People enrolling in the medical insurance benefit program will pay a \$3 monthly premium, which is matched by the Federal government. These premium payments will be placed in a separate supplementary medical insurance trust fund and the money will be used only for medical in-

Q. Recently I received an application card for enrollment in the supplementary medical insurance program. At this time I am undecided.

A. For those people 65 before 1966 to become eligible for medical benefits in July, 1966, they must enroll no later than March 31, 1966.

Q. When will the nursing home care part of the hospital insurance program begin? A. Benefits for nursing home care begin January 1967. Nursing home benefits are primarily intended to help during convalescent periods for post-hospital patients and not for permanent custodial residents.
