THANKS TO THE 1994 strike by the money-grubbing baseball players (or their agents, to be more exact), Ye Editor made a personal promise this past baseball season: not to watch a single baseball game.

May not sound like a momentous decision to some of you, but it's sort of like an alcoholic, chain-smoking womanizer (Maybe a U.S. senator!?) waking up one morning and deciding this was it: none of the above any longer.

So, I did it, and it didn't totally warp my personality. But before this World Series is over (it may be, already: I had to write this early due to a trip) I might have to break over and watch, for the Cleveland Indians' sake.

If there is a city in major league sports that deserved to have some success, it has to be Cleveland. When I heard they were going to the World Series, I said to myself "I don't think they've been there since I was a senior in high school," which has been a year or two.

Turns out that was exactly right. It was back during the Fabulous Fifties, and the team's pitching star, Bob Feller, was about to end his career. Feller was the Nolan Ryan of his day. Mister Nice-Guy. Never in his career did he do anything controversial. Just went out and won games and struck out hitters, such as Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams, Mickey Mantle—you get the idea.

Feller was the first pitcher thought to throw a baseball close to 100 miles per hour. Today they have the police car's radar guns that they hone in on pitches, to find out how fast they're speeding.

In the late 1940s when they tested Feller, if memory serves correctly, they had a race car on a track, with Feller and a catcher in the nearby "lane." When the race car got even with Feller, he let the pitch rip—and the story is that it beat the car to the catcher. Real scientific, in other words.

Fans of the Houston Astros and Texas Rangers do a lot of complaining because their teams have never made it to the World Series. The last time Cleveland made it to the Big Show, these Texas teams weren't even a glint in their future owners' eyes. And the Boston Red Sox have been in the major leagues a hundred years, and haven't won a Series since 1916.

With this thought in mind, we shifted gears to our other past-time, and couldn't remember ever seeing the Cleveland Browns in the Super Bowl. There again, Cleveland has been in the NFL for most of its existence.

The reason we couldn't remember seeing Cleveland in the Super Bowl was what we had suspected: They've never been there. We die-hard Dallas Cowboys fans fully expect the team to make it to the Super Bowl, in fact to win it. And they have been there seven times, and won four championships.

You have to go all the way back to 1964 to find when Cleveland won a National Football League title—and that was three years before the Super Bowl was "invented."

So, the long-suffering Cleveland fans deserved this moment in the spotlight.

If Cleveland's team owners (both the Indians and Browns) had been like some of today's, they would probably have moved their team to a new city prior to this, blaming the lack of success on the city.

And how about this old Texas Panhandle boy, Perryton's Mike Hargrove, who coached the Indians back into the limelight!

Perryton is really not a baseball town, no more than our towns. And not much bigger than Friona.

Hargrove, a former major leaguer himself, with a rural background, is a prime example of how America is still the land of opportunity. Sort of reminded me this week of my old former hero, Bob Feller. Maybe some of you oldtimers can appreciate this, and my apologies to the young-uns and the ladies!

In fact, I don't remember liking it a whole lot when I was a kid. I do remember that we would get

Here are a couple of my favorites:

3. Trick or treat early and go to homes of only people you know.

I bet that O.J. Simpson will be a popular costume this year, complete with fake knives, blood, gloves, and caps.

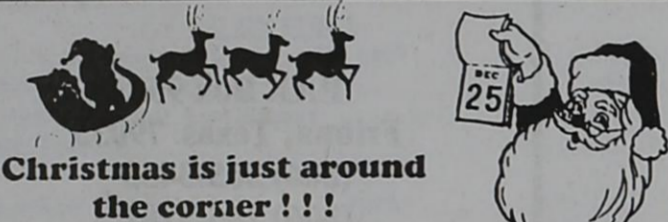
Some say that rubber masks of that obnoxious Duracell battery family will be popular too. Do we need a getaway from stress that bad?

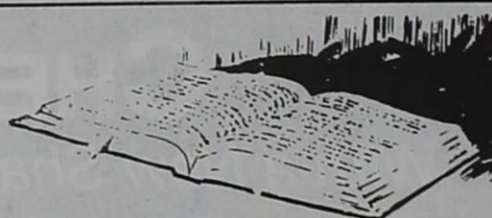

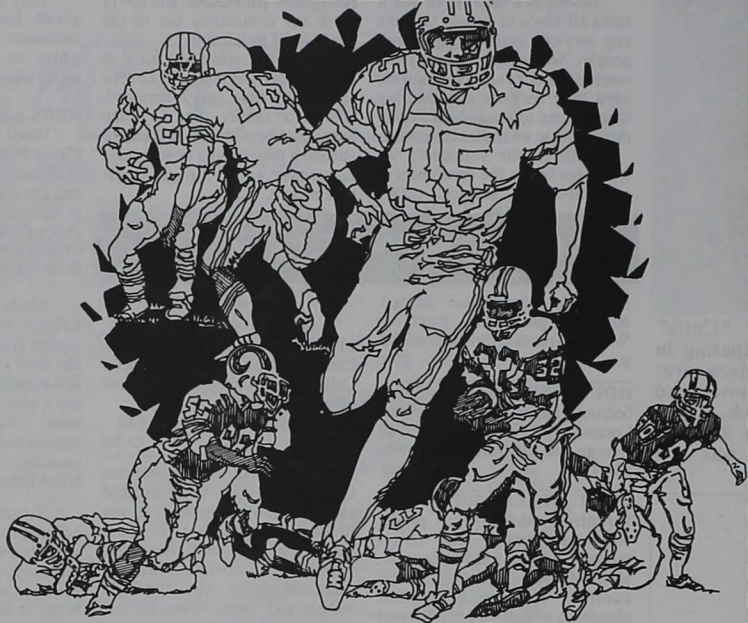
