But there is something that can be DONE about getting RID of them.

There is a City Ordinance which says all dogs must be vaccinated and tagged. Those that are not can be picked up.

Now here is what we think can and should be done about it, before the City starts picking up untagged dogs and bumping

4. Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

As a newspaperman we've been through this dog situation every year, somewhere, for the past 25 years, and we know some people always want to make a fight against obeying the law when it comes to dogs, and will cook up all kinds of stories, and will fight you quicker over a dog than they will a child, but the only way to stop dog trouble is to decide on a legal course of action and then
