## Undefeated Rangers Will Meet Murray State Here Tuesday

Two undefeated basketball teams collide in Ranger Tuesday night at the RJC Gym in what promised to be one of the most thrilling games of the season.

The RJC Rangers, with 8 wins to their credit so far, take on the Aggies from Murray State College of Oklahoma.

The game starts at 7 p. m. — 30 minutes earlier than previously scheduled.

The Aggies are led by 7-foot-6 Al Worthington, one of last year's most sought-after high school basketball stars. The balance of the Aggie team matches Worthington in skill and as one observer put it, "They aren't too far behind him in height."

The Rangers will be moving in behind the power of Ulric Cobb, James McCloud, and Robert Spivey, the champion point-grabbers of the season.

Coach Ron Butler says the Aggies are the toughest team the Rangers have had to face so far this season.

## Gary Beauchamp Begins Fifth Year At Mesquite and Rusk Church of Christ

On Sunday, Dec. 10, Gary Beauchamp will begin his fifth year as minister of the Mesquite and Rusk St. Church of Christ.

During the past four years, the church has experienced almost phenomenal growth in all fields of endeavor. Outstanding accomplishments include a 34 per cent growth in numerical membership; attendance of 250 representing an increase of 50 percent in attendance with corresponding 42 per cent increase in Bible Class attendance.

Responses average 1.3 per week for a total of 289. Contributions show increase of 367 per cent with building fund of \$15,000. So effective has been the youth program that attendance is 480 per cent above four years ago, which accounts in part for the 97 per cent increase in mission

work and 102 per cent growth in benevolent work.

It is to be expected that growth such as listed above would bear much fruit and such has been the case with local accomplishments including (1) Selection of new elders and deacons, (2) greater unity and harmony, (3) one half toward goal for completion of new building, (4) new minister's home, (5) all new furniture for present building, (6) acquired two lots for new building, (7) use of the best in teaching supplies, (8) purchase and equipment of a new Negro church building and employing of Hubert Hartin to assist with the work, (9) formulation of new plans for both local and world evangelism, and (10) beginning of a new local benevolent program.

Such forward strides on the part of this dedicated congregation can only redound to the glory of God and the ultimate good of all mankind as mission work includes the man on the other side of the street and the man on the other side of the world, it was said.

The helicopter surveillance procedure has been used successfully in other areas and will be used here for the following purposes according to Highway Patrol Sgt. Roger Sosebee:

Traffic surveillance, traffic patrol, area traffic surveillance, manhunts, lost person search, rescues, and disaster work.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that DPS Statistical has estimated 55 persons may die in traffic mishaps over the Christmas weekend.

Garrison said that the combined efforts of state and local police agencies and private traffic safety support organizations will be directed toward keeping the traffic toll below the estimate.

"Operation Deathwatch will be in effect from 6 p. m. Friday, Dec. 22 through 11:59 p. m. Monday, Dec. 25," said Garrison. "During this period we will make every effort to inform each motorist of the need for attention to safe driving. For the first time in many years the uniformed services of the Department are at almost full strength, and every highway patrolman will be on duty as much as possible. In addition, we will have about 250 men from other uniformed services of DPS who will supplement the highway patrol force doing patrol duty."

Traffic deaths will be tabulated and the totals announced three times daily to the news media from DPS headquarters in Austin.

It has also been estimated in traffic accidents over the that 45 persons will be killed New Year's weekend. The "Deathwatch" will resume at 6 p. m. Friday, Dec. 29 and continue through 11:59 p. m. Monday, Jan. 1, 1968.

# City Sales Tax Election Is Planned For January 9

Mayor Morris Newnam has announced that the Ranger City Commission has set an election for a one per cent sales tax for Jan. 9, 1968. Some weeks ago the city commission appointed a committee to study the feasibility of a one per cent sales tax, and also to discuss with them needs of the city.

