TUESDAY BALLOTS OFFER MANY CHOICES

Super Tuesday comes to Eastland County this week as parties pick their nominees for the fall General Election.

Balloting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at 14 different sites in the county — nine Democratic and five Republican. (See locations in adjoining articles.)

And it's from the White House to the Precinct choices — with presidential aspirants, state, county and precinct races. The Democratic ballot offers 11 presidential hopefuls but Bob Kerrey pulled out of the fray Thursday. The Republican ballot offers Incumbent George Bush and four others.

Low Early Voting

Early voting (formerly absentee balloting) ended Friday at 5 and was reported lighter than usual, with some negative political watchers guessing that the populace is so unhappy with the economy, abuses and double-dealing in general, that they're staying away from the polls in droves. A better turn out is hoped for by the positive political watchers for Tuesday in-person voting.

In early voting, citizens chose their ballots; in person Tuesday, they'll decide which ballot they want and go to that respective site. You can't vote in both. There are few two-party, local races, so guesses are that voting will be traditionally heaviest in the Democratic

booths.

President Choices

David Duke, George Bush, Tannis Rogers, Patrick J. Buchanan, George A. Zimmermann and uncommitted are Republican Presidential choices. The Democrats will pick between Kerrey, George W. Bennis, Tom Harkin, Edmund G. Brown, J. Louis McAlpine, Lyndon H. LaRouche, Paul E. Tsongas, Tod Hawks, Rufus Higginbotham, Charles Woods and Bill Clinton.

Incumbent Democratic Rep. Charles Stenholm has a Republican challenger in Jeannie Sadowski of Eastland, and Incumbent Democratic State Sen. Bob Glasgow is challenged by Republican Jane Nelson of Lewisville.

County Races

Closer to home, the County Sheriff's race pits Ben Sancillo, Randy J. Moncrief and Ronnie (R.B.) White, on the Democratic ballot.

And also the county level, a race exists for County Commissioner, Precinct One (Eastland) where Danny Woods, W. E. (Bill) Sikes, Ken Lyerla and Don Sherman each seek the post now held by Richard Robinson who did not seek re-election.

Voters in Commissioners Precinct Three (Gorman, Carbon and Rising Star) will choose between Incumbent L. T. Owen and Dick Burgess for Commissioner.

In Eastland, Incumbent

Justice of the Peace Vernon Walker is challenged by Jack Graham on the Democratic ballot.

County-wide Democrats will choose between Incumbent County Democratic Chairman Mrs. Scott J. Bailey and Challenger June Tucker Hicks. In Gorman and Carbon, voters will choose between Dewey Keese and Lee Wood for Constable; in Rising Star, Howard (Gene) Hicks and Norman Chancellor are candidates for Constable; in Cisco, Bob Snyder, Truett Horton and Teddy J. Parrish seek the Constable's office.

Unopposed

Office holders without opponents are Judge Bob Dickenson, Judge Jim Wright, Tax Collector Nancy Trout and Constables Bill Harris and Cecil Cook.

Republicans will see a new uncontested name at their County Chairman's slot in Richard Watson, since Incumbent Jim Kaffer did not seek re-election.

The New District

A new name for the Democrats is that of John Cook for the office of State Representative, District 60. The Republican ballot offers Pete Lynch for the same office. Eastland County will be moved to District 60 next year. Bob Turner presently represents this county.

Limited Terms

The Republican ballot offers a FOR or AGAINST

proposition to change the Constitution to provide for terms limitations for six, eight, or twelve years, depending on the office.

This isn't the first time for such a high mark in the national ranking. Mr. And Mrs. Dobbins Celebrate Anniversary

Ira Jenkins Dobbins and Lena Mae Overand were wed in Ranger Feb. 26, 1922.

Ira, 92, was born to the late Albert and Mollie Dobbins Sept. 23, 1899, four miles south of Strawn. Lena, 87, was born to the late Isaac and Emma Overand Dec. 20, 1904, in Dallas.

When I.J. and Lena met he lived in the Gourdneck Community, south of Strawn, and she lived in the Tiffin Community, northeast of Ranger. They have made their home in Cisco since 1934, having first moved to Cisco in 1932 for a brief period. Other places of residences were Ranger, Putnam, Baird and Corsicana.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

In as much as Mr. Lacy has directed his latest insinuation and attacking letter toward myself, apparently forgiving and forgetting my two opponents, I wish to take a couple of moments to reflect on his ambiguous and ill-researched piece of literature.

