Ranger Woman's Niece Authors Children's Book

Cisco-born Jean Richardson of Houston featured Lake Cisco Dam in her second child's book entitled *Tag-Along Timothy Tours Texas*.

Eakin Press of Austin released the large print child's book with colored illustrations last week. It is a sequel to her first production of *Tag-Along Timothy Tours Alaska* which has twice been nominated for the prestigious Bluebonnet Award.

In her newest book, the author again uses her favorite character, a little rabbit named Tag-Along by his brothers and sisters because he can never keep up with them. Tag-Along hates his nickname and runs away from his rabbit home to make his siblings sorry for having called him that. He hides in a van of some vacationing neighbors and tours Texas with them, camping out at night.

Tag-Along talks with the animals he meets on the 2,000 mile swing around Texas. Each animal is different and native to his special habitat where the family camps out nightly. At Lake Cisco, the dam is pictured with a horned toad inviting Tag-Along to revel in his feast of red ants.

The human family makes camp for 14 nights as they travel several different highways, 1-20 from the Monahans State Park to Dallas, and visit a total of 14 of Texas wonders including Big Bend Park, the Dallas Fair, Longhorn Cavern, the Alamo, the Enchanted Rock, Houston Astro-dome, and Huntsville State Park. The touring family is never aware that they are carrying a runaway rabbit hitchhiker.

The author, Jean Richardson, speaks to the Bay Area Conference Writers this week. She is the daughter of Writer Mary Carey of Alaska, and the niece of Lela Latch Lloyd of Cisco, Ann Latch Rendall of Ranger, and the granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W.Z. Latch. She spent the first seven years of her life in Cisco and loved Lake Cisco and all its entertainment facilities.

1500 POUNDS OF MARIJUANA SEIZED NORTH OF RANGER

Late Friday, January 17 and early Saturday, January 18 six persons were arrested and over 1500 pounds of marijuana was seized.

Of those arrested, two are from Mingus, three are from Dallas and one from Mexico.

This action was taken

after a combined investigation by the DPS Narcotics, FBI, Texas Rangers and Eastland County Sheriff, Ronnie White.

Five persons were arrested with the marijuana which was being transported inside a tractor trailer tank.

The truck was stopped

as it neared the entrance to a ranch house north of Ranger, which was being used as a stash house. This house is where the sixth person was arrested.

The marijuana has a street wholesale value of \$1,350,000.00, making this the largest seizure in Eastland County History.

The second largest seizure was in 1974 when 200 pounds was taken, also by Sheriff Ronnie White.

The investigation is continuing at this time and more arrests will be made according to Sheriff White.

Adams Grocery is the oldest grocery store in ranger and almost the oldest business there.

In 1925 the store set a United States record for the number of different items purchased in one single order.

This was a \$700 order for 112 items from Swift

and Co., and this was for their regular weeks trade. Another order would be placed the following week.

The record was previously held by Kansas City with 102 items and Chicago with 104 items.

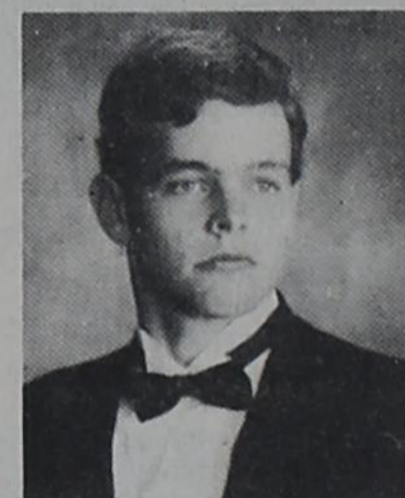
Patti is secretary of the student council for the second year. She served as class president her

Free Income Tax Advice Is Available For Area Residents

Free Income Tax assistance will be available for area residents during February, March and April through the TAX-AIDE program of the American Association of Retired Persons.

Volunteer counselors, trained by the Internal Revenue Service certified instructors, will be staffing counseling sites in all the Senior Citizen Centers throughout Eastland County from Feb. 1, 1992, through April 15, 1992.

