PARMER COUNTY Jr. Livestock Show for 1974 is history, and quite a show was concluded last weekend at the new showbarn in Friona.

Record crowds attended the show from the start to the finish, and they were able to enjoy the show in comfort for a change. Even the weather cooperated, with a beautiful weekend, one of the best in several years for the annual show.

The crowds surprised the show officials somewhat, as they weren't properly prepared for the turnout, particularly for Friday night's steer show.

By the time another show is held, additional seats will need to be provided. At least, with the huge show ring, spectators were able to line the ring for the steer show, and this afforded everyone an opportunity to see the show, where in the past it has been next to impossible to see the judging up close.

BOVINA AREA businesses were well represented at the auction sale on Saturday afternoon, and it is no secret that Bovina livestock that made the sale brought considerably more than average in the show.

There were easily twice as many buyers at the sale than there has been in the past—at least the crowd was that much bigger—and the buying duties were spread around somewhat.

Early this week, it appeared that a new record would be set in the sale, of perhaps \$60,000 for the young showmen in the county. In addition, around \$12,000 was raised to go toward paying the debt on the new showbarn.

Officials announced during the sale that an additional \$20,000 was needed to help pay off the facility. It was reported that \$65,000 had been raised toward the total of \$85,000 that was needed to pay for the showbarn.

Thus, the \$12,000 raised last Saturday gets the showbarn fund up to \$77,000, and leaves the building just \$8,000 away from being paid for.

FILING DEADLINE is just two weeks away in both the city council and the school board races, and to date, there has been little, if any, activity.

Wednesday, March 6 the deadline for filing for an office on either of the two boards, and the election is scheduled for Saturday, April 6.

CONGRESS, the executive branch of government and millions of U.S. citizens will find much cause for alarm and some cause for hope in a congressional opinion survey. The survey covered a wide range of topics and problems. Perhaps its most significant revelation is the abysmal lack of confidence in the federal government and most notably the executive branch.

The survey also revealed what will be a surprising fact to some. The medical profession stands highest in public esteem of all major institutions—above higher education, television news, the military, organized religion, the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Senate, the press and major companies. The individual appears to place more trust in his doctor than anyone else.

This brings up a highly-paradoxical phenomenon. On the one hand, medicine stands highest in public esteem; and, on the other, government stands lowest. Yet there are those who crusade for government to take over the doctors under a sweeping national health insurance law. The proposed government health plans would put the medical profession and related health

COUNCIL CALLS ELECTION

City Employees Get 12% Pay Increase

Bovina city employees received pay increases of 12 percent each at a recent session of the Bovina city council.

Five people are currently on the city payroll. Durward Bell made a motion to grant the employees the raise based on the cost of living increase. Roy Allen seconded the motion which carried.

Billy Whitecotton moved that the council pass a resolution of intent to pave subject to papers drawn up by City Attorney Richard Collard and City Engineer Ralph Douglas. Don Spring seconded the motion, which also carried.

Three bids were received on a 1959 truck the city had advertised for sale. Doyle Wassom's bid of \$151 was accepted. Others submitting bids were Elmo Dean and Joe Pena.

In other matters on the agenda, the councilmen also called the annual city election for April 6, a Saturday.

Four vacancies come up on the six-member council. The terms of Mayor Johnnie Horn and Councilmen Roy Allen, Don Spring and Durward Bell expire.

Bell, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dolph Moten, announced during the meeting he would seek re-election to the post. Horn and Spring said they would not be candidates this year. Allen was non-committal concerning his plans.

Holdover members of the council, those who have another year remaining on their two-year terms, are Billy Whitecotton and Vernon Estes. Named to serve as election judge was J.E. Sherrill. The

License Tags On Sale Here

License plates will be on sale in Bovina two days next week, announces Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector.

Moseley will be at Bovina's city hall Monday and Tuesday of next week from 10 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

Vehicle owners must bring their three-part license plate renewal forms in order to purchase the tags, says Moseley. Also, if owners plan to purchase the plates with a check, personalized checks must be used, he states.

In a change from previous years, Moseley will be prepared to do title work while he is at the county locations.

Vehicle owners may continue to purchase tags until deadline time by mailing the three-part renewal forms, registration fee and \$1 to cover the cost of mailing, to the county courthouse in Farwell.

