CONTESTED RACES DEVELOP IN COUNTY DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY

A number of candidates have filed in the Democratic Primary for the March 10 Election. Most of these are incumbents seeking re-election, but contested races have developed in County Commissioner and Constable offices.

Filing for County Commissioner, Pct. 1 are Ken Lyerla, W. E. Sikes, and Don Sherman. The incumbent, Richard Robinson, has stated that he will not seek re-election to this

office. L. T. Owen, incumbent, has filed for re-election to the office of County Commissioner, Pct. 3. Also filing for the post is Dick Burgess.

A race has also developed for Constable, Pct. 4. Incumbent Teddy J. Parish has filed for the office. Also filing is Bob Snyder.

Incumbent Howard (Gene) Hicks filed for another term as Constable of Pct. 3. Norman

Chancellor is also seeking the job.

Running unopposed for re-election to other offices are: Jim Wright, Judge 91st District, R. B. White, County Sheriff, Nancy Trout, County Tax Assessor/Collector, W. T. (Bill) Harris, Constable Pct. 1, Cecil Cook, Constable Pct. 2, and Dewey Keesee, Constable Pct. 5.

Vernon Walker, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1, has filed for election to the office he now holds by

appointment. He was named to fill the unexpired term of Jamie Honea.

The filing deadline to run for office is Jan. 2, 5 p.m. So others may enter the races before that time.

As yet there is no word of anyone officially filing as a candidate for local office in the Republican Primary, which will be held March 10. This could change by the deadline.

A number of Republican candidates will be on the ballot for state and national offices.

Energy Saving Tips For Winter

Winter has arrived, and you can welcome the change in weather by implementing a few low-cost, home-heating tips from the Texas Energy Extension Service.

One easy way to save on heating costs is to lower the thermostat on your central heating system. The Texas EES recommends setting the thermostat at 68 degrees F or lower when you are at home and 60 degrees F or lower when your home is unoccupied. This method will provide enough heat for normal conditions while helping lower your winter heating bill.

For families who spend extended periods of time in one room, space heaters or portable heaters can be used to heat small areas instead of the whole house, which saves heating energy.

Another low-cost, energy-saving measure is to plug the gaps around windows and doors with caulking and weatherstripping. These leakage areas can be responsible for 20 to 25 percent of the heat loss in your home. If you are especially concerned about cold drafts around windows, additional insulation can be provided by tacking or taping blankets, towels or plastic over the inside of the window.

The Texas EES also suggests "movable insulation" as another low-cost way to lower your winter heating bill. Draft stoppers are one form of movable insulation designed to block drafts at the bottoms of doors and win-

dows. Draft stoppers can be made by filling a tube of heavy fabric with sand, perlite or Styrofoam beads.

Other forms of movable insulation are interior, roll-down window quilts, thermal curtains, interior shutters, and roll-down exterior shutters. These are the most popular forms of movable insulation because they can cut heat loss in half during the winter as well as help reduce heat gain during the summer.

You already may be aware that fireplace heating is not as efficient as it is attractive. Approximately 85 to 90 percent of the heat produced by burning wood goes up the chimney, but these suggestions can help increase heat efficiency:

*Control the air source to the fire by opening the outside air inlet or slightly opening a window near the fireplace.

*Build the fire on the floor of the firebox to generate more heat.

*Install a glass shield in front of the fireplace opening to keep heated room air from escaping up the chimney while the fire is burning.

*Use dry, seasoned pieces of high-density woods, such as live oak, red oak, slash pine, or longleaf pine, to produce more heat.

Some other effective, heat-saving tips include opening the draperies on sunny days, wearing layered clothing and changing the filter on your central heating system every month.

DWI A Tragedy, Gramm Warns On Eve Of New Years

Alcohol-related driving deaths have declined steadily since 1982, according to U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who called for Texans to take special care on the highways during the holiday season.

"According to a nationwide study by the Center for Disease Control, drunk driving fatalities are declining—and that's great news," Gramm said.

"But with the approach of New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, the two days each year which generate more drunk driving deaths and injuries than any others, the time has come to take special care," he said.

Congress OK's Farm Disaster Aid

Congress has approved a \$1.75 billion disaster assistance bill that will provide payments for farmers from across Texas who suffered losses in 1990 or 1991, says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm.