The committee met with the city commission and expressed their unanimous desire that a one per cent sales tax election be held. Mayor Newnam explained to the committee at that time the city was as well faced with over \$400,000 in bonded indebted-

ness that was refunded in 1946, created in the twenties, and due in March, 1970.

It was also pointed out that the salaries of city employees were low and must be raised. The police car and trash truck must be replaced in the next few months, and

the city is to grow and prosper and be a safe, healthy and pleasant place in which to live.

Although the city has been able to purchase about \$200,000.00 of its own bonds since 1961, and these are the first that have been purchases sin-

ce, this is becoming increasingly hard to do because the cost of government in services and wages is steadily rising. The mayor and city commissioners work without pay and the city operated without a city manager to help provide money in the budget to retire bonds.

Mayor Newnam, the city commission, and the appointed study committee hope that the people of Ranger vote for the adoption of this fair tax, and are willing to discuss the needs of the city with and citizen.

Candies For Christmas Are Being Prepared From Favorite Recipes

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas in Ranger kitchens where those "prepared in advance" goodies are taking form and flavor.

Candy appears on everybody's list of Christmas sweets and each housewife knows her family's favorites. Three Ranger women were asked to share their recipes with readers of The Times. And their contributions to your holiday season follow:

CHOCOLATE PECAN LOGS

Mrs. Frank Hicklin  
1 box powdered sugar  
1/2 can Eagle Brand condensed milk  
1 stick oleo  
1 small can angel flake coconut  
2 cups finely chopped nuts  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
1 1/2 bars German chocolate  
2 ounces paraffin  
Combine melted oleo, milk and vanilla; add sugar, coconut and nuts. Add the dates and cook until mixture forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove and beat until thick. Add nuts and vanilla and beat until mixture will not stick to wet surface. Pour on wet cloth, roll and chill. Unroll and cut into slices.

DATE LOAF

Mrs. Gorman Morton  
3 cups sugar  
1 1/2 cups rich milk  
1 cup dates  
1 cup peacans  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Combine sugar and milk and bring to a boil. Add the dates and cook until mixture forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove and beat until thick. Add nuts and vanilla and beat until mixture will not stick to wet surface. Pour on wet cloth, roll and chill. Unroll and cut into slices.

Yield: Two and one-half pounds.

