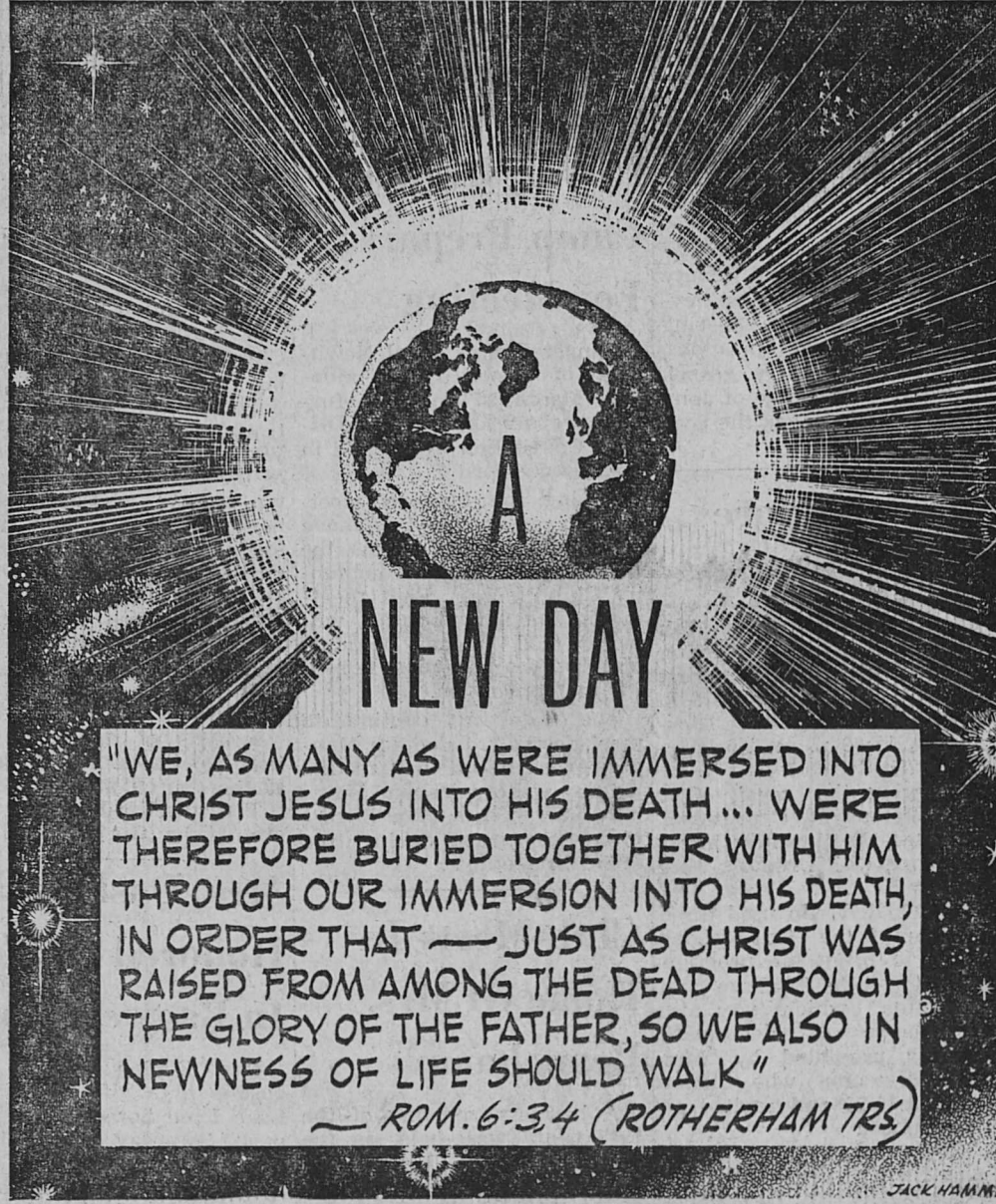

Summer Contests Could Cost Student Eligibility

HIGH School students who plan to enter rodeo events this summer should make sure they know the Texas Interscholastic League rules Supt. James R. Clark said today.

Ignorance of the rules can cost you one or more eligibility he said.

Girls entering the Queens Contest are not violating any rule providing the selection of the winner is not based on any rodeo event.

It is not a violation of League rules for any pupil 15 years of age or older to participate in a rodeo providing the pupil or his parents pays his expenses and he accepts no cash or valuable consideration.

Valuable consideration is construed to mean any item which is usable, wearable, or has resale value. Belt buckles, belts, shirts, and other similar items including golf balls are not to be accepted and will cause the student to lose his eligibility if he conceals any of them.

Symbolic items such as cups, plaques, medals or trophies can be accepted without danger Clark said.

Most rodeos now require the high school principal or superintendent to approve any application to enter but some do not.

