Two pleas of guilty were heard and five cases were dismissed for lack of evidence in County Criminal Court Tuesday, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

Burial was in the Murray Cemetery at Carban.

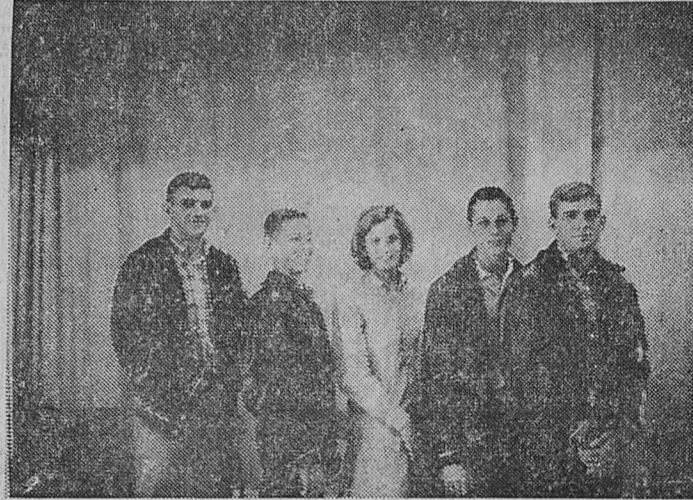

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Texas Agri-Tour To Be In Ranger Nov. 20

The highest concentration of interesting information about Texas agriculture is probably to be found in the Texas Agri-Tour trailer, which will be arriving in Ranger to be on exhibit in front of the Chamber of Commerce Building on Monday, Nov. 20, from 9 a.m. to 4 p. m.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is kicking off the biggest informational campaign in its history this month with the launching of the 56-foot Agri-Tour Trailer, which will make a sweeping trip across the state, stopping at 22 major Texas cities.

The trailer has been assembled and put on the road in conjunction with the Texas Agricultural Products (TAP) promotional program, the need of which Commissioner John C. White has explained in the following terms, "For a state that is notorious in its reputation for braggadocio, we have had mighty little to say about the outstanding meats, fruits, vegetables, and fine fibers produced in Texas. The time has come for us to bow the horn for Texas Agricultural Products." To help bow the horn on TAP, Commissioner White has designated November as Texas Agricultural Products month, and has initiated a giant information campaign, of which the Agri-Tour trailer is the advance guard.

To remedy the general lack of knowledge of the many fine agricultural products grown, and produced in Texas, the trailer is jam-packed with informational devices including exhibits of Texas products, demonstrations of new uses

for Texas Agricultural products, and a 15 minute side show which will tell the story of Texas agriculture through pictures. Also, free recipe brochures and helpful shopping hints will be given out free of charge by the Marketing Specialist in charge.

In addition to the Agri-Tour trailer, the TAP program will involve the distribution of informational posters, counter strips and bumper stickers which will be available in supermarkets throughout the state. There will also be a series of television-spots about TAP, and an original four minute film ("Products of Life") which will convey in a striking manner something of the vastness and diversity of the Texas agricultural scene.

The annual Turkey Shoot, sponsored by the Ranger Jaycees will be held Nov. 16, 17, 18 and 19. Time set for the turkey shoot is 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Nov. 16 and 17; 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 18, and from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 19. Place ribbons will be awarded in the children's division each hour on Friday and Saturday.

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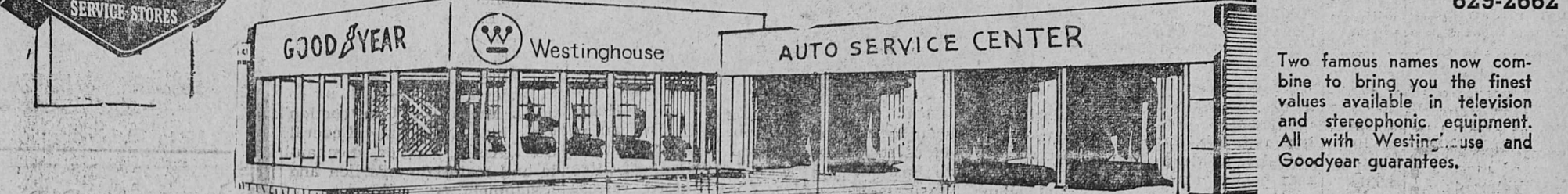

5,931.

Eastland County's returns
came in neat and swift Satur-
day night showing remark-
able planning and coordinat-
ing on the part of the election
workers in each of the pre-
cincts. The last box was re-
ported in complete by shortly
after nine. (In the state, the
Texas Election Bureau was
reporting slow returns from
all over.) Eastland's was a-
mong the few reported com-
plete Saturday night.

It was the last time for vot-
ing in four county precincts
which are being consolidated
into other boxes beginning
with next year's elections.

Apathy generally best de-
scribed voters' attitude toward
the amendments. More are
due for consideration in elec-
tions next year.

Across the state it appeared
early in the week that all the
amendments would carry —
with No. 1 being the only one
in possible question.

