Carbon

City Council-The only contested race pits Kenneth "Bubba" Knowles against incumbent Betty Greer for Place 4. Mayor Kenneth W. Halford and Place 2 incumbent Truman Bryant are unopposed.

Cisco

Mayor-Joe Wheatley is seeking re-election. City council-James Hinman is the lone candidate for Place One, and incumbent Jerry Jeffcoat is uncontested for Place Two.

School board-Incumbent Rick Roark is uncontested for Place One. For Place Two, incumbent Bruce Stovall faces a challenge from John Gonzales. Candidates for Place Three are Bob Snyder and John Gerhardt.

College board-Only one of four positions up for election is contested. Eddie McMillian, who was appointed to Place Three, faces a challenge from Melvin Wende to keep the post. Jim Puryear, Brad Kimbrough and Dick Wolley are unopposed for Places Seven, Eight, and Nine respectively.

School board-Five people are vying for two at-large seats. They are Herb Collins, Judi Butler, Nanette Goldston, Earl Wright and Steve Campbell.

Strawn

Mayor-Incumbent Gordon S. Thomason faces challenges from Paul Stephens II and J.D. Sublett.

City council-Running for two aldermen seats are incumbent L.C. "Chuck" Williams, Fred A. Brown and incumbent Margaret A. Price.

Tidemarks 1990-91 School District Budgets In Baird

In 1990-91 school trustees budgeted 30 percent more for operating high schools than for elementary sites. Statewide an average of \$3,280 per student was budgeted for high schools, \$2,645 for the 1,073 middle schools, and \$2,543 per child for the 3,594 elementary schools in Texas. In addition, \$1,014 per student was budgeted for the central office.

For the Ranger ISD the figures were \$4,961.52 for high schools, and \$26.32 for middle schools, \$2,232.49 for the elementary while \$1,080.54 per student was budgeted for the central office.

The figures come from a new report **Tidemarks 1990-91 School Campus Budgets in Texas**, a publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

The report also lists the amounts for direct classroom instruction. The statewide averages were \$2,366 per student for high schools, \$1,965 for middle schools, and \$2,030 for elementary campuses. For the Ranger

ISD the comparable figures were \$3990.10 for high schools, and \$2,115.17 for elementary grades.

The report is designed to provide reference points for site-based committees and the taxpaying public to evaluate future school budgets by types of campuses and for individual high school sites.

Excluding small single-campus schools, there are 1,059 high schools in Texas ranging in size from 83 schools with less than 100 students to seven campuses with more than 3,000 students. For these high schools, \$2,328 was budgeted per student for classroom instruction, or 72.3 percent of the \$3,221 per student for total operating expenses. Locally, Ranger High School had \$3,990.10 for classroom instruction and \$4,961.52 for total current operating expenses.

The Ranger High School had \$325.88 per student for school administration, \$450.56 for co-curricular activities including extra curricular, \$0 for guidance and counseling, and \$7.88 per pupil for plant maintenance.

The legislature provided in HB 2885 for site-based decisions relating to goal setting, curriculum, budgeting, staffing patterns, and school organization. Proponents contend that school boards and superintendents should grant greater latitude to campus level educators in exchange for an initial promise of more productive educational services for the students.

While there is little evidence to indicate that by itself school-based management will improve student achievement, as a management tool in the right hands, the report concludes that it may be helpful.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS APPROVE RESOLUTION FOR RANGER PRISON

Eastland County Commissioner Monday approved a Resolution supporting a Prison Proposal for Ranger, in Pct. 2 of Eastland County.

The vote was unanimous, and came shortly after the request was brought to the Court by Councilman Delbert Cozart and Ranger Mayor Ronnie Ainsworth.

Cozart noted that the County Commissioners had previously sent a letter of support. But now that the Ranger site was on the "short list" for consideration by the Texas Dept. of Criminal Justice further support was needed from County officials.

Mayor Ainsworth and Cozart invited all officials and other interested citizens to attend a public hearing at the Ranger High School Cafeteria at 7 P.M. March 30. This meeting will be monitored by the TDCJ, and could make a big difference in whether Ranger gets the prison.

On a related matter, Mayor Ronnie Ainsworth requested that the County give permission for the City of Ranger to cross and parallel County Rd. 469 (northeast of Ranger) with a wastewater line.

Ainsworth explained that although 469 is designated as a County road, the City has a sewer plant there and takes care of the road.

