## Dallas Man Charged With Attempt Murder

Larry Ouster Clar 21 year old Dallas negro, is in Eastland County Jail where he faces charges of attempt to murder and two unlawful entries into private residences with intent to commit felony.

Clark went to the home of Perry Pierson, 917 Vitalious, shortly after 8 a. m. Wednesday. He entered the house through a rear door while Mrs. Pierson was working in the front yard. Hearing her approaching, he hid in the living room. Upon being discovered, he attacked her, tearing the clothing from her body and striking her on head and face with a baseball bat taken from a toy box. He escaped to the stolen 1965 Chevrolet he was driving and drove out of town on Hwy. 80 E.

Mrs. Pierson's screams attracted neighbors who notified local police. A state-wide alarm was sounded at 8:55 and one hour later the criminal was picked up five miles west of Weatherford by Highway Patrolman Bill Pruitt, County Sheriff Lefty Sublett and deputy Loy Williams returned Clark to Ranger for hearing in the office of Justice of the Peace M. D. Underwood. Assisting in the interrogation were Ranger Police Chief J. W. Vinson and Constable R. W. Vesie.

The accused man admitted entering the Pierson home, stating that robbery was the motive. He also admitted entering another Ranger residence earlier, where he stole a radio and other articles. The radio was recovered.

Bond on the three charges totals \$15,000. Mrs. Pierson received treatment for minor injuries at Ranger General Hospital and was released.

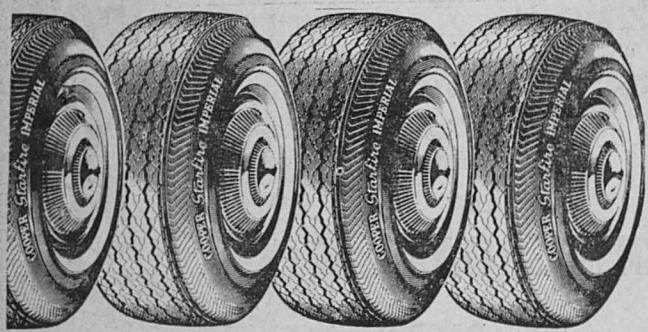

# THE GORDON SPOT

Eastland County has several good swine producers. I visited with one last Monday, Pat Moseley of Olden. Pat has a good place for raising hogs with plenty of pastures available. Swine production is a family job at the Moseleys. Three of the children, Patsy, Dollie and Jim are 4-H members at Olden and have swine of their own.

Patsy owns a registered Luroc sow which she won through the 4-H swine program. Her sow has just weaned a good litter of eight pigs. She plans to keep most of the gilts and go into pig production in a big way. One of the pigs will be given to her brother for helping to take care of her pigs. Patsy had surgery about the time the pigs were borne and has not been able to take care of them herself.

I would like to remind pecan producers that Di-Syston, a systemic insecticide, has been cleared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for aphid control.

A systemic insecticide is a chemical which can be absorbed into a plant's sap system. When the aphid feeds on the plant, it gets a dose of the poison. Di-Syston has proven effective against the black pecan aphid and the yellow or honey dew aphid. Twenty pounds of Di-Syston per acre are recommended

under Eastland County conditions. The granular chemical should be applied in 6-foot bands to the soil on both sides of the trees under the main drip areas. Next work the insecticides into the upper 2 to 3 inches of the soil. Adequate soil moisture is the key to getting top benefits from the Di-Syston. Otherwise, tree roots cannot absorb the material.

The usual recommended application period is May 1-15. Only one application is permitted per season, and this must be made at least 80 days before harvest. Season-long control is most often the rule when proper application and moisture condition prevails.

A Sheep and Angora Field Day will be held April 13 at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center near McGregor.