Deadline for displaying '74 tags is Monday, April 1. In addition to sales dates in Bovina, Moseley will be in Friona at the office of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union for the remainder of this week. Hours there will be from 10 a.m. until noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. Moseley will be at the Sherley Anderson Elevator at Lazbuddie on Wednesday of next week from 2 to 4 p.m.

Showing the grand champion steer was Roy Hartzog, a senior and member of the 4-H Club. Hartzog's winning steer was a Cross Breed. The reserve champion, a Charolais-cross, was exhibited by Galen Carson, a senior and member of the 4-H Club.

In the lamb division, Duane Mitchell, a sophomore FFA member, took top honors with the grand and reserve champion animals. Mitchell's grand champion was a fine wool cross and the reserve a Suffolk.

Rocky Bartlett, a freshman and member of the Bovina FFA, showed a Duroc to championship honors in the gilt class.

In the barrow division, Kathy Williams, a fifth grader and member of the Bovina 4-H Club, took grand champion honors with her Cross Breed barrow. Exhibiting the reserve champion was Al Kerby Jr., a senior and member of the 4-H Club.

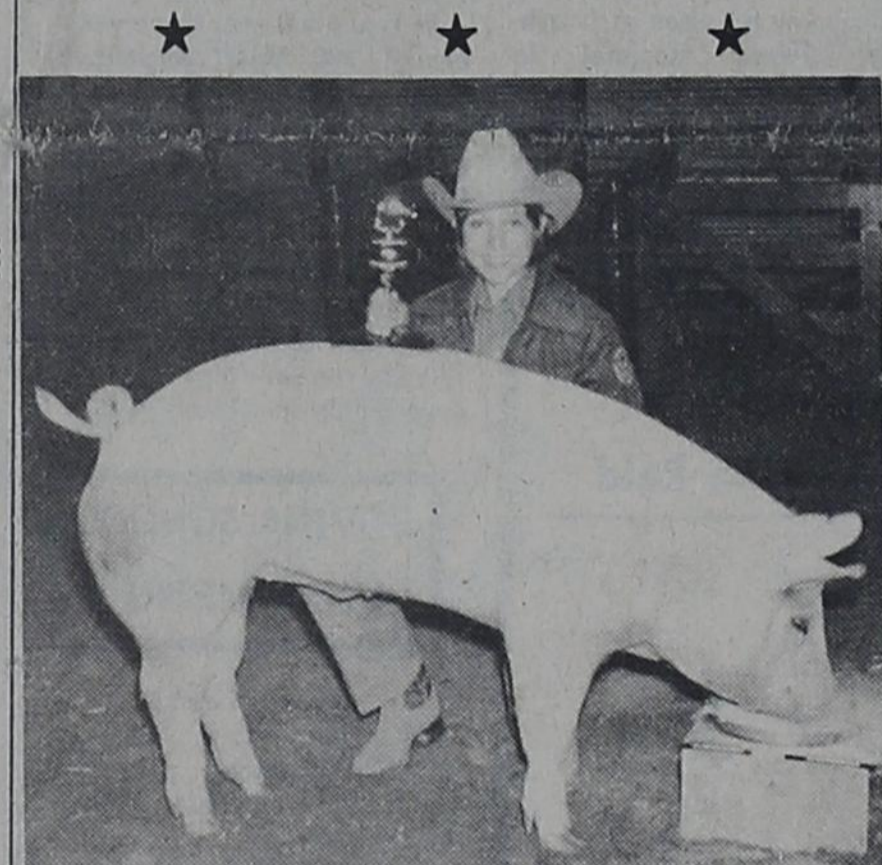

CALLS ELECTION

School Board Nixes Hair Code Change

Bovina Schools board of trustees rejected a Student Council-sponsored amendment to the dress code for students which is now in effect at a regular session of the board Monday night.

Student Council representatives requested that boys be allowed to wear more liberal hair styles. Current code for boys, which the school board agreed to leave unchanged, calls for hair to be "neatly trimmed above the eyebrows, ears and collar."

Superintendent L.F. Jacobs explains that organizations within the school have more restrictions in regard to hair. The Student Council requested the change for boys who are not in such organizations.

Student Council representatives meeting with the board to present the amendment were Ralph Ramon, president of the council; Billy Shelby, Senior Class representative; Roy Hartzog, Senior Class president and member of the council; and

Mike McCallum, Junior class council representative.