"More than 125,000 Texas agricultural producers suffered losses from flooding, freezes and drought," Gramm noted. "They will be able to file for claims under this legislation, which will be administered at the local level by the Texas ASCS."

Gramm noted that Texas cotton farmers were among the hardest hit by the weather borne agricultural disasters of 1990 and 1991.

"Nearly 40,000 cotton producers are estimated to have incurred damage valued at \$326 million in

1991 alone," Gramm said. In addition, producers of wheat, grain sorghum, corn and hay had extensive losses.

The senator noted that part of the funding, \$995 million, will be available for payments on either of the two years, at the producer's option. An additional \$755 million is also available, subject to a budget request by the President.

Some of the incidents which produced widespread agricultural losses were the 1990 flooding along the Red and Trinity Rivers, scattered droughts afflicting the Panhandle and the Rio Grande Valley and freezes which caused widespread damage to winter wheat production in the Panhandle, North Texas and Blackland Prairie areas.

USDA Charges Texas Livestock Dealer And U.S. District Court Issues A Temporary Restraining Order

Clyde Boyd, doing business as Cleburne Livestock Auction, Cleburne, Texas, has been charged by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) with failing to maintain and properly use the company's custodial account for shippers' proceeds.

Calvin W. Watkins, deputy administrator of USDA's Packers and Stockyards Administration, said a custodial account is a special kind of trust account, designed to protect funds owed to consignors from the sale of their livestock.

Boyd has a right to a hearing on the federal administrative charge filed by USDA under authority of the Packers and Stockyards (P&S) Act. If the charge is proven, he will be placed under a cease and desist order, similar to a permanent injunction. He could also

be suspended and ordered to pay a civil penalty.

On December 6 a temporary restraining order was issued by the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, Dallas Division, to restrain Boyd from conducting any auctions or transactions at Cleburne Livestock Auction until he can demonstrate his custodial account is being maintained in conformity with the regulations issued under the P&S Act. A hearing to determine why a preliminary injunction should not be issued is scheduled for December 16.

The P&S Act is an anti-trust, fair trade practice, and payment protection law. It is designed to assure free and open competition and to prevent unfair and deceptive practices in the marketing of livestock, meat, and poultry.

She turned off the service road and drove toward her property. Spectators

blocked the road leading to her house. My wife remembered one particular episode. Our friend got out her car and asked an elderly woman to move. This woman scolded our friend saying, "I'm not moving. I got the best view of the fire!"

The good news is that no buildings were damaged or livestock lost. The husband was fighting the fire and started moving their animals out of danger. Let's hope that in the future country folks act like country folks.

Heald Appointed Head Of Abilene District Of Texas Department of Transportation



Brownwood District Engineer Wes Heald has been appointed the new head of the Abilene District in the reorganization of the Texas Department of Transportation.

The newly formed Abilene District will consist of 17 counties, six of which were originally in the Brownwood District.

The 17 counties are Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Fisher, Hamilton, Jones, Mills, Mitchell, Nolan, Palo Pinto, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, and Taylor.

Heald said that all administrative work from the Brownwood District will shift to Abilene headquarters sometime next year. "We have not been notified which support activities might remain in Brownwood," he said, "such as the center stripe paint crew, the signal maintenance crew, the warehouse operation, and the equipment repair crew." Design and construction work will continue to be handled from an area office, and responsibilities will remain the same except for the area boundary changes. It is anticipated that each area engineer will handle three to five counties, Heald

said. The area engineer, who in Eastland is Bryan Neaves, is primarily responsible for design and

construction work and has overall responsibility for maintenance. Maintenance work in each county is supervised by a maintenance foreman, and changes are not anticipated in this operation. Clyde Braddock is the Eastland County maintenance foreman.

Heald emphasized that the department will continue providing the same level of service on the highway system as in the past and will promote the construction of those highways that will enhance economic growth as well

as reduce congestion in the existing highway system. Heald has been district engineer in Brownwood for the past four years. He began work with the department in 1961 as a senior engineering assistant, after graduating from Texas A&M University in 1960 with a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering. He worked in the Houston urban area before moving to the Brownwood district, where he held increasingly responsible engineering and supervisory positions until his appointment as district engineer in 1987.

