R. G. HILL IS FOUND DEAD AT HIS HOTEL

R. G. Hill, about 50, an employe of the United States Department of Agriculture, was found dead in his room at the Connellee Hotel in Eastland about 12:30 o'clock Saturday morning. Dress-ed in night clothing the body was found by hotel employes lying on the floor by the side of the bed and near a stand for the telephone. The telephone was on the floor beside the body.

Employes of the hotel told Justice of the Peace E. E. Wods, who with District attorney Earl Conner, conducted an investigation, that a call had come to the desk from Hill's room asking for a doctor and that a doctor had been summoned.

Drs. F. J. Isbell and J. H. Caton, Justice Woods stated, were at the elevator waiting to go upstairs when he arrived at the hotel after having been summoned by hotel employes.

Justice Woods said that his investigation disclosed no evidence of violence on the body and that his verdict would be that the deceased died of natural causes.

Among the dead man's affects the coroner found several dollars worth of travelers' cheques and a letter from Silver Springs, Maryland, addressed to R. G. Hill, care Southwestern Peanut Growers Association. The letter signed "Willie" was addressed to "Dear Dad," and the writer expressed the hope that he would soon be coming home. 

OF AXIS PACT HITS BRITAIN

LONDON, Oct. 5.—A high diplomatic source—neither British nor Chinese but vitally interested in the Far East-reported today that the new triple alliance joining Japan to the Rome-Berlin axis contains secret clauses setting forth Japan's potential gains in the Orient and tentatively providing for Japanese entry into the war against Great Britain.

This source expressed belief that Germany, Italy and Japan would deny existence of any secret clauses, but other foreign diplomats and Far Eastern experts who were questioned on the subject said that there was reason to

credit the reported arrangement. It was suggested that Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, at their Brenner Pass meeting, sought to determinie a definite date for a "triple blitzkrieg" against the British Empire in Europe, Africa and the Far East with the aid of Japan and to agree

on its tactical aspects.

The alleged confidential provisions of the triple alliance were described as follows:

1-Germany and Italy agreeassuming they are victorious—to use their influence to facilitate Japan's annexation of the Dutch East Indies and of French Indo-China after the war.

2—Germany and Italy express readiness to mediate peace between Japan and China in a sense favorable to Japan. It was recalled that in 1938 the German amassador to China made such an attempt in vain.

3—Germany promises to exercise to the fullest extent her dipomatic and political influence to pave the way toward a friendly understanding, including a nonaggression pact, between Japan and Soviet Russia.

4-A tentative date is fixed for Japan to enter the war against Britain and participate in the "triple blitzkrieg" by striking in the Orient while Germany intensifies its blows against Britain and a combined nazi-fascist offensive is launched in Egypt and the Near

It was said that the impression prevails here that China might be ready to accept German mediation of the war with Japan if Britain continued to keep closed the Burma Road, over which war supplies move to Chungking.

The British, however, are scheduled to re-open the road on Oct. 17 and as a result of this, as well as of further prospective British and American aid to China, the Chungking government is expected to continue the war.

Diplomats here continued to believe that in the long run the new triple alliance might be directed against Russia. They argued that Japan can offer Russia no important advantages and that the Soviet has a "community of interest" with the United States and Britain in the Orient rather than

Oil Production Brought In Line By Texas Decrease

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 5 .- Naional crude oil production, at 3,483,500 barrels daily, was brought sharply into line for the week ending today by a 329,425barrel drop in Texas fields, the Oil Weekly reported.

Daily average output this week was 300,100 barrels below the figare for last week, although most of the states outside of Texas showed increases, the trade magazine said. Production was 97,100 barrels daily below the U.S. Bureau of Mines estimate of market demand for October.

Respecting America's 'Big Stick'

To the world at large, America's insistence that it be left to pursue its own democratic way of life is no longer empty chatter, broadcast only to bring courage to the faltering hearts of United States citizens.

Appropriation of 15 billion dollars for defense and conscription of our manpower is at last beginning to convince some people that we mean business when we declare that the United States will not succumb to the kind of political policy that has already been imposed on weaker nations, less prepared than the United States intends to be. The conscript army has not yet been mustered. The military contracts authorized by Congress have scarcely been let. But other nations are already aware of the implications. We shall have more than a wooden gun and a prayer la.) 0. in our hearts when the test comes.

Indicative of the high regard the outerworld places on American military precautions is the warning expressed in Tokio recently by the authoritative newspaper Asahi. The United States, this organ proclaims, has finally passed the District Judge stage of paper plans and has embarked on a program of working reality.

Part of the recent activity on the American continent, the paper concedes, must be laid to the growing tension in the Pacific.

"We must be concerned because the words and actions of the American government and the American intelligentsia are growing more and more anti-Japanese and they are made against the background of huge armaments," the journal comments.

Japan knows, as every other nation and every American citizen knows, that America's military machine will not be brought into use against any foreign power unless there is adequate reason for doing so. Preparedness in the United States means exactly that. The American people have a genuine horror for aggression. They will never permit their armed forces to engage in that kind of war.

It is enough that Americans' desire to live an honest, free and peaceful life should be sufficiently supported by arms and power to guarantee that kind of existence.

In a world where guns and cannon have suddenly become the supreme test, the United States has shown it is
