LONDON, Oct. 12 .- Royal Air Force bombing planes attacked oil plants, factories, docks and airdromes in Germany and German occupied territory during the night despite unfavorable weather, and returned safe, the air ministry said today.

Kiel, Hamburg, Bremerhaven, Wesermunde, Ilhelmshaven and ports all the way from Rotterdam, Holland, to Cherbourg on the French coast were among the towns attacked, it was said.

German big guns shelled the Dover area angrily today after a night in which British guns and planes worked together in a blazing bombardment of French invasion ports.

British guns retorted and for hours there was a violent duel across the moonlit channel.

Late in the evening a big force of British bombing planes heavily bombed the German gun emplacements while the British big guns continued their canonade, Houses on the British side of the channel shook from the force of the ex-

Then British planes early this morning made a second punishing attack on the gun emplacements and other targets along the invasion coast.

### New York State Is Winner Of Most **Defense Contracts**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—New York state contractors were the greatest beneficiaries of defense contracts awarded by the Army and Navy between June 13 and Sept. 30, a state-by-state government survey revealed today. Statistics compiled by the of-

fice of government reports showed that firms with headquarters in the Empire State received defense orders totalling \$596,423,922 during the period. California was second with \$404,802,100, followed by Michigan with \$326,077,403.

The figures did not include naval vessel contracts for which individual ship prices were not available.

The survey showed that \$7,-879,069,549 of defense contracts were let by the Army and Navy during the June 13-Sept. 30 per-

Vanquished France will feel the pinch of winter as never before. Drastic conservation orders have been issued by the Vichy government in a desperate attempt to minimize the human suffering that seems inevitable.

Bread may not be served until it is 24 hours old to discourage anyone from developing a taste for it. Restaurants may not serve coffee with the evening meal. Cheese may not be eath with meat. Baths may be taken only on certain days. Patrons are discouraged from asking for paper wrappings around their purchases. Shoes and clothing are scarce. Razor blades and toothpaste will not last long. Saccharine is being used widely as a sugar substitute. The ! soap supply is nearly depleted.

In Jugoslavia, there is no war. Crops were reasonably good. Nevertheless, strict food control was recently decreed because Germany and Italy still expect this little nation to keep up the large exports to the Fascist coun-




