

Demos, GOP Ready For Runoff Voting

Texas Democrats found out this week what some had suspected ever since the May 6 primary-there will be a runoff for one of the statewide Democratic nominations.

The runoff will be in the race for Railroad Commissioner, unexpired term, between John Poerner and Jerry Sadler. Sadler is the former state official who alienated voters to the extent that they turned him out of office in 1974. They apparently forgot this on May 6, however, since he led the four-man field seeking the commissioner's spot.

In six of the eight Parmer County precincts, this will be the only issue on the June 3 runoff ballot for the Democrats. Voters in the Bovina and Rhea precincts have a commissioner's race to spark their turnout. Jack Patterson and Glenden Sudderth are the candi-

Hollis Horton, County Democratic chairman, said that he had secured permission to consolidate some voting boxes for the Democratic runoff. Black, Lakeview and Friona precincts will all vote in Friona. The Oklahoma Lane precinct will vote at Farwell. Rhea and Bovina will remain as planned, because of the commissioner's race.

election expenses, and due to the fact that in the majority of the precincts, where only the state race will be considered, the vote is

expected to be light," Horton said. Area Republicans have good reason to turn out for the runoff election, as candidates Jim Reese and George Bush, Jr. are meeting for the GOP nomination for U.S. Congress to oppose Kent Hance.

Absentee voting for the runoffs will begin today in the county clerk's office and will continue through May 30. The county courthouse will be closed Memorial Day, May 29.

A special booth will be manned one day only at Friona for absentee voting on Friday, May 26 at the Friona Credit Union office. Voters in the Friona area who don't want to miss the runoff election are urged to take advantage of this special service and cast their ballots on that day if they think they might be gone on June 3.

Bush To Meet Voters At Bank

George Bush, Jr., candidate for congress in the Republican runoff June 3, will be in Bovina on Friday, May 26, at 10 a.m. at First State Bank to visit with voters.

Bush led the voting in the three-man race on May 6, with 6,296 votes district-wide, or 47.5 per cent. Jim Reese was next with 5,500 votes, 41.5 per cent, and Joe Hickox polled 1,455 votes, or 11.0 per cent.

A spokesman for Bush's campaign said he was anxious to meet the residents of Bovina, and find out their needs and interests.

Ezell, Bovina, Texas, has announced that the Clerk-Carrier examination will be opened to the public May 30, 1978 at 8 a.m. and will close to the public June 5, 1978 at 5 p.m., and urged that all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment.

"We have not opened our register in quite some time and an examination of it has lead us to believe that it is out of date, and that many of the names on the register are people who have moved or for some reason are no longer available to take postal jobs," Postmaster Marvin E. Ezell said.

"I do not want to give the impression we will be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months", the Postmaster said. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for and taking the exams."

The Postmaster said the Postal Service established the policy two years ago of extending eligibility indefinitely for those on the job register because little hiring was being done. "On October 8, 1978 those who have been on the job register for more than two years will lose their eligibility. They will have to re-apply to compete for a standing on the new register," he said.

Postmaster Ezell explained those wishing to take the exam could by contacting the Postmaster, in person, at the Post Office in Bovina. during the period May 30, 1978, 8 a.m. through June 5, 1978, 5 p.m.

Starting salaries for ClerkCarrier, Part-time Flexible, PS-5, is \$6.90 per hour with steps taking rate up to \$8.19 per hour over an eight year period. Twelve steps with maximum time between steps of 52 weeks, minimum of 26 weeks. Beginning salary for Full-Time Clerk-Carrier employees is \$13,916 per annum with steps to \$16,501 per annum over an eight year period. New hires are employed as part-time who are paid at these hourly rates. The hourly rates are just about equivalent to the annual salaries but do not include pay for nine holidays that full-time employees get.

Trash Tips For Summer

With summer upon us, Andy Garza, Bovina's Water and Sewer Superintendent has a few tips concerning trash disposal. "First of all, you should be careful not to overload any single trash barrell. Insurance regulations prohibit our trash crev from lifting any barrell that is too heavy for any single person to reasonable load on the truck by himself. The crew can not dump any barrell which still has hot embers or sparks in it since this could catch our trash truck on fire. To insure against this, trash should not be burned the day before pickup is scheduled."

Garza has two additional suggestions about trash disposal. "Health regulations prohibit us picking up dead animals. Persons having dead animals must make their own arrangements to have them buried. Any persons having grass clippings for pickup should bag them in a plastic bag.'

By following these suggestions you will be assured of efficient and timely trash disposal service. If you should experience any difficulties with trash pickup call 238-1116 during business hours.

Mailbox Week Set May 22-27

week during May each year when customers on rural, city motorized, and contract delivery mail routes are encouraged to examine and improve, where necessary, the

appearance of their mailboxes.

The week of May 22-27 has been selected this year. The purpose of Mailbox Improvement Week is to call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are designed to protect the mail from the weather and are neat in appearance, conveniently located, and safe to use. "Neat, attractive mailboxes make a significant contribution to the appearance of the countryside and the streets in suburban areas," said Postmaster Gene Ezell.

