
David K. Klassen of Eastland, who was born in Russia and immigrated to the United States in 1921, was among 13 who were naturalized in federal court at Abilene before Federal Judge T. Whitfield Davidson.

They were told by Judge Davidson that the oath, among other things, obligates them to uphold and defend the constitution of United States. "The deed you hold to your property is your right or title to that property; correspondingly, the constitution is your deed or title to many personal rights," he declared.

"Among the latter are life, liberty and pursuit of happiness. The constitution forbids taking of life, liberty or property without due process of law.

"What is the difference between the absolute government of Germany and that of this nation? It is in origin of that absolute power. In Germany, the fuehrer may proclaim law; in the United States, the president must ask congress to enact the laws.



The following information has been issued by County. Superintendent T. C. Williams, to the trustees and teachers of Eastland County schools:

The first month of Eastland County School session 1941-1942 closed on the week of October 3. All teachers are required under House Bill No. 38 to take the oath of office required of all other of

School boards have regular meeting date at the end of each school month to approve all bills legally drawn against school funds. All teachers' salaries and all current bills are paid monthly without discount.

Unusual interest is manifested n organization and instruction in schools. The 12th grade system is being introduced without friction and with interest since new text books are adopted and a more definite and reasonable year's work is outlined.

Most of those schools that did not have hot lunch programs have introduced them for the schools. Very few schools in the county are without hot lunch programs. In addition to the advantages of a balanced diet for the child at the noon lunch, this program has great educational value. The public, generally, is invited to stop in at any of the schools at the lunch period and see the program in operation.

More than 40 buses and cars have contracted to transfer children to schools. All of these buses must be made safe for transporting children. Each must be inspected by a State Patrol Officer. Eastland County buses rank high in these inspection reports. Buses in Eastland county are in excellent condition.

Visual Education program is in operation. The office of the County Superintendent furnishes pictures and machine to any educational group free of cost.



Control-How'll You Have It?

Who will not control himself must be controlled. If everybody could, or would, control himself in his relations with other people, there would not need to be a single policeman in the world.

Policemen, the world has regretfully found, are necessary. Why? Because there are a certain number of people who cannot, or will not, exercise s uch control over themselves and their acts as make others reasonably safe.

Why is a free country free? Because, by and large, its people have managed to exert enough self-control, selfdiscipline so that their affairs are run without continual control from outside, or above.

The American people now have a magnificent opportunity to show themselves worthy of freedom from strict control. The country admittedly faces certain dangers, and not the least of them is the danger of runaway prices and inflation.

There is talk of government price-fixing, government setting of wages, government limitations on profits. Why? Because if there are no limitations on those things, inflation is inevitable, a common disaster dragging all down with it. The state is bound to protect against such disasters in one way or another.

Nobody wants complete state control. Farmers don't want state-set prices. Workers don't want state-set wages, to say nothing of state-set hours and job locations. Manufacturers don't want state-set limits on profits, any further controls. How to avoid them? * *

Self-control seems to be the only way. The farmers must not object to release of agricultural surpluses, even though that keeps prices down, and they must resist that hankering for \$2 wheat. The workers must not strike for arbitrary reasons, reasons connected only with politics and union administration; only as a last resort to protect their position in relation to a cost of living that has already risen. The manufacturers must not seek extraordinary profits, or try to corner defense business at the expense of the small producer. The ordinary consumer must not rush to buy goods produced in competition with armament; he must reserve his spare spending power by buying Defense Bonds.
