AS SOMETIMES happens, a piece of mail intended for someone else, found its way to our desk, and we decided you deserve to share the knowledge that the letter conveys. from one of the some 700 residents at the Abilene State School, we've forwarded it on to the whom it was written. The name of the letter writer has withheld. If it moves you, as us, you might want to write your own opinions. Here's the letter:

> DEAR MRS. Gov. Ann Richards Austin, Texas

We residents at the Abilene State School have a question which we wish you would ask your Facility Review Task Force. We understand that this Task Force appointed by you will by March 31 make the final recommendations about closing some of the state schools.

We know that a number of groups which are concerned with such matters has recommended that six of the state's 13 state schools be closed this decade.

They said that they do not believe that we are best served in segregated environments, such as institutions, where we are isolated from opportunities for the regular connections with everyday community life.

We understand that the groups making the recommendations included Advocacy Inc., the Association for Retarded tizens of Texas, the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Texas and American Disabled for Attendant Programs Today. They said that in closing state schools, money must be re-allocated to community services such as group homes or assisted-living This sounds like many of us would be moved into different environments, and it kinda scares us to think about that, Mrs. Governor.

Linda Parrish, head of your task force, says the disability-rights advocates' recommendations whould be weighed along with other advice. It is alright for us and others to give her our advice about the matter to be weighed, isn't it?

We hear that if the decision is to close, that the first two could be closed within three to four years.

We read that a Libby Doggett has said that the groups' dream would to close all 13 state schools provide community programs to suit all mentally retarded people. We know that a number of our folks believe that the state schools best meet our needs.

We understand that Mr. Fred president of the Parent Association for Retarded of Texas said, "We're the parents and the families of these people in the state schools, and we don't want them closed. We should have a choice."

The "closing group" recommends that the Travis State School in Austin and Fort Worth State School be closed Then Abilene State School, State School, Mexia State School and San Angelo State School also should be closed. Some are calling it a grand and modern plan.

This all sounds to us like a very drastic, complicated and disturbing program to take all of us out of the schools we are familiar with, and move us into new surroundings of some kind. And we have many concerns. Many of us could handle it. Some of us couldn't. And we fear the unknowns, about where would we Who would be in charge? would take care of us? Would more be expected of us that we can deliver?

So, our good and kind and sweet Mrs. Governor Richards, here's the question we want you to ask your task force, the one who'll make the final decision. Please ask them for

Ranger is centrally located on Interstate 20, a short distance from Fort Worth, or Abilene, and is a geographic natural location for one of your new facilities. The site that the city of Ranger is providing is an ideal one and easily accessible. Since the cost and convenience of transporting prisoners from all areas of the state to these proposed sites is of major importance to you, it is obvious that Ranger is a natural.

The degree of support, not only by the City of Ranger, but by all of Eastland County, was demonstrated by the large delegation, from all over the county, that met the site in spection team at the support of Ranger's bid.

The City of Ranger,

Texas, is among the 67 communities who have applied for one of the Department of Criminal Justice's new correctional facilities. Ranger and Eastland County are in my 65th Texas House District. I met with the department's site inspection team February 12th as they arrived at the Eastland County Airport for their inspection of the proposed Ranger site. The huge crowd, from not only Ranger, but the entire area, were indicative of the broad base of support for the location of a facility in Ranger. I spoke briefly, to the site inspection team, in support of the City of Ranger's bid for selection as the site for one of the new facilities. Senator Bob Glasgow also met with the inspection team in Ranger, at lunch, also voicing support of

Ranger's application. Ranger is extremely well situated, on Interstate 20, near the Fort Worth-Dallas area, as well as the Abilene and West Texas area. Since cost and convenience in transporting prisoner's are major factors, it is obvious that Ranger's location is a "natural" to be chosen for the location of one of the new facilities. Ranger, and the surrounding area, are totally committed, and supportive of the location of a

facility there. The economy of Ranger, Eastland County, and the entire area has suffered severely from the economically depressed condition of the agricultural and energy industries, and is in dire need of the kind of economic boost that the location of a new TDCJ facility would pro-

vide. Due to their local economy, Ranger is not able to provide huge economic incentives, above and beyond the actual property for the site and the necessary utility availability. Hopefully the decision will not rest on the provision of such economic incentive alone, but that location, practicality, available labor force, the site itself, and the economic need of the community will be deciding fac-

tors. Governor, I respectfully request your favorable consideration and necessary input in the final decision making process, that would designate Ranger, Texas, as the site for location of one of TDCJ's new correctional facilities.

nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to the one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

RETARDATION The following facts about mental retardation are from the Association for Retarded Citizens: One in 10

One of every 10 Americans has a family member who is mentally retarded, according to the ARC.

