JUDGE GIVES 99 YEAR SENTENCE ON DRUG CHARGE

In a trial in Stephens County Monday, 90th District Judge C.J. Eden handed down a 99 year sentence and a \$75,000 fine to a Ranger man found guilty of the manufacture of amphetamines.

David Goforth, 45, of Ranger was convicted of running a drug lab in Stephens County, on his property in the Necessity Community. Goforth's property was raided by authorities on Oct. 4 1989, and he was arrested.

He skipped bond shortly afterward, but was arrested by the FBI in Charlotte, North Carolina.

A charge of the manufacture of phenylacetone is still pending against Goforth in Stephens County. District Attorney John Neal says he plans to try Goforth on the phenylacetone charge on Monday, Sept. 30.

After the Sept. 30 trial, Goforth will be turned over to Federal authorities for charges in connec-

tion with the Benefiel drug operation. Any Federal sentences - by law will have to stacked on top of the sentences in Stephens County.

Goforth remained in Stephens County jail awaiting his Sept. 30 trial.



The money spent on these tests could be used elsewhere; was a suggestion from many people in attendance.

One educator in the audience brought up a final thought. "No one is held accountable for the education problems." Everyone points a finger, but the blame is passed from one to another. This is a direct result of some people being placed above the law. Until everyone is held accountable; be it legislators, teachers or parents, the problem will never be solved.

"And it becomes even more important when you look down the road and tote up the correlation between poverty backgrounds, school dropouts, drug abuse and criminal activity," he said. "If these kids are our future, what kind of future are we letting happen?"







Constitutional Amendments

On November 5, 1991, voters will go to the polls to either accept or reject 13 amendments to our Texas Constitution. In this column I want to discuss three more Constitutional Amendments that will appear on the ballot. Each amendment to our

Constitution is important. I hope you will not only take the time to study each of these proposals, but will also make certain to take the time to vote.

PROPOSITION NUM-BER 4: "Authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as State prisons or other punishment facilities.' This proposed amend-

ment passed the Legislature during a Special Session of the 72nd Legislature this summer to remedy county jail overcrowding by expanding the state's correctional system dramatically. The lack of prison facilities has created a backlog of convicted felons in county jails, causing an overcrowding crisis for some counties. County taxpayers have been forced to pay the costs of holding these convicts who have been sentenced to State prison, but for which no space is available in the TDC facilities. This lack of facilities and the number of facilities that the courts have found to be unsuitable for detention of prisoners has resulted in the State being monitored by the Federal courts since 1974.

This bond proposition is the largest single undertaking of capital construction ever proposed. The proceeds of these bonds would not only build prisons, but also construct facilities to provide drug and alcohol addiction treatment for up to 12,000 prisoners each year. This would make Texas the model State in the area of mandatory substance abuse treatment for prisoners whose crime in-

volved drugs or alcohol. In addition, the bonds would be used to expand mental health and mental retardation facilities, and expand facilities to house minors who have been sentenced to a correctional program.

Arguments for: The expansion of the State's correctional facilities will make it possible to comply with Federal court orders, and to possibly end the 17-year-old "Ruiz" lawsuit. The use of bonds to provide for repair and expansion will reduce the amount of general revenue spending over the current two-year budget cycle. The bond proceeds. will help the State to meet its obligation to provide adequate facilities for inmates and persons with mental retardation and to devote facilities for those

whose crimes are related

to substance abuse. Arguments against: Overreliance on bonded indebtedness may lead to financial problems in the future and may strain the credit of the State. The interest that the State must pay on the proposed bonds will increase the revenue responsibilities of reduce the need for exshould wait to determine the effect of the reforms it has enacted before incurring additional debt.

PROPOSITION NUM-BER 5: "Authorizing the exemption from ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."

This amendment would allow certain taxing jurisdictions to exempt qualified businesses located in enterprise zones from paying property taxes on merchandise that is stored or processed in the zone and transported from the State within 175 days. The Texas Enterprise Zone Act permits the State and local governments to offer tax incentives and regulatory relief to induce businesses economic distress, pervasive poverty and high unemployment rates. Zones must contain at least one square mile, but cannot be larger than 10 square miles or 5 per cent of the area of the municipality or county.

The purpose of this Constitutional amendment is to allow cities, counties or junior college districts to exempt from taxation tangible personal property, including oil, gas and petroleum products, within an enterprise zone. Unlike the general "freeport" exemption, taxing units could exempt Times from taxation businesses only confined within a general area; and not all

businesses located within the boundaries of the taxing authority.

Arguments for: This amendment will help economically depressed areas attract and retain industry. The limited size of the enterprise zones will not have a great impact on the overall size of the taxing district's tax base. Taxing districts which cannot afford to offer the county-wide "freeport exemption" could offer the enterprise zone tax abatement as an inducement to

industry. Arguments against: This creates an unequal distribution of the tax burden within a taxing jurisdiction by granting tax exemptions to those businesses located within the zone, but not those the State. Arguments for: An independent, Constitutionally-created Ethics Commission with the authority to investigate wrongto voter approval, and to doing will improve voter confidence in their elected officials. The problem of redistricting is one of the dilemmas that citizens seem very concerned about - "who will be our state representative?" is one of the questions most frequently asked me.

At this time, this issue is really an unknown element, since court cases. have been filed, contest-

tive, independent body to review and study what a reasonable level of compensation for Legislators would be, while retaining voter control. It is important to get an Ethics Commission established in the Constitution and up and running, so that the Legislature can then make any changes necessary to the law to correct any deficiencies that might exist.

Arguments against: The amendment requires that Tax Code for reimbursemembers be selected from lists approved by the Legislature, thus placing in danger the credibility and independence of the Commission. With equal numbers of members from each political party on the Commission, there stands a possibility that the Commission could consistently remain deadlocked over important issues. The law implementing the Ethics Commission fails to limit lobby spending on legislators for food and drink, and should be defeated until this defect and others are corrected.

