Need for Help Is Explained At Eastland Jaycee Meet

The Eastland County Sheriff's Department presented the program for members of the Eastland Jaycee Club and guests Thursday evening, and re-voiced their appeal for more help in their department.

County guests were present from Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star. Displayed around the Texas Electric Service Co. Reddy Room where the meeting was held were several pistols, rifles, shot guns, knives, brass knuckles, and clubs that have been taken from criminals in this

county by the sheriff's department. Eastland Jaycee President Dale Bakker introduced Sheriff L. E. Sublett, who presided, and in turn introduced his staff, and others. Liquor Control Board Agents Crowder and Bauls of Abilene; Mayor Reed and City Marshal Thomas and Mr. Chambers of Rising Star; Mayor Check Smith, Arlton Smith, Ada Monroe and C.O. Revels, all of Gorman.

Outlining the duties of his staff, Sheriff Sublett said that Office Deputy Ott E. R. V. i. n. books all mail, handles all office telephonic calls and radio calls, writes up the warrants, subpoenas, sends notices to prospective jurors, sends citations, makes monthly reports to the auditor and sends reports to the Department of Public Safety in Austin.

Jailer J. L. Shook is responsible for prisoners' personal belongings, assists in searching the prisoners and works in the field at times when the Sheriff and Field Deputy are out of the county. Mrs. Shook is the cook at the jail. Her duties also include searching female prisoners and helping with the jury.

Field Deputy Loy Williams is the first deputy of the county and his duties are to assist the sheriff in all capacities.

Sheriff Sublett said the County has a population of from 20,000 to 21,000 people, and it is hard for the department with only a sheriff and field deputy to handle all the crime cases. He said the county needs at least two more deputies.

Statistics show, he said, that the increase of crime from 1960 to 1966, 335 police officers were killed in the line of duty in the nation, most of whom were in the Southern States.

Sublett said "The crime rate is increasing seven times faster than the birth rate." With the increasing burglaries in the county, his department could easily utilize four more men — two would help, he said.

So far this year, the department has had to take 16 patients to the State Hospital in Wichita Falls.

Jaycee Saul Pullmann asked, "How much time is devoted to each theft case?"

"No set time. We get a call on one case and another one breaks out. We just can't handle all the cases like we'd like to," Sublett said.

Bulldogs Take 9th Straight Win, Defeat DeLeon Bearcats 35-6

The Ranger Bulldogs won their ninth straight football game here Friday night as they defeated the De Leon Bearcats 35-6 in district play.

Ranger received the opening kick-off but failed to gain yardage and were forced to punt. The strong defensive team of the Bulldogs, led by Andy Hamilton, Floyd Parks and Rudy Mendoza, held the visiting De Leon team to only four yards rushing before the Bearcats were forced to punt.

In just seven plays and 54 yards rushing the Bulldogs scored their first touchdown of the game as Quarterback Tom Golemon handed to Tom Fox III as he plowed through the left side of the line for eight yards and the six points. Charlie Orms' extra point conversion was good and the Bulldogs led 7-0.

After the kick off De Leon managed to pick up one yard before Quarterback David Creed attempted a pass which was intercepted by Armando Renteria of the Bulldogs. The pass interception set up the second touchdown for the Bulldogs as Golemon passed to Glyn Wilson on second down for 24 yards and a

touchdown. The extra kick by Orms was good.

De Leon came alive defensively in the second quarter and did not allow the Bulldogs goal line to be crossed, but the Bulldogs retired to the dressing room at half-time with a 14-0 lead.

The third quarter saw the

Bulldogs score again as De Leon received the opening kick off and rushed for five yards before they were forced to punt. Ranger took possession of the ball and in 9 plays and 74 yards later Golemon handed to Ricky Squyres for the final four yards as he ran through the middle of the De Leon line for another six points. Charlie Orms was again called on for the extra point try which was good.

As the final quarter of play started De Leon had gained four yards on the ground and another pass attempt was intercepted by the strong Bulldog defensive team as Bill

Watkins was credited with the interception which set up another Bulldog touchdown.

Bulldog Quarterback Golemon handed to Glyn Wilson who picked up nine yards on the first play. Golemon then handed to Squyres as he scampered around his left end for 12 yards and six points. The extra point conversion by Orms was good.