Three Percent are Mentally Retarded In the United States about three percent of the population, or more than 7 million individuals, will be identified as mentally retarded at some point in their lives, according to the ARC. Mental retardation is four times more common than rheumatic fever, nine times more

prevalent than cerebral palsy, and affects 15 times more people than blind-

> Causes of Mental Retardation

A condition that hinders or interferes with intellectual development before or during birth or in the early childhood years can be the cause of mental retardation, according to the ARC. Although more than 250 causes are known, these account for only one-fourth of all identified causes.

Institutional **Population Declines**

A growing number of people with mental retardation are now living in group homes and receiving community-based services, according to statistics of the ARC. The population of state institutions is decreasing at a rate of 5,00-6,000 per year. The number of residents in all state institutions has decreased from a peak of 194,650 in 1967 to 117,160 in 1982, a 40 percent drop, according to the ARC.

100,000 Annually Persons with mental retardation constitute one

of the largest disabled groups in America, according to the ARC. Each year some 100,000 babies and young children are born with or acquire the condition.

Little Difference About 89 percent of children and adults with mental retardation are mildly retarded and in many respects, quite similar to people without retardation, according to the ARC. They differ primarily in rate and degree of intellectual development.

People With Mental Retardation

Mental retardation cuts across the lines of race, educational, social and

economic background, according to the ARC. It can occur in anyone. In fact, hereditary components are known to account for only a fraction of the cases of retardation.

Causes of Mental Retardation

Malnutrition, German measles, glandular disorders and many other illnesses of a woman during pregnancy frequently result in the birth of a child with mental retardation, advises the ARC. Physical malformations of the brain or other organs originating in prenatal life may also result in retardation

What is glaucoma, who gets it, and how can it

Glaucoma is a slowly progressive disease of the eye which causes an elevation of the pressure inside the eye. This elevation of pressure slowly damages the nerve which supplies the eye, the so called "optic nerve." Glaucoma can occur in an otherwise healthy eye, and can cause a gradual loss of vision over many years.

Risk factors for the development of glaucoma include a family history of glaucoma, diabetes, whether insulin dependent or not, or hypertension (high blood pressure). Glaucoma has a tendency to run in families, however, it can skip generations in families and affect the grandchildren or great grandchildren of an

affected patient. Symptoms of glaucoma include a pain or aching in the eyes, excessive watering of the eyes, or absolutely no symptoms at all. Glaucoma can damage and even completely blind an eye with little or no symptoms at all. The loss of vision can occur so slowly that it is not perceived by the patient and usually begins in the peripheral or side vision. The disease slowly progresses until only a small central area of vision remains. Eventually,

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

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



Winter Of '92 Approaching Wettest On Record

One of the wettest Texas winters on record is causing serious problems for agriculture, particularly in Central and North Texas.

And there seems to be no let up in sight. Weather forecasts are calling for another 30 days of cool and wet conditions.

After an unusually soggy 1991 that ended with heavy December flooding in much of the state, 1992 has begun with more of the same.

George Bomar, a meteorologist for the Texas Water Commission and a weather historian, said the 22.73 inches of rain in Austin through February 5 marks the wettest winterever, dating since 1856 when records were first kept there.

The previous record, according to University of Texas figures, was 17.81 inches in 1913-1914. Winter is considered the period from December through February for with the Texas Agriculstatistical weather purposes.

Todd Swift, Extension agent in Blanco County in South Central Texas, said much grass is "just cardboard out there now."

Extension agents in West Central Texas and the Upper Coast have reported significant increases in calf fatalities because of increase disease and exposure.

On the Texas High Plains, up to 10 percent of 1991 cotton is still on the stalk because farmers could not harvest it, and Even businesses that 1992 plantings are being delayed.

Even in West Texas, where abnormally high rainfall hasn't caused as many problems as it has elsewhere, there are unusual difficulties. Wetconditions have contributed to more growth of toxic plants like loco weed and rattle weed, forcing ranchers to protect livestock by various management practices, said Dr. Alan McGinty, an Extension range specialist in Fort

There are a few bright spots. Subsoil moisture is good in the normally dry High Plains, leaving farmers anxious for topsoil to dry so they can plant. Producers there are optimistic about 1992 crops because the need to plant hasn't reached the critical stage it has in parts of Texas farther south, said Dr. James Supak, Extension agronomist in Lub-

Swift said the Hill Country is expecting a bumper crop of spring wildflowers, which is a major tourist attraction.