In as much as only two to three weeks ago Mr. Lacy was spouting condemnation of our American voting system, and firmly stating he would vote a blank ballot, I am reassured to know he is now going to cast a vote. This kind of pragmatic decision making, I understand, has been displayed by him in his "too numer-

ous to mention" prior Letters to the Editor, on "too numerous to mention" issues which have caught his attention. I am somewhat concerned about his self appointment as the voters' consciousness in Eastland County.

Now as to his immediate fixation on military records, Mr. Lacy called me at my home, uninvited, a man I had not at that time, nor have I yet, ever set eyes on, and began asking questions. In trying to be courteous, perhaps I did not make myself clear, what part of "no" do you not understand, Mr. Lacy. Now in judging my character against my military serv-

ice 20 years ago, I answered the questions necessary for an informed voter to draw a conclusion. I served in the United States Marine Corps, I served during the Viet Nam conflict, and I was discharged under honorable conditions. Past that Mr. Lacy who I choose to swap "war stories" with is my own choosing, and you sir did not make that list.

Now as to why I am now not serving as a peace officer. After having served well over a year in undercover narcotics, away from my family weeks at a time, I promised my wife that when my narcotics tour was over, I would either seek an administrative position, or enter private business. As no admint position, that would be worth moving my family for, was available, we chose to move home and open our own business. Nothing more Mr. Lacy,

as I understand you were told by the Chief of Police in Stephenville.

In answer to your next ill-researched paragraph, Mr. Lacy, no on's case should ever be termed "minor." Every case reported, especially to the individual making the report, is as "major" as the next, your kind of thinking indicates a total lack of knowledge about a properly new law enforcement dept. As to you blaming the voters of Eastland County for D. Hogan, that's the most assinine of all. By voting for Hogan the voters by no means gave him permission to engage in criminal activity. You want to blame someone blame Hogan. As for the current administration they have big enough crosses to bare from their own past record. I don't believe Hogan plays a part. As for not knowing what was going on, and if they did, doing nothing does not conotate life or

death. That would be like watching someone drown. It does however, show a direct violation of a law enforcement officers oath no matter what the consequences. If that in fact is what happened the decision to condemn or overlook should be up to the courts, or that individual, again Mr. Lacy you didn't make the list.

Now I have expressed my feelings on your letter. I want to assure you I will not again bother this paper or any other with answers to your inflammatory fan mail. I anxiously await your next crusade. As well as when elected the opportunity to serve you and the entire citizenry of Eastland County.

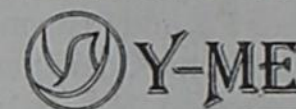

A DOCUMENTARY HISTORY OF YONKERS, NEW YORK, Volume One: The Formative Years, 1820-1852 by Joseph P. Madden.

While a member of the

Yonkers Historical Society, the author discovered that many documents relating to early Yonkers history were scattered throughout the area, wasting away. He determined to try to rescue these records from oblivion, and in 1974 was instrumental in the creation of the Yonkers Preservation Committee, dedicated to finding these documents. Many documents were discovered, but no central location could be found for their preservation. Consequently the author decided to transcribe the records that were in his possession, resulting in this informative new work.

This first volume focuses on the early years in Yonkers, during which the town began its evolution from a strictly agrarian community to a more urban, industrial area. About half of this volume illustrates the transformation from several vantage points; the demographics of the area, politics and government, and the economy. The author examines the causes and effects of the socio-economic and political changes in great detail. The epilogue discusses this period in the history of the state and nation as well.

The rest of this volume is dedicated to transcriptions of the records held by the author. These include entries from the earliest existing town record book as well as

separate documents related to the era. The record book transcriptions consist of accounts of credits and debits to the town's treasury from 1820 to 1829 and the minutes of meetings, lists of officials, and decisions made at the town meetings from 1820 to 1852. Associated documents interspersed throughout the town records deal with such subjects as: strays, road warrants, commissioner's reports, lists of jurors, and school district reports. A few of the scarce records that predate 1820 are also included.

