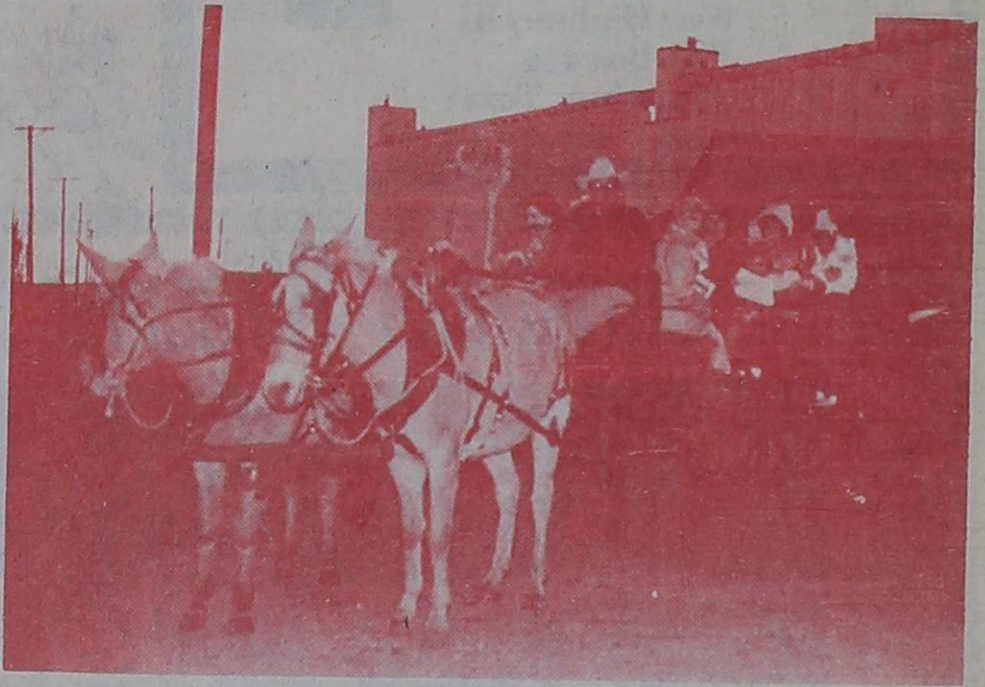


## Blade To Skip Issue

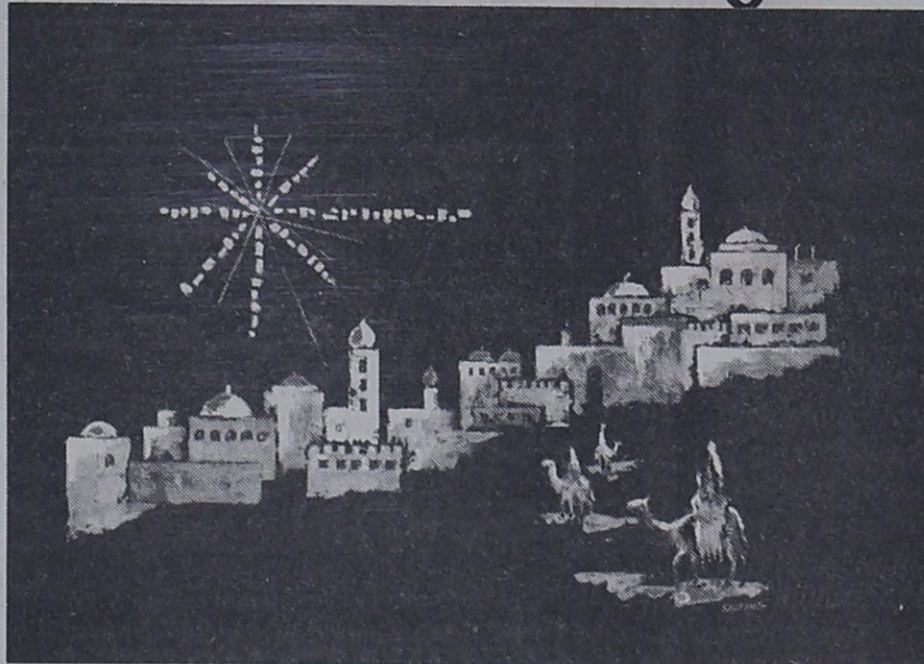

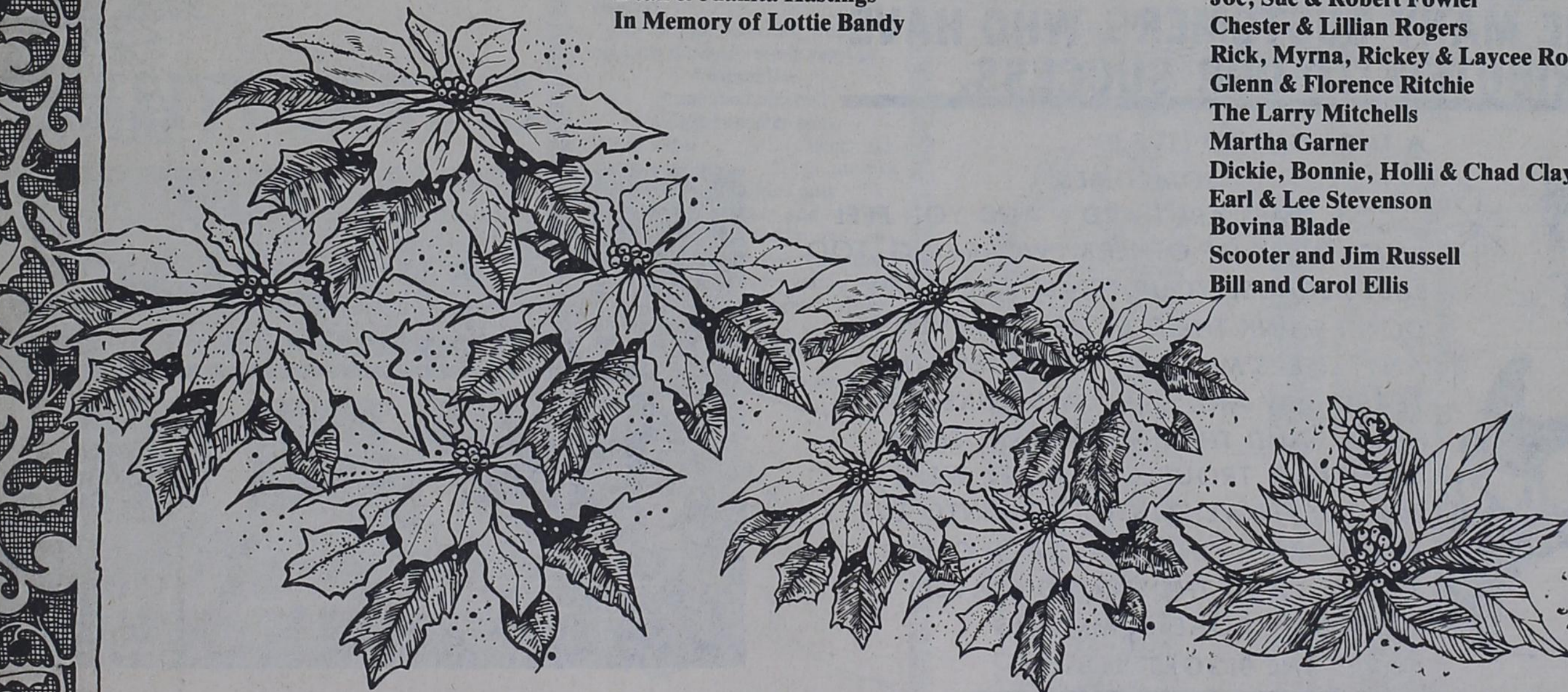

**Buttermilk Lemon Pie**  
 3 eggs 1 cup buttermilk  
 1 cup lemon juice 2 cups sugar  
 3 tsp. flour 1/2 cup melted oleo  
 1 tsp. vanilla 2 unbaked pie shells  
 Beat eggs well and add buttermilk. Beat well. Blend sugar and flour thoroughly. Add eggs, lemon juice, buttermilk and oleo. Then beat real well again. Add extract and mix well.

Pour into pie shells and bake fifteen minutes at 400°. Reduce heat to 300° and bake thirty minutes more or until filling is completely baked.

Hattie's final remark was "We love being back, like our home and enjoy attending First Baptist Church here. Frank will be attending regularly and I will go as often as my health permits."

# E. Johnson Recalls Early Days Locally

When Ethel Ashby was born December 25, 1907 near Rocky, Oklahoma, the Sooner State was less than six weeks old.

She spent the early years of her life on a farm near Rocky and later moved, with her family, to a Custer County farm near Clinton.

"When I studied Oklahoma history," Ethel said, "I never had any trouble remembering which year it became a state."

Ethel graduated from Clinton High School in 1926. She and Levi Johnson, a Custer County farm boy, whose father had purchased one half section of land seven miles south and two east of Bovina, were married in December of 1929.

