## Farm Bureau Is Hosting State President Tuesday

Bob Stallman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, will be honored at a luncheon at noon Tuesday, May 10, at the old Depot at the City Park in Friona.

Stallman has been a champion for the farmer and for better agriculture prices. He speaks out against such things as federal regulations, embargoes, tariffs, trade sanctions and other actions.

"Our government, and our people, share in the risk of farming with federal farm program payments to farm families. In the process, the American people are assured of an adequate, high quality and reasonably-priced supply of food and fiber," Stallman says.

"From the consumer's standpoint, it may be one of the most outrageously successful programs in history. It would make more sense to argue that the Dallas Cowboys are not the best team in the NFL.

"Farmers and ranchers, however, are not enjoying an end zone celebration of this food and fiber

miracle. Instead, we are under attack by elements that range from the ill informed to those that should know better," he continued.

"The public is generally not aware that farm program benefits are but a small percentage of the U.S. Department of Agriculture budget. USDA feeds millions of schoolchildren, many of them for free.

"Farm program benefits total less than one per cent of the federal budget--not a bad price tag for food security.

Today, May 7 is local election day in three races, the City election, the ISD board election, and the hospital board election.

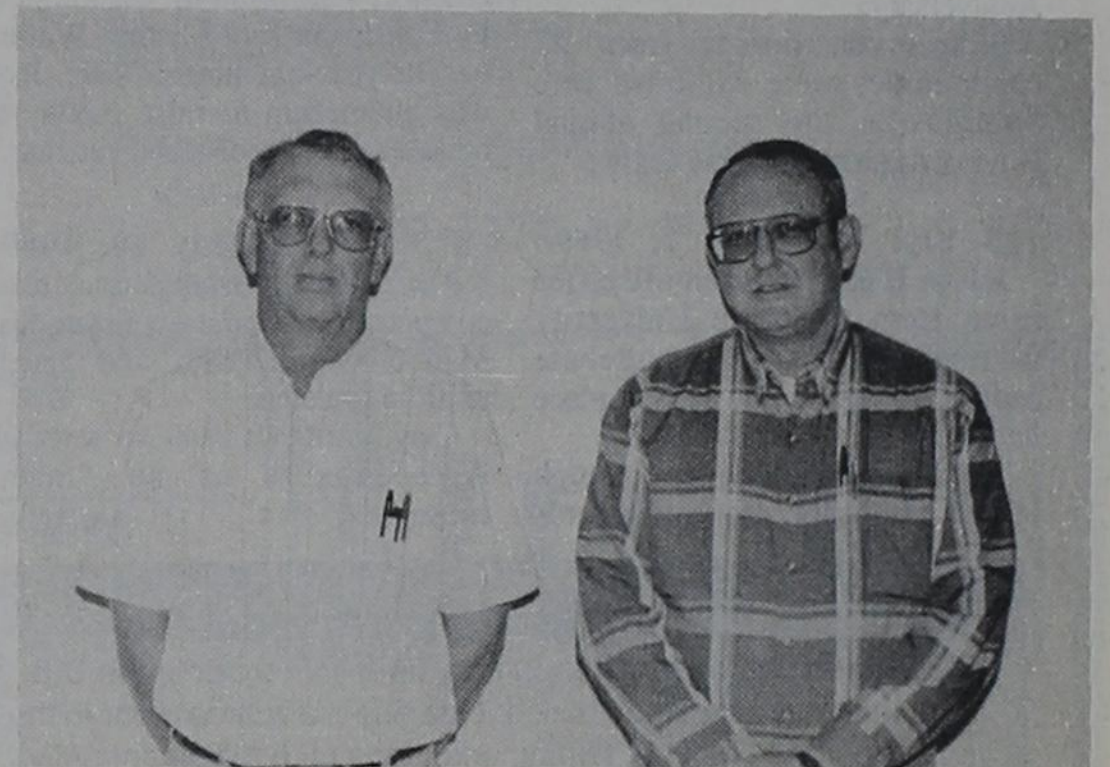
The voting for the City and hospital board elections will take place at the EMS Building on Third Street on Saturday, May 7 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