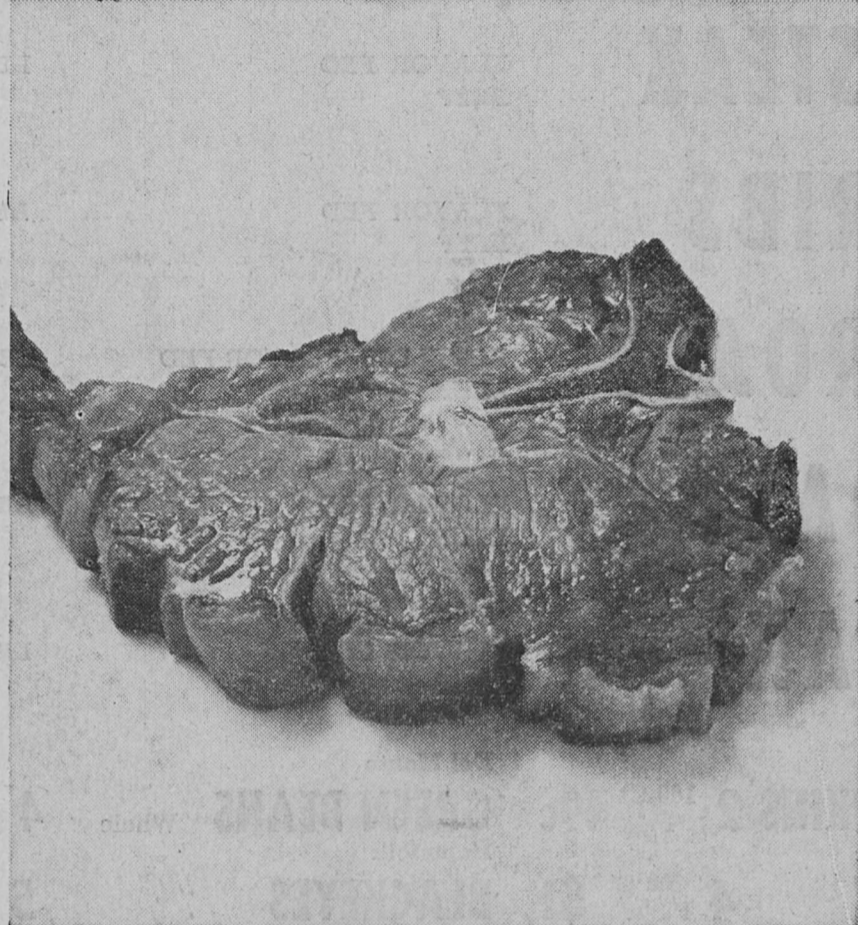
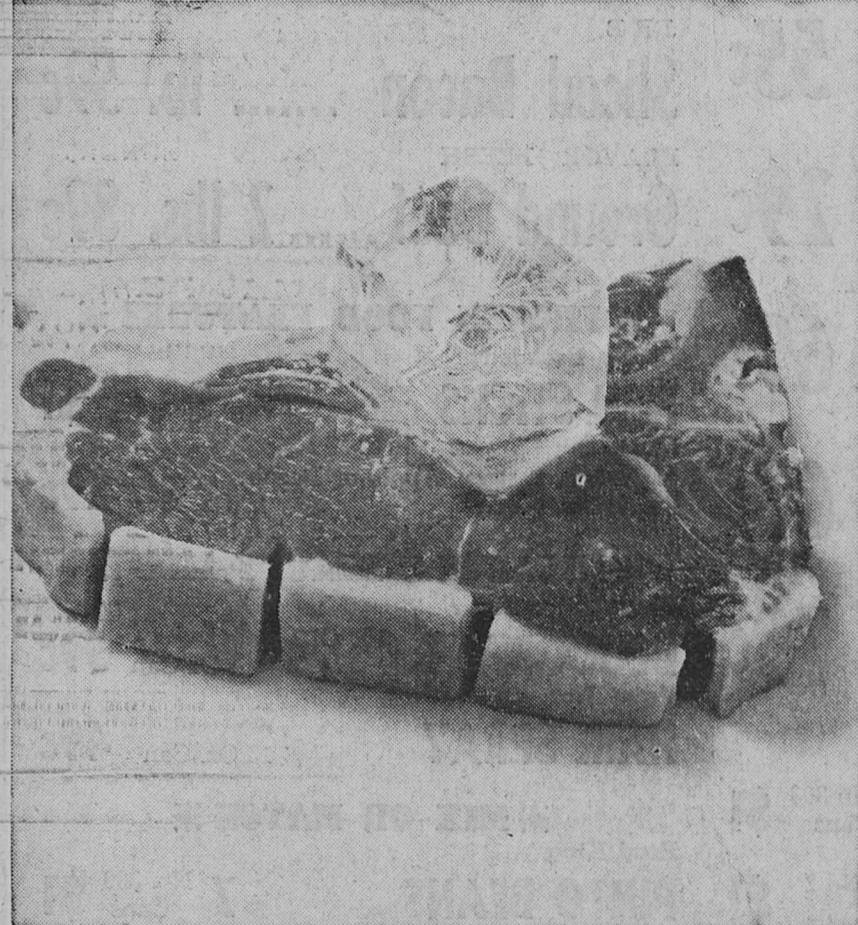

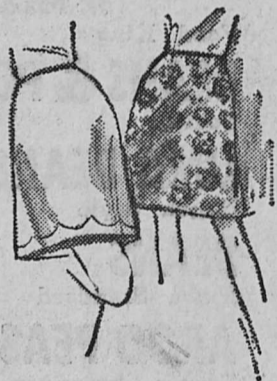

## Court Group Visits In Eastland On Thursday

The five members of the House subcommittee considering the bill to move the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene flew to Eastland Thursday for a first-hand inspection of the courts facilities being provided by Eastland County. State Representative Burke Musgrove, whose legislative district includes the Eastland County area, was with the committee group.

A large crowd of Eastland area supporters of the court plan was on hand to welcome the subcommittee of the House Judicial Districts Committee, which is considering the bill that would move the court if passed. Approximately 100 Eastland area residents traveled to Austin earlier during the session to protest the court being moved at a public hearing on the proposed legislation.

Musgrove said that moving the Court some 52 miles down a divided, four-lane highway