They moved to their present home from Arapaho, bringing their household necessities in a four-wheel trailer, which they pulled behind their car.

"At that time," Ethel says, "Nearly all of Highway 66 between Clinton and Amarillo was a two lane dirt road."

Upon their arrival at their new home February 12, 1930, they had a two room house, a windmill and a water barrel. One of the first things Levi did was turn on the

windmill and pump a fresh bucket of water.

Two of Levi's first building projects after arriving in Parmer County, were an adobe shed and a two hole privvie, which he put a screen door on to keep wasps out.

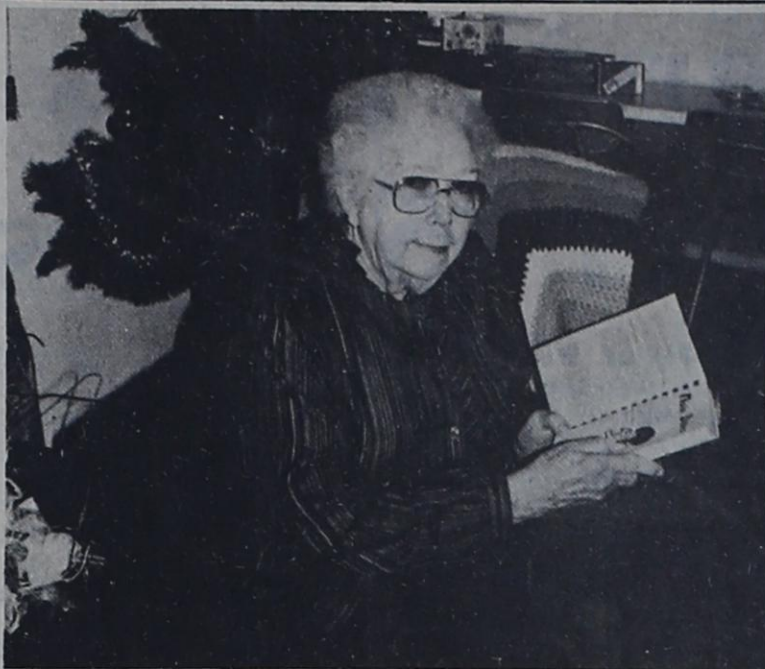
The first few years the Johnsons lived here, Levi farmed with horses. His lead team was two large Percherons, which he brought from Oklahoma. He also raised horses and broke them to work.

So many changes have been made since Ethel moved to her present home. The house has grown from two rooms and a path to three bedrooms and two baths plus a spacious living room, kitchen, utility room and two car garage.

Since Levi's death, this genteel lady has continued to live in the house that was home to them more than 55 years.

She keeps busy with activities of Bovina Church of Christ, which Levi served as an elder many years; activities of her Johnson grandchildren, who live less than three miles away and sometimes runs errands for her son and grandson.

The Johnsons' two children,

Billy and his wife, the former Sandra Eckley, have lived near his parents since their marriage. Their children are Scott, Charles and Sharlet.

Scott, a graduate of Lubbock Christian College, makes his home with his grandmother. Charles is a freshman at Lubbock Christian College at the present time and Sharlet is a junior at Bovina High School.

As these three have grown up, having their Johnson grandparents when they played ball, showed livestock, or whatever, was very important.

This year Sharlet is playing basketball, so Grandmother Ethel rarely ever misses a game. She also enjoys football and hasn't missed a Tech home game this season.

Betty Rose and her husband, Harold Lee Lourie, live at Midwest City, Oklahoma. They have two children and two grandchildren.

"As a general rule," Ethel explained, we have an early Christmas here with Billy and Sandra and their family, then go to Midwest City and spend some time with Betty Rose, Harold and their family."

This year's family time together may be changed somewhat. On December 21, Scott and Patti Cash of Portales, who is a third grade teacher in the local school, are getting married.

Ethel's hobbies include crocheting, piecing and quilting quilts and watching ball games on television.

Cooking has always been a pleasure to her and she has a large collection of recipes, some of them very old.

One of her favorites, which she has used for many many years is:

**Custard Pie**

- 1 unbaked pie shell
- 4 slightly beaten eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 2 1/2 cups scalded milk

Blend eggs, sugar and vanilla. Add other ingredients and mix well. Slowly stir in hot milk. Bake 25-30 minutes at 425°. Reduce heat to 325° and bake about fifteen minutes longer.

