EL PASO, Tex.—El Paso users of electric razors, heating pads and other appliances are in for a hard time if a proposed city ordinance becomes a law. The ordi- Brown. nance is designed to take the "squawks" out of radio reception.

It provides that anyone using any "appliance, apparatus, or machinery which causes an electrical disturbance interfering with radio reception shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor." Fines ranging from \$1 to \$100 could be levied for violations.

Alderman Leonard Fail, sponsor of the ordinance, said that operators of electric machinery would have to put "filters" on the machines to take out the static.



He said that the use of safety pelts would save many automobile passengers from serious injuries. Belts could be especially valuable in protecting children, he said. He pointed out that automobile drivers frequently escape injury in bad collisions because they can hang on to the steering wheel, while passengers without a brace are likely to be hurt.

#### Rearmament Means Quality More Than Quantity

The one thing to avoid in the pending rearmament program is hysteria.

It is quite possible, the world being what it is and not what it ought to be, that it is desirable to build up a larger

If that decision is made, then nothing but the best will do. Not necessarily the largest, but the best. Better no army at all than a second-best army.

\* \* Size of military establishment is no guarantee of anything. More and more it becomes apparent that modern war is a business of training and equipment.

In Spain, such advantages as the Rebels have gained have been won by tanks, air supremacy, and equipment against the devoted heroism of a Loyalist army which had to be improvised from scratch. In China, the millions of defenders availed little before the mechanical efficiency of the Japanese. In Russia, the armed forces are vast, but doubt as to their efficiency led several countries of Europe to question Russia's value as a prospective ally.

Ten thousand planes? Perhaps. But are they the best planes, the fastest, the newest, manned by pilots who have had the thorough and exacting training which modern air warfare demands? An expanded navy? Perhaps. But is it the best navy, ship for ship, and in maneuver training and gunnery? A bigger army? Perhaps. But has it the tanks, the improved small arms and machine guns, the thorough training and discipline, the modern-minded leadership that modern war demands?

These are questions more important than volume-expansion. What good are 10 slow, antiquated planes manned by novice pilots against one new ship, 50 miles an hour faster, piloted by a veteran who knows every trick?

More armaments if we must, but let them be designed to accomplish what we wish to accomplish, and no more. Let them be, as far as they go, the best in the world. In fields like this, politics have no place, partisanship no

We can not afford to have anything in equipment or training that is less than the best. And that means to face the problem quite calmly, decide-intelligent what needs to be done, and then do it, efficiently and well. Haste and hysteria are certain to breed trouble, not security.



## Mail Clerk Retires To Continue Hobby As Violin Mender

FORT WORTH, Tex.—Jan. 15 ras an important day in the life of J. E. Stamps, whose name is not familiar to a great many people but is an important one to many famous musicians.

That day marked Stamps' retirement from his job as a railway mail clerk, which means that from now on he can devote his time to mending violins. For 35 years he has been working on the instruments, waiting for the day when he could give his full time to them. Because, he says, there is drama in the job, and sometimes excitement, frequently joy, and occasionally heartbreak.

Once, he recalls with laughter, he had the pleasure of serving talented artist whose talent was mixed with temperament of the kind that makes certain golfers throw their golf clubs away wher they dub a shot. The artist came to Stamps with a \$50,000 violing which had been smashed to pieces He got mad, the artist explained ruefully, and in his anger tried to tear up his fiddle. Fortunately Stamps was able to repair it and the artist is still using it.

Stamps also worked on a \$100, 000 Stradivarius owned by Francis McMillan. He also handled another famous instrument belonging to the late Nicholas Longworth. But most of the people who believe they have famous violins are mistaken.

"Hundreds of persons have come to me with violins which they hoped I would identify as Stradivari, he said. "Also invariably they were disappointed."

He says people should not be worried, however, when they find out that the violins they have are comparatively new. He argues that instruments 200 years old are not Sponsored By Store necessarily sweeter in tone than newer and cheaper ones.



BY MRS. GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Service Staff Writer ONE snowstorm does not make a winter. Nor is a sirloin steak all there is to beef. Flanked steak, corned beef, beef heart—there are many other pleasant ways of looking at the beef question. Pleasant on the budget,

> Rolled Flank Steak (Serves 4 to 6)

One flank steak about 2 pounds, 2 cups bread crumbs, 2 table-spoons chopped onion, 1 table-spoon parsley, 1-2 green pepper chopped, 1-2 strip bacon chopped, 1 ripe tomato or 1-4 cup whole pack canned tomatoes, seasoning, fat, flour, salt, pepper, 1 can condensed mushroom soup.

Combine bread crumbs, onion,

parsley, green pepper, bacon, to-mato, and seasoning to make stuff-ing. Moisten with water if nec-Wipe steak with clean damp cloth.

Using a sharp knife, score the

meat to make criss-cross cuts. Season with salt and pepper. Spread generously with stuffing. Roll, tie at ends and middle with heavy white twine. Roll in mixture of Bour and seasoning.

Heat fat in heavy iron frying pan. Sear roll well on all sides. Add mushroom soup to pan. Bake