Walter Knowlden, coordinator for the Central Texas area of the AARP TAX-AIDE program, said the service is designed to help older persons and also taxpayers who are unable to afford professional advice. AARP counselors will help them understand tax forms and help them to be familiar with the special benefits available.

The counselors, many who have been in the TAX-AIDE program for several years, receive 40 hours of training by IRS each year and are trained on all the new tax changes.

According to Mr. Knowlden, past experience has indicated that many older persons are unaware of special tax benefits they are entitled to claim. Many are paying more than are required to pay. Some may not even be required to file a return because of limited income.

Taxpayers using the service should bring copies of their previous year's return and their forms for the current year. They should also bring with them all their W-2 and W-2P forms along with all the 1099 forms regarding income received, including their 1099SSA form from Social Security. They should also have all their receipts of expenses, such as medical bills, prescription drugs, medical insurance for possible medical deductions. They will need to bring receipts of Real Estate taxes, mortgage interest and charitable contributions paid during the year so that all taxable deductions can be applied.

TDH Warns Of Child Safety Seat Defects

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has warned that thousands of unwitting Texas parents may be buckling their infants and small children into safety seats which have been recalled by their manufacturers because of defects.

State law requires that all children younger than 2 must be buckled into safety seats while riding in cars. In addition such seats must be approved by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). To be approved, each new seat model must pass federal crash-test standards for a child's safety in a 30 mph collision.

An emerging problem, though, is that many

approved seats have been recalled by their manufacturers, usually because of defects they develop after a few months of use. Defects ranging from buckles which cease to work properly to flammable cushions have been common.

According to Steve Anderson at the Texas Department of Health, "Notices of the recalls, though mandatory, routinely go only from the makers to the wholesale and retail outlets—not to parents who may already have bought the seats."

"Consequently," Anderson said, "few parents are aware that even some of the most popular safety seats have been found unsafe, much less whether the specific model they own is on the recall list. Legally, the manufacturers must provide a repair kit, if the defect in a seat is minor; a substitute seat, if NHTSA has canceled its approval of a given model; or a refund of the purchase price."

Anderson is statewide coordinator of the Occupant Protection Programs of the TDH Public Health Promotion Division. He said that dozens of different models of child safety seats have been recalled by their makers in the past two years. "Several manufacturers have had at least some of their seat models recalled this year," he said.

Some seat makers have now gone out of business, he added. Yet there is growing evidence that defective seats — which should have been returned by retailers to their makers — are still being sold to the public.

"Our immediate concern is the safety of kids. We want to inform the public about whether the seats they own are on the recall lists, and we want to know which retailers are selling seats in violation of the recalls," Anderson said.

Anderson said that he is distributing lists of the

recalled seat model numbers and manufacturers' phone numbers to all local health departments. More detailed lists, which also describe potential defects, are available in each of the TDH regional offices, as well as in the central office in Austin.

"We also are distributing copies of the list to each of our 256 Child Passenger Safety Seat Loaner Program administrators throughout the state, as well as to regional Public Health Promotion staff members," he said.

He urged anyone who is uncertain about the safety of their child's passenger seat to contact a local health department, a TDH regional office (see numbers listed below), or the toll-free Occupant Safety phone line, 1-800-252-8255. Callers should be ready to give the brand name of their safety seat, its model number and manufacture date, which usually is found on the side of the seat shell.

The TDH Product Safety Program also needs information about any Texas retailers known to be selling any previously recalled models of safety seats. Reports of such sales should be made to Charles Branton, director of the program, at 512-458-7519.

Anderson added, "So far we have not learned of any injuries or fatalities directly related to use of the recalled seats. But the potential for tragedy is

very real. Use of safety seats is not just a matter of choice. All 50 states have laws requiring millions of parents to transport babies and toddlers in NHTSA-approved safety seats.

"It is essential that we make sure that the seats available to Texans are, in fact, as safe as they are supposed to be," he explained.

ASCS Announces Disaster Payment Program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood, and other natural disasters in either 1990 or 1991.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said ASCS official Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee. "Producers without crop insurance must have

had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

Harris said producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. He said that farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. "If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the County

ASCS Office."

