BETTER LATE THAN never, we made our annual visit to the "TEXAS" production in Palo Duro Canyon this week.

We have hardly missed a year since "TEXAS" was first produced in 1966, and the show always seems to get better every year.

As most of you know, the Ellis family thought the production was especially good during the summer of 1979, when daughter Laura was in the cast, and we made more than just a couple of "token" appearances that year.

Laura and husband Tim accompanied us to the production this week, and it served as her 10th anniversary since serving as a dancer on the "TEXAS" stage.

She was somewhat surprised to find that there were several members of the cast from 1979 who still are appearing in the production.

Of course there is Jerry (Tucker Yeldell) Williams, who is in his 22nd season as the crusty prospector, and Lois Kirkpatrick Hull, in her 14th season as "Aunt Anna" in the production.

In addition to these, along with a couple of other members of the dance troupe, Laura met two other former members of "TEXAS" who, like herself were attending in the audience last Tuesday.

One was Royal Brantley, who played Calvin Armstrong the year Laura was in the show, and the other was Kevin Knapp, who was a dancer in the show prior to becoming legislative assistant to Bill Sarpalius and is now an Amarillo businessman.

Then there is Raymond Raillard, executive vice president of the "TEXAS" production, who still greets audiences as one of the ticket-takers as you enter the amphitheatre.

Besides the always-changing costumes, it seemed that one of the major improvements for 1989 has been in the sound area. The audio and visual aspects of the show have always been superb, but it seems that there have been major improvements in this area in the past few years.

At every performance, there are those who are seeing the "TEXAS" production for the first time, and no doubt a number like ourselves, who have probably seen it 50 times. And it's hard to tell who is enjoying the production the most.

One thing for sure: the "TEXAS" production has more than equalled the expectations that Margaret Harpet and her cohorts had for the project when they began to dream about it in the early 1960s.

"TEXAS" has become the major tourist attraction for the Panhandle area, as more than 2,000,000 people have seen the production during its 24 seasons.

PTA Garage Sale Set Here Friday


The Bovina PTA is sponsoring a garage sale on Friday, August 18 at the American Legion Hall.

Spirits Run High As Grid Workouts Begin

Twenty-three candidates for the Bovina Mustangs football team greeted Coach Terry Bean when two-a-day workouts began for the recruits on Monday.

Bean said there should be more prospects added to the squad, with perhaps as many as seven boys joining the team by the time school starts.

"The workouts have been nice so far. The weather hasn't been too hot (through Tuesday morning), so that's a big help. When it starts to warm up, that may be another matter," Bean said.

Although hit a lick by graduation where the Mustangs lost six players from the team that captured a district title for Bovina in their first six-man season, Bovina is already being touted as a threat in district this year, which would be a fantastic re-building job by Coach Bean.

Among the returners are senior Manuel Porras, who was a second-team all-state defensive tackle a year ago. Porras is 5-8, 155 pounds.

Also back is sophomore Corey Kirkpatrick, who was a second team all-district runningback, and was on the first team as its punter in his freshman season. Kirkpatrick is 5-10, 165 pounds.

Then there is sophomore Cain Neal, 6-0, 197. According to Bean, Neal has good speed and "soft" hands. He will play center for the Mustangs.

Jimmy Don Gilbreath, 5-10, 155, is a senior guard-end back from last year's team.

A couple of players who will be seniors are coming out for football for the first time since junior high. They are Randy Stone and Tony Flores. Both of these players show a lot of promise, Coach Bean says. Stone was a member of the basketball team last winter that also won district.

Bean has some freshmen up from the junior high team that he is expecting to be a lot of help. These include Andy Stormes, Rusty Venable, Isabell Marrufo and Chris Wilson.

Kory Mitchell, a sophomore, along with Juan Reyna, quarter-

backed Bovina's junior varsity team to an outstanding season last year. If there had been a district championship in JV, the Bovina team would have claimed the title. This duo is expected to contribute significantly to the 1989 Mustang effort.

"The players have come out with a great attitude. We don't get to put on the pads and do any hitting until Friday, but they seem anxious to do some hitting. By the time Friday rolls around, this should be a pretty good workout, if the fans want to come out and watch," Coach Bean said.

Bean said that the fact that several players saw action either on the varsity, JV or junior high team should make things a little easier at the start of the season, where last year the players were having to learn a completely new system in the six-man game.

The Mustangs will scrimmage here against Whitharral on August 25, and then travel to New Home on September 1 in their second scrimmage outing.

