

Ex-Resident Charged With Murder

Infant Deaths Investigated

A former Bovina resident has been charged with first degree murder in the death of her young child in Garden City, Kansas, and the incident has caused local law officials to re-open investigations of five infant deaths that occurred while she was living in Bovina.

Diana Lumbrera, 31, is currently in custody in Garden City, Kansas.

She has been charged with murder in the latest death of a child. In addition to having lost six of her own children at very early ages, another infant she was babysitting while she was a local resident died from mysterious causes. The parents of that child, thought to be a relative, lived in Dimmitt.

Four of the children died while Ms. Lumbrera lived in Bovina, and another died in Dimmitt. Residents of Bovina took donations to help bury some of the babies that died when she was living here.

According to authorities, autopsies were performed on two of the children who died in this area. One showed that a baby suffocated from "aspiration of stomach content" (vomit), and one died with a heart disorder, according to Bovina Chief of Police Gary Coleman.

Most of the infants died when they were only a few months old, which may have led authorities to suspect SIDS (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome), although one was about two years of age and another three.

Lumbrera is the daughter of Alvino and Juanita Lumbrera. The mother died of leukemia five years ago, and the father now lives in Clovis, N.M.

Chief of Police Coleman said "Whether or not the murder charges will hold up is unknown at this time, but the case is certainly being investigated."

Water District In Its Annual Survey

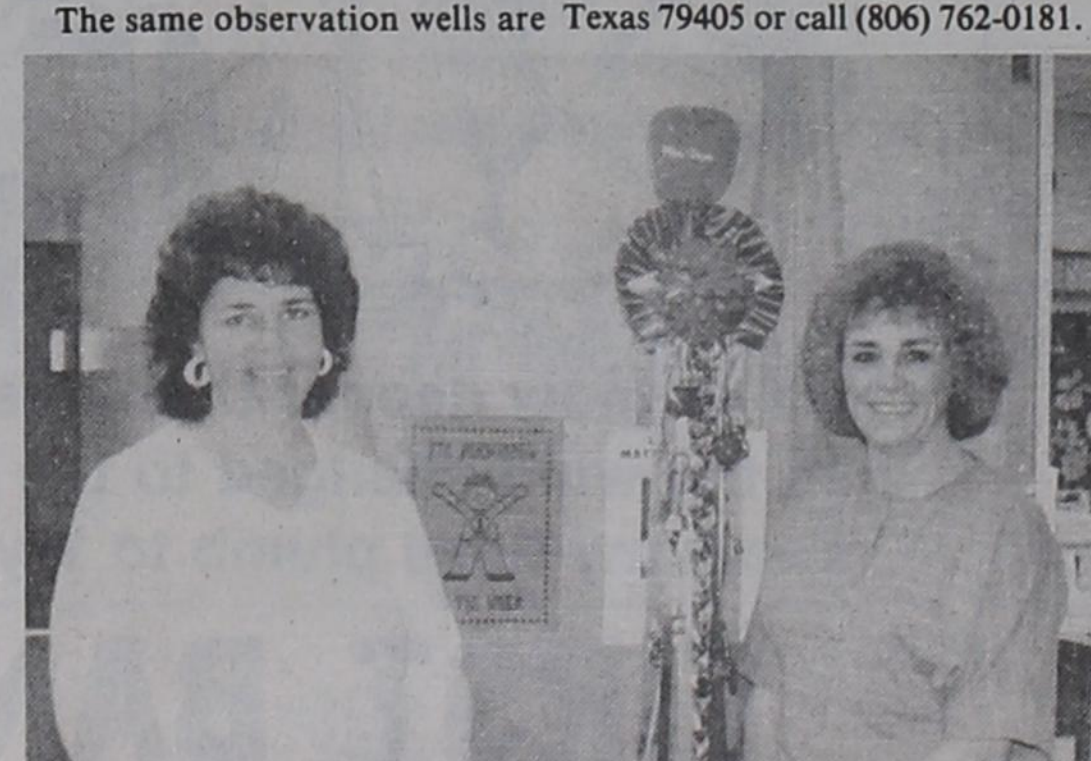
Now that groundwater levels measured each year, and the data collected during the January and February 1990 measurements will be compared to the previous year's date to determine any changes in the water levels in the Ogallala Formation.

Maps showing the location of each observation well in a county or portion of a county served by the Water District are published annually in the April issue of the District's newsletter, *The Cross Section*.

