

#### The World's Too Small for Racial Enmity

Those three reporters who are racing around the globe may not realize it, but they are handing the world a neat little object lesson on the folly of jealous nationalism.

Using ordinary, commercial means of transportation, they expect to circle the globe in three weeks or less. That measures the shrinkage of the earth in this modern era. It shows just how closely the races of man have been jammed together by twentieth century science.

In a world grown as small as that — a world which you can completely circle in less time than you could have crossed the Atlantic a century ago — it ought to be clear to the blindest that men are under a greater compulsion that ever before to get along with one another, to co-operate, to substitute harmony for discord.

Yet the trend has been all the other way, ever since the war. Apolicy of isolation has been followed in almost every great capital.

Nation after nation has tried to pull down the blinds and pretend that it could work out its own salvation without regard for what its neighbors did - just as if neighbors were still as far away as they were at the time of the

That policy may have been all right a century ago. It is far from all right now. For a n odd thing about technological improvement is that when you invent a new machine, you are compelled to use it, whether you want

Inventing machines that have made the earth shrink to a tenth of its old size, men are forced to use them.