Where box numbers are assigned, rural route box numbers must be shown on the side of the box visible to the approaching carrier, or on the door where boxes are grouped. If the box is located on the street other than the one on which the customer resides, the street name and house number must be inscribed on the

In all instances, placing the owner's name on the box is optional Generally, boxes should be installed with the bottom of the box between three and one-half and four feet from the roadway. However, due to varying road and curb conditions, and other factors, it recommended that customers contact the postmaster or carrier prior

to initially erecting or replacing their mailbox and support.

On city motorized routes with curbline delivery, it is recommended that the box be either the approved traditional rural type box or an approved suburban box of contemporary design. Boxes designed primarily for use by customers receiving door delivery are difficult to serve efficiently from a vehicle and their use is not

However, any box that gives protection to the mail and allows safe, convenient delivery from the carriers vehicle is acceptable. Boxers should be installed with bottom of the box between three and one-half and four feet from the roadway. Where boxes are not located directly in front of the customer's residence, the house number must be shown on the box.

When a mailbox is newly installed or an unsuitable receptacle is replaced on contract delivery routes, and approved box of either the traditional rural type or contemporary design must be

Mailboxes on both rural and contract routes must be located on the right-hand side of the road in the direction traveled by the carrier. The box must be placed and served to comply with state laws and highway and postal regulations. The carrier must have access without having to leave the vehicle.

Supports for mailboxes should be of adequate strength and size to properly support the box. Reports have been received that some mailbox supports are so massive that they are damaging the vehicles and causing serious injuries to the

people who accidently strike them. The use of heavy metal posts, concrete posts, and miscellaneous items of farm equipment, such as milk cans filled with concrete, should be avoided. The ideal support is an assembly which, if struck, will bend or fall away from the striking vehicle instead of severely damaging the vehicle and injuring its occupants.

Fillies Hit Milestone--Win State Title

The Bovina High School Fillies' track team achieved something in 1977-78 that no other sports team had ever accomplished before at BHS--winning a state team championship.

The Fillies turned a combination of an outstanding group of athletes, dedication and determination into a season that saw the team go undefeated in every meet they entered-from the first meet of the year right through the state meet.

That's a record that isn't achieved

every day, or every year.

In addition, through the team's first seven meets, the Fillies ran up a string of consecutive wins by its relay teams that reached 22 straight before the team finally lost a relay race, at the regional meet—an impressive winning streak.

impressive winning streak.
For the season, the Fillies' three relay teams claimed 23 first place finishes, three seconds and one third.

The team won enough trophles to fill most schools' trophy case--in just a year's time. An impressive statistic is the fact that team members won a total of 160 medals for first, second and third place finishes during the season.

Seniors figured prominently in the success of the 1978 Fillies, and although there were just three

seniors on the team, Coach Joel Nelson lauded the trio of athletes, and what they had meant to the team's drive for the state championship.

Discus thrower and shot putter Pat Shepherd was one of the most steady performers on the team, and contributed a big 12 points at the state meet

"In most of the meets we entered, we could depend on 20 points from Pat, to get us off to a good start," Nelson says. (Figuring ten points each for a first place finish in the shot put and discus.)

Nelson explained that it was this good depth, especially in the field events, that carried the team to its unbroken string of meet wins during the season.

Having from 30 to 40 points in the field events gave the Fillies an early lead, and a base on which the relay teams could add points.

"Pat did something that's hard for

"Pat did something that's hard for most girl athletes to do--she improved during her senior year," says Nelson, aluding to the fact that girls usually "peak out" earlier than do boys. "With the help of Coac h Barnes, she worked on her form, and had a noticeable improvement, especially in the discus. We'll miss Pat next year," the Fillies coach says.

Miss Shepherd also had a statistic that not many high school athletes can match-she competed in four state meets, one for each of her years in high school.

Diane Gilbreath was another of the senior mainstays on the Fillies team. She excelled as a member of the relay teams, and competed in three state meets as a relay performer.

A pulled muscle in the middle of the season threatened to cause a premature end to Diane's track career, but she held on determined-

"An injury like this sets you back. You usually don't come back as quickly as Diane did. It is a tribute to her determination that she stayed with it," Nelson says.

Miss Gilbreath was on the state championship mile relay team at Austin in 1976. Then in 1977, she ran aleg on the foursome that toured the mile in 3:59.1. At the time, there was an elite club of teams which had run the mile in less than four minutes—Bovina being the third class A team ever to achieve the feat


Then this year, she contributed relay legs that helped the Fillies win the state team title.

Denise McCormick was the other senior member of the Fillies team.

The 80-yard hurdles event was her specialty.

"The fact that I'm not a strong hurdles coach probably held Denise back somewhat. I felt like she did as well as she possibly could have during the season, and definitely contributed to the success of the

These seniors contributed considerably to the team's overall record, and it is going to be a tough job replacing them.