There are problems with the old sewer line, Ainsworth said, and this new one should help in the efforts to get a Prison.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that the Court could grant tentative approval at this meeting and ratify it at the next meeting.

Ainsworth said the efforts of the Court were appreciated very much.

On another matter, Tammy Weiser discussed rural road matters. Mrs. Weiser lives in Pct. 4, in the Scranton area southwest of Cisco.

She requested that County Rd. 137 be added to the list of roads on a petition for an FM road in that vicinity. She said four miles of Rd. 137 are almost impassable. A tin horn is coming off the road in one place, she said, and in a recent rain the water backed up and flooded her home. It ran two feet over the top of a fence nearby.

"It's a sad road," she said. "It's not been maintained - there are big holes in it. Unless the road is built up high and maintained it will always be a problem."

Comm. 4 Reggie Pittman agreed that this road needed work, but said they had started grading on it and would continue making repairs. He said this was a road "We took over from L. T. Owen (Pct. 3) when we changed Districts."

He also said: "It would tickle me to death to get an FM Rd. anywhere we could!"

County Judge Bailey remarked that it rained over 4 inches in less than an hour in part of the Scranton area in early March.

"We need to get our Disaster Designation extended past Jan. 14," the Judge said.

On another agenda item, Judge Bailey informed the Court that a Tax Lien of \$63,409.92 had surfaced on the old Blackwell Hospital in Gorman and had been sent to County Auditor Ray Pruitt.

Eastland County assumed all assets and liabilities of the bankrupt Blackwell Hospital and the South Eastland County Hospital District about a year ago.

Ray Pruitt told the Commissioners that lawyers were studying the situation as to whether the County would be liable for this tax. A report will be forthcoming.

On a court matter, Assistant District Attorney Bill Dowell requested that the Commissioners consider hiring an interpreter for County Court. Dowell explained that the individual the Court had used previously (part time) was no longer available.

He indicated an interpreter would be in the interest of justice and also might save the county time and money.

"On Spanish-speaking individuals in County Court, we cannot adjudicate on a plea without proper interpretation," he said. "There is also a possibility of a longer trial."

A retainer fee of \$75 per month was suggested. Usually an interpreter is not needed more than 10 hours per month, Dowell said.

The Court agreed to consider the matter in the new budget.

On jail matters - Sheriff Ronnie White reported that the annual State Jail inspection would be on April 30.

He said he had one cell destroyed recently. An inmate ripped bunk off the wall and shorted out an electrical system and started a fire.

"This won't affect the inspection unless we get overpopulated," Sheriff White assured the court. Comm. Reggie Pittman

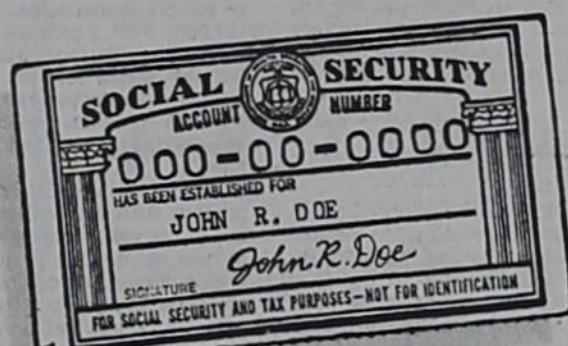

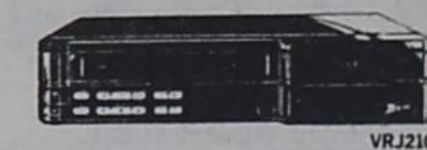

TxDOT Provides Grant Programs

Grant programs to provide vehicles for the transportation of the elderly and disabled and to provide transportation for the general public are two functions of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) not widely known to most Texans.

TxDOT has been designated to administer these programs in Texas on behalf of the Federal Transportation Administration.

Brownwood District Engineer Wes Heald said that the program to help purchase vans for the elderly and disabled has been operational in this area since 1976, with 17 vans currently in service. "These vehicles are operated for the benefit of the people by organizations such as the May Senior Citizens and the New Horizons Ranch of Goldthwaite," Heald said.

This grant program for the elderly and disabled is funded under the Federal Transit Act of 1964. Grants are available to private nonprofit organizations for the purchase of vehicles to transport elderly and/or disabled persons. Twenty percent

of the cost of the vehicle is paid by the private nonprofit organization. The Federal share of the program is the remaining 80 percent.