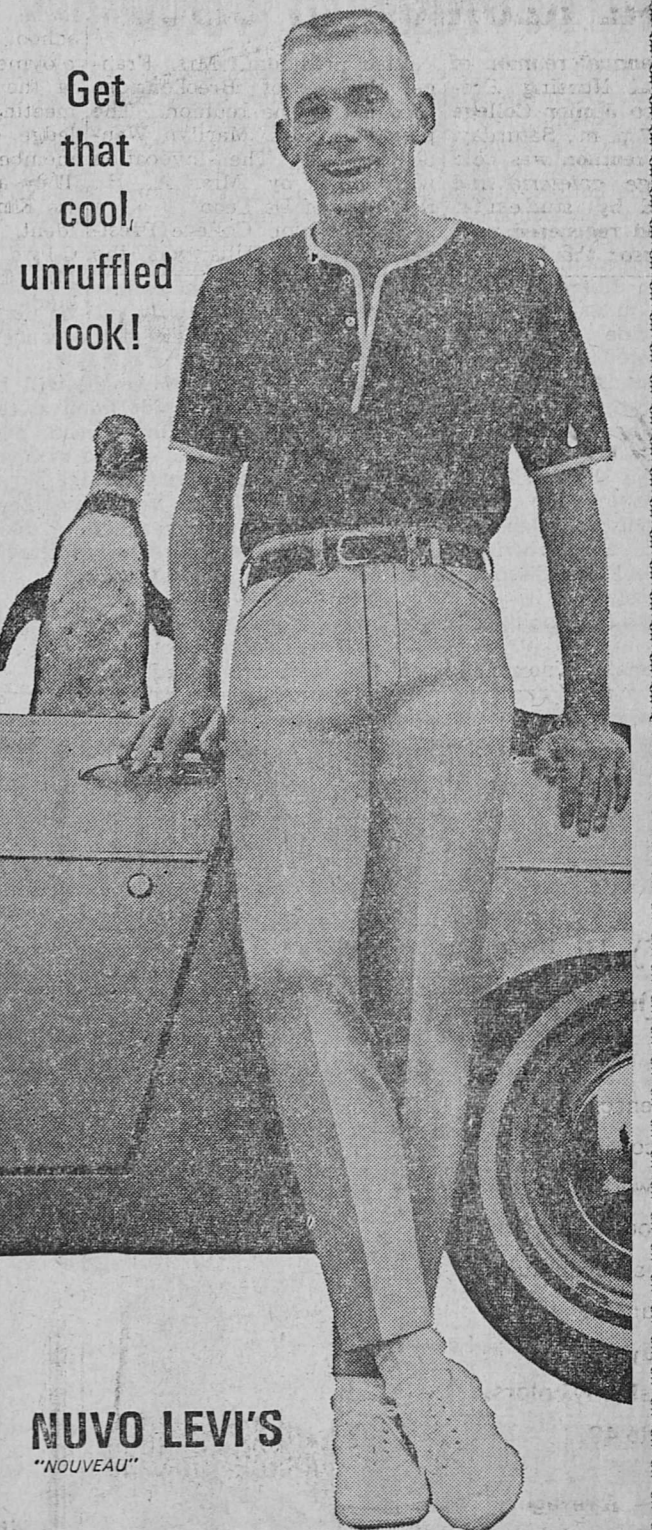

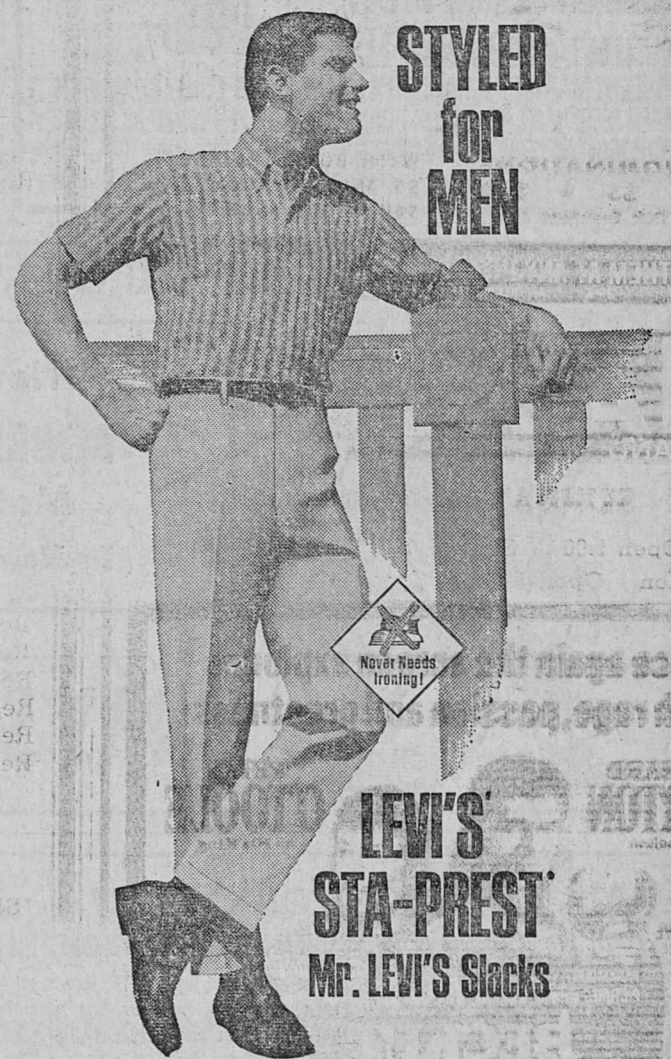

# THE GORDON SPOT

Members of the Eastland County pecan growers association are working hard to have the best pecan show ever held in Eastland County next weekend. The pecan show will be in Cisco in the building formerly occupied by the Chicken-on-the-Run Restaurant. I hope you will come to see the pecan exhibits Friday or Saturday, Dec. 8th and 9th.