Harris explained that a producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster program may be obtained from the Eastland ASCS office.

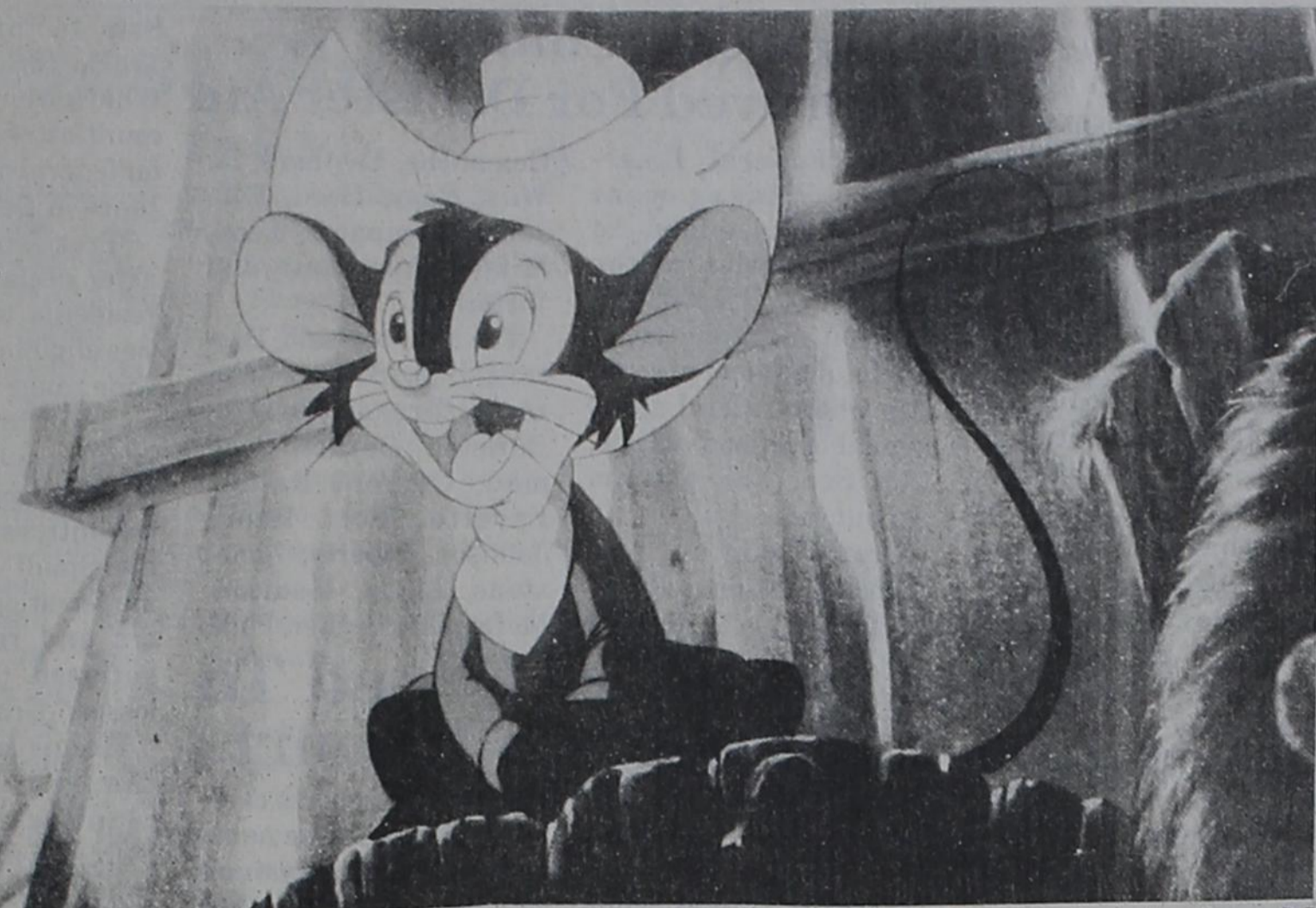

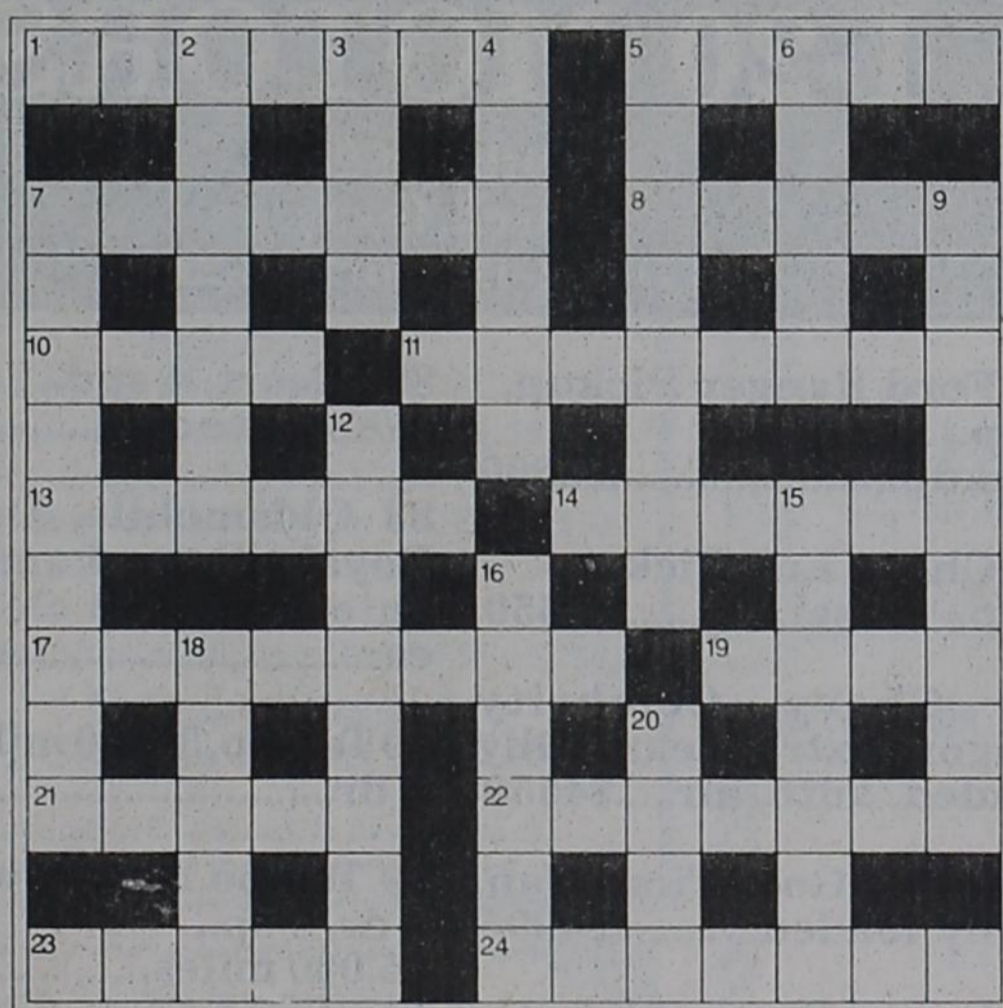
The speaker will be Dr. Ashley Lovell, Professor

Exercise is good "medicine" against diabetes. The New England Journal of Medicine reports on a study that showed at-risk men who exercise regularly could lower their chances of developing the disease.

New British study pinpoints folic acid - a B vitamin - as the supplement that greatly reduces the risk of serious neurological problems in babies, if it is taken from the time of conception.

Ultrasound waves, aimed through a "window" in the cast, seem to help fractures heal faster. Study at the University of Texas in San Antonio was reported to the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons.

Fluoride supplements taken by mouth offer real protection against cavities to children living in communities without fluoridated water, according to The American Academy of Pediatrics. It recommends continuing supplementation until a child is 16.

Low dietary levels of calcium and vitamin D may increase the risk of stroke, the Journal Circulation reported.

Employers Urged To Check Wage Reports

It's the time of year for us to remind employers who will soon be preparing their annual wage reports to carefully check them for accuracy before submitting them.