Tables listing the observation wells in each county and the depth-to-water measurement at one, five and ten-year intervals are included in this special issue. The annual average water level changes in feet for one, five and ten-year intervals are also published.

Technical Division staff will be traveling to each well site in blue and white Water District vehicles. Staff members will be happy to answer any questions from landowners and/or producers while the depth-to-water measurement is being made.

WHY IS IT THAT the person who has everything, now needs an elaborate security system in order to keep other people from taking it all away from him?

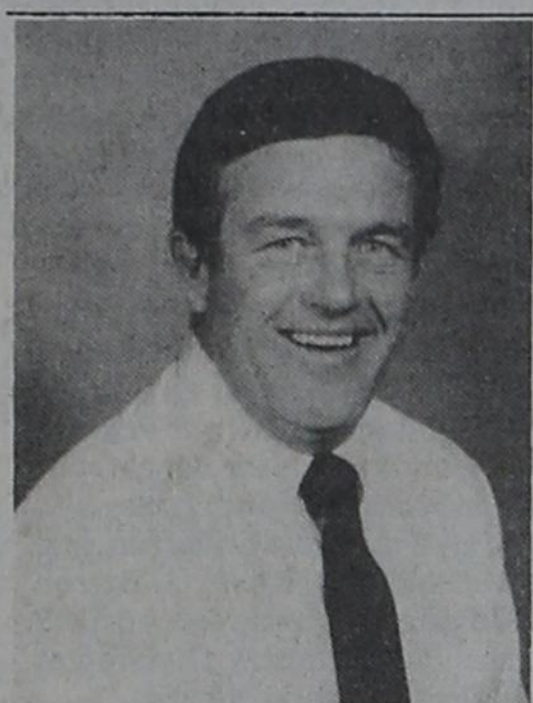

Update Given On Stallings Condition

Ted Stallings' condition is still critical but the report is that the skin grafting done on Friday of last week is looking good so far and his vital signs are good.

Ted is owner of Ted's Spraying Service in Bovina and was spraying over forest land in Pennsylvania on Tuesday of last week when he flew too low and transit lines caught the cockpit of his plane and caused the fiery crash.

His secretary, Margaret Meason, said 44 per cent of Ted's body had third degree burns and 26 per cent has second degree burns.

Ted grew up in Bovina and his parents are Chuck Stallings of Clovis and Tootsie Stewart of T or C, New Mexico. His sister, Vicki Goebel, lives in Clovis. His wife is Glenna and her parents are Albert and Ann Lee Henry of Logan, New Mexico. All of the family is in Pennsylvania with Ted except for

his three-year-old son, and he is staying with Glenna's sister.

Margaret said a government employee from Pennsylvania, Henry Kissinger, who works with the Forest Service there, called her and talked to her. He said Ted was at the top burn center in the world and was getting the best care possible for a burn patient.

Margaret said the telephone has been ringing off the wall since the accident, and she also expressed much appreciation to Jim Zehner and Anita Guest, who came to the office and answered the telephone so she could get her work in the office completed. She said people had been so very concerned about Ted, and all of us are very anxious about him.

