The tax, which is levied directly on those who use telephone service, has been included on monthly telephone bills, and each month your tax payment has been sent on to the federal government. In effect, the telephone company has been a collection agency.

When the excise tax is eliminated in 1969, telephone users in Texas will save more than \$50 million annually. This will mean more than \$4 million a month added to Texans' spendable income.


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