At the close of the calendar year, employers are responsible for submitting Form W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement) to SSA, and giving a copy to each employee. The W-2 information must be reported in a timely fashion and with the employee's correct name and Social Security number. Because all Social Security benefits are based on those earnings, this will ensure that workers and their families will one day receive the benefits they are due. Employers should

check wage reports carefully to be sure the name and Social Security number are correct for each employee. If there is an error, the employer should furnish the correct information to SSA by completing Form W-2c, (Statement of Corrected Income and Tax Amounts).

Employees are also urged to check their copy of the W-2 to make sure the correct name and Social Security number is shown and they should save their W-2s (for future reference in the event wage records need to be corrected.)

San Jacinto, Tarrant, Travis, Trinity, Walker, Wharton and Williamson counties were approved for federal disaster assistance in December.

Texans suffering flood damage in the designated counties may contact FEMA to apply for assistance by calling the agency's disaster hotline number at 1-800-462-9029.

"Federal authorities have moved promptly and, so far, efficiently to make the full range of federal assistance available to Texans who are bailing out their homes, their businesses and their lives," Gramm said.

"I intend to make sure that this quick response continues," he said.

RANDOM GERMAN Notes: Carts at supermarkets, terminals, etc. are returned where they're secured BECAUSE users put a Mark coin in a mechanism to release them AND retrieve their coin when they return the cart. Ingenious, huh?...And at the markets, bring your own bag; none are furnished; receipts are given and you take your purchases out, in your bag or your hands.

Weight restrictions must be severe on the autobahn, because you don't see the giant, long, multi-axled truck trailers we see here. You see many short versions, mostly Mercedes. And all cargo is either enclosed or tarped securely...While we were there, new laws went into effect lowering the speed limits during fog and drizzle.

TIME DIFFERENCE is 7 hours ahead; when it's 10 p.m. there, it's 3 here; and we had to remember that constantly as we kept in touch with our folks here and the office. AT&T over is good; other systems within Europe are complicated, expensive and unpredictable.

BONUS FIND: at the end of another major tour that wound through Austrian countryside and ski-havens, we stopped at Wieskirche, the Church of the Meadow, and it's a beauty. It is so unbelievably ornate, you wonder how worshippers keep their minds on the business at hand. But on the bright afternoon we were there, it was full of the faithful and tourists. It stands in an alpine meadow near Steingaden, with its yellow and white walls and steep red roof in vivid contrast to the dark backdrop of the nearby mountains. Architect Zimmerman was commissioned in 1745 to build the church on this spot, where, six years earlier, a local woman claimed to have seen tears running down the face of a picture of Christ. Although the church was dedicated as the Pilgrimage Church of the Scourged Christ, it is now known as the Wieskirche. It is Bavarian Rococo at its outstanding best. The simple exterior gives no hint of the lavish interior. The

tour buses unloaded in the meadow parking lot and the tourists walked up a lane flanked by barns, farm animals and plows, to approach the church. Entering, one is astonished by the complex oval plan animated by a series of brilliantly colored stuccos, statues and gilt. A luminous ceiling fresco sparks the decoration. The detailed choir and organ loft are wonders of gilt and color. It is an active church, and the parishioners and their priest recognize the importance of the building and gladly share it with the thousands of tourists who visit. Their treasury obviously benefits from the donations which are given and from the sale of post cards and other souvenirs as well as a snack booth on the grounds. Our tour guide insisted that the priest and the worshippers considered the visitors welcome guests to their beloved church. Story is that the architect who did this church and another elaborate Romanesque church nearby is buried in a plain dour, side chapel not far away.