He has served on the Brownwood Transportation Committee. He was in the Army Reserves from Cisco Press - Eastland Telegram - Ranger Times - Rising Star - Callahan County Star Thursday, December 19, 1991

1960 to 1984, and received the reserve's Meritorious Service Award in 1984. In 1970, he received the Young Engineer of the Year award from the Abilene Chapter of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers.

Pharmacy Topics

Christmas trees are beautiful - but watch out for mold and pollen in the home. Trees release airborne pollens and molds, especially as they dry out, and terpene, a chemical in the tree's oil, is allergenic.

Stress may exacerbate skin disorders. At least one dermatologist/psychiatrist at the University of California at San Francisco finds that anti-anxiety medication helps.

Antibiotics given before surgery lowers the risk of infection after, even for low-risk procedures, an eight-hospital study found.

New vaccines against pertussis are under consideration by the FDA, and the National Institutes of Health will start tests soon. Acellular vaccines work without the whole killed bacterial cells that cause side effects. Testing will take at least two years.

Children should be on a low-fat diet starting at the age of two to avoid heart disease later in life, says the director of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.

Railroad Commission Issues 67 Permits For Horizontal Wells In November

The Railroad Commission granted a total of 67 new permits for horizontal wells in November, as permit applications to drill the advanced technology wells declined from the previous month, according to RRC Chairman Lena Guerrero.

By comparison, the Commission issued 80 permits for horizontal wells in October, 56 in Sept. 61 in Aug., and 71 in July, 1991.

So far, operators have

applied for 838 permits to drill horizontal wells in Texas during the first eleven months of 1991, compared to 985 during the same period one year ago.

In all, the Railroad Commission has issued a grand total of 2,136 permits for horizontal wells in Texas since 1984.

The Pearsall and Giddings (Austin Chalk) Fields continue to lead the nation in horizontal drilling activity. Nineteen new

permits were granted for horizontal projects in the Pearsall (Austin Chalk) in November, compared to 22 in October. Meanwhile, operators in the Giddings Field applied for twenty-nine new horizontal permits last month, led by Fayette County with 14 and Burleson County with 10.

Frio County in the Pearsall (Austin Chalk) continues to lead all others with a total of 603 permits for horizontal wells

now granted. 468 of those wells have been completed.

Meantime, Dimmit County ranks second in the Pearsall Field with 170 horizontal permits issued through Nov. 30, followed by Zavala County with 167 and LaSalle County with 156.

In all, 1,096 permits for horizontal wells have been granted to operators in the Pearsall Field. Some 823 of those wells have now been completed.

Meanwhile, the Commission has issued 499 permits for horizontal wells in the Giddings (Austin Chalk) Field through

Nov. 30. Burleson County leads the horizontal race there with 285, followed by Fayette County with 151, Lee County with 53, and Washington County with ten. As of Nov. 30, 296 horizontal wells had been completed in the Giddings Field.

Drilling was completed on some 24 horizontal wells during the month of November, raising to 1,398 the number of horizontal wells now completed in Texas since 1984.

Overall, operators in 71 Texas counties have now received Railroad Commission permits to drill horizontal wells. Besides the counties previously noted, 178 permits for horizontal wells have been granted to operators in Gonzales County, 87 have been issued for horizontal projects in Brazos County,

while another 57 permits have been granted to operators drilling horizontal holes in Wilson County.

Horizontal drilling is a technique used to tap oil reserves that can't be recovered profitably using standard methods.

"Little Man Tate": Can Genius Bring Happiness?

