### Law Enforcement Feels The Pinch of Defense Program

DALLAS, Texas-Law enforcement has felt the pinch of the defense program.

The Dallas police department, which in former years had a plentiful supply of applicants, was forced to advertise for 150 special policemen. They will work during 16 days of the Texas state fair, which starts Oct. 4.

Police Chief J. M. Welch said booming defense industry had created a shortage of the kind of men he wants-"young, strong, able to take care of themselves.' Welch said he would hire men in their 50's if necessary, provided they still are able-bodied.

Map-makers will assist this year in keeping order at the fair grounds. A diagram has been prepared showing last-year's "trouble spots." The officers will be dispersed over the grounds accordingly, Welch said.


