



Among conemporaries who can claim March as the month of their birth, are conductor Arturo Toscanini and inger Dinah Shore, and in history, composer Johann Sebastian Bach, inventor Alexander Graham Bell and poetess Elizabeth Barrett

The aquamarine, a gem related to the emerald, has the depth and tone of sea water and, as does the sea, varies in the intensity of its color, from delicate pale blue to cool green. Research conducted by the Jewelry Industry Council dis-closes that the ancients wore this stone, engraved with the head of the Sea God, for protection against the perils of the sea.

Aquamarines are famous for versatility and subtlety of color, making them particularly becoming to women, whether blonde or brunette. In rings, clips, and other jewelry for women, they are often set with diamonds. Aquamar nes are mined in Brazil, Madagascar and the United States.

The bloodstone, a dark chalcedony spotted with red inclusions of jasper, is found in Siberia and India. A companion piece to the aquamarine as March's birthstone, the bloodstone is especially popular in men's rings and cuff ings, frequently carved with crest or monogram.
