### **EARLY VOTING FOR NOV. 5 ELECTION BEGINS OCT. 16**

Early voting by personal appearance for the Nov. 5 Election in Eastland County will be Oct. 16 through Nov. 1. Voting will be held in the County Clerk's office, first floor of the Courthouse, during regular office hours Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This election deals with 13 Constitutional Amendments, and is considered a very important one.

Senate Bill 1186 was enacted recently to change the term in the Election Code from "absentee voting" to "early voting." This accommodates the change in the

law allowing any voter to vote early regardless of whether he or she will be absent from the county.

This does not apply to the early voting application by mail, County Clerk JoAnn Johnson says. There are certain other deadlines and restrictions on this type of voting. An individual may call the County Clerk's office for information concerning an application by mail, or go in person to the office and pick up a form.

All registered voters are urged to study the proposed Amendments and cast a vote, either early or on Nov. 5.



In the Sunday edition, I was reading the section entitled, "Letter to the Editor," and the story about Hodge's Oak Park School and it struck home. I felt compelled to write this letter. In fact, so much so that I didn't wait to get home to write it on proper stationery. I am listing whatever I can find here at work.

I was so moved and touched by the letter from Susan Maurine Rose Bratton and wanted to console her in some way and I hope that if you print my letter, it will help her and may be others who feel as she does.

I am a little young to have attended Hodge's Oak Park but my mother and her sister and brothers went to that school They lived on Ranger Hill and they also walked, to school and back everyday, although, it wasn't as far as Susan had to walk. I'm sure they enjoyed many pleasurable moments together in route to and from school each day. Maybe, Susan, might remember them. My mother's name was Lois Scott but everybody called her "Honey." She had one sister named Myrl Grace and three brothers named Boyd Clarence Scott, Philo Ralph (P.R.) Scott and Charles Albert (A.B.)

Scott. The last, as well as the first, time I was the school, it had already been boarded up so no one could vandalize it. It struck me as being a very charming building. One that almost said, "Welcome, come inside and warm yourself by the fire, if it was cold or come inside and have a glass of lemonade if it was hot outside." Just like family or friends would welcome you. It was a building with character, something you can't say about these newer buildings. I love the older buildings. They were constructed with care and

attention of appeal to the public it would present hen completed. They were "one of a kind" buildings. Each one built with special touches and craftsmanship all its own. There will never be a building constructed again to remind us of Hodges' Oak Park. One to look upon and remember the good times you had, the friends, the laughter you shared with other when you were

young. My mother came with me when we visited the school and she was surprised to see the boards on the windows and doors. We sat in front of the school for a long time and I knew she was remembering the days when she was young. When life was new and troubles weren't too hard for mama to fix when you got home. We drove down the streets

that she used to walk coming to school and going back home and as she remembered some of the things they used to do, her and her brothers and sister, while walking together, she spoke them out loud so I could enjoy them, too. We laughed about some of the times and cried about some of the times. Her mother died when she was nine years old. So, after that, her brothers and sister were very close and the times they spent walking to and from school were very special times of closeness for them.

The sight of Hodges' Oak Park School brought these memories flowing back to her again and allowed me to share some-. thing with my mother that I might have missed had that school not been there. I am very saddened to know that it is gone and the memories of someone who went to school there might never be spoken and shared with a loved one. This is why Susan's letter touched my heart because I grew a little closer to my mother by memories of Hodges' Oak Park. Thank God for those moments we had together that day and God bless Susan for her letter that brought memories of that day back to me again.

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



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### Farms And Gardens By David Tunmire

FALL-TIME TO CONTROL PEACH LEAF CURL

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Fall is the time when peach tree care is often forgotten or neglected. Fall is an important time for the control of peach leaf curl. Mid October till December 1st is the time to control this disease to insure a good crop next year. Applying a fungicide now can stop or reduce this disease that can attack peach trees.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide. A commonly used fungicide is Kocide 101.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and can cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly. Apply the copper-containing

fungicide once the tree has gone dormant.

Other fungicides containing chlorothalonil can also be used to control peach leaf curl. A fungicide in this category is Bravo 720.

