

And when you see the splendor, you get a better feeling for the poets, the dramatists, the artists, the historians and the dreamers, who, for good and/or bad, have recorded so much, and it makes you grateful that it's been saved and passed down to us. And then you think and wonder about all that didn't make it; that got lost through plunder or natural disaster.

Folks have been nice to tell us that they're enjoying these pieces. Some are going over and have asked about safety, and we've tried to tell it as we saw it. Another precaution that was given us needs to be passed along. At a breakfast with Swiss tourists in Florence we were told that there is danger for unaccompanied women on trains because of the unscrupulous who knock on locked compartment doors, saying, "Conductor," and if admitted, spray the occupants with a dazing chemical, and proceed to rob and otherwise abuse the poor unsuspecting travelers. We were lucky, but have heard of a number who suffered losses, mostly from pickpockets. Money belts and tightly-clutched purses are highly recommended -- but isn't that also true for our own large cities?

the translations in the tour books are good for laughs: "Each year there is in Venice the very famous historical regatta: the performance is unforgettable and the Grand Canal crossed by magnificent boats, seems magically (to) go back to the splendour of the times of

the Most Serene Republic." Or, this entry: "His (Venice) first inhabitants were the Venetian populations who were escaping from the barbaric invasions and from the IX century there are precise news (records?) of the development of Venices."

A NEW collection: it has always been our habit to pick up "pretty little pebbles" from various places, and this time we added chestnuts; new to us, but found hither and yon; and for the first time, seeing them

roasted and vended in squares and plazas all over.

In Florence we learned of the devastation in the floods of '63 when the Arno left its banks...In the Plaza overlooking the city, there is a bronze replica of the heroic David -- and it appeared to have been vandal-splashed with paint.

In Piazza della Signoria in Florence is Neptune Fountain dating to the 1500s; because the enormous white sea god is set in the center on a white chariot drawn by white sea horses, the Florentines renamed the sculpture the White Giant . . . Florence by night: unbelievably



beautiful. Some call it the most beautiful city in the world.

VIA CONDOTTI, a narrow Roman street that leads from one plaza to the Spanish Steps is undoubtedly one of the most elegant and sophisticated thoroughfares in the city; maybe the world? And radiating in every direction are mazes of tiny streets with many more shops of every possible description. Name a famous brand or shop and you'll find an outlet here. Italian fashion world must rank somewhere near that of France. And it was in this vast and confusing section that we wandered one night amid the thousands of other tourists and natives, looking and marveling. After what seemed like hours of circling first this way and then that, Gaynell and I were sure that we were hopelessly lost -- never to find our way out or back. Imagine the horror of a lifetime condemned to the tiny boutiques. But wouldn't you know; Amy, with her homing instincts, led us out, though it be through hill and dell, but thankful we were.

We visited with a retired New Jersey couple who had departed a tour to continue their visit of Rome on their own. And to do these places justice, you'd need to just "live on the economy" (a military expression) to really savor it all.

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#### **Glasgow Requests Assistance** For Protecting Children

AUSTIN—Senator Bob Glasgow today requested the cooperation and assistance of State health and education officials in seeking protections for children whose families have opted for homeschooling.

Senator Glasgow's concerns arose as he studied reports of the starvation and death of Stephen Hill of White Settlement. Stephen Hill, whose death was allegedly the result of being starved by his parents, had been removed from public school under a court ruling allowing children to be educated in their own homes.

"I have many personal friends who have opted for home-schooling, and they are all good people," Glasgow said. "We need, however, to establish safeguards for children such as Stephen Hill who have fallen through the cracks." Senator Glasgow's letters requesting meetings with the Commissioner of Education, the Commissioner of Health, School Administrators and others, state "I intend to do all that I can to see that Texas does not allow another child to suffer as Stephen Hill did."

Senator Glasgow intends to collect the input of certain officials with a direct interest and responsibility in the matter as well as representatives of home-schooling families in order to consider options for legislation to help protect children not enrolled in public and private schools. Such children have special needs. simply because in not attending school where they may be observed by an adult outside the family, abuse may more easily go undetected.

Senator Glasgow will be meeting with these officials and groups right after the first of the year.





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#### Thirty Year History Of Texas Sales tax had brought in \$148.7 Tax Retraced In Fiscal Notes

When Texas first implemented a sales tax in 1961, then-Comptroller Robert S. Calvert had to rely on the state's newspapers to spread the word. Contacting individual taxpayers was out of the question since lawmakers had given him only three weeks to prepare for the monumental task.

When Texas lawmakers revised the state franchise tax in 1991 it took tax experts at the Comptroller's Office only three days to prepare a written summary of the changes. Staff then sent each of the approximately 400,000 taxpayers who may be affected a letter and brochure explaining the change. The agency's 54 field offices received the news through the inhouse electronic mail system. Tax practitioners soon read about the changes in a specialized newsletter prepared by the Comptroller's Office.

A lot has changed since 1961 when astronaut Alan Shepard made the first U.S. manned space flight, East Germany erected the Berlin Wall, the Yankees won the World Series and Texas enacted the sales tax as it s newest source of reve-

Today U.S. astronauts have been to the moon and back, the Germans have torn down the Berlin Wall, and the Minnesota Twins, a team that played its first He has a sister, Ron- season in 1961, won the 1991 World Series. The They are the owners of Texas sales tax, no longer new, has become the state's largest source of tax revenue, bringing in nearly \$8.3 billion in fiscal 1991, or well over half of total tax collections.

"Sales taxpayers now represent the majority of tax accounts at the Comptroller's Office, with nearly 500,000 sales taxpayers sending in more than 2.2 million tax returnsayear,"State Comptroller John Sharp said.

The sales tax has proven to be one of Texas' most relied upon revenue producers, exceeding all initial expectations. In the past three decades, it has produced \$73 billion in state tax revenue. Texas avoided the sales

tax for many years by relying on its lucrative oil, gas and business taxes. But as those revenues dwindled, Texans were forced to look elsewhere for a major new income source. After considering a payroll-earnings tax and a corporate and a personal income tax, state lawmakers in 1961 decided on a state sales tax, and Texas became the 35th state to impose the levy.

In 1961, the new tax exempted groceries, prescription drugs and farm equipment, as well as gasoline, tobacco and alcoholic beverages that were already covered by excise taxes. No services were taxed, but diapers, aspirin and embalming fluid were taxable items.

Thirty years later, much has changed. Lawmakers have increased the original sales tax rate of 2 percent seven times to its present 6 1/4 percent.

Cities, counties, mass transit programs and hospital districts may now impose an additional local sales tax of up to 2 percent, as long as the combined state and local rates does not exceed 8 1/ 4 percent.

Many items and services that were once sold tax free are now taxable, including alcoholic beverages, cigarettes, newpapers and magazines, "canned" computer software, dry-cleaning services, amusements and

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#### **Texas ASC Committee** Requests Flood Assistance

Farmers and ranchers in more than 50 Texas counties have suffered severe losses to crops and livestock due to some of the heaviest flooding in Texas history. Severe flooding occurred and continues on the Colorado, Brazos and Trinity rivers and their tributaries.

In response to these

losses, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has requested that the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee take action to provide assistance to farmers and ranchers who suffered losses due to the current floods.