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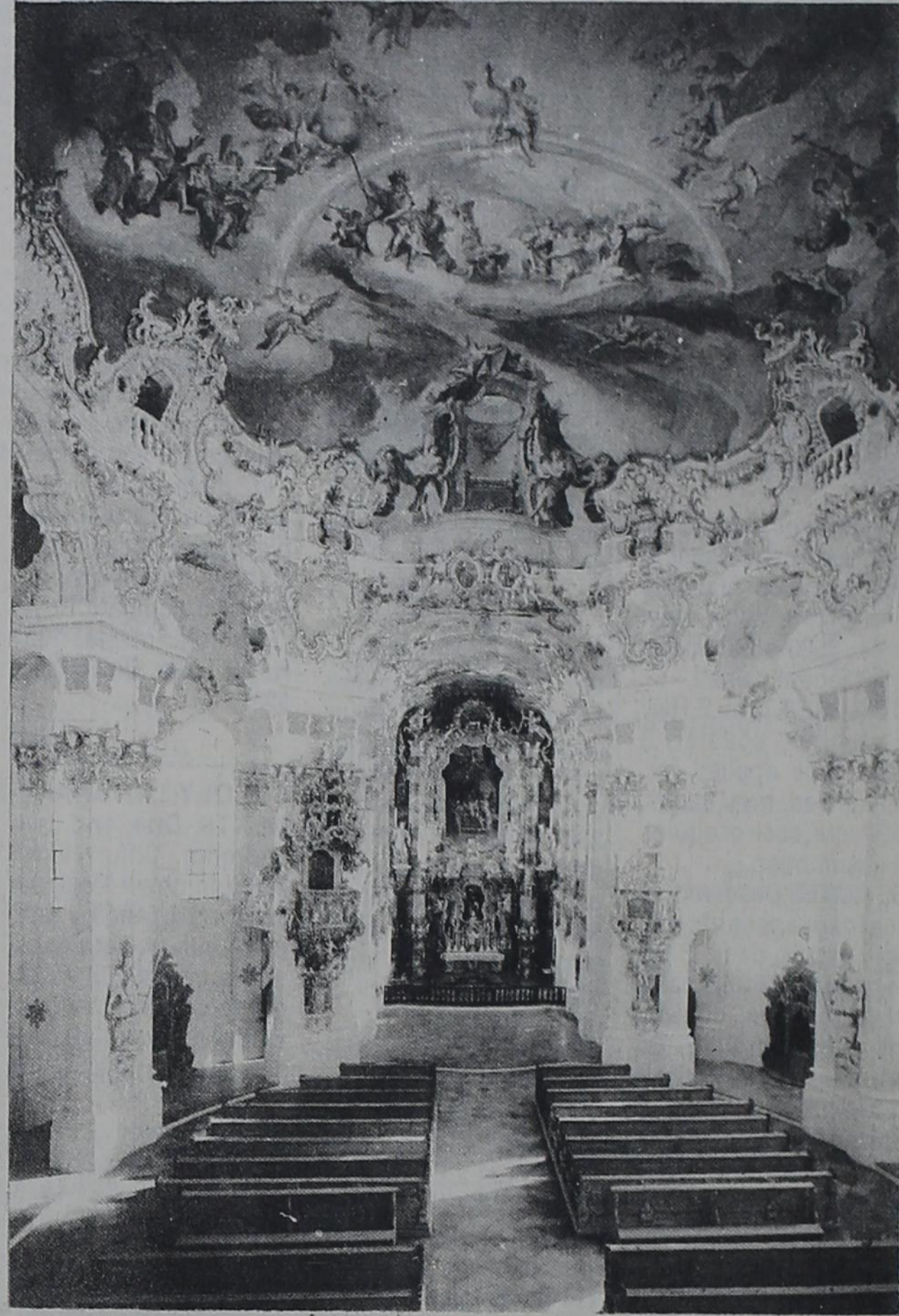
We were struck by the number natives who were visiting the church on that bright afternoon. A number of whole families were dressed in traditional German/Austrian costume, and we were told that it was their normal Sunday dress-up rather than for any other special event or celebration. Short, leather britches would take some getting used to, don't you think?

Later we trained from Garmisch, through beautiful alpine Mittenwald, Munich, Nuremberg to Bayreuth where

Gaynell learned that Amy had failed to give us the phone information necessary to get through to the post where they live. It took a kindly German matron type, who understood the predicament, and even though she spoke no English, took charge and enlisted a young lady who did, to accompany Gaynell to the post office, which is also the phone office, to make the connections.
