V. Steele To Celebrate Her 80th Birthday

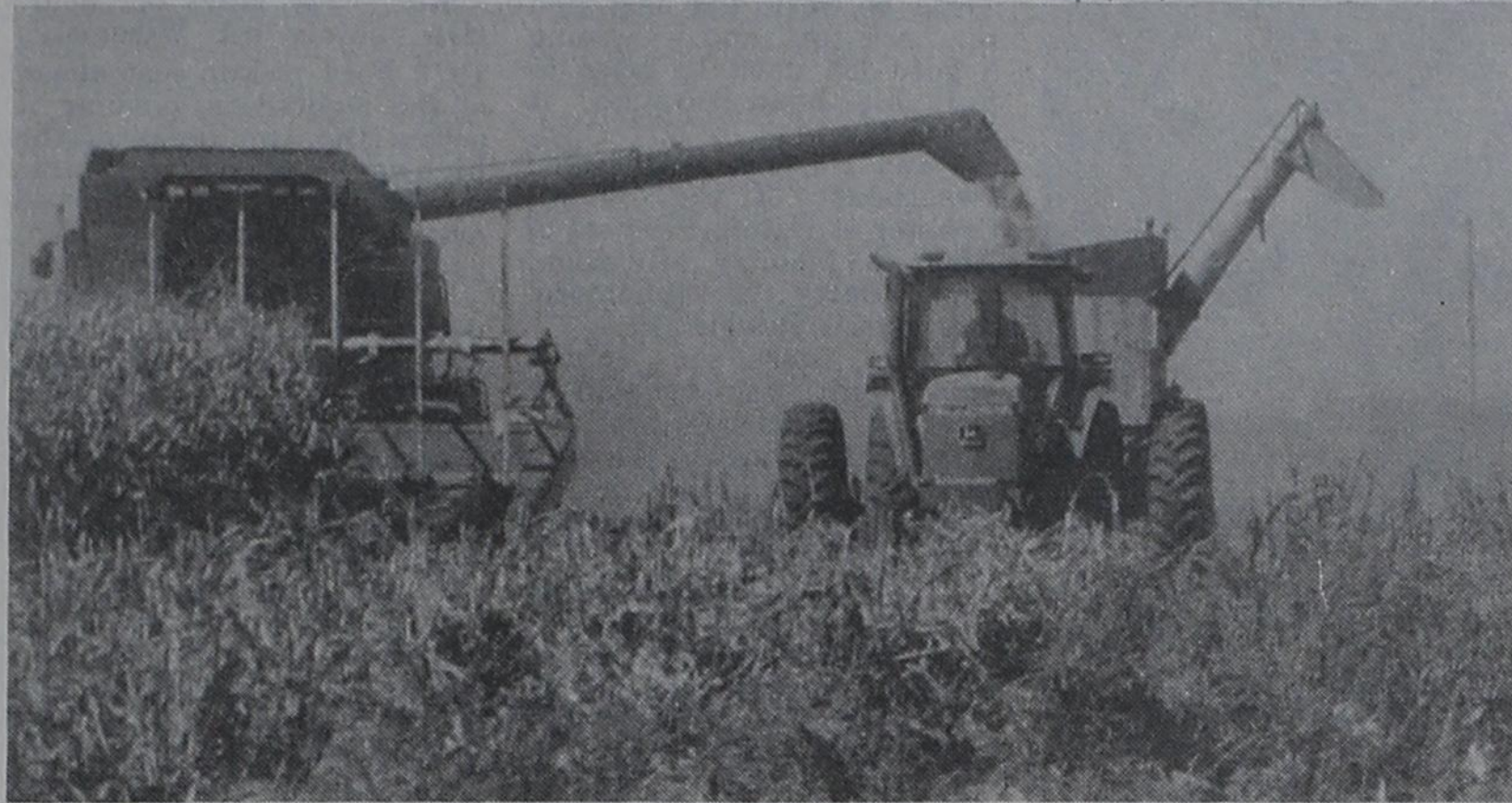

'Stangs Smash Smyer 34-13, Aim To Go 5-0 At Lorenzo

Last year when the Mustangs opened at 4-0, fans, players, and coaches were amazed, delighted, and had begun to believe.

But in game 5, the Lorenzo Fighting Hornets came to town and flew off with a wild and crazy 34-32 win, spoiling Bovina's bid to go into district play with a 5-0 record.

This year, the Mustangs again face the Fighting Hornets, who are 1-3, with the same 4-0 record.

The difference is that the 1997 Mustangs know what it is like to win. They have more confidence and more

balance this year as they face a Lorenzo team who is coming off a 37-21 loss to Lubbock Christian.