In other matters before the board, renewal of two-year contracts were given to Gary Cox, high school principal; Jim Noyes, junior high principal; Wilson DiCuffa, elementary principal; and Roger Ezell, athletic director and head football coach. Contracts of all other professional personnel will be considered at the next meeting of the board in March.

Board members approved of a request by Mrs. Carolyn Reeves and Eugene Boaz, sponsors of the Junior Class, to hold the annual Junior-Senior banquet and prom at the Holiday Inn in Clovis.

Jacobs announced that the deadline for transferring students from one school district to another will be May 1 this year, according to information received from the Texas Education Agency. In the past, June 1 has been the deadline for transferring students. Transfer forms may be

obtained and filled out at the superintendent's office of Bovina Schools.

The board called the annual school trustee election for Saturday, April 6. Deadline for candidates to file for three positions on the seven-member board is March 6. Candidates may file, or petitions for candidates may be filed, at the school tax office in Ridgelea Elementary School.

The terms of Leslie McCain, Leon Ware and Jon Lin Riddle expire this year. Riddle is filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Lawrence Jamerson in September.

Board members with one year remaining on present three-year terms are C.E. Trimble and Earl Whitten.

With two years remaining to serve are Edwin Lide and Billy Smith.

The election will be held at the Bovina Schools with Johnnie Horn serving as election judge. He will appoint clerks to assist him in the near future.

Poison Control Program Slated

The public is invited to a County-wide educational program on the Panhandle Poison Control Center. The program is sponsored by the Parmer County Family Living Committee and the Parmer County Home Demonstration Council. It will begin at 7:30 p.m. Monday, February 25, at the First United Methodist Church, 400 Ave. C in Bovina.

Mrs. Gosneel, Director of Emergency Services at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo will be the featured speaker from the Poison Control Center, which serves the Panhandle Area with emergency information for treatment in case of poisoning.

Mrs. Gosneel plans to give those attending information on how area residents may use the Center effectively and some basic information on care of those who have been poisoned. We are especially interested in having people who work around herbicides and pesticides attend as well as mothers with young children. A nursery will be provided for those mothers wishing to use it.

In Texas last year there were nearly 200 fatal poisonings listed as accidental. The Poison Control Center is there for you to use, come find out how it can help you prevent such fatalities.

Remember 7:30 p.m. Monday, February 25, at the Methodist Church in Bovina. The life you save may be one of your family members.