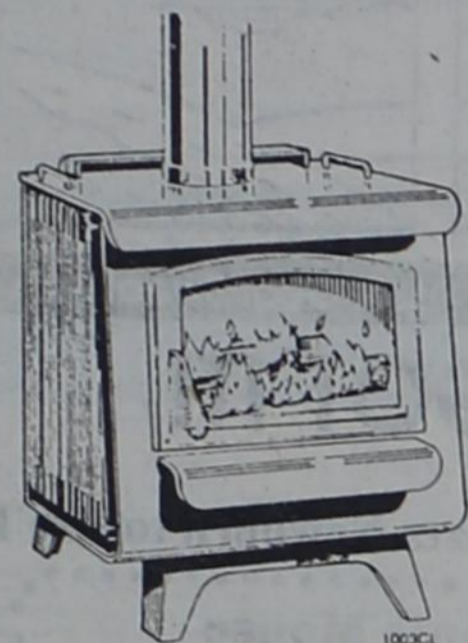

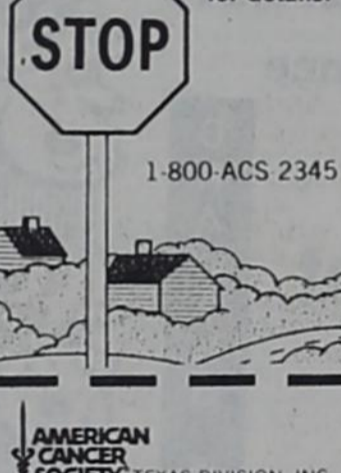

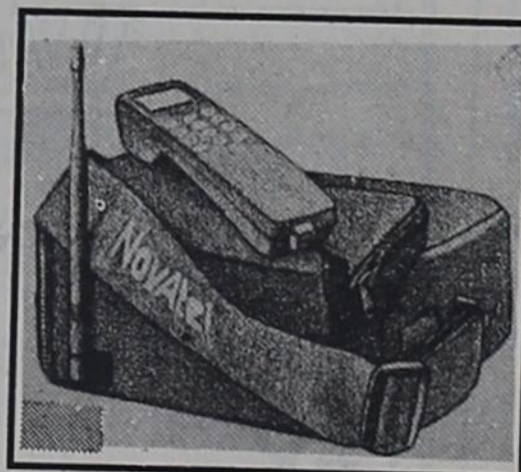

Fishing Outdoors

Follow your shadow to some winter angling. Standing in your boat your shadow will fall more towards the north and the last this time of year, so more heat should be present on these banks. Once over there don't let your shadow beat you to the target you plan to fish cast ahead.

Nextcast I will run some great stocking stuffer ideas for the outdoors person on your Christmas list. Till then Safety begins while we are young. Teach today's youth for a safe outing of "Fishing Outdoors".

Texas hunters continue to shoot each other at an alarming rate, already surpassing last year's mark for accidents with a month left in the year.

Through November, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department had received reports of seven hunting fatalities and 67 injuries. There were eight fatalities and only 53 injuries during 1990. The state saw 12 fatalities and 78 injuries in 1989.

All seven of this year's fatalities, and 26 of the injuries, have occurred during the fall hunting seasons. East Texas and Central Texas have seen the bulk of the accidents.

Since the Sept. 1 dove opener, the region around Brownwood has seen 12 hunting accidents, one of those resulting in a fatality. During September and October there were five accidents from dove hunters not verifying their target or swinging on game. Six of the accidents have occurred during deer season, three in Sutton County, and one each in San Saba, McCullough and Gillespie counties.

Hunters in the region surrounding Rusk have reported eight accidents, including two fatalities. The fatalities were in Jasper and Panola counties. Three of the injuries occurred in Shelby County, and one each in Trinity, Angelina and Rusk counties.

Most, if not all, of these accidents could have been prevented, said Terry Erwin, recreation programs coordinator for the department and a hunter education instructor.

Some of the preventable accidents include:

*a 5 year old boy fell while chasing his 4 year old sister, shooting and injuring her with a .22 caliber rifle.

*a man mistook his hunting partner while deer hunting and shot him in the thigh, injuring him.

*a dog knocked over a gun while riding in the front of a pickup and it discharged, injuring the driver.

*a man received bullet fragments to the head after hitting the trigger instead of the safety while

trying to climb into a deer stand.

*a 10 year old girl lost the index, middle and third fingers on her left hand when a companion handed a rifle through a deer blind window and it discharged.

*a man was wounded in the arm when his bullet hit a metal compressor and ricocheted.

*a 30-06 discharged in the back seat of a pickup and the bullet hit metal under the front seat before shrapnel hit one man in the back of the leg.

*a boy shot another boy in the neck, injuring him, while uncocking a .22 pistol.

Most of these accidents could have been prevented by following the rules of shooting safety, or perhaps by wearing hunter orange clothing, Erwin said. Hunter orange is required in 40 states. In Texas at least 400 square inches of hunter orange must be worn while hunting on Type I or Type II Wildlife Management Areas.

"We recommend that people wear blaze orange for the safety factor," he said. "I recommend wearing it all the time while in the field hunting. If it's not on, it's not doing you a bit of good."