Tamara Swan, public transportation coordinator of the Brownwood District of TxDOT, said the first purchase was two vans in 1976 for the Brown County Association for Retarded Citizens. The association currently operates these same vans plus two mini-busses.

Since that time, the following purchases have been made: two vans by the Brownwood Chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons for use by the Camp Bowie Senior Citizen Center; two vans for Bethphage Community Services, which operates two residential group homes in Brownwood; a station wagon and seven vans for the New Horizons Ranch in Goldthwaite; and a van for the May Senior Citizens Center.

As an example of how these vehicles are utilized, the May Senior Citizens van, purchased in 1985, is used to transport senior citizens from their homes in the May area to the center. The van enables senior citizens to travel to the center to participate in group activities such as crafts, gospel singing, games, and exercise programs that they might otherwise miss.

The main purpose of the center, however, is nutrition. The van is also used for traveling to Brownwood to collect noon meals at the mother center in the Camp Bowie area, and return to the May center. Diana Gilbert, site manager, drives the 12-passenger van about 125 miles three times a week to coincide with the days the center is open and to transport a client to the Janie Clements Center. The van is used on field trips to other towns or for dining out. Once a year a bluebonnet tour is made to the Hill Country.

The second public transportation program, which is for the general use of all citizens, is to provide rural area residents access to transportation for health care, education, shopping, employment, and recreation. "This program provides transportation for all, not just the elderly and disabled," Swan said.

The transportation program for the general public is federally funded at 80 percent capital and administrative costs with 50 percent for operating expenses, based on the net operating cost. Eligible to apply for the grant are regional councils of government, community action agencies, city govern-

ments, and local nonprofit organizations.

Currently there are 43 vehicles in this program which have been funded within the Brownwood district, all operated by the Hill Country Community Action Association with headquarters in San-

Saba. "This is the third largest rural transportation system in Texas," Swan said.

Children, ACU Alumni Invited To Participate In ACU's Aggie Club Rodeo

Bareback riding, barrel racing, a calf scramble and such kids' events as a stick horse race and goat-tail tying will be included in the April 2 Abilene Christian University Aggie Club All-School Rodeo at the Taylor County Fairgrounds.

All current and former ACU students are invited to participate, and children's events are open to the public, said Wes Sullivan, Aggie Club president.

The annual event, which begins at 6:30 p.m., is sponsored by the ACU Aggie Club, the Students' Association, the university's intramural department and through generous donations by area merchants and friends. ACU students can receive intramural points for all men's and women's events except bull riding.

A barbecue is tentatively planned for Nelson Park, Sullivan said.

The events are:

*Bareback riding (men's buckle event) - The contestant must ride for eight seconds without touching himself, the equipment or the horse with his free hand.

*Goat dressing (women's team event) - A team of four contestants must catch a goat at the end of the arena, dress the goat, and bring it across the finish line.

*Stick-horse race (ages 3-7, must bring own stick-horse) - Contestants must stay aloft their steed until crossing the finish line.

*Calf scramble (women's team event) - A team of three contestants must catch and halter a calf at the end of the arena and then return with the calf across the circle of

mid-arena.

*Goat-tail tying (ages 7-12) - The contestant must catch a haltered goat, untie a ribbon on its tail and cross the finish line.

*Steer saddling (men's team event) - A team of four contestants must travel to mid-arena with a steer then one must ride the steer back across the finish line with assistance from team members.

*Barrel racing (women's buckle event) - The contestant must complete a figure around all three barrels. A five second penalty will be added to the time for every barrel overturned.

*Chute dogging (men's buckle event) - The contestant must allow a steer to travel 10 feet, then must throw the steer onto its side or back.

*Goat tying (women's team event) - A team of three contestants must catch a goat, throw it to the ground, and tie three of the goat's legs together with a pigging string. The legs must remain tied for eight seconds.

*Team roping (team buckle event) - A team of two contestants must rope a steer, one by the horns and the other by the back two legs. They will receive a 10-second penalty for breaking the barrier and a five-second penalty for catching only one hind leg.

*Three-legged relay

race (women's team event) - A team of four contestants is divided into two pairs. One pair begins at the starting line, runs to the second team pair and makes contact. The second pair then returns to the starting line.

*Team branding (men's team event) - Three men must catch a calf and throw it across a designated line after branding it "ACU" with duct tape.

*Bull Riding (men's buckle event) - The contestant must ride for eight seconds without touching himself, the equipment or the bull with his free hand.