One chapter is dedicated to a listing of the Yonkers residents named in the documents, along with a few other individuals who do not appear in the records but have a strong link to Yonkers. This section provides such information as occupation, family relationships, positions held, census records, and references to other sources in which the person may be mentioned. CONTROLLING AQUATIC VEGETATION

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission voted to approve the use of Triploid grass carp on a permit basis for the control of vegetation in private ponds or tanks.

"The Triploid grass carp is not a cure for all aquatic vegetation problems," according to James T. Davis, Fisheries Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. They will eat most submerged vegetation, but like any grazing animal, prefers some plants over others.

For information over regulations and license for use of Triploid grass carp, contact the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission or the Eastland County Extension Service.

COASTAL FERTILIZATION TIPS

For hay production, here are some points to consider:

1. Harvesting and production costs are high, therefore enough forage must be produced to justify hay harvest.

2. A minimum of 50 to 60 lbs. of actual nitrogen

per acre should be applied to those acres fertilized. This may mean fertilizing less acres or reducing the number of applications during the growing season.

3. Timing of the nitrogen applications is extremely important for efficient utilization by the grass. Do not apply too early. Night temperatures must be consistently above 60 F for bermudagrass to grow rapidly. It may be desirable to remove the early spring flush of growth before apply nitrogen.

4. For soils medium or above in phosphorus and potash, these nutrients may not be needed for one year. A minimum rate of phosphorus and potash can be applied, especially if the total amount of nitrogen for the year is being reduced.

Stage of growth at harvest greatly affects the percent or concentration of protein in the grass. For highest protein, harvest hay before it begins to mature. Protein quality necessary to meet specific livestock requirements is determined by production of cows and age of young animals at time forage is to be fed. High yields can be made from the same rate of nitrogen by delaying harvest.

Deciding how to fertilize coastal bermudagrass for grazing only is more difficult than for hay. In most instances a combination of hay and grazing

will bring about the most efficient utilization of applied nitrogen.

Where coastal fertilization for grazing is being considered, keep these points in mind:

1. Do not apply nitrogen too early. Allow the spring growth to be grazed off.

2. Controlled or rotational grazing is important to utilize forage efficiently. Animals prefer grazing that portion of a pasture which has been fertilized.

3. Time the nitrogen applications to produce forage when needed.

4. Minimum nitrogen rates should be about the same as for hay. Phosphorus and potash may not be needed unless the soil is very low in these nutrients.

For those producers who have increased livestock numbers, hence high stocking rates by fertilization, the decision may be between reducing livestock numbers and minimum fertilization to support the remaining livestock.

A small business normally able to meet its bills and pay its operating expenses, but cannot do so now as a direct result of the disaster, may be eligible for an economic injury loan. The loans, however, are not to cover physical losses. The filing deadline for economic injury assistance is September 28, 1992. 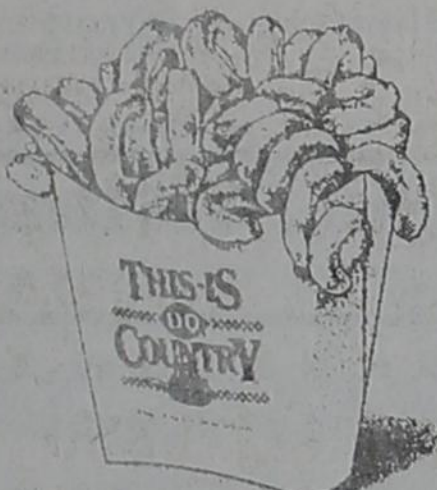

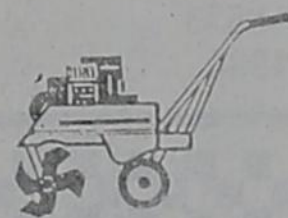



4 tsp. grated lemon peel
1 c. buttermilk
1/2 tsp. vanilla
4 eggs
GLAZE:
1 c. powdered sugar
1 to 2 tbsp. lemon juice
Heat oven to 325 degrees. In large mixer bowl combine all cake ingredients. Beat at low speed, scraping bowl often, until all ingredients are moistened. Beat at high speed, scraping bowl often, until smooth (1 to 2 min.). Pour into greased and floured 12 cup BUNDT pan or 10" tube pan. Bake for 55 to 65 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 mins.; remove from pan. Cool completely. In small bowl stir together powdered sugar and lemon juice until smooth. Drizzle over cake. YIELD: 1 cake.

