

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Mine Of Good Eating



Cut the cost of fresh vegetables for weeks by storing surplus from your garden in a cool basement or in a pit dug or barrel sunk in a well-drained out-of-the-way corner outdoors.

In these days of ever-rising food prices those of fresh vegetables are going up too. So the gardener who has surplus vegetables from his garden has the advantage over others for he can store his surplus

Given a corner of a rat-proof basement where temperature may be maintained between 32 and 40 degrees F, where there is slatted boxes suspended from ventilation and the humidity can be controlled, many vege-

tables can be kept for weeks. Such a storage corner is pre-pared like a layer-cake with carrots, beets, rutabagas, turnips and kohlrabi stored at floor level. These root vegetables are simply dug and reset in boxes of sand, peat, sawdust

Celery, too, may be dug, outer and injured leaves discarded, then plants set close together in boxes of moist loam on the

Cleaned of earth after digging, potatoes may be stored in slatted boxes set several inches above the floor for all 'round circulation. Cover with keep out light which turns tubers green.

The next layer up is onions which should be stored in | vents.

the ceiling or supported so they set several feet above the floor. Dry the bulbs well before storing.

Plants of cauliflower, peppers and tomatoes may be pulled from the garden, hung from the ceiling of the storage room until used. Melon plants may be handled the same way, but hung in a sunny place.

All of the root vegetables named above also may be stored outdoors in a pit dug in a well-drained, out-of-the-way corner or in a sunken barrel, Line pit or barrel with 6 inches depth of straw. Mix vegetables so a variety is available, place them carefully in the "mine" and cover with another 6 inches of straw allowed to protrude through an additional heavy covering of earth to serve as

planning division of the Texas tion since the early 1940's. Parks and Wildlife Department recently compiled a list of 25 facts concerning the 61 State Parks.

These facts are published here for your information.

1. Texas has purchased only three of its sixty-one State Parks. . . . the other fifty-eight have been donated or leased. 2. If 48.572 acres of recreation land were purchased for the Texas State Parks tomorrow, the State would still have to buy 18,540 more acres by 1970 to keep pace with outdoor recreation demand.

3. If no additional land acreage is added to the present State Parks system, the supply of land suitable for development will reach its maximum visitor capacity in 1971.

4. If Texas purchases 12,000 acres of land each year for the next 20 years, the State of Texas could obtain the current national average for State Parks, if the population does not increase.

5. Texas State Parks contain 6.3 acres per thousand population, or a block of land approximately 17 feet square per person.

6. Texas is 51/2 times larger then the State of New York, yet New York has 7 times the amount of State Park land. The State of Oregon has only 3% less State Park acreage than Texas, yet the State of Texas is nearly three times larger with 51/2 times the population.

8. Twenty-two per cent of the land required for Texas State Parks has been acquired since 1940. . . population during this time has increased 68%.

Over the last five years (after development) the visittation at Huntsville State Park (60 miles from Houston) increased 346.5%. . .estimated visitation over the same period of time, based on trends, indicated an increase of only 25.4%.

10. Camping demand is expected to increase 3.5 times between 1964 and 1990, while camping facilities will increase only 0.4 times based on current supply rates.

11. While 5.34% of the nation's population resides in Texas, only 0.12% of the nation's State Park land is found

12. Texas' population increased 12.5% from 1960 to 1965, yet its State Park visitation rose 48.5%.

Texas has a per capita visitation of 0.6 to its State Parks while Michigan's ne capita visitation is 2.4 and Oklahoma's is 3.7.

14. Texas has an average of 6.3 acres of Texas State Park land per thousand population. This is 24.4 acres per thousand below the national average and 38.7 below what the White House National Conference on Outdoor Recreation suggested for its acreage per thousand population.

15. If 7,500,000 people left Texas, the State's Park system would be equal to the national average of 30.7 acres of State Park land per thousand

16. The White House Regional Conference on Outdoor Recreation suggested 45 acres of State land per thousand population. If 8,500 people left the State, Texas would meet

this standard. 17. Of the total existing State Park acreage, only 31% is suitable for intensive recrea-

tional development. 18 Twenty-six percent of the total existing State Park acreage is water.

19. There is a scant 0.7 square foot of developed coastal beach per 1000 people in Texas. 20. Seventy--five per cent of Texas' population resides within a 4.5 hour drive of the

21. There are 1,100 miles recreational shoreline along the Texas Gulf Coast, of which 300 miles is recreational beach area.

22. Less than 1,500 acres of the 300 miles of open Gulf beach are set aside and developed for public recreation. 23. Since 1910, only three State Parks have been purchased with State funds with an investment of less than
