POE'S CIVIL WAR DIARY IS PUBLISHED

"THE RAVING FOE," a new book just released by Longhorn Press of Eastland, Tex., contains the complete personal diary of Maj. James T. Poe, who as a member of an Arkansas Confederate Regiment, was a prisoner of war on Johnson's Island, Ohio. Maj. Poe, a cousin to the poet, Edgar Allan Poe, wrote the journal before, during and after his service. His great-grandson, J. C. Poe, an Eastland florist, has taken the family heirloom and turned it into a combination adventure-reference volume, using the major's own accounts as the basis for the book, and including documents and records pertinent to the saga. The 144-page book contains a complete list of units and places where captured. Born in 1829 in Alabama, Maj. Poe moved to Arkansas in 1856. He served of 1,253 prisoners on the island, showing hometowns, two years in the Arkansas House of Representatives after the War and moved to Central Texas in 1896. He died in 1913 and was buried in Eastland County, Tex.

CESSATION OF INTEREST ON SAVINGS ANNOUNCED

United States Postal Savings certificates totaling \$3,948, on deposit at the Ranger Post Office, will cease earning interest for 12 local depositors on April 27, 1967, Postmaster Ross Hodges said today.

On June 30, all remaining funds in the program will be turned over to the Treasury Department to be held in a trust fund until liquidated. There they will remain available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

Mr. Hodges urged that all Postal Savings depositors close out their accounts and invest their funds in United States Savings Bonds or the new Freedom Shares, which on May 1, will pay 4.74 per cent interest.

Holders of Postal Savings certificates can arrange to redeem them simply by applying at the post office where the certificates were issued. The postmaster there will provide guidance and necessary forms to assist in cashing certificates.

All transactions can be handled by mail, and certificates issued to persons now deceased can be cashed by legal heirs in accordance with State laws governing such distribution. Again the postmaster at the issuance post office will render authorized assistance.

Shepard, Cavazos, Merrell and Steadman also combined to place third in the mile relay. The athletes placing first through fourth are qualified for the conference meet in San Antonio, March 29.

A quick survey look at Eastland County at this mid-spring time reveals that there is a lot of activity, things are moving forward and the prospects for the future are bright indeed.

Just about any index you choose points upward for this area.

Not the least of the bright spots is the weather - rains, though late in coming, are proving to be "just the right kind" for seasoning and getting things ready for putting in crops and supplying stock water, the experts agree. Most of the county had over an inch of rain this week with little or no damage, as the early morning showers soaked in, and skies cleared for bright Spring days. Lack of moisture earlier had prompted some e-juzzled looks, particularly after last year's record-breaking peanut harvest. The question was: "Can it be repeated in 1967?" Best guesses are that it can.

Construction and development continues to be at a fast pace from one end of the county to the other. New buildings are under construction at both county junctures.

Interstate Highway 20 is under way through the county, with the major part of the work now centered to the southwest of Eastland. This work is bringing many families to county towns.

Major expansion of peanut processing and storage facilities at the Gorman Peanut Co. and the opening of an agricultural fertilizer company plus increasing interest in irrigating equipment continue to emphasize the importance being placed on Mr. Peanut.

In Carbon, peanuts again make their mark, where expansion of the drying facilities has increased capacity there, and continue to stimulate that town's economy.

Olden residents boast of the new community water system which provides abundant water supply at reasonable costs and are quick to point out all the nice, available building sites for homes and industry.

Deposits in the five banks of Eastland County are approaching \$20 million, and continue to inch upward, indicative of the county's growing economy.

At the county seat in Eastland, major emphasis at this time includes the improvement of the city airport by the Jaycees who are expanding the landing strip to 4,000 feet. A lot of street improvement is underway and much more on schedule for the summer.

The City of Eastland is looking forward to a debt-free status, expected soon, which will mark the first time since the early '40s that the city will be out front under the old federal court order which resulted at the time of bankruptcy. It's been a "bootstrap" operation for the city since.

Thoughts are of sewer plant improvements, park development, major paving and other citizen-benefiting projects.

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative is presently building a new Eastland County Headquarters Building on West Main St. in Eastland.

Eastland experienced a recent home-building period which has virtually provided all the needed housing for the present, with additional new starts being noted regularly.

On a "hold our own" basis, the county has put on a "hoped-to-be successful" effort to keep the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in this county in spite of an attempt steal by Abilene. The court facilities on the 5th floor of the courthouse have been completely remodeled & air conditioned.

The County Sheriff's Posse is improving its arena facilities with a view to expanded use.

A brand new drive-in restaurant is a building on East 80 in Eastland. Continued expansion at Hollywood Vassarette has brought (Continued on page 4)



Southwest Machines has doubled its capacity within the year, adding thousands of dollars in new payroll.

Featherlite Corporation has increased its payroll by \$30,000 per year.

A new housing development is underway with one new home completed, two more started and lots laid out for 39 more with new curbing and paving complete.

Athletic Repair, Hou-Tex Peanut Co. and Lone Star Gas continue to bolster the city's economy.

Six new businesses have opened since the first of the year — Chestnut and Son Automotive, Walnut Street Clinic, Quality Food Mart, Bray's Department Store, Western Auto Store and Fishers Used Cars.

Numerous merchants have remodeled their buildings and put up new signs. All this has caused Main St., Ranger to present a fresh look.

College Working To Make Biology Studies Standard

The biology department in each Texas junior and four-year college is being asked to participate in a plan to correlate junior college courses in the biological sciences with those of the freshman and sophomore levels of four-year schools, according to Gerald DeViney, Cisco Junior College biology instructor.

Mr. DeViney and biology instructors from Hardin Simmons University, Odessa College, Wayland Baptist College, Sul Ross State College and Howard County Junior College met at H-SU in Abilene Saturday, April 8, to outline discussion topics for the West Texas Regional Conference on Undergraduate Biological Education that will be held Oct. 6-7 in Big Spring. Biology personnel from 22 colleges are expected to at-

tend this regional meeting. Biology departments in 4-year and 2-year schools need to correlate their course material, Mr. DeViney said, in order that junior college students will be sufficiently prepared for higher level work at four-year schools. Presently, DeViney said, junior college graduates transferring to four-year schools are sometimes required to take extra background courses, because the junior college courses did not correspond with those of the freshman and sophomore levels of the 4-year schools.

Dr. Eva Lee Craik of Hardin-Simmons' biology staff is chairman of the West Texas Region's planning committee. Biology departments in the West Texas Region and those in other regions in the state are working on the correlation plan with the consultation of the Commission on Undergraduate Education in the Biological Sciences, an international organization headquartered in Washington.

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
