(Copyright 1935 by United Press) ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 25.— Ethiopia claimed the rout of three Italian battalions on the northern front today with more than 100 Italians killed.

An official statement said the fight occurred near Hawale, north of Makale, on the northern front. The three Italian battalions, it was asserted, had plundered a village and had encamped to feast on captured cattle.

Ethiopians surprised the Italians in a canyon in the mountains, attacked furiously and killed the commander and more than 100 men, according to estimates of those present. The rest of the Italians were put to flight and eight horses and 13 mules, carrying ammunition, were captured. This victory was impossible to con-

Communists were reported in control of the city of Natal in the north today and loyal troops and rebels were fighting for control of Pernambuco.

Luis Prestes, communist leader for all of South America, was beieved to be leading the rebellion. It was reported that the movement was intended to be a general one, providing for outbreaks not only in Brazil but in Argentina, Chile and Paraguay.

Federal regulars, navy airplanes and government cruisers were speeding north to engage the rebels, Gen. Manuel Rabelo was named in supreme command with orders to suppress the revolution. All army, navy and police units in the country were out on emergency duty.

It was indicated that the rebels had control of the states of Rio Grande, de Norte, of which Natal is the chiew city and that they were strong in Pernambuco state.

#### Taxpayers Burdened By Officeholders

When Scheherazade of Arabian Nights' fame, was trying to think of enough tall tales to keep her husband from having her head cut off at the break of dawn, she told him about the Old Man of the Sea.

The Old Man of the Sea was a tenacious individual who had a way of jumping on the shoulders of perfect strangers and compelling them to give him free transportation. Once he got on, there was no getting him off; he stuck and enjoyed the ride until his human steed could go no farther.

Now Scheherazade flourished 'way back in the days of ancient Bagdad, but her story has a very modern ring, and the Ameican taxpayer can listen to it with a sad smile of recognition; for if ever there was a person who is ridden by the Old Man of the Sea, it is this same taxpayer.

Wherever he goes, the taxpayer carries on his shoulders a flock of officeholders, and he could very profitably get rid of a great many of them if they didn't have their knees cemented firmly against his short ribs.

Forget, for the moment, about the vast horde in Washington, and the lesser hordes in each state capital, and think only of the local county seat. It probably is no exaggeration whatever to say that at least half of the county officers in this republic are completely unnecessary and would be cut off the payroll forthwith if our system of local government were even 50 per cent efficient.

For one thing, we have far too many counties. In this day of autos and paved roads, a state which contains three dozen counties could combine them into eight or ten without working any real hardship on anyone. The horse and buggy era made small counties necessary; the modern age makes them utterly useless.

It is self-evident that a slight extension of the state police idea would completely do away with the need for sheriffs, deputies, and small-town constables.

If it be objected that deputy sheriffs have such essential duties as the serving of legal papers to perform, it can only be replied that Uncle Sam's registered mail would do that job quite as efficiently and infinitely more cheaply.

We have county auditors and treasurers and assessors. each with his own staff, when one office could very well do the work of all three. We have vestigial remnants, such as coroners.

We have, to top everything, the fact that 99 per cent of these offices are grossly over-staffed, due to the requirements of party politics.

The needless officeholder is the modern Old Man of the Sea. The taxpayer patiently lugs him around and pays through the nose for the privilege.

Some day, let us hope, the taxpayer will get wise, pitch the Old Man into the nearest ditch-and discover that he can govern himself for about half of the present cost.

A hearty laugh is often as good, if not better, than a hearty meal.