Couple Adds Baby Boy

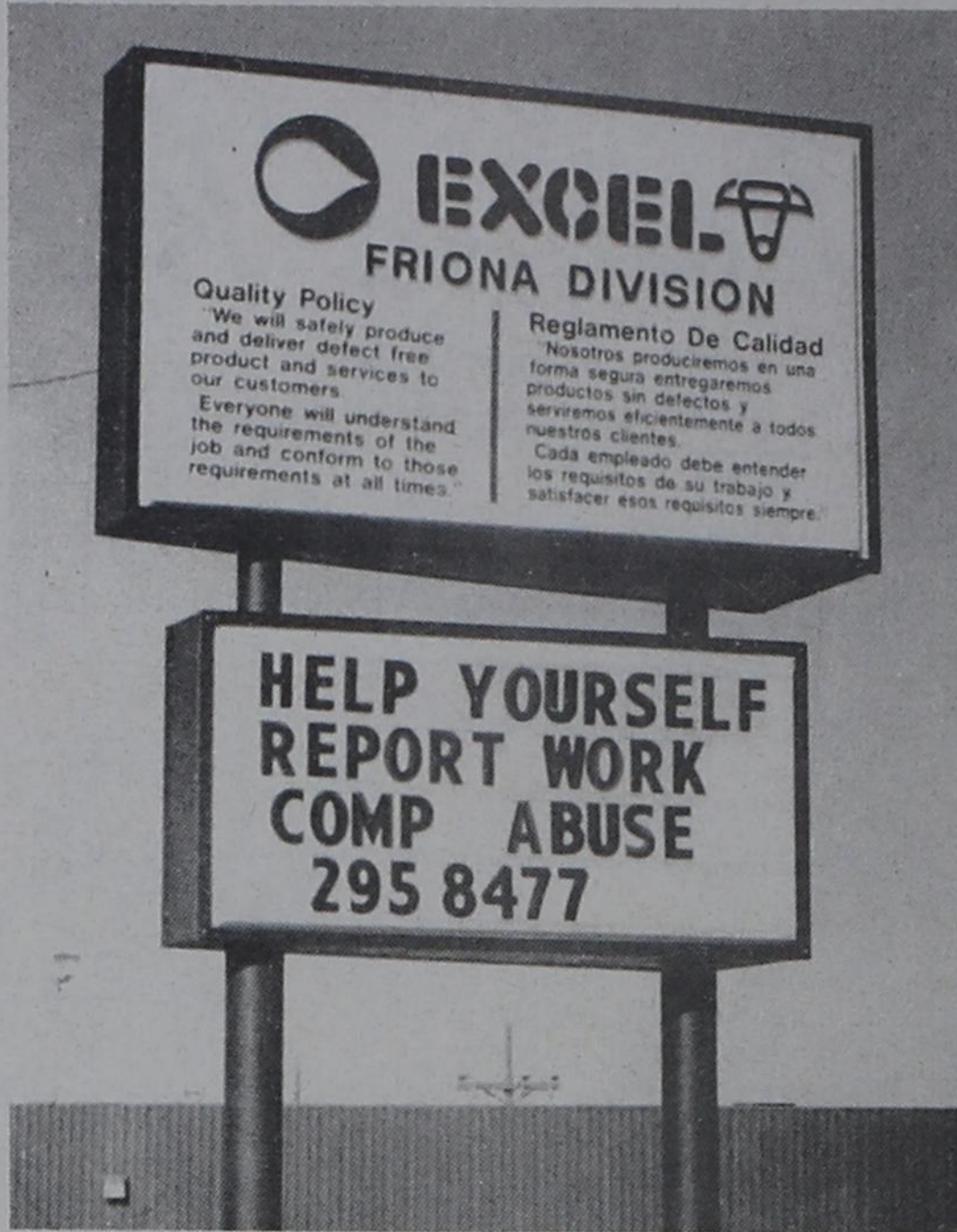

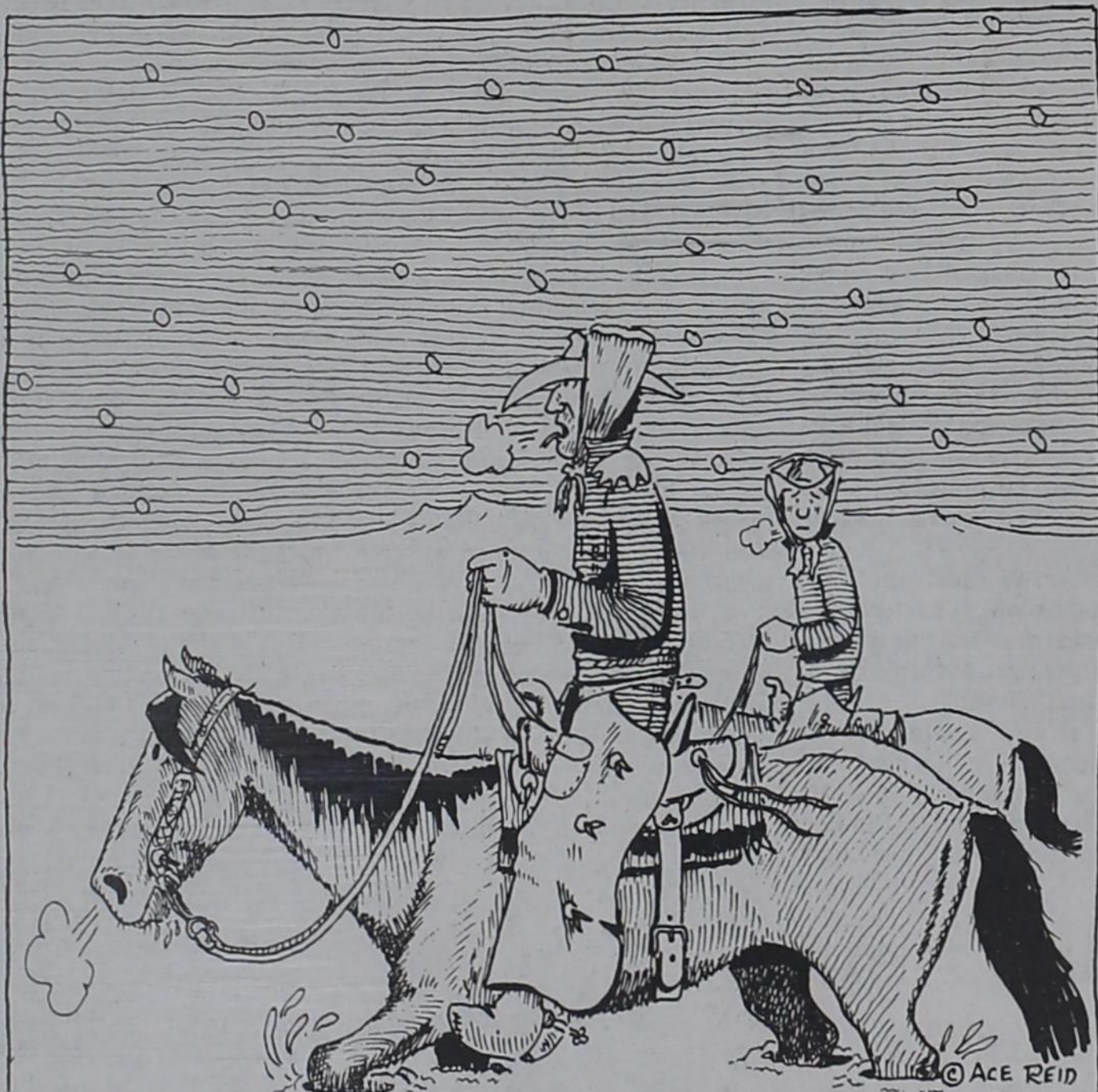

SPS Action Aids Fuel-Cost Savings

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to credit \$20.7 million to its Texas retail customers for savings in fuel costs.

Retail customers include residential, commercial and industrial users.

A residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month would receive a one-time credit of \$22.51. The proposed credit includes interest at an annual rate of 11.7%.

SPS expects to get swift approval on this filing, said Gerald Diller, SPS's group manager of rates and regulation.

"We hope to be able to apply the credit to our customers' July bills," he said. The credit would cover fuel expenses from April 1989 through March 1990.

"Several factors made these savings for customers possible," Diller said. "For example, expenses related to the purchase of power from other electric companies were reduced. Also, we were able to negotiate for lower fuel contracts at our power plants. Additionally, this credit includes customers' share of the proceeds made from off-system sales to other electric utilities. The net result is lowered costs for our customers."

Of the \$20.7 million requested credit, about \$11.2 million accumulated since the beginning of the year. This primarily was due to the delay in getting approval from the Texas commission to implement a new lower "fuel-cost recovery factor." SPS's original request, filed in November 1989, was to implement the lower "fuel-

cost recovery factor" by January 1. The factor was ultimately implemented on April bills, Diller said, resulting in an overall 9.6% rate decrease.

Doyle Moore, SPS's Panhandle Division manager, said continued savings in fuel expenses will help the area economy.

"SPS expends significant effort to keep its fuel expenses down. And since the cost of fuel makes up about half of an electric bill, that's very important to the customer," he said. "By continuing to be a low-cost producer of power, SPS is sending the message that this part of the country is a great place for relocating and expanding businesses."

Moore noted that SPS's industrial rates already are among the lowest in the nation.

"We are active in economic development activities in our region and we are pleased to be able to pass this savings to our customers," he said.

Signs Of Stroke

Suffering a stroke can be a frightening experience, particularly for the person who is unaware of what is occurring.

A stroke is an instantaneous disruption of the blood flow to a certain portion of the brain. When fresh blood is not received by a section of the brain, the cells are deprived of needed oxygen, and damage results. The body function that is controlled by that particular part of the brain is then damaged either temporarily or permanently.