# Paul Joneses Observe 40th Year In Business Locally

Bovina and other Parmer County residents, as well as strangers passing through Bovina, learned many years ago that they would receive courteous service and quality products when they stopped at Paul Jones Texaco Station, which is located on the north side of Highway 60.

In August of 1945, this couple moved here from San Diego, California, where they had been doing defense work since the beginning of World War II.

They went into business soon after their arrival. Their first station was near the intersection of Highway 60 and FM 1731 and they sold Phillips 66 products. Five years later they changed brands of gasoline and continued to operate in the same location.

In 1956, they had their present building constructed and moved into it. Their grand opening in the new building was held Saturday, August 18 of that year.

In addition to offering the usual tires, batteries, fan belts and other small essentials for cars, pickups and trucks, Jones Texaco Station offers other services, too.

It has been the bus stop for New Mexico Transportation ever since it was opened. It is also the stopping place for Tex-Pack Freight of Lubbock and Beaver Express, Woodward, Oklahoma.

Ola Lee has been the local representative for Claborn Floral of Friona for many years. She assists Paul with operation of the station and does the paper work

for the entire operation.

If Paul is occupied installing windshields, changing tires or batteries or doing other chores, Ola Lee waits on customers, washes windshields and does other related jobs.

Paul and Ola Lee are both natives of Red River County, Texas and lived near a small town named Bogata, but didn't know one another.

Ola Lee moved to the Rhea Community with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Calaway, and two brothers, Robert, who lives here, and C.L. Jr. who is deceased, in November of 1928.

At that time she was a freshman in high school and finished the term at the Rhea school. The following year she attended Pampa High School. Then, during her junior and senior years she attended Friona High School. She and a friend, Helen Schlenker Potts, who also lived in the Rhea Community, shared a room in the home of the late Mr. and Mrs. Floyd W. Reeve.

Ola Lee remembers, "Our class was the first one to graduate from high school in the new building, which was between the Old Red Brick building and Highway 60."

This building was located where the present junior high school building is now.

At Christmas time, she usually makes Peanut-Pecan Brittle, but not in the conventional way. She uses a standard Peanut Brittle recipe, but instead of using the amount of peanuts called for, she uses one half peanuts and one half pecans.

Also, when the candy is ready to pour into buttered pans to cool, she spreads it paper thin with a hot spoon which has been dipped in butter.

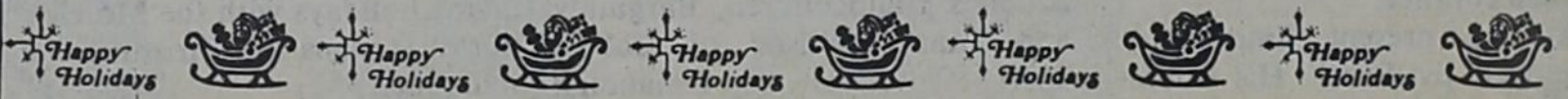

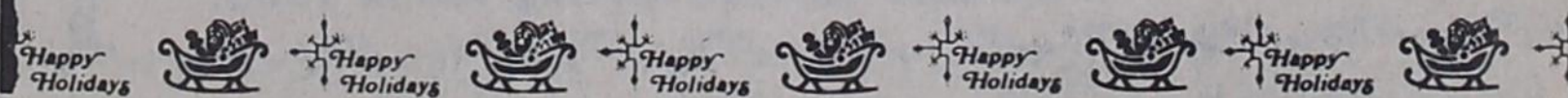

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Scald milk and let cool. Sift dry ingredients. Add milk and yeast mixture. Add well beaten eggs and oil. Beat until smooth.

#### Pancake Syrup

1 1/2 cups white sugar  
1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
1 cup water  
Combine in saucepan and bring to rolling boil. Cook 1 minute. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon maple flavor and 3 tablespoons butter. Serve hot.

# J.T. Joneses Have Resided Here Since Early 1940's

The top part of the horseshoe drive in front of the country home of J.T. and Tessie Jones has for many years been evidence of Tessie's hobbies.

She combined her ceramic skill with antiques and rocks, which she collected from almost every state in the union, to create a unique setting in the front yard.

The Jones family moved to their present farm location early in 1944. The first house they lived in burned, so they had to move to a nearby farm while another was being constructed. They have lived in their present home since October of that year.

A native of Coryell County, J.T. moved with his parents to the eastern part of the Texas Panhandle in a covered wagon in 1917.

The family's first Panhandle home was in Wheeler County. Later they moved to Hemphill County and from there to Ochiltree County.

