OUR AREA HAS experienced some weather extremes within the past few days, with a big cooling trend being one of the most evident changes.

Last Saturday night, the area was buffeted by hard rain and some hail. A lot of moisture was received in the local area, and it varied from one field to another.

Suffice it to say that the area's farmland is very wet. Driving around the area will prove that, and you don't want to get off the pavement unless you have to.

However, the Clovis area again may claim to be the "rain champion" in this latest round of showers. We had reports on Monday that the Saturday night storm dumped up to eight inches of rainfall north of Clovis, and that the New Mexico dam on Running Water Draw had water backed up about three miles behind the dam. It was the most rain the area had received since the dam had been built, and consequently, the most water that had collected behind the dam.

Back in the summer, the Clovis area had a four or five-inch rain during another round of showers, so it would appear that our neighbors just across the state line may be about to discover what it's like to be water-logged.

A lot of the corn that is left in the field is beginning to lodge, and corn farmers don't need this problem added to the low market prices.

Also, the area's cotton crop received a dousing this past weekend that they didn't particularly need. Cotton is still needing some good, hot weather to complete its maturing process. The extremely cold weather of early this week has not helped cotton at all. Here's hoping the trend reverses.

Sugar beet harvest was well underway until it was interrupted by the weekend rains. The early crop was being trucked directly to Hereford, where a considerable volume had already been received.

A little later on, the local beet dump next to the Santa Fe trucks will be activated, and beets can be dumped a little closer to their origin.

Holly Sugar Corp. plant manager Cal Jones told us this week that because of the wet year the area has had, the latest moisture should increase the sugar content of this year's beet crop, by utilizing the available nitrogen.

Digging of the sugar beets had started somewhat earlier than usual this year, and Jones said that at the time harvest was interrupted by the rain approximately six percent of the crop had been harvested.

Holly Sugar has started processing the 1985 crop, and will control the inventory of beets through the month of October, due to fluctuating temperatures.

A target date of November 4 has been set for the beet harvest to get into full swing, with Holly officials hoping to complete the harvest by the end of November.

Sugar prices look good, Jones says. This year's beet crop comes under the 1984 farm bill. The House of Representatives has completed work on the portion of the farm bill which deals with sugar beets, and it looks good for beet farmers for the next couple of years.

It is good to see at least one facet of agriculture which holds a little promise for our farmers. Improvements are still badly needed in the market price situation for the other crops, however.

Mustangs Are Encouraged After Offense Improves

Having finally broken the scoring "barrier" in their 35-12 loss to the Farwell Steers last Friday, Bovina's Mustangs are looking for new worlds to conquer.

And Coach Bill Talley says the team's mental attitude has been helped tremendously.

"Our offense was much improved. There were other areas of our game which showed a lot of improvement, such as the kicking

game. This game has improved our outlook considerably," Talley said.

Another "plus" for the recent performance was the fact that the improved offensive performance came with Todd Ware, the team's leading ground-gainer in early games, out of action. Ware will rejoin the team for this week's game, and this should be a big shot in the arm.

Homer Renteria was Bovina's

leading ball-carrier against the Steers, gaining 62 yards and adding a 30-yard pass reception. Bud Venable had a 29-yard run for one of Bovina's touchdowns, and Denver Riddle scored on a 46-yard pass from Blake Scaff for the other.

Bovina's offense in the game was almost equally divided in rushing and passing gains.

Talley credited linebackers Hippy Gomez and Homer Renteria for their outstanding play, along with the entire offensive line. "We got some major movement at times on offense, and the line was the big key," Talley said.

The Mustang coach added that Scaff threw the ball well. "We're improving each week. One of these weeks we'll get all the pieces together, and we'll win a ball game," Talley said.

Talley said that the team came out of the Farwell game with no new injuries, and should be at relatively full strength when they meet Valley this week.

Once again, though, they are playing a team which is coming off a tough loss (Nazareth beat the Patriots last Friday, 7-0).

Valley will throw a lot of different formations at Bovina, Talley says. They will run a prototype offense, and will give the young Mustang defense a stiff test.

Friday's game is at Valley High School, and begins at 8 p.m. This is the last 8 o'clock game on the Ponies' schedule.