If you're absolutely against wearing hunter orange while hunting, at least wear it and from the stand, said Steve Hall, education administrator. "Hunter orange will allow your companion to see you if you get out of position or stray from your hunting plan."

A hunter orange bill was proposed in the last legislative session, but no action was taken. In Mississippi, Erwin said, a combination of hunter education and hunter orange has dropped the accident rate about 60 percent.

"We need hunter orange," said Capt. Wayne Coffman, regional law enforcement director in Brownwood. "I guarantee you that most of these hunters wouldn't have been mistaken for game."

One of the most often broken shooting safety rules this year is the one that says, "Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you hunt." "If you can't identify it, why are you shooting at it?" Erwin asked.

"Everything you see and hear in the woods should be considered a human until there's absolutely no doubt," Hall said. "That's before you ever raise a gun. If there's any doubt, raise the binoculars. Bird hunters should stick to their 'safe zone-of-fire' and know where their companions are at all times."

"Hunting is fun, but safe, responsible hunting

is even more fun, and it makes good sense," Hall said. "Hunting is a relatively safe sport, but one accident is too many."

In addition to identifying the target before shooting, here are some other tips to remember:

*make sure the firearm is unloaded every time you pick it up.

*unload and put firearms in their case when

traveling, separating them from locked-up ammunition.

*do not load the firearm until you're in the field.

*always point the muzzle in a safe direction, never in someone's direction.

*use a hauling line to raise unloaded firearms into tower blinds and tree stands.

*keep your finger out-

side the trigger guard until you're ready to shoot.

*know where your companions are at all times; never swing a gun towards them.

*control your emotions by thinking safety first at all times.

*avoid alcohol and drugs before or during a hunt.

RIDING TRAINS in Europe for Americans is exciting, calling for stamina, some intelligence and lots of understanding. Exciting because you cover lots of ground fast, and comfortably. Some strength because you hoist luggage onto and off trains and through stations. Some brain, because they assume you have sense enough to know when to get on and off; and patient understanding because you're traveling in another language, another culture and it helps to keep in mind that you are subject to their schedules and devices, not your own.

A FUNNY thing happened on the way to Rome; we got to know Munich better than we'd planned. When Amy, her mother and I were told that Ireland would be cold and miserable in late October, we substituted Italy (also cold), bought Eurailpasses (bargains at \$298 for 15 days in 30 first-class travel), and the trio set out on the big adventure. We boarded a local at Bayreuth; after

an hour, changed in Nuremberg, bound south for Munich, where we were booked to change at 20:30 to a sleeper direct to Rome. It was a good ride to Munich, but we all, temporarily mis-reading the 24-hour clock, mistakingly thought we had plenty of time for a little snack before catching our train. Some time after 8:30 p.m. we asked which track for the train to Rome. The answer rings in our ears yet: "It is gone."

Not to fret: there's another at 23:30 (11:30 p.m.) which gets to Bologna at 7:55 a.m., where you change, arriving Rome 12:45. And so we take a better look at Munich; catch our train; get some sleep; cross a strip of Austria and into Italy and a morning coffee at Bologna: Espresso or Cappachino? American. So they put more water into Espresso.

AND ON to Rome, through Florence, in the area of which lies another train tail which happened on return.

Amy, very well-versed in getting around in Europe, was a tremendous guide both on the highways and rails. Train schedules are posted, but you must determine, based on destination, departure time, track location, AND arrival times because they rarely call stations. They run on schedule so if you're armed with the right data, you're okay. Back to Florence, we weren't, and learned that you do not rely on a native who doesn't

speak English. To make a long story short: we did a dumb thing. We got off one station short of Florence. A kindly conductor almost physically put us onto another train headed to Florence. Then the train did a dumb thing; it broke. And we sat on a siding for a couple of hours waiting for a substitute engine. This was an exception and not the rule. Most are electric; we saw a few diesels.

Later, our Florence-Venice Train was over All Saints (Nov. 1) holiday weekend and was overbooked, with no seats to be had. We made for the dining car for a comfortable seat and a full Italian dinner, a novelty in itself. First course: mucho spaghetti and/or lausagne; then vegetables of little potatoes and brussels sprouts; then a mushroom-smothered roast beef; dessert of cream cake, fresh fruit and good cheese. Total: about \$34. Each! Plus we got to remain at the table, sipping our Espresso all the way to Venice because there was only one meal seating on that route.