During his growing up years, J.T. assisted with sod breaking, taking care of cattle and doing other work farmers and ranchers did at that time.

Early in life he decided he wanted to be a farmer, but not a cowboy.

After living in the Panhandle about ten years the Jones family moved to a Hidalgo County farm near Edinburg, Texas.

Tessie Martin was born in Drew County, Arkansas.

Her mother died when she was

very young and in 1924 Tessie moved with her father and brothers and sisters to a farm in Hidalgo County.

The Jones family and the Martin family lived in the same neighborhood and all the children attended school at Edinburg.

J.T. and Tessie met when they were in school and married June 17, 1934 at Edinburg.

Tessie said, "Before we married, I picked cotton for him."

J.T. added, "After we got married I couldn't get her to pick cotton."

The couple's first home was on a farm near Edinburg. Their first child, Dorothy Louise, was born three years later.

When she was about five, the family moved to a farm south of Bovina and a couple of years later they moved to their present location.

J.T. continued to farm in

Parmer County and served eight years on the board of directors of the Parmer County Farm Bureau, during which he was chairman of the Weed Committee. He was also a 4-H adult leader and an honorary member of Future Farmers of America.

Joe Weldon, the couple's only son, was born after they moved here. He and his wife, Denise, live in Bovina. They have three children, D'Anne, who is seven, is a second grade student; Jimmie Don is three and Montana Dee is five months old.

J.T. and Tessie take care of Jimmie Don and Montana Dee mornings, while their mother works.

Dorothy and her husband, George Luttrall, live in Lubbock. They have three daughters, Jana, Joni and Jegi. Jana and her husband, Greg Hallett, and Joni, who is single, also live in Lubbock.

Jegi and her husband, Jay Houston, and their daughter, Chelsey Dawn, who is the only great-grandchild in the Jones family, live in Roswell, New Mexico.

Tessie's hobbies include piecing and quilting quilts and growing plants. When she was younger, she enjoyed playing baseball and deer hunting.

Since J.T.'s retirement, the couple have done quite a lot of travelling and enjoy their recreation vehicle and CB. His hobby is reading.

J.T. reported, "When I first came to this country, I knew next to nothing about farming here, but with the help of the late Uncle Bob Caldwell and J.I. Gober, I managed to stay until I learned."

Although health problems interfere with church attendance at the present time, J.T. and Tessie are members of the First Baptist Church, where she taught preschool age Sunday School classes for many years.

"There was a time," Tessie says, "When I enjoyed family get-togethers and cooking holiday

**Cherry Cheese Pie**  
 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, cubed  
 15 oz. can sweetened condensed milk  
 1/2 cup lemon juice  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 1/2 inch graham cracker crumb crust  
 1 lb. 6 oz. can cherry pie filling

Put cheese, milk, lemon juice and vanilla in blender container; cover and run on high speed two minutes or until smooth. Pour into the crumb crust and chill two or three hours. Spread with cherry pie filling and serve. Makes one pie.

**Graham Cracker Crumb Crust**  
 16-18 graham crackers  
 3 tablespoons sugar  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted

Break four graham crackers into blender container; cover and run on low speed until crackers are finely crumbled. Empty into a bowl. Repeat process until all crackers have been crumbled. You should have 1 cup crumbs. Add sugar and cinnamon to mixture and mix well.

Add melted butter and mix well. Press firmly onto bottom and sides of nine inch pan. Chill until firm.

## Local Church Sponsors Blood Drives

The United Methodist Women sponsor a Coffee Memorial Blood Donor Club and residents have an opportunity of giving blood twice a year.

The blood drive makes it possible for the people in the Bovina area to have the needed blood. Most insurance companies pay 80 per cent of the recessing charges and the donor club credits cover the final 20 per cent.

Each pint of blood gives credit amounts to \$10 off the cost of each unit of much needed blood. If they are not used, they lose 30 credits on March 29 and October 1.

October of this year, Coffee

Memorial Donor Club converted to the community responsibility system dropping the credit plan. They will be allowed to use the credits we have already earned. The majority of the blood centers in the U.S. have already converted to this plan and refuse or only reluctantly accept credits from the Blood Center, according to Elouise Dixon of the Methodist women.

Two weeks ago the Bovina Blood Donor's Club was able to be of service to Chester Rogers and his family. Chester needed four units of blood and they were able to help his cost by transferring

four credits to the Hereford Community Hospital.

Community responsibility means that each community blood service region should meet its transfusion needs, except in rare emergencies, by donations from the local inhabitants. They will be informing the people in the community as the months move on.
