## Old Rip Makes Headlines As Solons Consider Frog Plans

Sen Joe Christie's plea for a law to protect the horned toad from exploitation and eventual extinction got unanimous approval from the Senate when his bill passed that body and went to the House.

The El Paso senator's bill would permit capture and holding of the pictureque creature of Texas dry prairies and hills, but for propagation purposes only.

As might be guessed, Eastland County's famous frog, Old Rip, has come in for a share of headlines in connection with a bill presently before the Texas Senate.

In an elaborate eight-column feature in a recent issue of the Daily Texan at Austin, Old Rip is cited as the example in the horned frog issue. The story headline read 'Legend of Old Rip', the Hapless Horned

Toad, Revived By Restrictive Legislation of Campus Jewelry Fad."

The bill in question was introduced by Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso on March after he observed what is being done to the poor creatures. Christie is quoted in the article on how the baby frogs are used to make jewelry.

...they put the baby toads in a substance to make a mold with. Then the mold is baked and the toad is burned to ashes. They take out the ashes and pour metal into the mold."

"Burned up" about this abuse, Christie said that after some research, he discovered that hundreds of thousands of the animals are also being

"Not only are thousands being burned up, but many are sent to other parts of the country, where in strange environments they die." Besides being harmless, Christie added one toad alone eats more than 40,000 bugs a year.

His proposed bill would make it unlawful for any person to capture, trap, trap for, ensnare, willfully kill or injure, take or have in his possession for the purpose of sale, barter or commercial exploitation, horned toads except for propagation and scientific purposes.

Maximum penalties for violating the conditions of the bill would be a \$200 fine and or 60 days in jail!

## Old Rip Appears In National Observer

A clipping from the National Observer, Washington, D.C. was sent to J. I. Doc) Brinkley by his daughter, Mrs. Ruby Copp of Chickasha Okla.

The article is titled "Hopping Mad: Of Toads and Tortoises" and deals with the bill, sponsored by Senator Joe Christie of El Paso, to stop commercial exploitation of either horned frogs or the Texas tortoise. The bill calls for a penalty for commercial exploitation of either creature of a maximum of 60 days in jail and 200 fine.

The National Observer article devoted space to Old Rip, Eastland's horned frog.

The Texas Tortoise lives in the southern reaches of the state. State biologists have said the species could become extinct unless protected.

# Explore Inner Space READ

Theme: Explore Inner Space-Read: Reading is What's Happening.

The students at Ranger Junior College are able to practice the theme of National Library Week better than ever this year. Over a thousand volumes of books and bound periodicals have been added to the library.

Important reference works such as the Encyclopedia of Science and Technology, Encyclopedia of Social Sciences, and The Oxford English Dictionary have made much vital information available for assignments. Other important reference additions are Congress and the Nation, Cyclopaedia of Literary Characters, Private Secretary's Encyclopedia Dictionary.

The Texas Almanac, 1857-1873 is a collection of articles which appeared in the Texas Almanac and were written by the people who participated in the events: For the Battle of San Jacinto, both the account by Sam Houston and the one by Col. Pedro Delgado of Santa Anna's army are published. This book will prove invaluable for the study of Texas history.

Frontier Forts of Texas identifies more than thirty forts of Texas and relates, in depth, the history of eight of the forts.

The Wire That Fenced The West, relates as its title implies, shows the importance of barbed wire in the history of the west. By 1900 more than four hundred patents had been issued and thirty-six typed of barbed wire are explained in the book. The author, Henry D. McCallum owns one of the most extensive collections of barbed wire in the world.

Another very interesting title is Merchants Make History by Ernest Samhaber. The author relates how trade has influenced the course of history throughout the world.

Recreation and extra-Curricular activities are included with such titles as: Practical Photography by Robert A. McCoy, Encyclopedia of Party Ideas for Adults by Lora Lee Parrott, and Vaughn's Parade and Float Guide.

For recreational reading, science fiction, murder mysteries, spy, and suspense stories dominate the fiction list. By popular demand a high percentage of the "James Bond, 007" adventures were purchased.

The foregoing is only a sample of the large variety of books acquired this year. These acquisitions were made possible by an increased book budget supplemented by a large federal grant. Many important gifts were received, the most important being over one hundred and fifty volumes from R. B. Goleston. Other equally valuable gifts, in terms of quality were donated by Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Larson, Mrs. James P. Morris, Mrs. George Robinson and Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Bobo.

Immediate plans include the purchase of a microfilm reader and microfilm. The addition of microfilm will enable us to include rare and out of acquisition of back files of periodicals which are difficult, as well as costly, to acquire otherwise.

The public is invited, at any time, to make use of the Ranger Junior College Library facilities.