Our real Olympian feat was a 4-minute change at Verona, from Venice to Garmisch: down, over and up; Amy and some bags on outgoing JUST as Gaynell, I and remaining bags climb aboard; doors close JUST as we scamper aboard. Stairways are long and steep and tracks may be far apart. Much later en route home, Gaynell and I trained from Bayreuth, via Nuremberg to Frankfurt, where the train terminal is at and two levels below the giant international airport.

We rode a number of the ICE express trains. Were that our Amtrack as extensive, efficient and well-used as are the European trains. The Eurail map touches all of Europe as we know it, plus Greece, the Scandinavian countries and Ireland, offering steamer and ferry transfers as needed. But not England. (NextRome).

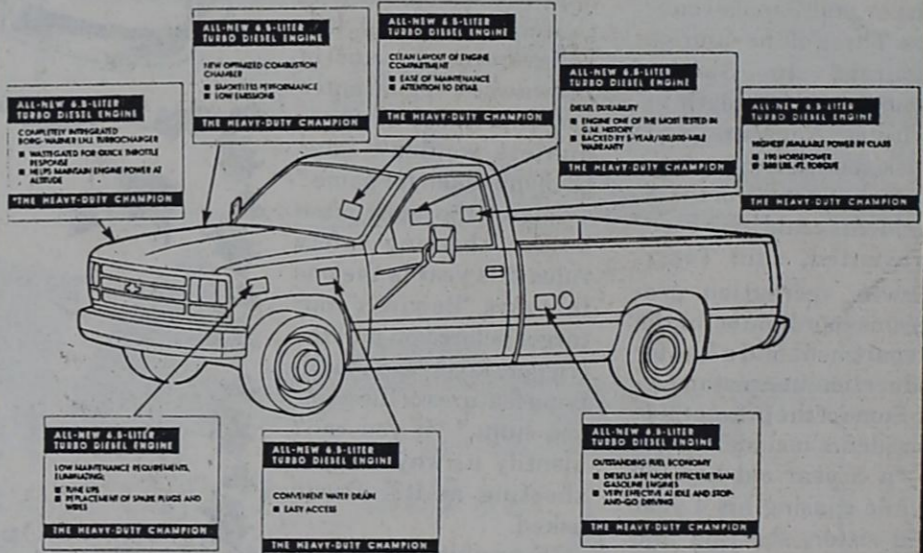

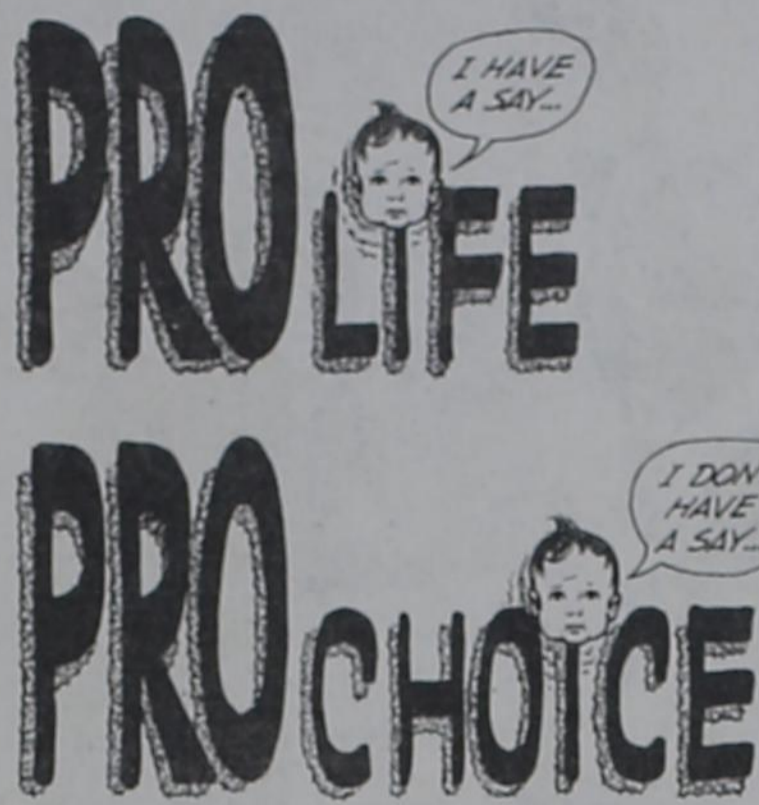
They have eight grandchildren, and 17 great grandchildren.