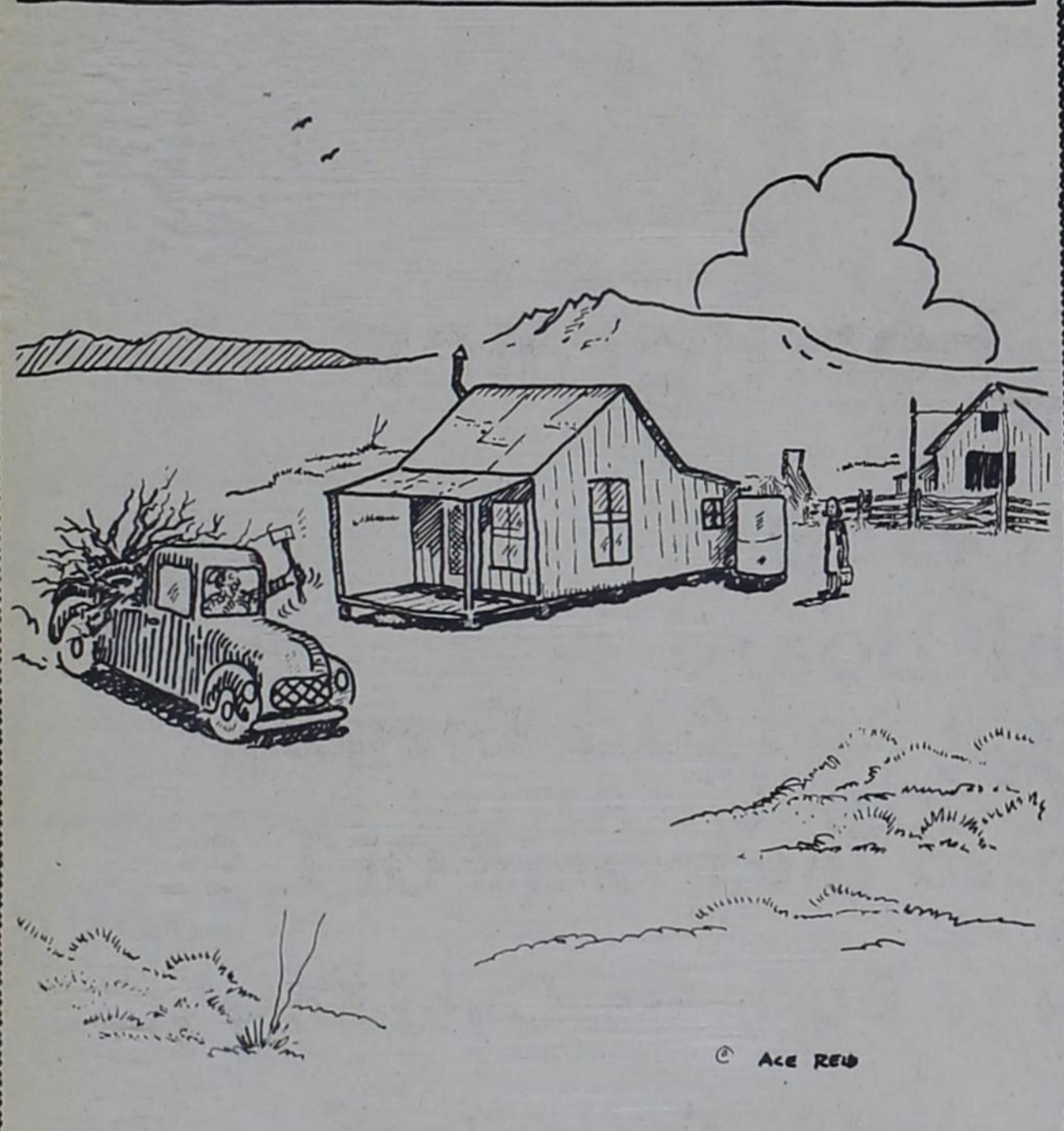

Silverton Farmer Testifies In D. C.

Pat Northcutt, a Silverton farmer and secretary-treasurer of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, testified on grain sorghum marketing and prices before a Senate subcommittee recently.

Speaking for GSPA, Northcutt asked the Senate Subcommittee on Agricultural Production, Marketing and Stabilization of Prices to increase loan rates and target prices for grain sorghum.

"There simply is not enough money available through private sources to finance the total grain crop throughout the year. A more reasonable government loan level would assist farmers and their buyers in a more orderly marketing of the grain," Northcutt told the subcommittee.

Northcutt termed an annual price escalator clause is vital to farm legislation because "with the higher cost of production, there is hardly a farmer in the United States who could survive if the market dropped to or below current target prices."

Under the present farm law the escalator clause was declared for 1974 and the cost of production is estimated to

increase by 25 percent or more. The subcommittee heard Northcutt's testimony Feb. 4 in Washington, D.C.

IRRIGATION HOOKUPS

Pioneer To Approve Additional Services

A number of pending requests for natural gas service to additional irrigation wells in a portion of Pioneer Natural Gas Company's West Texas System known as the "triangle" area will be approved in the near future, according to an announcement made by K. Bert (Tex) Watson, president of the company.

The new farm program has resulted in a very large increase in acreage being planted in the area and in a large number of requests for service to additional irrigation wells. Pioneer has been holding these requests for approval because the natural gas transmission lines serving the area are operating at maximum capacity.

The problem, according to Watson, was a "bottleneck" in the transmission line serving the area between Amherst and Sudan. The present 8-inch pipeline will be paralleled by a 10-inch pipeline and, when completed, will increase peak delivery capacity to the "triangle" area. It was pointed out that there will still be some

localized areas where the capacity of the lateral pipeline or the customer-owned group line is insufficient for additional gas service to irrigation wells.

This increased capacity will permit approval of the pending requests for more than 100 wells, tailwater pumps, lake pumps and sprinkler booster pumps in the area which includes the western half of Lamb County and the portions of Bailey, Parmer and Deaf Smith counties served by Pioneer.

Applicants with requests pending will be notified within the next few days that they may begin preparing for connection; however, actual service to the new wells will not begin until the new construction is complete and in operation. Construction is presently planned to commence on the Amherst-Sudan pipeline in early March and is anticipated to be completed in early April.

