



Those two pylons that rise toward the sky along the green slopes of Vimy Ridge were dedicated by the King of England, and a great crowd stood in silence to hear his eloquent tribute to the heroes whom the pylons commemorate.

Yet this memorial, like all World War memorials, becomes more than a record of great heroism and painful sacrifice, when you think about it a little. It is both exclamation point and question mark; a reminder that human beings on this earth must stand or fall together, all of them, and a repetition of the wistful, unanswerable "Why?" which the great war continues to provoke.

It is a strange and tragic thing, when you stop to ponder it, that this gigantic memorial should rise on a hillside in France to honor the last sacrifice of 60,000 young Canadians