So far the Mustangs have met with little resistance in their four victories, trampling Smyer last week 34-13, giving the 'Stangs a 144-25 edge in scoring through four games.

To continue the 1997 "surprise" series, after scoring a quick third quarter touchdown on a 36 yard scramble by Tony Beauchamp, the Mustangs special teams "surprised" Smyer with an on-side kick.

The Mustangs recovered the on-side boot at Smyer's 47-yard-line and promptly drove to the two, where Tony Beauchamp punched across, Billy Chisom added his second two-point conversion and Bovina had a comfortable (surprise) 28-7 lead.

On their second possession, the Mustangs drove 93 yards behind Albert Larrea's runs of 18 and 22 yards, and sophomore standout Lucas Ramos' 6-yard TD.

The Mustangs next drive began at their own 12 and under the steady direction of all-state candidate Tony Beauchamp's option keepers on several plays, he scored on a 12-yard run. After a failed two-point try, the Mustangs led 12-0.

Ahead by an uncomfortable 12-7 margin at the half, Coach Ortiz's charges quickly added the two third quarter scores. Then Santiago

Vargas earned the special teams player-of-the-week award from coaches for a 65 yard punt return for a score in the fourth quarter.

Grinding it out on the ground, the Mustangs rushed 64 times for 431 yards. The passing game disappeared this week as Bovina completed only one pass in five attempts for seven yards.

Speaking of balance, against Smyer seven players gained rushing yardage. Preliminary figures showed these rushing stats: Beauchamp 13-101, Ramos 10-44, Reyna 7-46, Quintana 9-47, Larrea 11-87, Chisom 10-65, Vanegas 4-13.

Coach Ortiz said that the boys tended to play at Smyer's level during the first half, but a talk by coaches at half time motivated the team to a higher level of play during the second half.

Ortiz, normally conservative in his comments, praised the offensive line for their performance contributing to the 431 rushing yards. The entire offensive line was awarded for offensive player-of-the-week.

In 2A area rushing statistics Bovina trails only Lockney in the South Plains Area Statistics compiled by the Lubbock Avalanche Journal. Bovina is averaging 421.5 yards per game, while holding opponents to 165.3 per game, third in area defense.