There will also be a pecan bake show and centerpiece show. Cash awards will be given to the best three centerpieces using pecans or parts of a pecan tree.

About 12 young ladies are expected to compete for the title of Eastland County Pecan Queen Thursday night at the Cisco High School.

This is the 15th annual pecan show held in Eastland County. J. M. Cooper organ-

ized and supervised the first pecan show ever held in Texas in 1952. This year county pecan shows are being held in 24 Texas counties and ten Oklahoma counties. In addition to the county shows three regional shows and a state show are held in Texas.

The beauty of a fire in the fireplace during the upcoming Holiday Season, can be made even prettier with the addition of multi-colored flames.

Chemical treatment of the material to be burned can result in green, red, blue, orange, or purple flames instead of the usual yellow flame from wood.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride—blue, potassium chloride—purple, strontium nitrate—red, lithium chloride—carmine, and copper sulfate—emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemicals for multi-colored flames. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or drugstores.

To treat the cones or wood a plastic pail and an onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighed so that all of the material is completely covered and the cones and wood should soak for at least 10 minutes.

After soaking, place the treated material on newspaper to dry and then they will be ready to brighten the holiday fireplace.

Newspapers can be turned into "logs" which will burn with a rainbow of color. Simply tie the loosely rolled newspapers with heavy twine and soak them in a solution of four pounds of copper sulfate and three pounds of rock salt dissolved in a gallon of water. After allowing these "logs" several days to dry, they may be burned just as wood.

## LOOKING At Agriculture

(This is one of a series of articles dealing with agricultural programs in Eastland County).

We received an announcement recently in the county office made by Secretary of Agriculture, Orville Freeman, that a 1968 voluntary feed grain program covering corn and grain sorghum would apply to encourage reduction in total supply and strengthen farm feed grain prices. The program was announced after public hearings all over the feed grain producing areas. Two of the public hearings were held in Texas.

We have had numerous inquiries at the Eastland County Office on what kind of program would apply in 1968. According to the announcement the program will be similar to the 1967 program and sign-up will be held for interested participants in February and March of 1968.

Eastland County has about 1,000 farmers who grow feed grain and in 1967 about 300 farms signed up in the program. Many small farms did not participate as they only produced small quantities for home consumption. The base acreage for Eastland County farmers is about 27,000 acres.

The program for 1968 provides that voluntary participants must reduce their base acreage at least 20 percent in order to qualify for price support. No diversion payment would apply on the 20 percent. The farm could divert up to the larger of 50 percent of his base or 25 acres and receive a diversion payment. Small farms with 25 acres or less could divert his entire base and farms with more than 25 acres could reduce his base voluntarily for 1 year to 25 acres and divert the 25 acres.

The question concerning most Eastland County farms with wheat allotments and feed grain bases is the provision of substitution of these crops. The law for 1968 provides that substitution will apply as it did in 1967. In other words a farm could divert the 20 percent minimum of his feed grain base and could plant his wheat allotment and the balance of his feed grain base to wheat or feed grain and be eligible for price support on his commodity.

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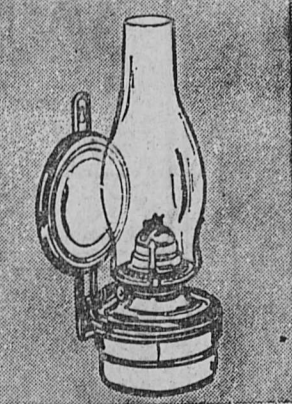

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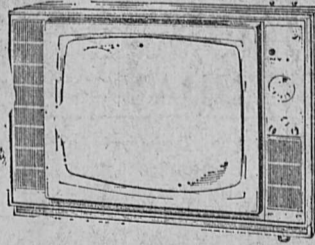