Watson added that the expansion of the Amherst-

Sudan line is one of a number of improvements to Pioneer's transmission and distribution system made during the past 18 months to meet the growing demands for gas service in the company's service area. Additional gathering pipelines to new gas supplies and the addition of 68 miles of 16-inch pipeline between Odessa and Tahoka are under construction or planned for the spring of 1974.

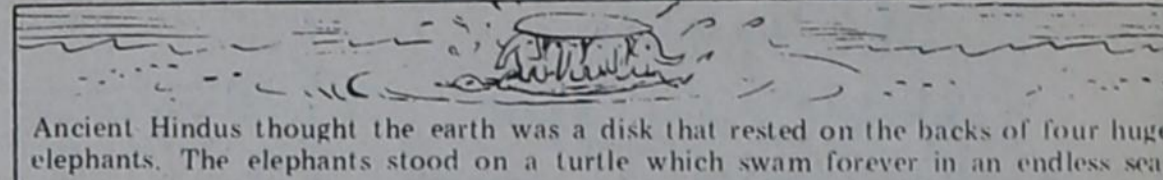
Silva Injured In Accident Here Friday

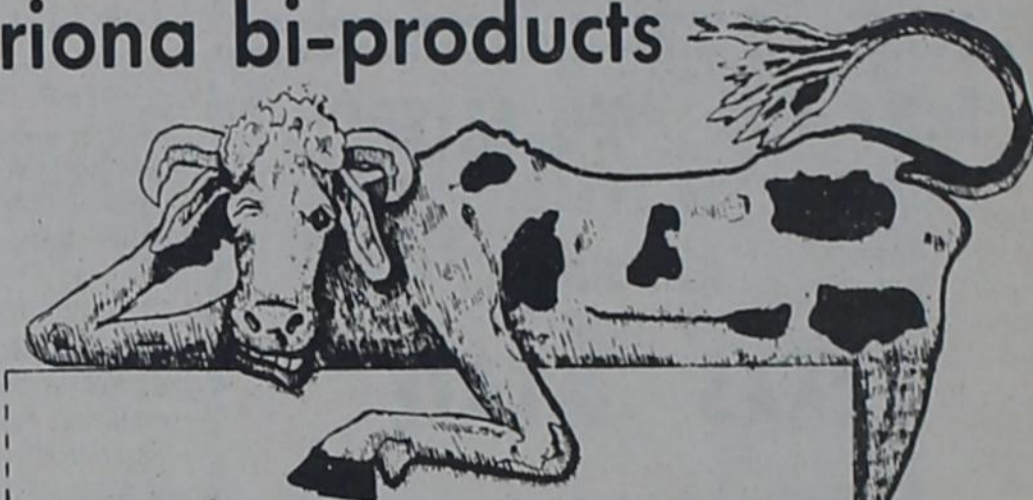

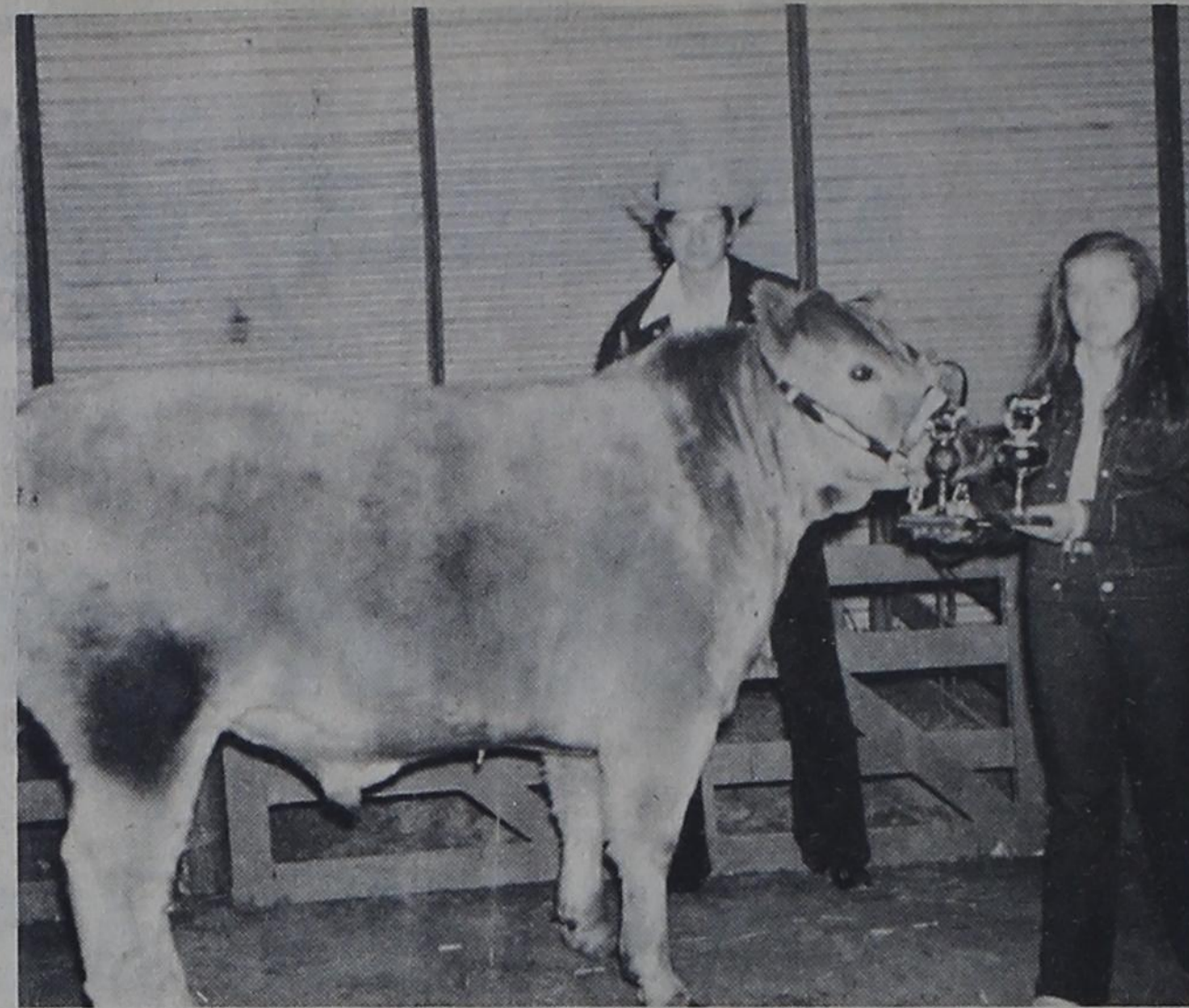

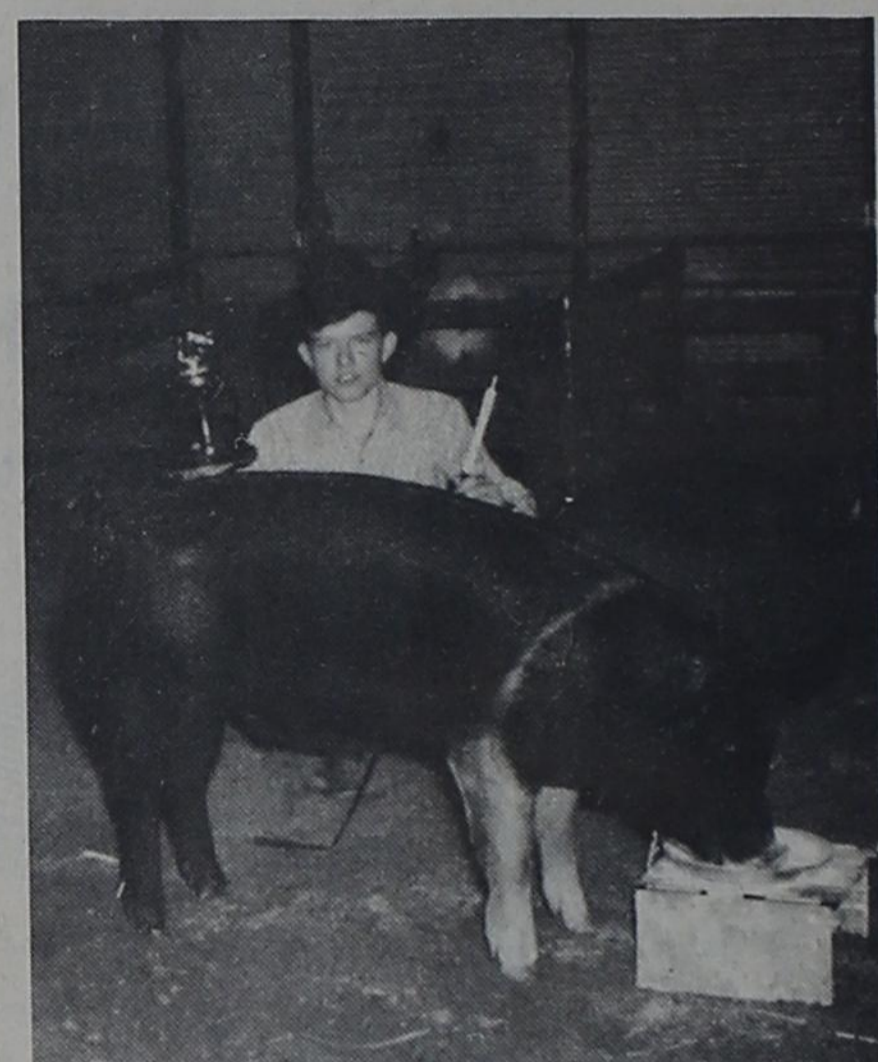

Local Entries Place, Sell In County Show

A record-breaking sale of almost \$60,000, actively supported by area businesses, climaxed the 18th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show held in the new County Show Barn facility at Friona last weekend.

Several business firms donated animals they had purchased back to the County Barn. After being resold, some several times, approximately \$12,000 was raised for the show barn fund.