Kerby Takes First Place In Week Four Of Contest

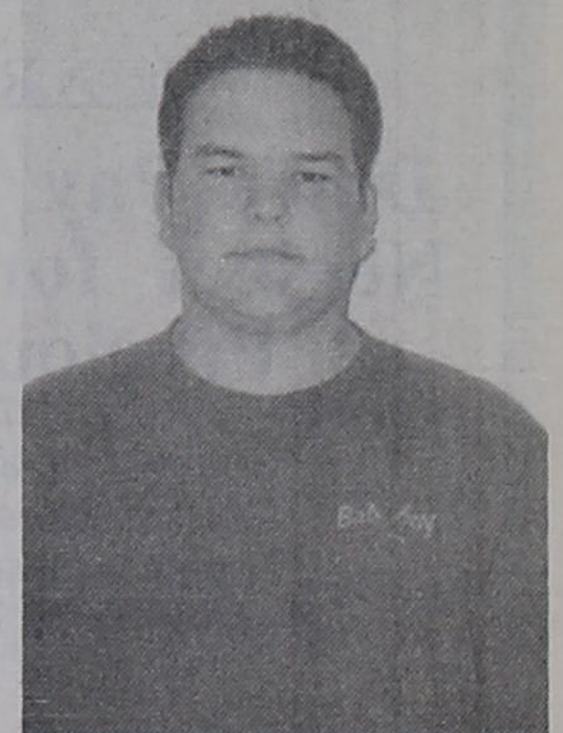
Student Of The Week

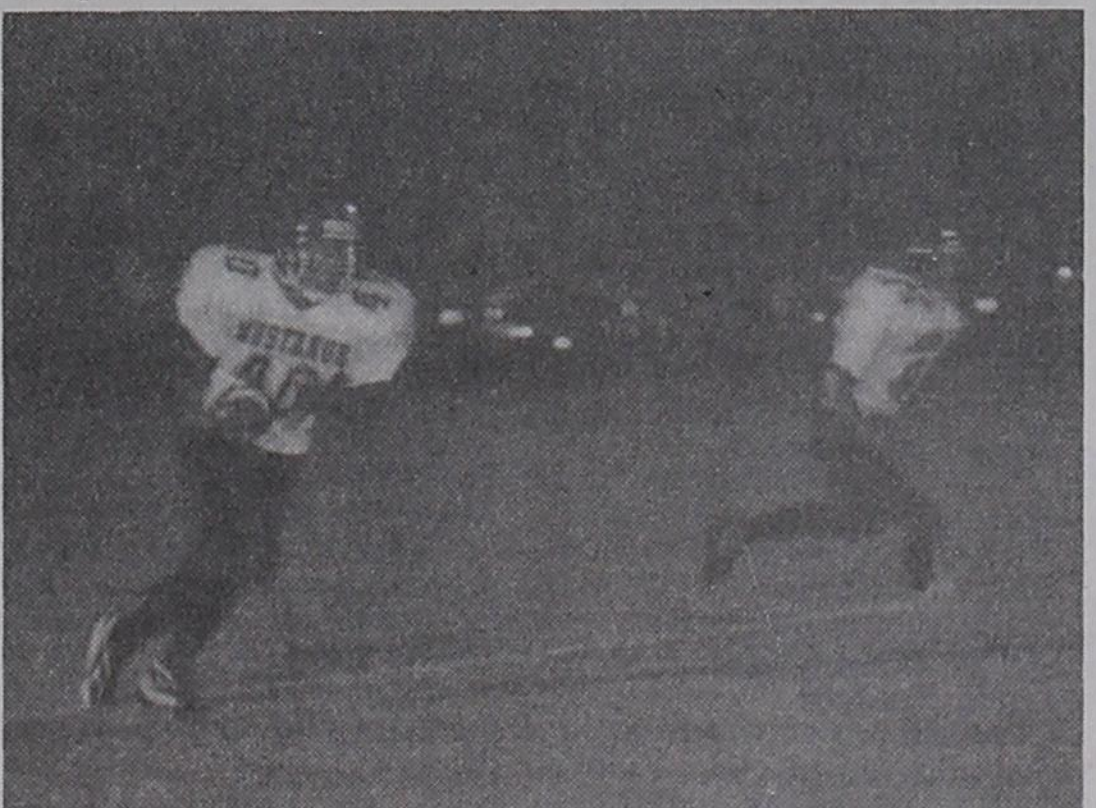
Ex-Teacher Meeting Scheduled For Tues.

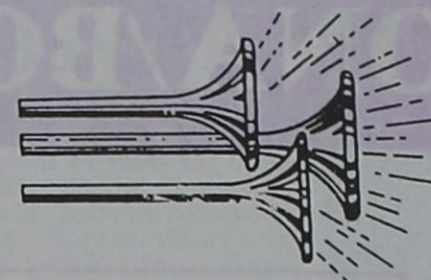

The State Fair of Texas opened in Dallas last Friday. My 40th class reunion is in progress in Hillsboro, Texas, as we speak. Class of 1957.

These two events came roaring back from my past this week as I reluctantly decided to make the drive back to Hillsboro and see my classmates from 40 years ago.

Hillsboro, the county seat of Hill County, is stuck in blackland farm country, 30 miles north of Waco and about 60 miles south of both Dallas and Ft. Worth.

I was born there, at home, a short distance out in the country. October 15, 1939. My mother, Hannah, was 20 years old. She said the doctor charged \$5 for the house-call and delivery.

Some folks these days that know me say she paid too much.

I was the first grandchild. Frank and Bobbie Brown, my mother's parents, were 39 years old when they became my grandparents.

Not only was I the first grandchild, I was an only child for nine years. Then Gena, Kathye, and Rick came along and ruined life as I knew it.

It really didn't matter though. By the time they arrived on the scene, I was already spoiled rotten. And I stayed that way.

In the fifth grade at Franklin Elementary I won first place in the fire prevention poster contest and had my picture in the paper. Today I help put lots of other kids pictures in the paper. I hope they will remember too at their 40th reunion.

In junior high I got my first pair of glasses. I did not want them, but from the first time I put them on I have never been without them. Junior high was a rough and awkward three years.

Junior high was when kids honed their skills and talents. It was the period

when bullies perfected their art of bullying.

It was when boys begin to realize that girls are not boys, and vice-versa. Sauntering, swaggering, and smart-mouthing hatched into full manifestation. Glory hallelujah!

It was an era when all our heroes were either baseball players or cowboy actors.

Joe Dimaggio, Yogi Berra, Roy Campanella, Jackie Robinson, and Mantle and Maris chilled and thrilled us through our radios and in the newsreels at the local movie houses where Roy Rogers, Gene Autry and Hopalong Cassidy held court each Saturday for a fee of nine cents.

It was a time long before Gatorade, Nike, velcro, and wealthy athletic egos.

In fact as I look back now it was sort of living your life in black and white instead of color. Life was simple. Life was fun. Little did we know.

