#### **Cisco To Vote** January 23 On **City Sales Tax**

An election has been order- just north of Cisco. mission on Wednesday, Dec. Battery B. 20, according to the election order.

A legal notice in connection with the election will be published in The Press on Thursday, Dec. 28, and again on Thursday, Jan. 4.

The question in the election will be for or against an ordinance providing for a local sales tax of one per cent (1%)within the city limits. Authority for the election is a state law approved by the last Texas Legislature, giving this authority to cities.

Under the law, cities are permitted to levy and collect a general sales tax not to exceed one per cent. The state presently collects atwo percent sales tax, and the city sales tax will be handled by the state collection agency.

City officials were running a survey to determine an estimate of the yield of a one per Annual Buildog cent sales tax. This information will be published in the near future, according to Mayor W. W. Sawyers.

The city sales tax covered For January 13 the identical items as the state tax.

Breckenridge, Abilene and other area cities have recently adopted city sales taxes. Ranger will vote on the matter January 9. Eastland is reported to bestudying the tax with no decision to date.