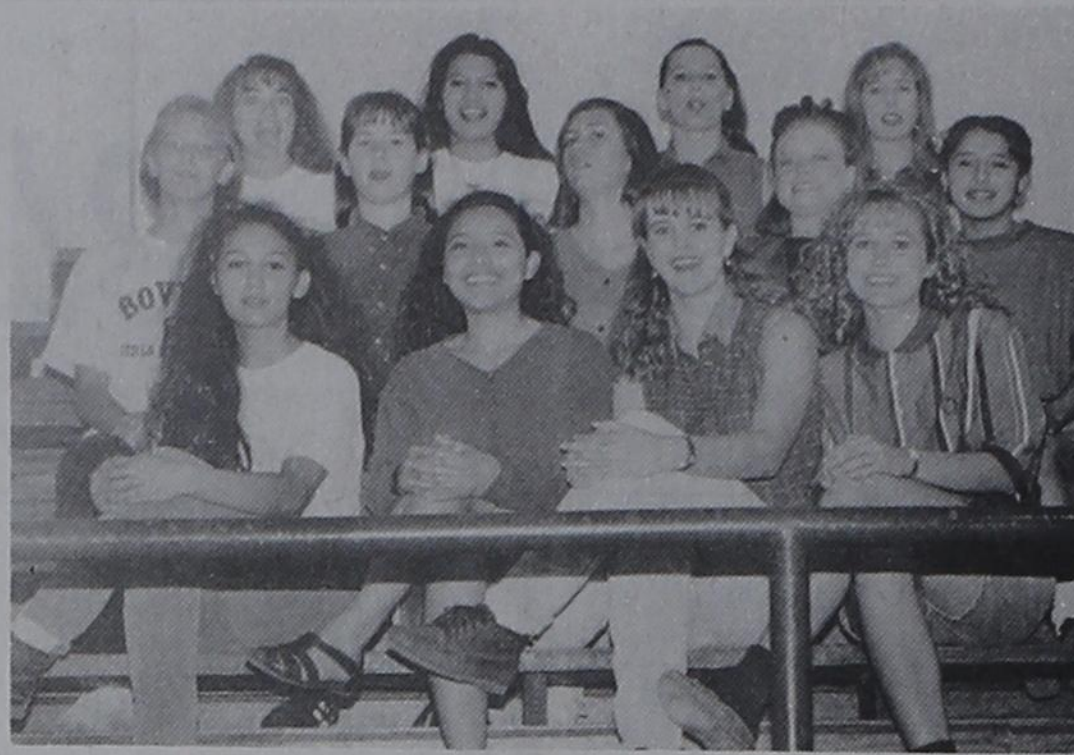

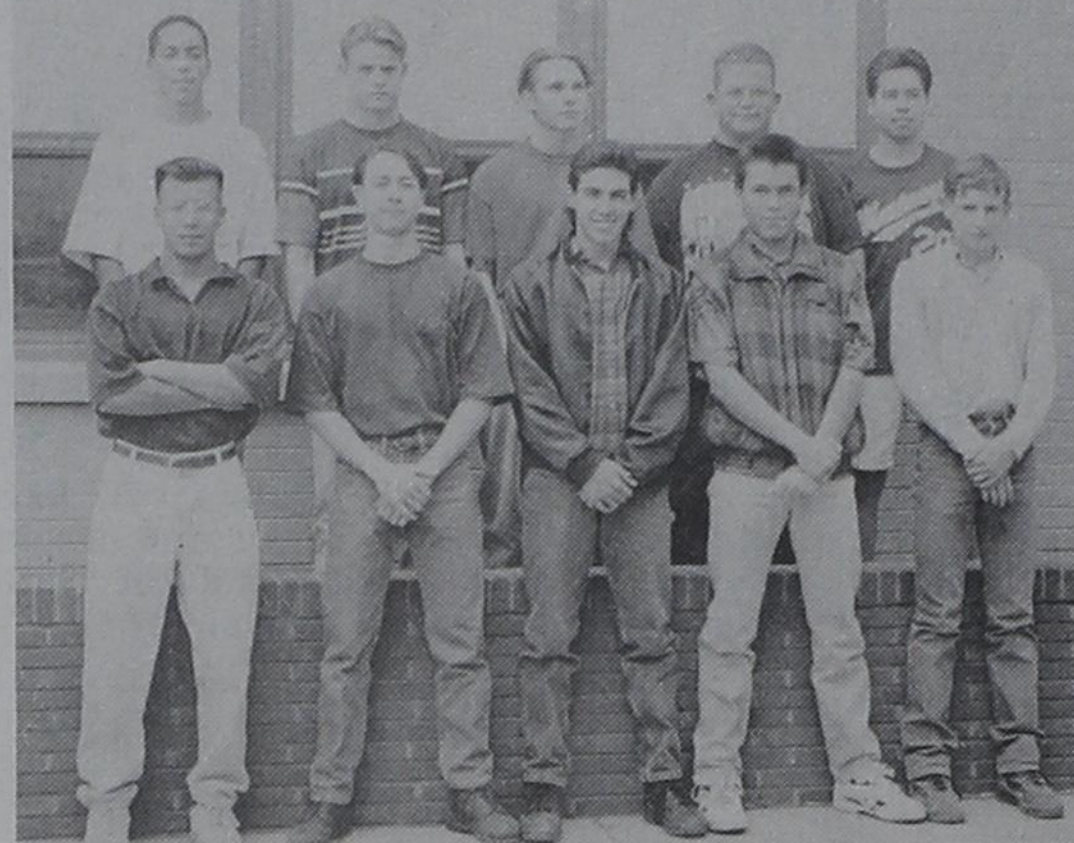
**10 Yrs. Ago--May 9, 1984**

## Local Hospital Sets Cancer Screening

On Wednesday, June 15, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Friona, at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland.

Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment, call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The state flower of Texas soon may be a contender in the U.S. floral market because of its rich, blue hue—a scarce color in the floral industry. The U.S. floral market tops \$5.5 billion annually, which could mean big bucks for Texas growers.

## Bluebonnet Named After Former First Lady Bush

Texans who love bluebonnets can now enjoy the state flower in a lavender shade that has been named after former First Lady Barbara Bush.

The Lupinus texensis Barbara Bush—the Barbara Bush Bluebonnet—is the result of work conducted by Dr. Jerry Parsons, professor and horticulture specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Parsons started selecting color variants of bluebonnets in 1982 to help renowned Texas native plant authority, Carol Abbott, achieve his dream of planting blue, white and red bluebonnets in the design of the Texas flag for the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial.

Unfortunately, Abbot did not live to see his dream come true, but the project has continued with astonishing results, Parsons said. With the assistance of other horticulturists, seed and bedding plant producers and farmers, the bluebonnet wild flower has been domesticated into a new multi-million dollar bedding plant industry in an array of colors.

The Barbara Bush Bluebonnet seeds will be made available for landscape design at the George Bush Presidential Library Center on the Texas A&M University campus. According to Don Wilson, executive director of the center, the Bush foundation will explore its options of planting this particular flower, which honors the former First Lady.

people to locate color variants in the native populations and planted seeds from those rare plants in isolated locations," said James Johnson, horticulture senior lecturer in floral design at Texas A&M University, who presented the bluebonnet to the former First Lady. "He progressively increased the color purity of the populations by removing different colors."

The project resulted in bluebonnet plants with several non-traditional flower colors, including pink and white, Johnson said.

For those who believe that bluebonnets should only be blue, "the additional colors (such as pink and white) that have existed in nature for hundreds of years are now being isolated and purified," Parsons explained. "No plant breeding or genetic manipulation of bluebonnets has been done except by God," he said.

"The colors of the state flower, which have existed for as long as bluebonnets have bloomed, have not been changed," Parsons said. "They have only been transformed from a wild, blooming weed into a bedding plant that yields an assortment of colors in different shapes and sizes that can be enjoyed even more by plant enthusiasts."

The Barbara Bush Bluebonnet seeds are available at the Texas Seed Company in Kennedy, and transplants can be found at Peterson Bros. in San Antonio.

## Pineapple Pork Chops & Rice

6 pork chops (1/4 inch thick)  
Salt and pepper  
2 tablespoons butter  
1-8 ounce can crushed pineapple  
1 cup water with 3/4 teaspoon salt  
1-1/2 cups Minute Rice

Salt and pepper chops. Brown well in butter in large skillet. Add pineapple. Reduce heat, cover and simmer until tender (20 minutes).

Always cook pork thoroughly. Move chops over to one side of skillet. Add salted water and bring to a boil. Stir in rice. Cover. Remove from heat. Let stand five minutes before serving.

## Barbecued Meat Loaf

1-1/2 pounds ground beef  
1 cup bread crumbs  
1 onion, finely chopped  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper  
2-8 ounce cans tomato sauce  
3 tablespoons vinegar  
3 tablespoons brown sugar  
2 tablespoons dry mustard  
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

Combine beef, bread crumbs, onions and beaten egg. Add salt and pepper and 1/2 can tomato sauce. Form into a loaf and place in shallow pan.

Mix the remaining half can of tomato sauce, brown sugar, mustard, vinegar and Worcestershire sauce. Pour this mixture over meat loaf, reserving some to baste with later.

Bake in 350 degree oven about one hour and fifteen minutes, basting occasionally. Serves 4-6.

## Summer Tacos

Taco Sauce:

1-16 ounce can stewed tomatoes  
1 teaspoon sugar  
3/4 teaspoon dried oregano  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 teaspoon bottled hot pepper sauce

1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1/4 cup chopped onion

Meat Filling:

1 pound ground beef  
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt  
1-9 1/2 ounce package (6 cups) corn chips  
4 or 5 slices processed American cheese  
2 cups shredded lettuce

To make taco sauce: in bowl, stir together stewed tomatoes, sugar, oregano, Worcestershire sauce, salt, pepper and pepper sauce. Using edge of spoon, break up large tomato pieces. Stir in green pepper and onion. Set taco sauce aside.

