Another im portant reason for spraying is to apply zinc to the trees. Native groves are usually sprayed once or twice a year, but these applications must be correctly timed to be effective. You can mix an insecticide, a fungicide, and zinc sulfate in the same spray solution and apply all at one

> There have been many farmers and ranchers who have improved native pecan grov-es in this way. Most of them say that under this type of mlanagement their pastures were improved enough to pay for the clearing work and their pecans gave an additional income.

The Oct. 1 forecast of the Texas pecan crop remains at 35 million pounds. 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




Sales in Texas for the first nine months of 1967 totaled