Area Receives 1.5 Inches Of Rainfall

The Bovina area received 1.5 inches of rain last weekend, according to Maggie Moore, who keeps track of the local rainfall.

There was a light shower on Friday night of about .1 inch of rain, and the balance fell on Saturday night and in the early morning hours of Sunday.

Virtually all of the rainfall fell nicely, and should have been of maximum benefit to farmland, falling as it did when the temperature was at its lowest point of the night, and without any accompanying wind.



Students Need S.S. Numbers

Monday, August 28 will be the first day of school in Bovina for the 1989-90 school term, according to Bob Owen, superintendent.

Students in grades seven through 12 who are new to the Bovina Independent School District for the coming school year are asked to come by the school and pre-register prior to the first day.

The students in both junior high and high school pre-registered at the end of last school term, so will not need to do so prior to the opening of school, and elementary students will register on the first day of school, Owen said.

Students in elementary school must have their Social Security numbers when they register, it was announced.

The in-service schedule for Bovina teachers will begin on Friday, August 18 and continue throughout next week.

There are nine teachers who are new to the Bovina School system for 1989-90. These are as follows:

Tony McGowan is the new director of bands for the Bovina Schools. He is coming here from Tahoka.

Lou Ann McGowan, also from Tahoka, will be a teacher in the elementary school.

Dennis Field will teach junior high school social studies. He comes to Bovina from Canyon.

Wanda Burney will be a teacher in the elementary school. Mrs. Burney taught in the Friona School system for several years.

Shelly Bean will be teaching kindergarten. She is the wife of Coach Terry Bean, and this is her first teaching experience.

Larry Futch is the new high school boys' basketball coach and athletic director. Futch has coached for the past several years at Hartley.

Martha Morris will teach pre-kindergarten. Ms. Morris is coming to Bovina from Clovis, N.M.

Jim Nau is the junior high boys coach. He is coming to Bovina from Lufkin.

Gina Prather will be a teacher in elementary school. She comes from Brownfield, and is the wife of Bovina's new Church of Christ minister.

Bivins Gives Update At Friona Meeting

Senator Teel Bivins, who represents the 31st District in the Texas Legislature, was in Friona on Friday, August 1, to report on the 71st Legislature. Bivins met with several local people at Cora's Kitchen for a breakfast that was followed by his report.

Senator Bivins highlighted several legislative actions taken during the session, discussing both what he saw, as positive and negative. Bivins stressed the success of the Legislature in terms of taxes, criminal justice, agriculture, and rural health care. He pointed out that the Legislature "failed" in terms of public education and workers' compensation.

"The most important item, in my view, was that for the first time in four sessions, no new taxes were imposed. In fact, we allowed the existing temporary taxes to expire," said Senator Bivins.

In the area of criminal justice, Bivins reported that the Legislature approved the increase of 20,000 new beds in Texas prisons. This is a 100% increase over the present 40,000 beds.

Also, a bill was passed which will allow law enforcement officers to seize not only personal property derived from the commission of a felony, but now officers may seize any personal property or real estate used in or derived from the commission of any felony.

Senator Bivins was pleased with the gains made for District 31. He reported that funds were restored to the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, to four junior colleges in the district that had been vetoed by the government in the past, to the Ag Extension Service in Amarillo, and to the Texas Tech Medical School. Bivins felt that the West Texas State University/Texas A&M merge was the "pinnacle" of the work done by the legislative members from this area.

Bivins also explained his "strategy" for this legislative session. "My goal was to limit my legislative activity to a narrow scope of issues," said the senator.

Instead of trying to gain a little bit of knowledge on every subject, Bivins focused on some "areas of public policy that I knew something about, and tried to develop as much or more knowledge as any of my colleagues in the Senate." Bivins said that he tried to focus on issues concerning the people of this district such as agriculture and education.

Senator Bivins told of his involvement in a "team approach"

to best serve the interests and needs of the Panhandle people. He explained that he and the five representatives from this same area met every Thursday morning to discuss and review the bills that were coming up for debate in both the House and the Senate. "We needed to get together and develop strategies of how to pass bills, or often more important, how to kill bills (that were affecting the people of this area)," said Bivins.

Senator Teel Bivins felt that his first session in the Senate was a successful one in light of the fact that it was the first time he has held a public office. "It is my feeling that the people of Senate District 31 and our institutions did not suffer too greatly to the fact that their senator was a freshman," said Bivins.

Unit Set To Visit

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97 per cent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 per cent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast care detection unit will be made available to local women on Wednesday, August 30.

The mobile unit will be parked at the Bovina City Hall. Appointments may be made by calling 238-1116.


