

THURSDAY, MAY 5, will be our country's thirty-first consecutive National Day of Prayer. It is an occasion that Americans should note.

Observances of a national day of prayer date back to 1775, when the Continental Congress declared the first one. Other such days followed for several years. Through the succeeding decades other national days of prayer were declared from time to time until 1952, when, by joint action, the two houses of Congress established the custom of a national day of prayer on an annual basis. By this action, the nation's Chief Executive was instructed to set aside one such day each year.

The National Day of Prayer for 1983 will come on May 5, and plans are under way to observe it on the national, state and local levels. A national "celebration of prayer" is scheduled for Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C. Governors and many mayors have been alerted to the National Day of Prayer and asked to initiate appropriate activities in their own areas of influence.

Churches, synagogues and public buildings are being asked to cooperate by ringing their bells at noon on May 5 as a reminder of the day and as a call to united prayer. On an individual basis, Americans are being encouraged to observe the National Day of Prayer in ways appropriate to their own traditions.

In particular, all citizens are being asked to "Take 5 at 12" -- to take at least five minutes at noon, wherever they happen to be, to thank God for the blessings we enjoy, including our freedom itself, and to ask God's continued blessing on our nation in the days ahead.

We hope that Americans of all faiths will respond strongly to the National Day of Prayer appeals, and especially to the call for "5 (minutes) at 12" on May 5. All things considered, there may never have been a time when we had more to be thankful for, yet more need for God's help and guidance.

Commission Ponders Dump Site Problem

Further discussion concerning the dump ground in the Lazbuddie precinct was held at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court on April 11. The court reviewed estimates for different methods of handling the project, and is attempting to find the most economical way of accomplishing what is required by the Texas Department of Health.

Two bids were received on the truck advertised for sale by Precinct 4. After reviewing the bids, it was decided to reject both bids as being too low.

A motion was passed approving the articles of incorporation for the County Industrial Development Corporation.

A bill was approved in the amount of \$469.15, for the testing of a prisoner, to determine his fitness to stand trial.

Motion was approved to pay the boarding care bills for county foster children in the amount of \$2,142.10, which amount will be reimbursed to

the county. Sheriff Bill Morgan asked the court to have some shelves built in the jail storeroom for better storage. Motion

was passed to have the shelves built, at an estimated cost of \$465. Approval was given to pay attorney

Richard Collard \$188 as attorney ad item for a juvenile hearing. The court approved paying

Energas of Littlefield a total of \$2,150 for moving of gas lines on proposed Farm to Market Road 3333. Benna Felts, county treasurer,

presented the quarterly report of county finances. Motion was passed approving the report with the stipulation that it be published in the county's three newspapers.

Bonds were received for the county deputies and dispatchers and a reserve deputy. These were approved by the commissioners.

Purchase of an IBM typewriter for the County Clerk's office was approved. This was a budgeted item.

Soil conservation work was approved subject to availability of machinery for the following farmers: Davy Carthel, Donald Christian, Franse Irrigation, Kirby Burch, Jimmie Dale Seaton, Marvin Mimms, Wayne Clark and Bart Burnett. Those involved will reimburse the county for the work performed.







We understand a large crate of the critters can really make music when someone is demonstrating how to milk and de-vein them. People in this area who live there think of the snakes as being another meat for their deep freezes as we would a beef or a pork

The people not only enjoy good eating from the meat but either sell the skins or make articles of belts, key rings, or a variety of things that sell real well. The fangs and bones are also used to make necklaces and all types of jewelry for men or women, and for lots of other things.

Anyway, as it was, there was a crate beside the Coke machine about a 2x5 foot box and about two or three feet deep that was filled with rattlesnakes. 
Field Day Set May 26

The Annual Wheat Field Day at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland will be held at 1 p.m. on May 26, according to Dr. Paul Unger, acting director. "Everybody is invited to see the latest research on profitable production of wheat," Unger said.

In addition to observing the small grain plots, visitors will be shown research projects on cropping systems, weed control, irrigation, limited tillage and wind energy. Latest methods of spray application will be discussed.

All arrangements for the event will be under the direction of Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station small grain breeder. Speakers at the various stops on the tour will include Dr. Frank Petr, area agonomist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; and Dr. David Worrall and Gary Peterson, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station wheat researchers from Vernon and Bushland.

Dr. Porter said, "Since releasing TAM 105 wheat three years ago, we have been developing new wheat lines that have even better yield potential. This will be the first opportunity for people to view the new wheats," he concluded.



An allowance gives the manage money and introduces the youngster to living within a regular income.

The amount of an allowance can depend on several factors including the child's stage of development, the family income, and the number of kinds of expenses the allowance is expected to cover. More money to spend does not lead to greater learning.

The amount finally decided upon should be large enough to cover expenses for which the youngster is responsible, and include some money to spend as he

Children soon learn that wishes. The amount also should be small enough to require that the child make choices.

As the child makes choices about how to spend his allowance, parents have a chance to serve as consumer educators. For example, television advertisers continually try to attract a child's attention and promote brand consciousness. But parents can talk with a child about his specific needs and wants, product quality, and the trade-offs involved in buying

one product over another. Giving a child an allowance will not necessarily teach him or her to be an effective consumer, however. As parents, we must set a good example and then supervise and communicate with our children concerning money management.