Fatty foods may lower the sex drive in men, a study at the University of Utah suggests. After a high-fat milkshake, testosterone levels dropped 30 percent; a low-fat shake had no such results.

Scientists at Washington University in St. Louis have been able to turn muscle into bone. Working with rats, they developed a technique that may some day help doctors repair bone defects in humans caused by accidents, diseases or even treatment of tumors.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS HEARINGS SCHEDULED

AUSTIN—Public hearings on proposed 1992 hunting and fishing regulations have been added for two Texas towns, increasing the number of early March hearings to 44.

The additional hearings are scheduled for March 4 at the Jackson County Courthouse in Edna and for March 5 in the District Courtroom at the Cherokee County Courthouse in Rusk. All public hearings begin at 7 p.m.

The hearings are scheduled six weeks earlier this year. The earlier schedule will allow the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission ample time to add last minute changes.

Final decisions on pro-

posed regulations will be made during the March 26 commission meeting, scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. in the Commission Hearing Room. All approved regulations will go into effect Sept. 1, except the proposed prohibition on the use of gill, trammel and hoop nets in public freshwater. If passed, it will become effective Sept. 1, 1993.

RAY ROBERTS: Water murky, 51 degrees, 3 feet high; black bass are fairly good to 8 1/2 pounds on spinners; crappie slow; white bass are slow; catfish are slow due to lack of fishermen; only boat ramp open is the temporary one on east on FM 3002 and south FM3442.

RICHLAND-CHAMBERS: Water murky, 56 degrees, 1 foot above normal level; black bass are slow this week, over the weekend several bass in the 8 pound range were caught on spinners and lizards; all other fishing is slow; high winds and nearly 5 inches of rain this week have kept most fishermen at home. A weekend tournament produced good numbers of bass on spinners and lizards the winner had 27.12 pounds while the 11th place had 20.50 pounds with five fish.

AMISTAD: Water clear and rough, 55 degrees, 8 feet above normal level;

black bass are fair to 8 pounds on black and purple worms and spinners; striped are improving to 20 pounds on chartreuse Bananahed jigs; crappie are fair up the Devils River on minnows; white bass are fairly good up the Pecos and in Zorro and Caballo on white and chartreuse slabs and minnows; catfish are scattered in 20 to 100 feet of water and are caught on cheese bait and worms.

FALCON: Water clear, 68-70 degree water temperature, 1 foot above conservation level; black bass are slow in the 8-9 pound range on spinners and model 700 Bombers in fire tiger colors; striped are fairly good to 15 pounds on Rattle Traps; crappie are slow; white bass are fair to good to 1 1/2 pounds at Veleno Creek and the Rio Grande; catfish are excellent to 2 pounds in 15 to 25 feet of water.

GRANBURY: Water stained, 47 degrees, normal level; black bass are slow to 4 pounds on spinners; striped are slow; crappie are fairly good on minnows in the creek channels; white bass are

beginning to run up the river around Tintop; catfish are very good to 6 1/2 pounds on Mr. Whiskers Catfish Bait.

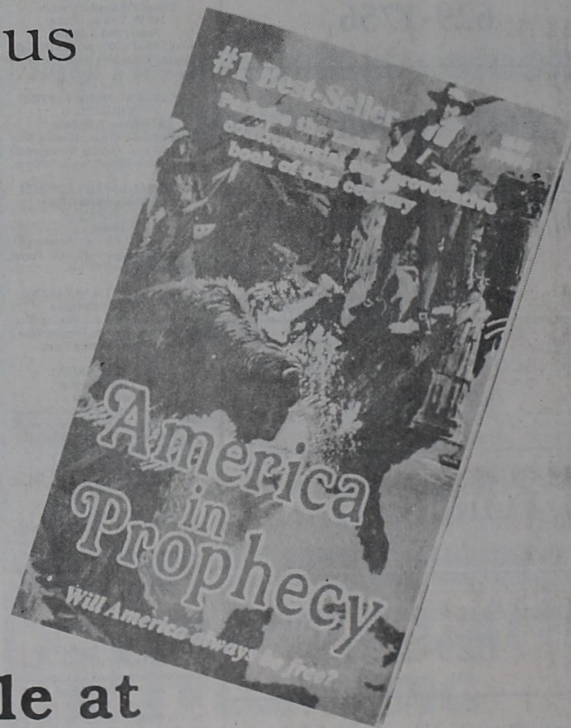