Barrows, lambs and steers were judged Friday with the sale of all animals on Saturday. Lazbuddie showmen continued their years-long domination of the barrow and sheep divisions and a Farwell entry won the steer show for the fourth year in a row.

Jaquelyn Langford of Farwell climaxed the day's activities by taking grand champion honors with a Hereford steer. Garvin Thorn of Friona took reserve champion honors with a Black Angus.

Lazbuddie sacked up the barrow championship for the 13th consecutive year when Charleson Steinbock showed his Duroc barrow to grand champion honors.

The only exception in the barrow division, was the Poland class, where Lazbuddie was shut out, with Thad Phillips of Farwell taking the trophy and Dana Harris of the Bovina FFA copping the reserve champion trophy.

Lazbuddie showmen continued their domination in the sheep division, also, winning four of the five lamb trophies.

Duane Mitchell of Bovina was the exception to the Lazbuddie streak, showing the champion medium wool lamb.

Bovina entries fared well in the barrow division, however, with Harris placing first in the lightweight Poland China class and taking the reserve champion in that class. Wesley Cockerham showed his lightweight Duroc to a first place, Al Kerby Jr. took two second place ribbons in the middleweight Chester White and middleweight Hampshire classes, and Kathy Williams showed her heavyweight Poland China to a third place ribbon.

In the lamb division, Duane Mitchell placed first in the medium wool heavy class and took champion honors in the medium wool class. Charlie Trimble won a second place ribbon in the medium wool light class and Lezli Williams took a third place ribbon in the medium wool light class. Mitchell also placed third with a fine wool crossbreed.

In the steer show, Galen Carson placed second in the medium heavy class and Roy Hartzog placed third and fourth with a heavyweight and middleweight entries.

Floor price on the steers was \$46.75 per hundredweight. Barrow floor price was \$41.25 and the lamb floor price was \$38.50.

