Commissioners Put Through Pay Hikes for County

Employees and office holders in Eastland County will begin taking home a fatter billfold next month. Commissioners Monday voted an almost across the board pay increase of 18 percent for everyone on the county payroll. Only persons who will not share in the pay hike are constables and justices of the peace. The pay hike broke a 37 year

drouth for many employees, and nost agreed it didn't come any too soon. Everything went off smoothly at the regular meeting of the Court, with no objections from the floor to the increase. A surprise move was made by Commissioner

J. B. (Tip) Arther of Precinct 1 (Eastland-Olden-Ranger), when he oted against the increase. Arther bolted when other commissioners would not include constables in the

pay hike. County Judge John Hart aid that justices of the peace did not want to be put on a salary basis, and that was the reason justice precinct officials did not share the increase. Arther then asked the Court to put the constables back on the same pay scale that they had two years ago when they were handed a big pay cut. His motion to that effect died for want of a second.

Pay of grand jurors and jurors was also increased by the Court. (Continued on Page 2)