Which ever fungicide you select make sure you read and follow the label instructions.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of peach trees This also is the only time when peach leaf curl can be controlled.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AND MESQUITE CONTROL TOUR







Risk factors for breast cancer include a family history of breast cancer, early menstruation, no children or first child after age 35, late meno-

sumption of alcohol. As with most cancers, the earlier it is discovered, the more likely it can be treated and cured. Doctors suggest that women perform a breast selfexam each month, have a breast physical exam every three years between the ages of 20 and 40 and every year after age 40, and have a baseline mammogram done at age 35 to 39 with a mammogram done every one to two years for women ages 40 to 49 and every year for women ages 50 or older.

'HUNTERS FOR THE HUNGRY ACTIVE LO-CALLY

Hunters can provide thousands of meals to hungry people across the state by sharing their deer and antelope with the Hunters for the Hungry program.

With the help of several public and charitable organizations, including the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, hunters can donate freshly killed deer and antelope that will be delivered to one of 18 food banks in the state.

The program is sponsored for the second year by the End Hunger Network Houston. 'This program gives Texas hunters an opportunity to participate in their sport while not wasting food, and provide the hungry in Texas with an excellent source of low fat red meat,' said Mary Keegan, president of End Hunger Net-

work-Houston. Hunters will be asked to contribute \$15.00 (tax deductible) to the meat processor to pay for processing and packaging. Two pound frozen packages of meat will be picked up by representatives of Hutchins; Dublin, Dublin the foodbanks around the Zero Locker, 817-445state and distributed to the needy. More than 170 meat processors have volunteered to accept meat donations this year, up

from 70 last year.

Although a late start in 1990 led to only 70 processors participating, 212 deer were donated, providing 7,411 pounds of meat for the program. This meat provided an estimated 22,233 meals for the hungry.

'We hope to do several times that this year,' said Sister Francis Klinger, executive director of the End Hunger Network-Hous-

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



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

Reye's Syndrome usually affects people from infancy through young adulthood; however, no age group is immune. It can develop 3 to 5 days after the onset of chicken pox, upper respiratory infection, or other fever-causing illnesses. It affects the liver and brain,

POINTS TO PONDER REYE'S SYNDROME

Typically, Reye's occurs when someone is recovering from a viral illness and begins to feel better. A person's life can depend on early diagnosis. Watch for these symptoms, usually occurring in this or-

\* Relentless or continuous vomiting

\* Listlessness (loss of pep and energy with little interest in their environment)

\*Disorientation or confusion (unable to identify whereabouts, family members or answer questions)

Combativeness (striking out at those trying to help)

Reye's Syndrome should be suspected in peatedly. Phone your sodes of viral infections. doctor immediately if these symptoms develop. Voice your concern about Reye's Syndrome. If your physician is unavailable, take the person to an Emergency promptly. Two liver function tests (SGOT, SGPT) can be done to determine the possibility of Reye's Syndrome. There is a 90%

in its earliest stages by physicians and nurses experienced in the treat-

ment of Reye's. Studies have shown that using aspirin or aspirin-containing medications to treat the symptoms of viral illnesses increases the chance of developing Reye's Syndrome. If you or a member of your family have a flu-like illness, do not use aspirin or aspirin-containing medications. In fact, you should consult your physician before you take any drugs to treat the flu or chicken pox, particularly aspirin or anti-nausea medicines. Anti-nausea medicines may mask the symptoms of Reye's Syndrome.

The National Reye's Syndrome Foundation (NRSF), the U.S. Surgeon General, the Food and Drug Administration, and the Centers for Disease Control recommend that aspirin and combination products containing aspirin not be taken by anyone under 19 years of age during fever-causing ill-

nesses. Aspirin is a part of the salicylate family of medicines. Another name for aspirin is acetylsalicylate; some drug labels may use the words acetylsalicylate, acetylsalicylic acid, salicylic acid or salicylate instead of the word aspirin. Currently, there is no conclusive data as to whether other forms of salicylate are associated with the development of Reye's Syndrome. Until further research has answered this question, the NRSF recommends that products containing any of these substances should anyone who vomits re- not be taken during epi-

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
