### FOURTH ARMY ROLE IN CASE OF DISASTER IS EXPLAINED

CAMP WOLTERS, Texas — When nature on the rampage throws a disaster punch at a community in the five-state area of Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas, the Fourth Army is capable of a mighty counterattack to save life and property.

Fourth Army, however, cannot swing into action unless certain elements exist, i. e., mainly communities overmatched in battling the foe, be it flood, hurricane, tornado, fire, drought or the like.

The role of Fourth Army in natural disaster relief is something every civil official should know when coping with emergencies.

As soon as disaster strikes, the

natural reaction of civil officials is to obtain all available assistance to alleviate its effects. Under such conditions, time is of utmost importance and all concerned should be fully aware of the proper procedure to obtain aid from outside sources.

Fourth Army with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., is primarily responsible for coordination of military assistance given by all of the military services in the five-state area.

Military assistance is complementary to, but not a substitute for, civilian participation in relief of natural disaster. As agencies of the federal government, the military services are not permitted by law to utilize their resources for

disaster relief, with one important exception, until civilian resources have been exhausted or civil authority is clearly unable to cope with the disaster.

The exception is that the commander of any military unit may take action in the case of imminent necessity in which overruling demands of humanity compel immediate action to save human life, prevent starvation and extreme suffering, and destruction or damage to the public property of the United States.

Alleviation of disaster conditions is the responsibility of the following in the order listed: the individual; private industry; local government; state government; American National Red Cross, as defined by its charter; federal agencies in particular fields of operations defined by law—that is, the Federal Civil Defense Administration and the military services; and other federal agencies.

Should local resources prove inadequate to meet a given disaster situation, the responsible civil official should notify the Red Cross, which is concerned in assisting individuals and families. Military assistance may be furnished through Red Cross upon request on a reimbursable basis.

If the situation is beyond the capabilities of the Red Cross, the responsible civil official should proceed through civilian channels all the way to state level, if necessary. The state civil defense director is charged with the function of providing aid in natural disasters and has the entire resources of the state government at his disposal. He may also recommend to the governor use of the National Guard, which has much equipment identical to that of the Army.

Should the magnitude of the disaster prove to be beyond the capabilities of the state to control, then a request for federal assistance should be made. This request should be directed to the administrator of Region 5, Federal Civil Defense Administration, Denton, Texas.

The administrator of the Federal Civil Defense Administration is charged with the responsibility of coordinating the activities of federal agencies to provide disaster assistance in major disasters, and will direct key federal agencies to utilize available personnel, equipment, supplies, facilities and resources. When the request is made, the initiator should be prepared to state that all available resources

have been exhausted and further help is needed.

A major disaster in any disaster which is determined by the President to be of such severity and magnitude as to warrant assistance by the federal government.

When requesting that an area be declared a major disaster area under Public Law 875, the governor of a state is required by law to certify to the President the need for federal assistance and give assurance of the expenditure of a reasonable amount of funds of the government of such state, local governments, therein, or other agencies, prior to requesting federal assistance.

When authorized by or directed by the President or his designated representative, the administrator of the Federal Civil Defense Administration, federal agencies are authorized to provide assistance. This assistance to state or governmental agencies will be made available only after the President has invoked the provision of Public Law 875 (the Natural Disaster Act of 1950).

In cases of a major disaster and upon request of the administrator, Region 5, Federal Civil Defense Administration, the Fourth Army may furnish assistance. Among the kinds of assistance the Fourth Army can furnish, and has in the past are: skilled personnel, trucks and special engineer equipment, amphibious vehicles, light aircraft and helicopters, temporary bridges, water purification kits, communications equipment, tentage, kitchen equipment for mass feeding, sandbags, and bedding including cots, blankets and mattresses.

### Lagging Polio Vaccinations Cause Concern

AUSTIN — Quickening concern over lagging polio vaccinations was in evidence this week as state health authorities reported slightly over 10 percent of the Texas population under 20 years of age has received the full course of three shots.

"And the start of the 1957 season is just a brief three months away," State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle reminded.

The polio season usually begins in mid-April in Texas.

Dr. Holle predicted the relative number of cases among teen-agers and young adults would steadily increase because many persons in these age groups discount the possibility of falling victim to the disease and thereby fail to take the protective shots.

"The facts are that about 29 percent of all polio cases last year occurred among persons over 15 years old," the commissioner said. "Moreover, polio among persons of these ages is more highly fatal than it is in younger ages."

Dr. Holle said "fair" progress has been made in vaccinating infants and youngsters of grade school age, but that unless high school and college students quickly avail themselves of protection through vaccination, "the heaviest percentages of future cases will affect them."

He said the vaccine is now in plentiful supply, "but it doesn't do any good in the bottle." National vaccine supply sources have indicated that enough of the protective fluid is on hand to vaccinate anyone desiring it, regardless of age.

As the year ended, a total of 732 cases of polio in its paralytic form had been registered in Texas for 1956. Of that number only 48 were reported as having received at least one shot. Only two had received all three shots.

Dr. Holle also appealed to parents of children who had received one or two shots to be sure the youngsters completed the third shot on schedule.

"The vaccine may give over 90 percent protection when all three shots are administered as recommended."

The recommended sequence calls for the second shot to be given a month after the first, and the third shot seven months after the second.

The commissioner called for a concentrated drive throughout the state to get "all Texans—from infancy to maturity and beyond" to begin the three-shot series at once.

"It is a major medical miracle that so many people have been vaccinated in such a short space of

time, but we cannot rest on that laurel with less than 10 percent of the job done and with another polio season coming up," the commissioner said.