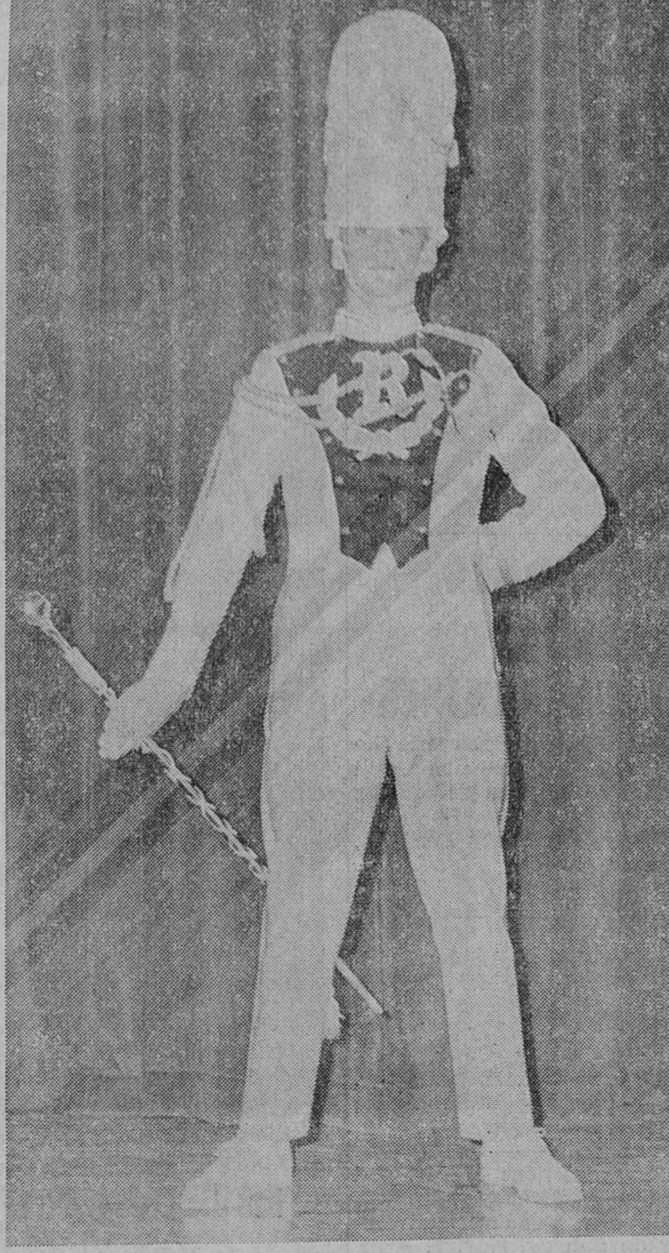
De Leon took the ball after the kick-off and were held to nine yards loss before they were forced to punt.

The longest pass and run play of the night was from Golemon to Rudy Mendoza which covered 54 yards and the final touchdown of the night for the mighty Bulldogs. The point after conversion by Orms was good. The score board showed Ranger 35, Visitors 0.

With only about 30 seconds left on the clock DeLeon came alive and racked up three first downs and a touchdown as Creed handed the ball to fullback Kent Boswell who drove through the middle of the Ranger defensive line for one yard and six points. A pass attempt by Creed to Tim Creed fell short.

LOB agent, stated, "We sure get good cooperation from these county officers and they need help bad."

It was pointed out that Callahan County has one sheriff and a deputy in each town in the county.

The county jail has had over 200 occupants since Jan. 1, Sublett said, and our department works all felonies, including murder, assault, rape, etc. Other duties include getting offenders for out of state crimes, sheriff's sales, working with the jury panels and with the juvenile court.

"How would you see the extra men if you were to get them?" Pullman asked.

"If we could get two more men and two more cars, we would put a man in the east end of the county full time, and one in the west end. Deputy Williams and I would work through the middle and helped other points when needed. It would be a blessing to have a deputy in each town."

"How much time is spent serving papers?" a questioner asked.

"Eight hours a day, seven days a week."

"Can you deputize anyone in case of emergency?"

"Who wants to work for five dollars a day?"

"At five dollars a day for our kind of work, you can't get anybody."

The sheriff and his staff praised officers with the Texas Department of Public Safety for their assistance.

"What are the major arguments against giving your department extra help?"

"It is apparently believed by some that there is enough law enforcement officers in the county."

Mike Collins asked: "What is your suggestion on getting some more help?"

"Well, I've been asking the county commissioners court for two years without any results, so I don't know."

Mayor Smith of Gorman stated that he plans to get the material in working condition. We would like to have a full-time deputy sheriff in Gorman, Ranger, Rising Star and Cisco. I will go anytime to the court to request this."

Steps outlined in the citizens' appeal will be for formation, salaries, etc., and hold another meeting before going to the county commissioners court.

11th Is Election For County, State

... election Saturday will concern six constitutional amendments. Voting continues Wednesday, Nov. 7, at Clerk's office at 1005 Eastland. Tuesday following Monday in November constitutional general day. In even-numbered years, when general elections are held, special elections are ordinarily held same day for financial matters. County Judge Scott stated that it costs approximately \$2,000 to hold an election in Eastland County. However, the Texas Legis-

lature has the authority to set different dates for special elections. This year, Saturday, Nov. 11, was chosen primarily for two reasons: first, it was felt that a Saturday would get more voter participation than a week-day; second, there is a strong movement led by state veteran's organizations to pass the \$200 million bond issue to offer land to veterans and this group wanted the election held on Veteran's Day.