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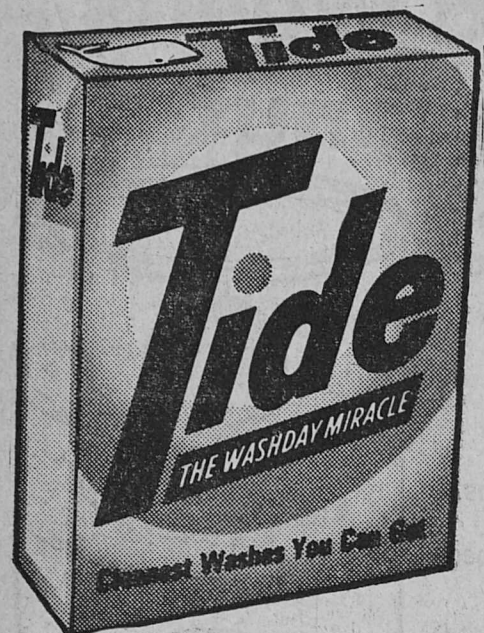

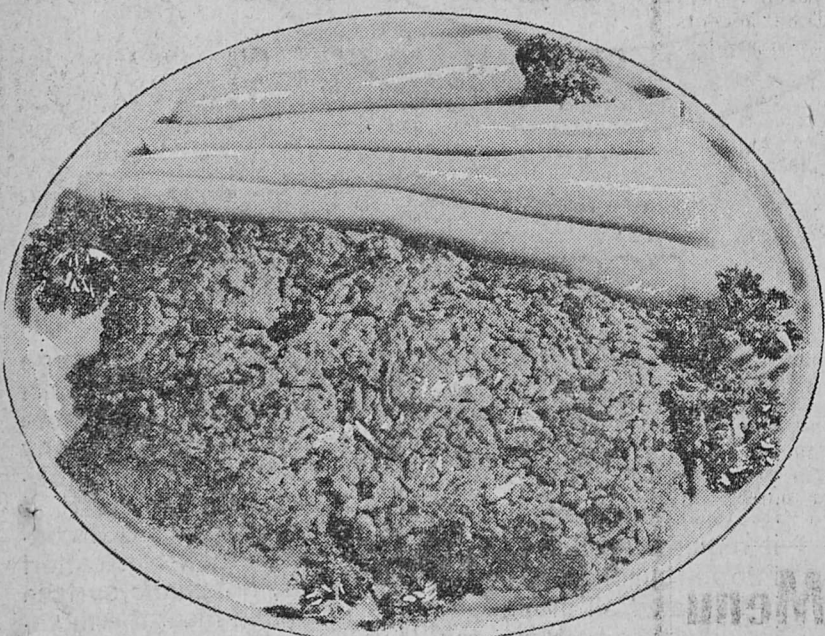

Annual Pecan Budding School Planned In Cisco April 14th

The 14th annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School will be held in Cisco, April 14, according to an announcement by DeMarquis Gordon, county agricultural agent.
The school will be sponsored by the agent, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the "Eastland County Pecan Growers Association." The morning session will be held in the cafeteria at the Cisco Junior College. It will begin at 9 a. m. and will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on budding and grafting.
After lunch the afternoon practice session will be at the B. T. Graham orchard, one mile west of town on the Old Abilene highway.
J. M. Cooper, former county agent, who originated the school several years ago, will

be instructor. Mr. Cooper is the president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. In the past years more than 1,000 people from over central and west Texas have leaned the basic fundamentals of pecan propagation at one of these schools.

Deadline Near To Have Motor Vehicle Check

AUSTIN—The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that only six weeks remain before enforcement begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last minute lines begin.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison stated, "many motorists will wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped with late-comers."

"In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we would urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized neighborhood inspection station."

New Proposal For Burleson's 17th District

A recent report out of Austin stating that a plan was being considered to do away with Cong. Omar Burleson's 17th Congressional District, dividing it between two adjoining districts has caused quite a bit of concern among people in this area.

Realizing that congressional re-districting is almost certainly going to become a fact of life this year, several local people wrote Cong. Burleson and asked his opinion on what the best "representa-

tion" procedures might be. The congressman's reply indicates that Cong. O. C. Fisher of San Angelo, of the 21st District, has proposed a more acceptable plan in which Cong. Burleson's present district would be increased by three counties (Borden, Scurry and Garza) bringing the total district population up to 404,256. His present 23-county district has 376,200 population, and the figure around 400,000 has been decided to be the most equal figure, it is re-

ported. The proposal was from U. S. Rep. Fisher to House Speaker Ben Barnes. The "abandon - the - 17th" proposal comes from a Midland state representative.

The Fisher proposal would further: add six counties and remove two from the 21st District; remove six and add Gonzales to the 23rd District; add Crane to the 16th; add Ector and Bailey to George Mahons 19th, subtracting

seven counties; add two to the 18th, removing four; and adding four to the 13th (Purcell).