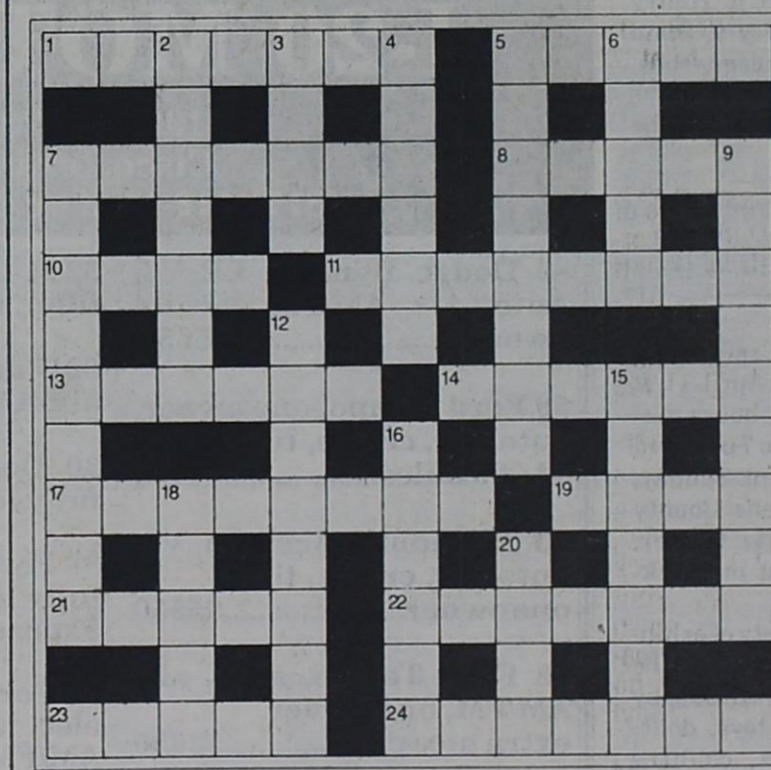

Reception Planned Usserys Moving To Oregon

Eastland is losing two notable citizens-I.W. and Rozelle Ussery. The Usserys are moving to Albany, Oregon in April.

There will be a Farewell Reception for the Usserys in the Fellowship room of the First United Methodist Church, 204 Mulberry, Eastland on Sunday, March 29 from 2-4 p.m. The Suzannah Wesley Class, Martha Dorcas Class and the Friendship Sunday School Classes will be hostesses for the event.

All who would like to wish the Usserys well are invited to attend. The Usserys speak of the move with mixed feelings, for they have strong ties to Eastland County. They spent their early years here, and moved back in 1978.

The career of I.W. (Weldon) Ussery has spanned a number of years and continents. He has served as a teacher, engineer and consultant-he speaks eight languages and has tremendous knowledge of international affairs.

In Eastland the Usserys have been active in Church and Community affairs. I.W. Ussery has taught a Sunday School class at the First United Methodist Church since he came here.

"We have moved 34 times during our married life and this is the hardest one," Mrs. Ussery remarks. "But we do feel it is time to go."

Among other considerations the move to Oregon will give the Usserys a chance to live near some of their grandchildren. Their daughter Suzette Boydston, her husband John and their two children will be close by.

Others of the Ussery family reside in Washington, D.C. and in New Jersey. They are: Mary and Steve Cline and two children, and William J. and Carol Ussery and four children.

Besides eight grandchildren, the Usserys have three great-grandchildren.

I.W. Ussery was born southeast of Carbon and attended schools there. He attended John Tarleton College in 1929-30, and later in the summers while he taught school.

He was High school principal at Scranton in 1931-33, and principal of Cottonwood Common School for two years after that.

He married Rozelle Pippin of Cisco, February 14, 1935. Rozelle came from a pioneer Eastland County family who had settled west of Cisco.

In 1936 the Usserys moved to Odessa, where I.W. was employed by American Manufacturing Company, Broderick and Calvert and Gulf Refining company until 1947.

But this was only the beginning of their adventures. In 1948 I.W. joined Fish Engineering Co. as Pipeline Construction Manager. Later he was a Division Engineer during the construction of the Transcontinental Gas Pipeline System.

In 1958 Ussery went to Venezuela, where he was employed as Chief Inspector with TECNOTUBERIAS, C.A. In 1960 he was assigned by Shell Oil Corp. to a project in Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, where he resided with his family until joining Brown and Root, Inc. in 1961. He was

assigned to duty in the Middle East as Project Engineer.