YORKTOWN, VA.: This is where we'd better interrupt the narrative to win the Revolution and claim our independence from those British.

Located miles from Williamsburg at the other end of the Colonial Parkway (with Jamestown on the James at the other end) and just about where the York River dumps into Chespeake Bay, Yorktown offers the Battlefield and the Victory Center. In a word, you could say that America began at Jamestown, her ideals matured at Williamsburg, but came of age, through blood and fire at Yorktown.

The Battlefield tells this story: the last important conflict of the War for Independence. In the spring of '81, after the campaigns in the Carolinas, British Gen. Lord Cornwallis led his army into Virginia, a move he believed was the key to conquering the southern colonies. Opposing him was the smaller American force led by Lafayette, who used his army to harass and threaten the British through the early summer. After several skirmishes with the recently reinforced American army, Cornwallis received orders to fortify Yorktown as a base for contact with the British fleet.

Washington and French Gen. Rochambeau decided that a combined land and naval battle in Virginia was now possible as the French fleet was sailing north to the Chesapeake Bay. Washington then quietly moved the bulk of the French and American troops from New York to Yorktown. On Sept. 5th the French

fleet intercepted the British fleet outside the Virginia Capes and forced it to retire. Washington and his French comrade arrived at Yorktown late September and laid siege to the town. The British surrendered on Oct. 19, 1781, virtually ending the Revolution.

The Victory Center covers the entire Revolutionary War period, and a walk chronicles events that culminated in the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. film and exhibits, the story of the last great battle is told, and there's a Continental Army camp and a typical 18th century farmsite. Here, men and women with extensive knowledge the Revolutionary era portray daily life at that time.

The center is open daily; admission is \$5. for adults, \$2.50; and a combination ticket to Jamestown is also available. These two sites are operated by a separate foundation to the Williamsburg Foundation, both private non-profit operations, which obviously operate hand-in-hand with the National Park Service facilities located adjacent for each of the major attractions.

THROUGH CAREFUL examination of 18th century military maps and archaeological excavations, the National Park Service has reconstructed nearly complete a picture of Washington's siege. Earth works and siege lines mark the pattern of the British and American troops during the battle. Tours of the Battlefield are conducted from the Visitor Center by the park rangers.

The attractions are linked under the slogan "relive the spirit of our American Revolution in Virginia's historic triangle . . . Jamestown, Williamsburg and Yorktown."



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



Ranger began, as its name implies, as a Texas Ranger Camp located on the Main Line of the Texas and Pacific Railway. After its founding in 1881, Ranger remained a small farming community of around 700 people until a rainy day on October of 1917, when the McCleskey well number one blew in the face of Ranger and the history of this area changed forever.

The well gushed out of control for four days. The oil mixed with the rain and mud and ran into the streets below. The T & P Coal Company operating the coal mines in nearby Thurber concentrated their efforts toward finding oil and abandoned the mines soon after to become the biggest prospectors in the Ranger Field.

To add to the importance of the find, the world was at war and the Allied forces were in desperate need of oil. It is estimated that a large portion of the petroleum used by the Allies came directly from the Ranger.

With the boom came an influx of people that has never been experienced since. Within eighteen months over 40,000 people moved into Ranger and to complicate matters, the rain that was falling continued to fall during that eighteen month period, making the unpaved streets impassible for man or beast. There were tales of a team of mules drowning on Commerce Street while pulling an oilfield wagon. The best bargain in town was a mule powered sled that would pull passengers from one side of Main Street to the other for the price of five cents.

The mud and the masses became the stuff of which legends were made. In fact, Ranger became the model for several movies including "Boomtown" starring Clark Gable and Spencer Tracy which has the two stars fighting it out in the muddy street in the opening scene.

But the truth really outdoes the legend in Ranger. It was here that a man was fined \$50 for murder by the local Justice of the Peace . . . that ten passenger trains daily carried standing room only crowds into town . . that Lawrence Welk and the immortal Jimmie Rodgers brought their musical shows to town to entertain the roughnecks.

North Americans could be in for a repeat of the 1989-90 influenza season when 50,000 people died of flu-related illnesses.

The two influenza strains expected to dominate the 1991-92 season are A/Beijing and A/Taiwan, each named for the area where it was first observed. "The 1990-91 season

was predominantly influenza B so we expect influenza A to be dominant for 1991-92," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen, chief epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Carter Blood Center is committed to providing a safe and adequate blood supply to the people of this area through the cooperation of Eastland Memorial Hospital.

The blood supply at Carter Blood Center is constantly and thoroughly tested. Seven separate tests to detect transmissible diseases are conducted on each unit of blood donated, including tests for AIDS, hepatitis and syphilis.

Blood banking is one of the most highly regulated areas in health care. It is governed by multiple federal and state laws, rules, policies and regulations. Carter Blood Center is licensed by the FDA and must adhere to these rules and regulations plus additional guidelines that are issued continously.

Carter Blood Center is responsible for supplying the blood needs of 48 hospitals in 17 counties. It takes approximately 250 pints a day to meet those needs.

The blood supply depends on volunteers. The practice of paying people for their blood was phased out in the 1970's at Carter Blood Center.

Each year over four million Americans need a blood transfusion. Carter Blood Center provided more than 100,000 blood transfusions in 1990.

Criteria For Blood Donation On mobiles, blood donors must be between the ages of 17 and up to 66th birthday. All 17 year old donors must have written consent from parent or guardian.

A donor should have consumed food and drink

within 4 to 6 hours prior to donating blood. A person must weigh a minimum of 110 pounds. The interval between blood donations must be 8