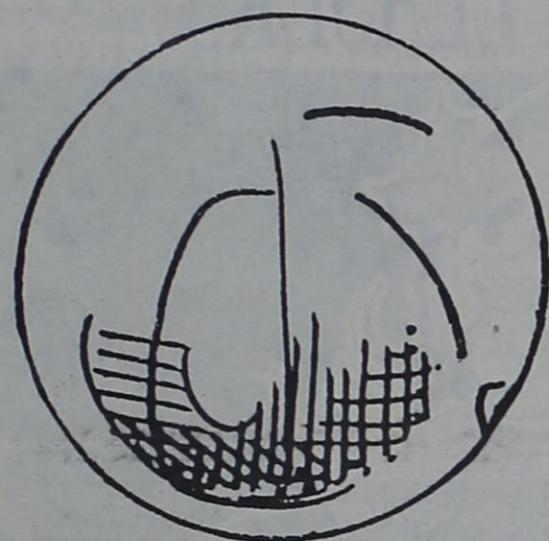
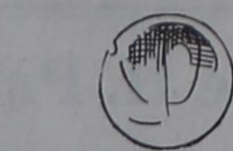
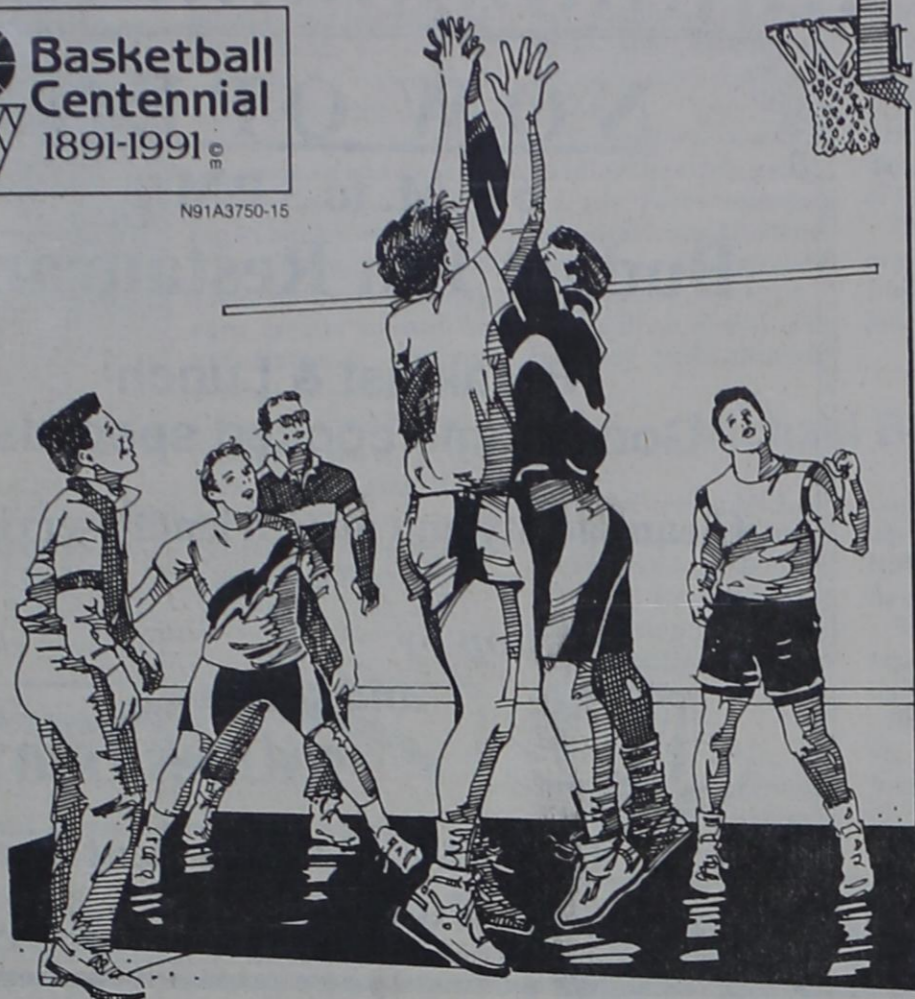