Pioneer Reports Record Income

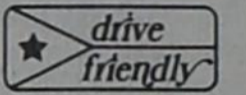

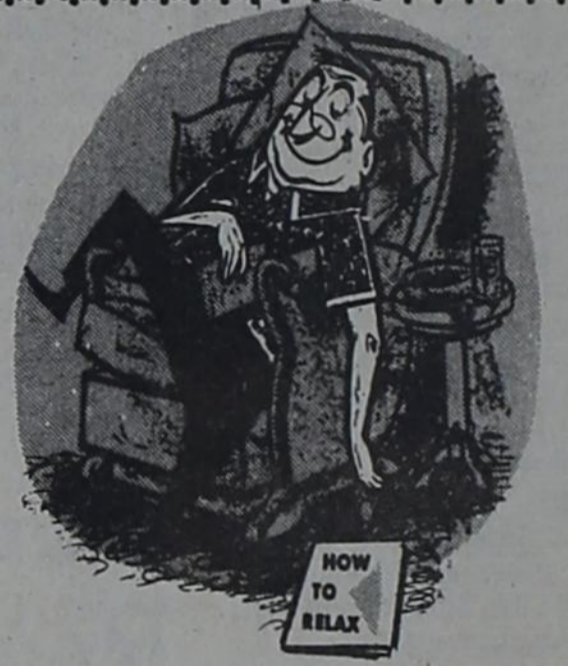

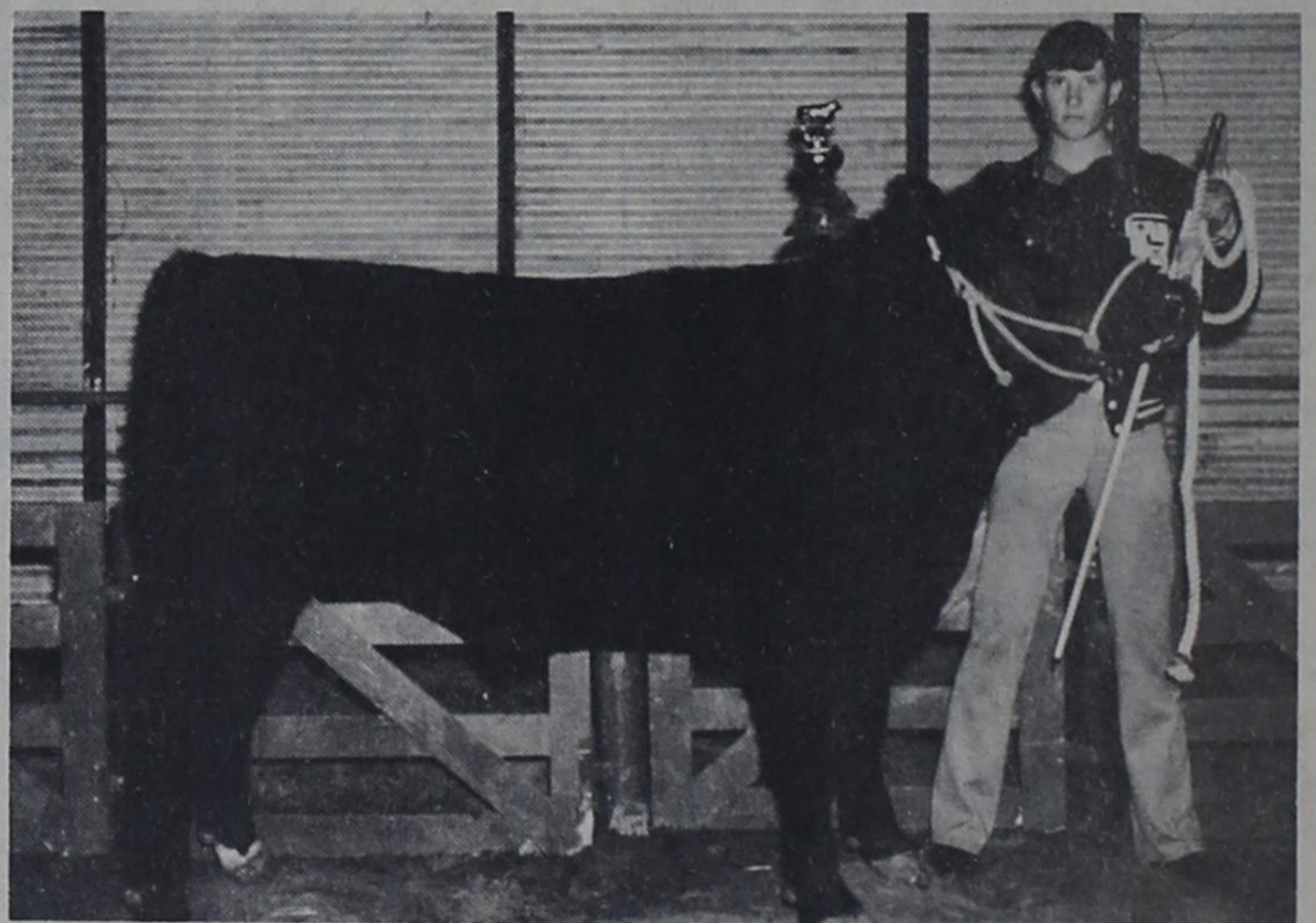