By the time my best friend Bobby Frank Payne and I got to high school it was 1953. Bobby and I had been friends since 6th grade. We were inseparable all through school and beyond.

We played basketball year-round. There was me, Bobby, Booger Podsednik, and Duck Owens who made up four out of the five varsity basketball starters our junior and senior years.

I hope Booger and Duck come back for this 40th reunion. Bobby won't be there. He died in Dallas in 1967, ten years after he and I went to work for Braniff up there.

He died, while I was racing through Dallas traffic to the hospital, from injuries he received in a car accident. He was 27 years old.

He left a pregnant wife and five-year-old son. He left elderly parents who had already lost one son in World War II. Now they had lost their middle son, Bobby.

And Bobby left me too. Without warning, a friend I depended on constantly was simply gone. Didn't exist ex-

cept in memory where he still lives today.

I helped Bobby's widow with the funeral arrangements and lifted his young son up in my arms at the funeral so he could see daddy one last time. I managed not to cry until the cemetery.

Bobby and I and our classmates had a good time at HHS. It was back when home-coming corsages were made with real flowers, big white "mums". Saturday morning was spent sweeping white flower petals and glitter out of the car.

My class had 73 graduates. At various times I was in the band, on the student council, a class officer, a class favorite, and even president of the Latin Club.

We didn't need driver's ed to get a license. My mother put her life at great risk and taught me to drive out on Highway 22 between Hillsboro and Bynum. I got my license at 14.

My first car, a 1949

Plymouth, came along in 1955 or '56. During the years, we made the "drag" through town several thousand times and spent countless hours at Tacker's Drive-In listening to Fats Domino, Little Richard, and Jimmy Reed.

That was back when cars actually had fenders you could sit on and we did a lot of that too.

Each year, the State Fair in Dallas observed Hill County Day. They let school out that day and the high school band went to Dallas on buses, spent a day on the Midway in full band uniform, and performed a concert in the afternoon on the steps of the Hall of State.

Mother would give me maybe \$10 to spend at the Fair. When Midway games were a nickel or a dime and rides were a quarter, ten bucks was enough to make a boy's chest stick out with some kind of pride.

The smells, sights, and

sounds of the Fair are forever imbedded in my memory. We went timidly into the side shows to see the two-headed calf, bearded lady, and other improbable oddities.

We stood looking at the roller coaster waiting for one person to chicken out so none of us would have to ride it.

Footlong Fletcher's Corny Dogs, candied apples, popcorn, and taffy were breakfast, lunch, and dinner. It is a wonder we were able to play a note when concert time came.

I'm not sure why I am going back to this 40th reunion. To be honest, I am nervous about it. Don't know why exactly.

My mother and I are going to Hillsboro and joining my sisters. It will be nice to remember those years of our youth with our mother as the tour guide and historian.

I don't know where those 40 years went. I don't know whether I will know my classmates, but it won't take

long for memories to kick in.

Class reunions are about wondering as much as about remembering. "What ifs" will be as much fun as "How've you beens".

Either way, I am stepping back into history for perhaps one last time. I'm taking Bobby with me too.

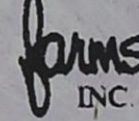

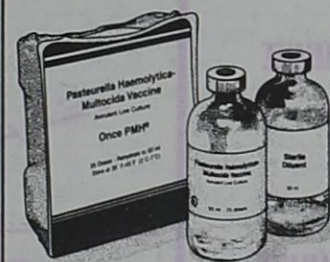

C. Richards Is Buried In Bovina

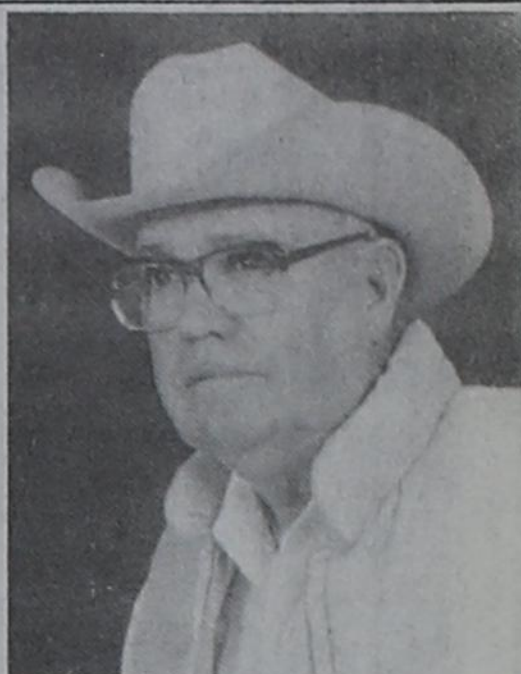
