

Members of the SEC stated that they believe he Union Carb has been entering "matching orders" in aircraft shares since last April, creating "actual and apparent active trading" for the purpose of boosting the security's price U S Ind Alc and inducing its purchase by others.

Whether the present charges are substantiated remains to be seen. The important thing is that the SEC is Worthington at last moving against traders who seek to manipulate the market—and, in that way, is offering a real protection for