For suffering producers, some relief is available. The U.S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has approved 15 counties, primarily located between the Trinity and Colorado rivers, for the Emergency Conservation Program, which shares the cost of repair farmland damaged by natural disasters.

The counties include more then 625,000 acres on 2,865 farms, said Sammy C. Cook, state ASCS conservation program specialist.

LIVESTOCK MANAGEMENT WET WINTER CONDI-

TIONS - Many producers are concerned that their cattle look bad even though we have had a relatively mild winter up to this point. Research work on cold stress and its effect on cattle indicates that when considering cattle comfort and nutrient needs for maintenance, a wet hair coat on a 60 day is equivalent to a dry hair coat on a 32 day. If you consider this relationship, it becomes apparent that the wet weather is "taking its toll" on cattle this winter.

The wet conditions have also hurt the quality of dormant grass (standing dry forage) that many operations depend on to winter their cattle. Grass quality has been hurt in two ways: (1) by leaching nutrients and (2) by physical deterioration (rot and decay). As grass quality declines, intake is sup-

pressed and cattle have a more difficult time maintaining themselves.

At this point in time it is probably not critical to understand what has happened, but how to best finish the winter. Additional (extra) supplemental feed may or may not help. If you are already feeding an adequate to slight surplus amount of protein, additional feed will probably not help. This is because when protein needs are satisfied, energy is probably the limiting factor if weight loss is a problem. We cannot increase energy intake by feeding supplemental energy when cattle are on forage based diets.

Energy intake is regulated by quality of the forage; therefore, we must increase forage quality to increase energy intake. This can be accomplished by either moving cattle to better grass or changing to hay or other harvested forage that is better in

quality. We can also change the cattle to a concentrate based diet (majority of ration supplied from grain, protein sources, etc.); however, this is not an economically feasible alternative

in most cases. Remember that cow condition is important if you want a high breeding percentage. Study your situation and make adjustments that are dictated by your conditions.



Mistakes Financial Shortchange Focus You

Mistakes are part of learning, but they need not be disasters. Investing mistakes are no exception. Here are some of the most common investment mistakes and suggestions on how to avoid them.

Mistake number one is to hold only cash. Although cash or low-yielding, fixed-income investments might appear secure, they are actually losing value to inflation and missed opportunities in longterm investments. Prudent investors always maintain a reasonable amount of cash or readily available money-market funds. How much depends on comfort levels and individual needs. The mistake is holding too much cash and not letting it work for you.

Mistake number two is fear of taxes. Too often, rational investors throw money into a tax scam on the promise that they can "write it off." Be reasonable. If you earn \$100 and pay \$30 in taxes, you still have \$70 left to spend. If you "outsmart" the IRS and lose \$100, about the best you can reasonably hope for is to save \$30 in taxes when you "write it off."

Mistake number three is blindly looking for the highest yields. Be aware of current yields offered by securities similar in quality and maturity to those you want to buy. For example, if you want maximum safety for the next 10 years and AAA corporate bonds are offering about 9 percent, be suspicious of anything paying considerably more but promising equal security.

Mistake number four is buying invest-

ments you don't understand. Every investment is bought with the hope of future profit. The bigger the profit, however, the bigger the risk. Unfortunately, investments are sometimes sold by magnifying the possible rewards and ignoring the imminent risks. It is your responsibility to understand your investment enough to decide if it meets your needs and risk tolerances while offering a reasonable chance of achieving what it promises.

Mistake number five is buying and forgetting. Today's economy is in a constant state of change. Depending on current conditions, sound investments can quickly lose their favor. A complete annual investment review, along with regular monitoring, is recommended. When things begin to erode or fail to meet your expectations, don't ignore them.

Mistake number six is not admitting a mistake once you realize it. Investment mistakes are inevitable. Allowing them to compound without correction, however, is inexcusable. Re-evaluate your investment in light of what you now know. Would you still buy it? If your investment is not performing as you expect, limit your loss and get out.

The list goes on, but these six investment mistakes are the most common ones. Consider your own experience. Once a mistake is made, correct it and make every effort to avoid repeating it. But don't panic and stop investing. That's another mistake.
