Stimson today urged enactment of the proposed vastly-expanded draft law "to provide a framework into which we can steadily and solidly build, stone by stone, the structure which will accomplish vic-

He made the plea in a letter read before the House Military Affairs Committee shortly after the army recruiting service appealed for air corps volunteersat least 20,000 men between 20 and 26 monthly for training as pilots, and an additional 150,000 other volunteers between 18 and 35 for ground services.

Stimson's letter was read by Committee Chairman Andrew J. May, D., Ky., as the committee opened brief hearings on his bill which would provide a basis for a draft army of 10,000,000 men.

The bill would require the registration of all male residents of the United States from 18 to 64 years of age, inclusive, making those from 19 to 44, inclusive, subject to actual duty.

"I desire to emphasize," Stimson wrote, "The psychological or moral effects of the passage of a great measure along these lines. It will make clear to the American people the character of the effort that will be required to defeat the vast forces arrayed against us.

"To the outside world it will be a symbol that we are providing the means to make good our declared policy to 'accept no result save victory, final and complete."

Stimson said the purpose of the measure as to "make available, if and when necessary, a great pool of men to meet contingen-

He cautioned against legislating to restrict the "pricrities" by which registrants may be called into the armed forces.

"All such restrictions might turn out to be shackles that would hamper the organization of our land

Island of Guam has probably been captured by the Japanese, but two other mid-Pacific outposts, Wake and Midway Islands, are still resisting, a United States Navy communique said late today.

This was revealed by Navy Communique No. 5, after the army, in its seventh communique disclosed that Japanese forces were trying "to secure improvised air bases" in the fringes of the

The Navy said it "is unable to communicate with Guam, either by cable or radio" and "capture of the island is probable."

## The Paradox of Unemployment

Despite mounting employment, despite labor shortage in certain skilled fields, despite the prediction that labor shortage may become general by next spring, there is still "unemployment." It is estimated today at around five million. And the relief problem, while less pressing, is still with most communities.

Possibly because, for one thing, we have been allowing the word unemployment itself to deceive us. What is a reasonable meaning for the word "unemployed"? It ought to mean a person who needs a job, is able to do it, and hasn't got it.

On that basis we may have been fooling ourselves all along. Let's see. The peak of unemployment in the U.S. came in 1933. Nobody knows how many "unemployed" there were then. We have to guess, and the best guesses seem to run around 12,000,000.

Now, with that figure in mind, let's look at a little study which Cleveland recently made of its relief problem. Naturally, with mounting employment, Cleveland's relief problem, desperate like that of all large cities during the depression, is less pressing today. But in spite of the better conditions, Cleveland still had 21,321 people on relief in October.

The startling thing shown by the Cleveland survey is that of these, 15,526, or three-fourths of the total, were judged totally unemployable. And 9000 of these were children under 16, scarcely to be considered "unemployed" in any man's statistics.

Something over 4000 were partially employable (aged, handicapped) and getting partial aid; 461 were classed as "temporarily unemployed," and of the whole 21,321 people on relief only 92 men and 111 women were classed as fully able to work but not working at all.

2. The labor reserve, of which we once thought we had an inexhaustible supply, is not as great as we thought, and a real shortage may impend, a shortage which cannot be supplied except by rehabilitating those now unable to work, or by immigration. Of course relief rolls and unemployment totals do not coincide except very roughly. There are many unemployed, and always have been, who never have appeared on any relief roll. Nevertheless, the tiny percentage of Cleveland's relief rolls actually eligible for jobs suggests that a labor shortage is not nearly so impossible as one would have guessed two years ago.




