The U.S. Department of Agriculture today (November 18) proposed a national peanut poundage quota for the 1992 marketing year of 1,610,000 short tons (3,220 million pounds), up 60,000 short tons (120 million pounds) from the 1991 level.

Keith Bjerke, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Convservation Service, said USDA is required by the 1990 Farm Bill to announce the final national poundage quota for 1992 marketing year peanuts by December 15. The quota may be no less than 1,350,00 short tons.

The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, requires the national poundage quota for the 1992 crop of peanuts to be equal to the quantity of peanuts that the Secretary of Agriculture estimates will be devoted to domestic edible, seed and related use in the 1992 marketing year. The marketing year for peanuts begins August 1. It is also stipulated that the quota may be no less than 1,350,000 short tons. All available information will be considered prior to the final determination, Bjerke said. Notice of the proposed determinations will appear in the November 21 Federal Register. Comments concerning the determination must be received no later than December 9 by the Director, Commodity Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, Room 3741, South Building, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013; FAX number (202)720-8261.

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



Food Safety Legislation Before Congress

The House Agriculture Committee, on which I serve, has begun its hearing process to study various food safety bills. As innocuous as the phrase "food safety" may sound, this issue activates passionate debate motivated by individuals' concerns for maintaining their livelihoods, protecting the Earth, feeding the American public, as well as other vital matters. I want to take this opportunity to talk about the issues before the Committee and how they will affect both the farmer and the consumer. Critics promoting environmental concerns contend that the human health and environmental impacts of pesticides are not being fully counted; standards for pesticide residue allowed in food are set too high; some pesticides still in use should be canceled; the cancellation process takes too long; and the export of canceled, suspended, or unregistered pesticides should be prohibited. On the other hand, critics from the agriculture, food, and chemical industry side contend that current pesticide registration standards are more than adequate and even excessive; a faster cancellation process is needed but it must be fair and based on scientific evaluation; the high cost of registration is depleting the availability of pesticides for minor crops; and food safety standards must be applied nationally, ensuring uniformity and predictability for the producer. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) enforces compliance with EPA's standards by sampling and analyzing domestic and imported foods, except meat and poultry. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) carries out the same function for meat, poultry, and some egg products.

Actually, what is often forgotten in this debate is that natural-occuring pesticides make up most of all plant chemicals. Plants naturally produce toxins to protect themselves against fungus, insects, and animal predators. 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The Black Forest

SCHWARZWALD (BLACKFOREST) isn't black at all; it's green, lush, sunny and beautiful. It follows the east bank of the Rhine from the Swiss border as far north as Karlsruhe. Good, winding roads, hundreds of little villages, and visual delights everywhere you look. We read of acid rain damage, but saw only beauty at the late October visit as we came out of France, driving over hill and dale bound for Triberg which Amy called THE Clock-Town.

Getting out of Strausbourg late, our first order of business was to find lodging in this Forest which has an international reputation for almost mystical qualities, thanks in no small part to the writings (A Tramp Abroad) of Mark Twain and others who have extolled its exciting virtues. We settled on Gruenerwald. Could you figure out that it means "Green Forest," a hunting lodge deep in the forest, and it would be a choice place for a long stay: in summer to do the hiking trails which turn into cross-country ski trails in winter. We came in late and our (a double and single at 90DM rooms total) were on the top floor with dormer windows with spectacular views.



(A good place to inject observations on German window treatment: maybe available here, and ideal. They're made to open from side to side and/or top our for fresh air. They use radiator heat from a central furnace, with little or no air conditioning, so the fresh air windows are an absolute boon.)

In the restaurant, Amy went with the venison, I had roast pork done with prunes, and Gaynell went with rinderschmorbraten, for a total with mineral wasser, coffee tab, and tea, of 78.20DM. Breakfast in the same dining room was the hard roll-jelly variety, but the coffee was plentiful and American. This particular lodge, a family-owned and run operation, has a history that goes back prior to WWI. Each attesting that this would be the ideal place to headquarter for an extended stay, and hoping one day to do it, we launched off again bound for Triberg. Through here one sees authentic thatched roofs, and the good little roads run right through the heart of the towns, so you get a good upclose look. Triberg is the site of Germany's highest waterfall, where the Gutach River plunges nearly 500 feet over seven huge granite steps. For some, however, the most compelling reason for visiting is to see the Heimatmuseum, the local history museum. This is cuckoo-clock country and museum has an impressive collection; the oldest dates to 1640. Its simple wooden mechanism is said to have been carved with a bread knife. Here you begin to see a lot of wood carvings, and of course clocks of all sorts. Amy took us to the shop where she and Vince had earlier found their prized clock, and we chose, after long deliberation, an anniversary, mantle clock which we'll treasure. We visited a lot of little shops, and walked the little streets of the quaint town. We patterned the locals for lunch, in going into a little food shop, picking out some little sausages, a few hard rolls, cans of cola, and ate in the car, parked on main street, as the rain poured down.

I remember we had to get gasoline here and found that the cost is pretty much equal to our prices here, except they sell by the liters, and it takes some calculations.

We were in the Southwest corner of Germany, not far from Switzerland, and we bounded off, skirting Stuttgart, and Nurnburg, bound for Bayreuth, Benlock and Christenson Barracks to visit in Amy and Vince's home in the stairwell apartments.

It was a three-hour autobahn trip, and we saw farm land, vineyards, many of Germany's reported 1,200 breweries along the route, and lots of beautiful scenery.



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




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
