RUSSIA'S PLACE IN BALKANS IS STILL PUZZLE

MASON United Press War Expert While heavy concentrations of German troops in Rumania increasingly threaten Russia's position on the Black Sea and in the Balkans, General Tatekawa, newly-appointed Japanese ambassador to Russia, is en route to Moscow to try to placate, or overawe, Stalin as part of the axis

It is probable that no major action will be taken by the Germans in Rumania for extending the war until General Tatekawa has had an opportunity of determining Russia's basic reactions to the new triple alliance.

Japan's dispatch of a high ranknig army commander as ambassador to Russia, immediately after making the military alliance with Germany and Italy, carries the implication of offering Stalin a pact of friendship in a mailed fist. If the Russians accept, it will be under duress and with reservations secreted in their

Under more normal conditions a Russo-Japanese non-aggression agreement advantageous to both nations might be negotiated. While Russia and Japan are rivals in the Far East, their mutual sense of realism has acknowledged that war between them would be too costly.

Now, however, with the triple alliance encircling Russia with potential enemies in Europe and the Orient, the situation has changed fundament of A Russo-Japan-ese not agression treaty has become a practical impossibility because Japan already has pledgeded herself to assist Germany if any country now at peace joins the war against the Germans. Should Russia conclude that her vital niterests demand a hostile attempt to check Germany in Southeastern Europe, no Russo-Japanese pact would be operative.

Thus, General Tatekawa's mission must necessarily be limited in scope. He cannot agree that Japan will not molest Russia if Stalin goes to war against the axis. LONDON, Oct. 16 .- The British Cruiser Ajax. veteran of the "The military crowd still seems River Plate battle against the Graf Spee, has sunk two small Italian destroyers and damaged a large Italian destroyer which was finished off later by other British warships, the admiralty reported tonight.

The warships were sunk in an engagement 80 miles southeast of Sicily at 2:30 a. m. Saturday. The small destroyers were of the Airone class of 679 tons, built in 1938 and carrying a complement of 94 men each. The larger destroyed was the Artagliere, a 1,620-ton destroyer of the latest Italian class.

The admiralty said this was the action in which the Italians admitted the loss of two torpedo boats and one destroyer while sinking a British cruiser.



The British bombers struck back strongly at the Germans and the Admiralty said that naval units had shelled an "invasion base" at Dunkirk. British planes attacked Hamburg, Keil Naval Base and at several fuel concentrations.

Bucharest reported that the Russians are building "defensive fortifications" across the border from where the Germans are now patrolling, but a Russian spokesman denied they had any unusually large forces in that area.

An influential Turkish news paper said that Russia will fight if the Dardanelles are threatened, but expressed doubt that further penetrations by the Axis powers in the Balkans will cause Russia to enter the war.

The Italians reported one of their submarines had sunk a large British boat in the Mediterranean, and declared that fascist troops are ready to advance through North Egypt toward the Suez Canal.

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 16 .- Texas' defense guard already is partially enlisted on a tentative basis, with the plan advanced as far as possible before passage of the act authorizing arming of home guard units.

In mid-September the adjutant general's department sent a circular to American Legion posts and other patriotic inquirers outlining a proposed plan for the defense units and the procedure that should be followed in forming them.

As a result sixty tentative units already have been set up ready for induction at any time.

One of the early units was formed by the famous Houston Light Guards, a body that claims to have furnished the largest percentage of World War offi-At Fort Worth units were

Education—a Defense Industry

American schools are not hiding their heads in the sand. They know what's up. They understand what war means -how dependent they are on adequate national defense for the continuation of free education.

To help give the public a clearer concept of the importance of the schools in any preparedness program, the National Education Association will devote its 20th observance of American Education Week to the theme, "Education for the Common Defense." Programs throughout the country will begin on Sunday, Nov. 10, with emphasis on spiritual life. Each day will be devoted to a different phase of education in relation to defense, until Saturday of that week, when economic securty will be stressed.

The schools have already recognized two fundamental ways in which they can bolster up national defense. The first and immediate is to provide the special training required for those actively engaged in defense work, both in industry and in the military. The other is to inculcate more strongly in the mind of the impressionable student the value of a democracy too often taken for granted.

One moment of reflection will convince anyone what a tremendous weapon the schools can become. Hitler knew. Remember, the youngsters who were in German elementary schools only seven short years ago are now in the Hitlerian army or in civilian life-stalwart supporters of the Nazi cause.

The minds of the little fellows who trudge off to their classrooms every day are completely in the hands of the forces administering education. Every other educational power in the world cannot compete with the teacher, especially during a youngster's earliest years of schooling.

This is when the toddler gets his introduction to democracy. This is when he learns to live democratically, even before he knows what the word means.