Voting in the county will be in 12 precincts apparently for the last time. Four voting precincts—Kokomo, Scranton, Pioneer, and Nimrod—will be abolished Jan. 1, 1968. Other voting boxes will be Eastland, Olden, Ranger, Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona, Rising Star and Cisco.

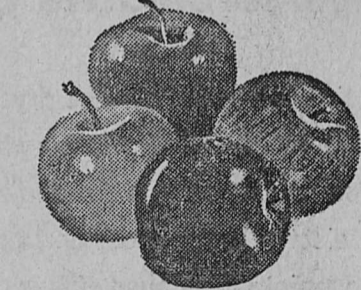

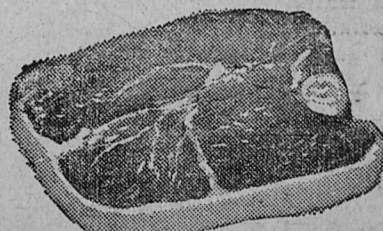

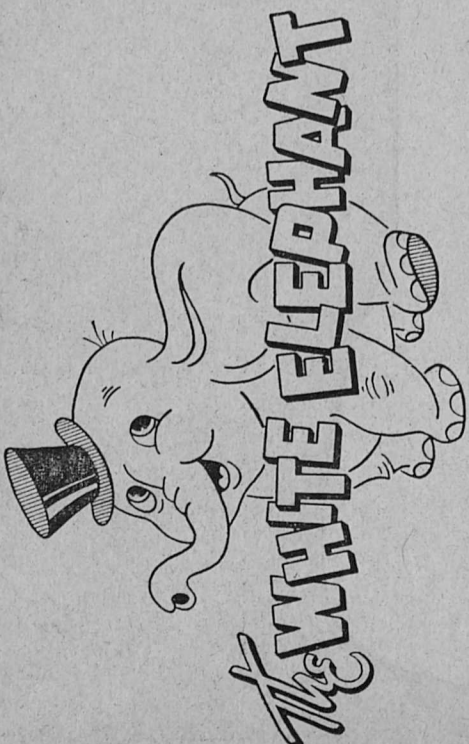

The annual Eastland County grass tour will be conducted Wednesday, Nov. 8, according to the Technical Action Panel. The tour will leave the First Methodist Church in Eastland at 1:30 p.m.

The tour is planned annually by the Technical Action Panel consisting of O. M. Boyle, Farmers Home Administration supervisor; E. E. McAlister, Soil Conservation Service; and Jesse G. Meredith, ASCS office manager. County Agent DeMarquis Gordon worked with the members in planning and conducting the tour.

This year's tour will include five farm and ranches in Flatwood, Carbon and Pleasant Hill communities.

The first stop will be at

Johnnie Aaron's place where the visitors will see bottom land coastal bermuda grass, a four pasture rotation system and mesquite controlled by aerial spraying.

Next the visitors will see W. S. Webb's coastal bermuda grass, fencing arrangement, brush chopping and a stand of weeping love grass.

From there the tour will go to W. A. Collin's place to see where he chopped brush and seeded weeping love grass. He also has system of sprout control.

Mrs. V. L. Loowry's place is the next stop. She has coastal bermuda grass, a terrace system, good cover good cover crop and has seeded range and with sodoats, grama and K. R. bluestem grass.

The last stop will be on P. A. May's place. In 1966 he chopped brush and seeded to weeping lovegrass. He also controls brush with goats.

Farmers and business men from all parts of the county have been invited to make the tour.

TRIBUTE TO VETERANS

Veterans Day, November 11. Once again we celebrate an observance of significance to all Americans, and honor the memory of veterans of all wars.

We should reaffirm our pledge not to forget the dead who have served this great Nation. Their contributions can never be forgotten. And remember the sacrifices and contributions of all living veterans who conducted themselves with gallantry and courage in wartime to preserve our heritage of freedom, and further that we pay tribute to those valiant soldiers who are still striving to attain the ultimate goal of world peace.

In the last week, fifteen thousand servicemen and women have become veterans, swelling the number of living veterans we honor today to more than twenty six million.

Have you ever counted up to twenty six million? Of course not. Undoubtedly, no human being has. Someone has estimated it would take twenty six weeks of eight-hour counting days, and no coffee breaks or week ends off, just to count to twenty six million.

Then how do you honor twenty six million veterans? Obviously not individually, much as we might like to salute each veteran personally, from the youngest veteran of Vietnam to the oldest campaigner of the Spanish American War, and give him our share of the nation's gratitude for patriotic services rendered.

We must never allow the figure of twenty six million living veterans to become commonplace.

who served, we can today stretch out the hand of gratitude . . . and we do that today.

Our very democracy pulses with the stout hearts of the veterans who fought that it might endure. We owe them far more than this Day of tribute. We owe them this day, which we ourselves are living, and enjoying.

There is no typical veteran. He is a young man who perhaps has not voted yet, just back from his tour of duty in Vietnam.
