PRESIDENT DICK WOOLLEY SAYS **CUSTOMERS HELPED MAKE BANK** 



National Bank of Cisco will celebrate its 75th anniversary. The Bank's colorful history includes weathering five wars, two oil booms and busts, and the notorious Santa Claus Bank Robbery.

Other experiences included the depression of the 1930's, the seven-year drought of the 1950's, the closing of a railroad, and the unsettling bank

changes of the 1980's. chairman of the board Lee D. (Dick) Woolley has been a part of First National's history since 1964, when he took his first job there as an Assistant Cashier.

A quiet, soft-spoken man, Woolley apparently has a lot of ability in investment and finance. When he became President of the Bank in 1974 it had just over \$13 million in assets. On March 31, 1991 the Bank had more than 38 million in assets.

Recently Woolley took time to discuss First National, his work at the Bank, and his involvement with Cisco and Award in 1979, and in community affairs.

He sat at his desk in a sunny, open office. Like the rest of the building, this room featured earth tones and touches of communities under southwestern art.

He also finds time for some farming and ranching, which are special interests of his.

When asked about his preparation for the work of a Bank President, Woolley said a lot of his training was from 'coming up through the ranks." He said he also learned a lot from J.P. McCracken, who was Bank President from 1953 to 1974.

His duties at the Bank consist of various things, Woolley explained. He is Chief Executive Officer, makes investments, and also makes commercial

Other officers in the Bank make the other types of loans, he said.

He represents the Bank at State and National Organizational meetings, and of course must keep informed on new banking laws and proposed laws.

Woolley mentions that he came to Cisco from Fort Davis, where he grew up. He finished high school there and enrolled in college at Sul Ross in Alpine. He graduated there with a Degree in Business

Administration. While working at the Cisco Bank Woolley took special courses and graduated from the Southern Methodist University School of Banking.

When the town of Cisco was mentioned, Dick Woolley responded like the good Chamber of Commerce member he is. The town, he said, has plenty of good things going for it - things that ought to make people want to live here.

'Look at the College,' he said. 'Cisco Junior College is expanding - it had the largest enrollment in its history this year. The College is a real plus for the town.'

He went on to say that Cisco has good people they're it's greatest asset. He also remarked that Cisco had good churches, good schools, good water and a lot of civic pride.

The recent Educational Reform Bill has many surprises, including a new taxing entity for Eastland County and for other counties in the state.

Called the County Education District (CED), this new governmental body was created by the state legislature to levy, assess, collect and distribute school taxes. A CED has the same power to invoke laws and its affairs as that of any other School Taxing District.

All the current School Taxing Districts will remain, according to Chief Tax Appraiser Steve Thomas, but taxes will be adjusted and divided between the CED and the others.

The Eastland County Education District is composed of the school districts of Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Ranger and Rising Star. These component districts select a representative from the respective boards to serve as a trustee for the Eastland CED.

The organizational meeting of the Eastland CED was held quietly June 27, 1991 at 7 p.m. in the Eastland ISD Administration Building. Members present were Ron Rhodes, Cisco; Daryl Hirst, Gorman; Jim Moylan, Eastland; Lorene Oliver, Ranger; and

Frances Agnew, Rising Star.

Others present were Don Bryan, Rising Supt.; Jerry Jackson, Ranger ISD Supt.; Keith Watkins, Eastland ISD Supt.; Steve Thomas, Eastland County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser; and Jill Little, Eastland ISD Adm. Secretary.

Oaths of office were administered to the new CED trustees by Jill Little, and will be filed with County Judge Scott Bailey as required by law.

Officers were elected for the County Education District. Daryl Hirst was named Chairman, Ron Rhodes, Vice Chair., and Lorene Oliver, Recording Secretary.

A resolution was adopted calling for an election on August 10, 1991, for the percentage residence homestead exemption pursuant to H.B. "885, Sec. 20.945.

Eastland ISD Supt. Keith Watkins and Chief **Appraiser Steve Thomas** gave information regarding the statutory responsibilities of the County Education District, as provided in S.B. 351 as amended in H.B. 2885.