In medium skillet, cook ground beef until browned, stirring to break up large pieces of meat. Drain off fat. Stir in garlic salt. Coarsely crush corn chips; place in bottom of ungreased 8x8x2 inch baking dish or 8 inch round baking dish. Spoon hot meat over corn chips; top with cheese slices. Bake in 350 degree oven 10 minutes or until cheese melts. Sprinkle casserole with shredded lettuce; spoon or pour on taco sauce. Serve immediately. Makes 4-6 servings.

1/2 cup catsup

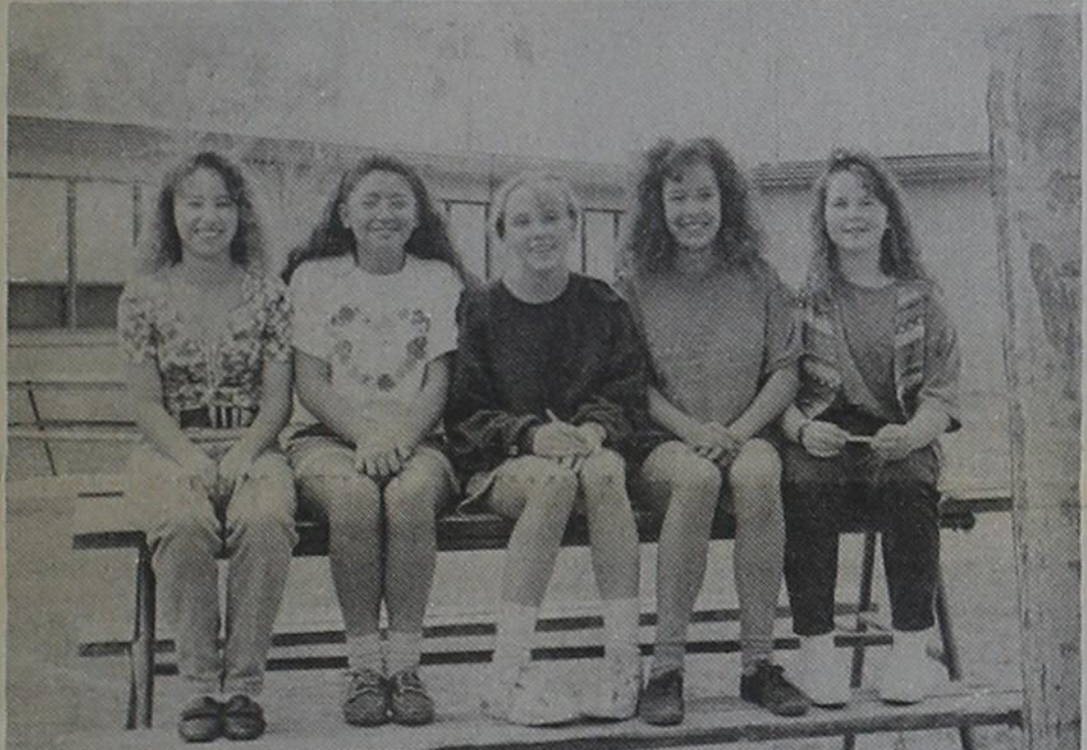

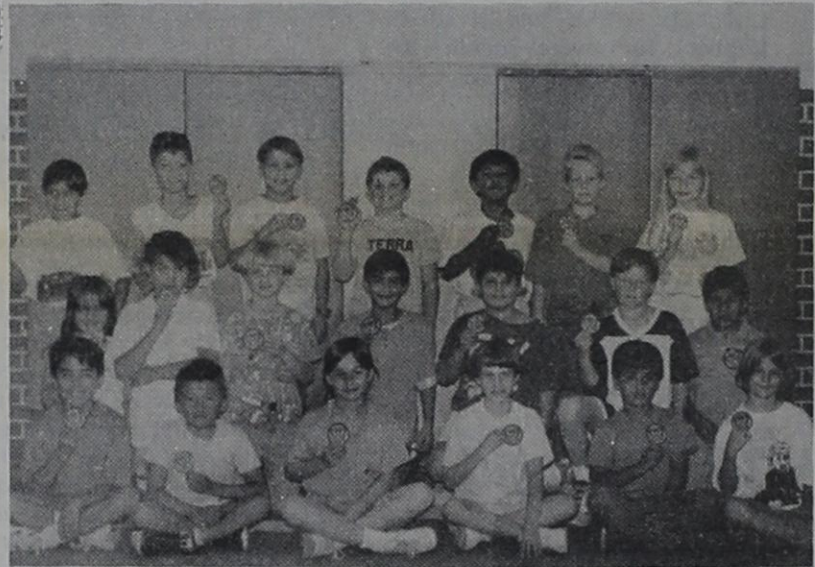