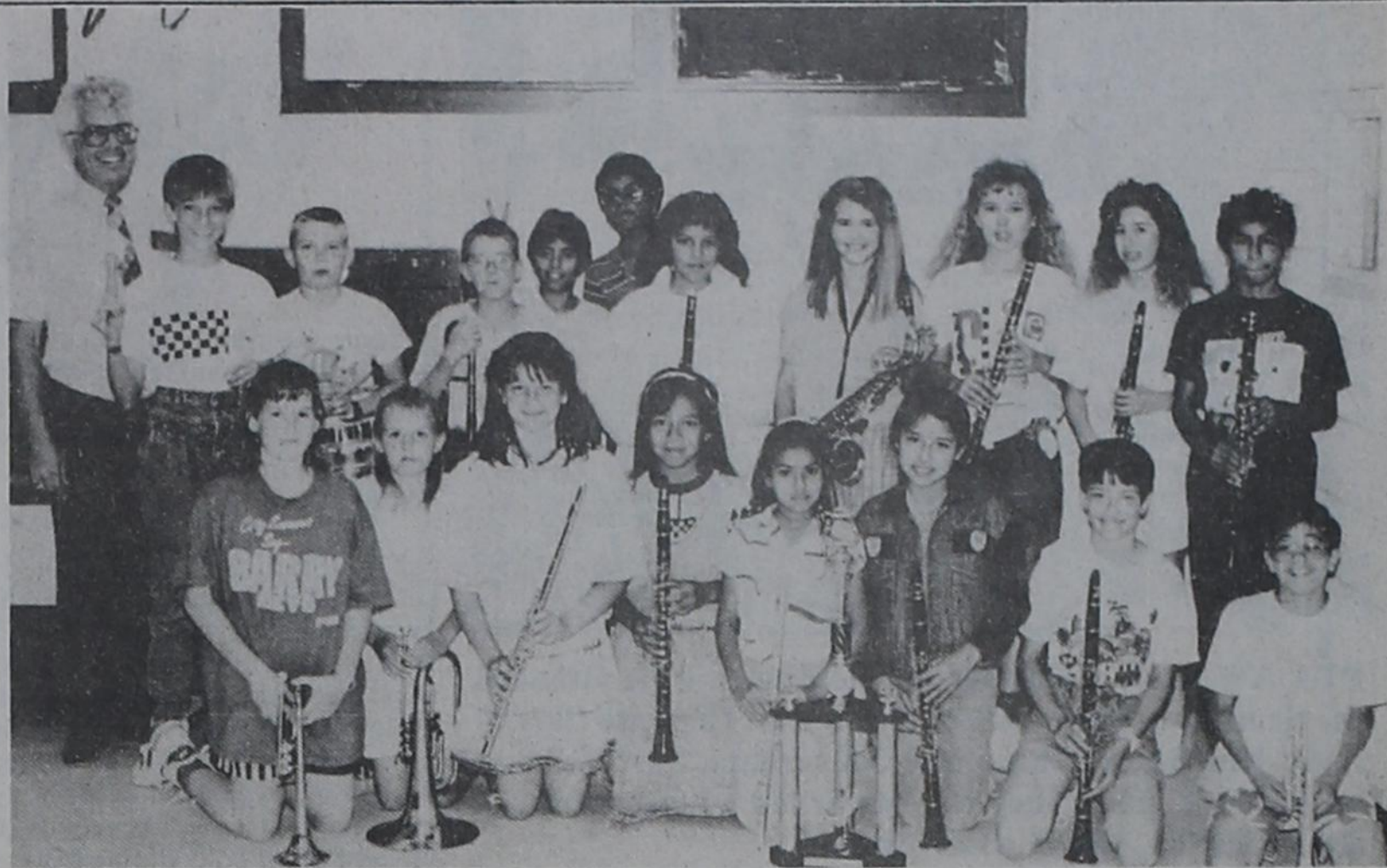
Some strokes result from blocked arteries that literally starve the brain of blood. The arteries are simply too clogged with fatty deposits to allow enough blood to reach the brain. Other types of strokes that are more serious in nature are like hemorrhages that leak into the brain tissue or small clots which break loose from the arterial wall and block the artery.

According to medical experts in Methodist Hospital's Rehabilitation Institute, the following are warning signs of a stroke:

- *Dizziness;
- *A temporary loss in memory or mental ability;
- *Numbness or weakness in the face, arm or leg on one side;
- *Garbled speech or new swallowing problems;
- *Eye problems, including temporary loss of sight or double vision; and
- *Recent onset of severe headaches.

A person also can experience a temporary "little stroke," called a transient ischemic attack, and not even be aware of it. The following may signal that attention is needed to prevent a future, more serious stroke:

- *Blackouts;
- *Falls which have no explanation;
- *Temporary loss of vision;
- *Dizziness; and
- *Temporary weakness in the limbs.