Bids will be solicited for a Bank Depository Contract. An official request was made for appraisal rolls from the Eastland County Appraisal District. School District Superintendents are to gather 1990 tax collection data to be reported to the Board at the next meet-

Reports since this meeting are that school taxes in Eastland County may not change much under the new system - that it may not be as bad here as at some other places.


For Eastland County will be a self-contained County - unlike some others where schools from several counties have been combined into a County Education District. Under the plan for Eastland County the money collected here will

not leave the county. Chief Appraiser Steve Thomas says that it will be several weeks before all details of the plan will be defined. But he does know that the Legislators will give each District a levy, and the State will tell the CED Board how the money collected in the County will be distrib-

Undoubtedly there will be much discussion of this new type of school financing. But one thing seems to stand out - the people who pay the taxes have no choice in the matter.

Summertime Rat-L-Trapping

Summertime angling can be a tough row to hoe many times. Extreme heat, slow fishing and hard to locate fish.

Over the years I have noticed anglers have become almost programed in their bait choices this time of year, top water early and late, and a worm during the day.

Today I would like to de-program you folks a little with what I feel like is probably the finest fish locating and catching live today, "The Bill Lewis" "Rat-L-Trap."

For 27 years the fine folks at Bill Lewis Lures have head lead the industry in live quality, catchobility and performance. The Rat-L-Trap comes packaged ready to turn an otherwise slow day into something to remember.

Sometime "Trappin" can be tailored to fit where ever the fish are: Shallow water in tight cover holds a special place in every anglers heart. It's right fishing. Take a 1/4 ounce

Rat-L-Trap in your favor-

ite color, mine during summer are Smokey Joe, chrome with blue back, or Fire Tiger. Gold if there is a heavy cloud cover. 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
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

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

#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

Once again I take up typewriter key in hand concerning the proposed county wide ambulance service. After my first letter I had a nice phone conversation with commissioner Robinson and he explained that they were about to put a piece in the paper explaining their position. While it did explain why they were withdrawing county funding, I have yet to see an explanation of how this new ambulance service is going to be set up or operated.

So, as ever, I'm willing to shoot off my mouth (or foot) and give my sugges-

tions. 1. There should NOT be a new district created for an ambulance district; it should be made part of the county government. If it is made a district by itself it will cost us more money to hold elections for it, it will take more money to set up offices for it, it will add another bureaucracy to an overloaded bureaucracy. Let's just authorize the commissioners to add a new category in county taxes (such as the road and bridge fund or the fund they used to pay off the jail) and limit the amount of taxes that can be used to 10 center per \$100 valu-

ation. 2. It it only takes the signatures of 150 property owners to call for an election to vote on this district, then lets have the same number of property owners be able to call for an election to dissolve the distict.

3. Have the commissioners appoint a qualified individual to run the district or hire a person who can be both a manager and working EMT. One person, in charge, is perferable to a bunch of people on a board. One person can make instant decisions and be accountable to the county commissioners for the satisfactory completion of the work.

4. If at such time the ambulance service should make a "profit" above the taxes needed for its operation, the county should not be able to take that "profit" or unused taxes and shift them to another fund; the money should be used to either upgrade the service, pay on debts or reduce the next year's tax rate. That does not mean to reduce the ambulance fund by 1 cent per \$100 and use that 1 cent somewhere else. It means to give the property owners an actual 1 cent, 2 cent, 3 cent, etc. break on their property tax rate.

5. To save money, each area that an ambulance and crew is to be based in should provide a free place for the ambulance to operate from; such as a fire or police station or some structure free of rent.

6. I think all interested

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
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#### **Ervin Family Reunion** Held June 8 In Eastland

Several of the Ervin children returned to Ranger in the late 1920's and early 1930's to make their homes. J. R. (Dutch) C. D. (Conk), J. H. (Hubert), and O.R. (Odd) reared their families in Ranger and lived there until their deaths. Alta Ervin Hendrvn. Mae Ervin McMil-

lon, R. L. (Bob) Ervin, I. H. (Ike) Ervin, and Ollie Ervin White lived in Ranger for many years.
