

A. Serling C. Roberson acquired the rights of Robert Leftwich and the Nashville Company, obtained in 1826, to colonize lands when he attempted to settle the he was informed that it would be in violation of the law of April 6, 1830, forbidding further immigration .His contract was annulled and he was expelled from the country. In February, 1831, Austin and Samuel M. Williams obtained a grant that included part of the Leftwich grant. A little later Robertson's rights were restored and a bitter feeling between the two resulted, which lasted until Austin's death.

Q. On what grounds did the Mexican government restore Robertson's right to colonize the Leftwich grant? E. P.

A. The immigration law of April 6, 1830, allowed empresarios then holding grants one year to colonize the lands. That time had not intervened when Robertson attempt ed to carry out his contract, no had it passed in 1831 when Austin and Williams secured their grant covering part of the Leftwich or Robertson grant.



With the opening of the State Highway Patrol School at Camp Mabry near here Ocober 26, the "rookies" on the patrol will begin to learn their "trade" and old timers will refresh their memories on things learned in past schools.

For instance a patrolman must know how to conduct himself in a courr om when called n as a witness - in other words he must learn court room procedure. Every patrolman must be an accomplished public speaker. Courses on the subject are included in the school. This enables him to deliver lectures on the subjects of safety and first aid — which he must also have a thorough knowledge of.

No well informed patrolman is more than a few days behind in the statistics of highway patroling. This included the number of deaths, and injured in accidents, the number of accidents; where most of them occurred; the principal causes; whether accident victims were pedestrians or motorists; age of victims; and type of car or cars involved.

He must be able to administer first aid to the injured until a doctor arrives. To this he must be able to stop bleeding, apply tourniquets and bandages, and to generally care for the patient until a doctor is on the scene.

Every patrolman must have a working knowledge of crime investigation. This includes investigation of car theft, murder and almost every other crime on the

But above all a patrolman is tactful. No embarrassment must come to the parties involved in traffic accidents, if it can be avoided, and it nearly always is


