Strange things do happen, however, and you are invited to listen to the tale of James Leftwich.

James Leftwich is a WPA worker in New York. He saved his salary diligently, and one night he planned a big splurge for the One and Only; he would take her to a fancy night club and show her life as it is lived.

He had to figure things pretty carefully, and he thought he had it doped out right down to the line. The chosen night club's advertisement announced a minimum charge of \$2.50 a person and stated that there was no

Leftwich found he could stand this and still have a dollar to tip the waiter. So, with his girl on his arm, on

But the night club double-crossed him, he said. When he got his bill he found on it an extra dollar as a "location charge." This left him with no money to tip the waiter, and roiled his sturdy American soul.

So he went to the police and made a kick about it—at the expense of a good deal of unpleasant publicity—and won from them, finally, a ruling that all night clubs henceforth must post plain notices of the freak charges which they will impose on their guests.

Now it isn't very important to the race whether New York night clubs gyp their patrons or not; but it does seem refreshing to find one cash customer in the United States who is ready to stand up on his hind legs and squawk when the needle goes into him. We could do with a good many more like James Leftwich.

For the American consumer is one of the most longsuffering souls in all Christendom, and he is exploited from dawn to dusk by all sorts of people.

He buys his way into a movie and is forced to sit through inane and unutterably boring advance showings of week-after-next's films. He rides downtown on an illventilated bus and is almost sufficated by fumes from the

He goes to a ball game and finds drinking fountains non-existent so that, to quench his thirst, he has to pay a dime for a nickel bottle of pop that he doesn't really want.

If he rides in a train, in a day coach, candy butchers are permitted to do everything but sit in his lap in their efforts to make him buy. He pays good money to see a prizefight and is treated to a patently fixed sparring

At football games he must pay a quarter or a half dollar for a program which he ought to get free. Theaters extract dimes from him for giving him a place to hang his

And the point is that he puts up with all this. If he would get up and yell, or break something, he could remedy matters. He is too long-suffering for his own good. He needs to contemplate the example of Mr. Leftwich.

Teacher Retirement To Be Voted Upon In November Election

On March 12, 1935, the House Committee on the Constitutional Amendment went on record as unanimously favoring the submission of an amendment which would enable the legislature, after its adoption, to enact teacher retirement laws. On the following day a lay committee of the Senate voted 7 to 2 in favor of submitting a similar resolution. In each instance the resolution went to its respective body for consideration.

In April, both houses approved the resolution by an overwhelming majority, and on May 1 the Governor signed the resolution submitting the amendment to the people, who will vote on it on No-