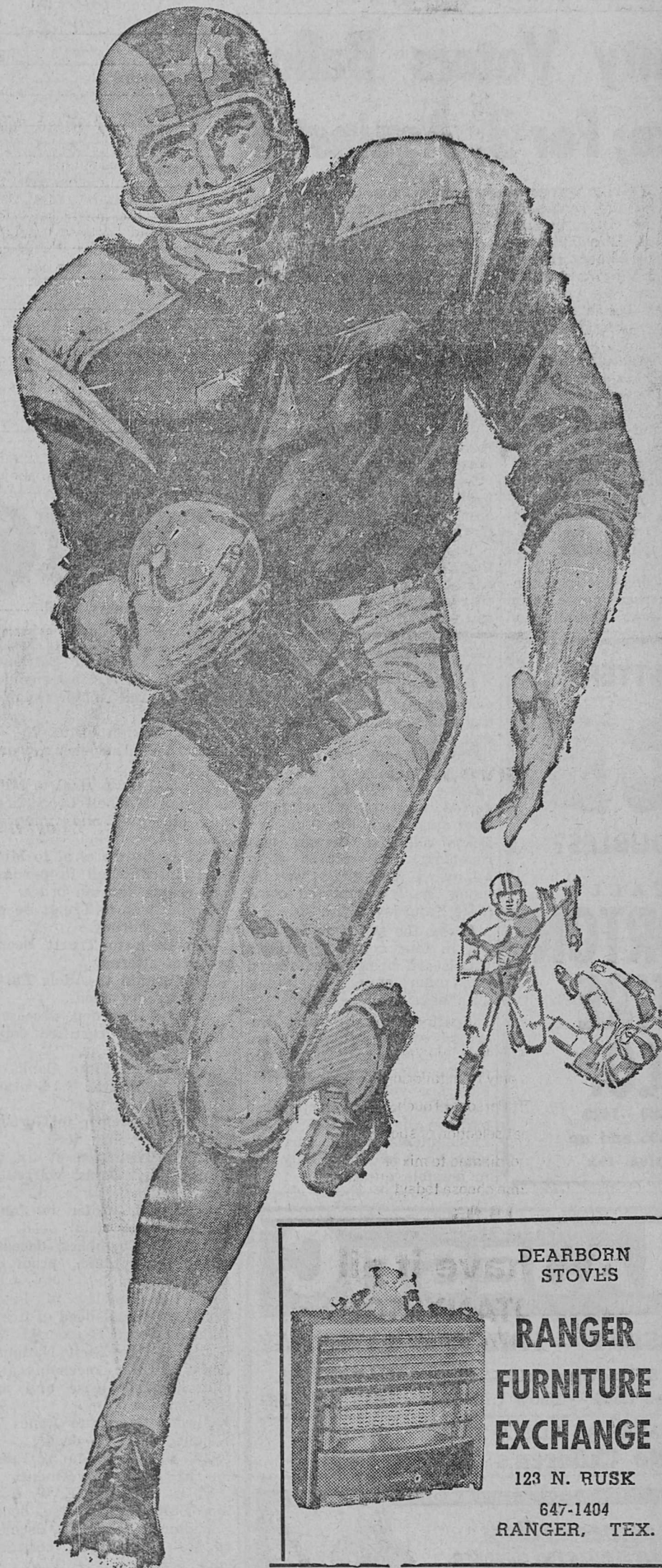

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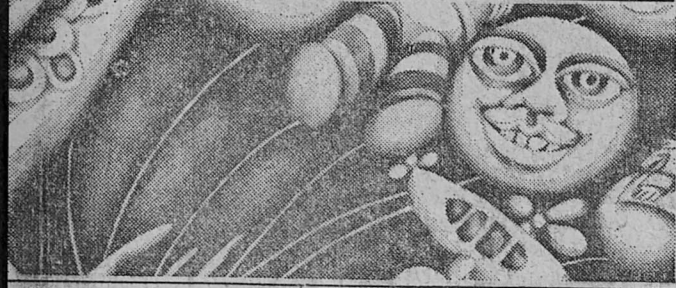

Residents In Area May Be Missing Medicare Payments, Agent Advises

A number of Big Country folks could be losing Medicare payments, advises R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of the Abilene Social Security Office. Indications are that some folks who had medical expenses covered by Medicare's medical insurance for July-December 1966 have not yet made their claims for payment. Their claims can still be paid now, but loss could result by delaying too long, Tuley reports.

Many may be waiting until all of their medical bills are paid. In most cases, this is not necessary. If the doctor or medical supplier will accept assignment of his bill from Medicare, payment can be made immediately. Also partial payment can be made in most cases where the total bill is not yet paid. Those who have Medicare coverage and incurred medical bills for 1966 should file their claims before Dec. 31, 1967. "The Abilene Social Security Office can give further information and assist with these claims. We urge all our Big Country folks to do this now," Tuley says. Persons unable to come to the Abilene office should check at their local post office for a schedule of visits by a representative of that office and meet him when he is at a nearby contact station, he added.