In 1964 Ussery was joined by his wife and youngest daughter in Teheran, Iran, where he served as area Representative for Brown and Root.

Early in his service in the Middle East, Ussery became involved in a labor uprising in Abu Dhabi. For singlehandedly putting it down, he was recommended to her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, for the honor of Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Later, during his residence in Teheran, Ussery was appointed to the Board of Governors of Damavand College for Women. He was elected to the Board of Trustees of Teheran American School in 1964. He served in that capacity (four years as President) until the graduation of his daughter from the school in 1970.

Many other honors came to Ussery during his years in Iran. Probably due to his close friendship with the ruler of Abu Dhabi, he was appointed Honorary Colonel of the Defense Force of that country.

But probably one of the events that touched I.W. Ussery the most during his years in Iran was a request for him to deliver the official Eulogy after the death of President Lyndon Baines Johnson in 1975. He wrote this piece and presented it to a large crowd of Americans and Iranians who had gathered in the city. (His Eulogy is reprinted elsewhere in this paper.)

Returning to the United States in 1975, Ussery was assigned to represent Brown and Root as Consultant to the Minority Assistance Program of the Houston Regional Minority Purchasing Council Inc.

Upon his retirement in 1976 (he preferred to use the term 'recycled') he continued to serve with the council until the move to Eastland in April 1978.

He continued to work as a consultant in Eastland, along with many other activities.

Highway Adopters Saving Big Dollars

Big blue Adopt-a-Highway signs are cropping up faster than flowers after a spring rain, as citizens by the thousands sign up in groups with the Texas Department of Transportation to help rid Texas highways of unsightly litter.

Eight thousand of these signs have been erected statewide for 4000 volunteer groups who have adopted 8200 miles of highway. In the nine-county Brownwood District of TxDOT, 85 groups have adopted 191 miles, which includes Eastland County, with 11 groups adopting 25 miles.

Adopt-a-Highway offers volunteer groups the chance to sign up to actively support the department's anti-litter programs. Local groups "adopt" two-mile (or more) sections of highway which they agree to clean at least four times per year. At each end of the two-mile section the department installs a big blue sign crediting the adopting organization. Adopt-a-Highway groups include families, churches, civic and youth groups, businesses, and clubs of all kinds.

"One of our greatest concerns is the amount of litter collected on our highway system," said Brownwood District Engineer Wes Heald. "And one of the most frustrating things that I have faced since becoming district engineer is the total disregard some people have for highway beauty. From time to time we observe where people have purposely dumped household garbage for our crews to dispose of."

He emphasized that Adopt-a-Highway groups have made a big difference. "They not only keep the wildflowers from being covered by trash, but they are helping change attitudes about littering. People notice, and once they've seen volunteers picking up

trash or have participated themselves, they will think twice before throwing out even a gum wrapper."

It appears that the majority of littering is due to loose trash blowing out of trailers and pickup trucks, Heald noted. "When you drive down the road and see large sacks and other big pieces of litter, you know they must have come from the bed of a pickup."

He observed that many of the old landfill sites have been closed due to environmental regulations, and this has caused an increase in the number of discarded tires and other things on the right-of-way that were formerly hauled to the dump site. Cost of picking up litter statewide for fiscal year 1990-91 was \$13,127,756. In Eastland County during this period, the cost was \$27,789. "This is money that could be used to improve the highway system," he said.

Five years ago the cost for picking up litter in the Brownwood District was \$271,000. During this past fiscal year, the cost amounted to \$149,304, registering a reduction of \$121,696. Heald credits the 'Don't Mess with

Texas' campaign and the Adopt-a-Highway program for the reduction. "Our hats are off to the volunteers. We appreciate them very much, and ask that they 'spread the word,'" he said.

The Adopt-a-Highway program began in Texas in 1985, the brainchild of Billy Black, public affairs

officer for the Tyler District. It quickly spread statewide, and has been so successful that today 47 states from Wyoming to New York have initiated similar programs.

We need to remember we own this country

Editor's note: Dallas businessman H. Ross Perot has said he will run for president if he is put on the ballot as an independent candidate in each of the 50 states. Last week, he talked about what's wrong with America, and how Americans can regain control of their government, in a speech to the National Press Club in Washington. Following are excerpts from the speech:

H. ROSS PEROT

We own this country. It belongs to us. That's the central theme of everything I have to say today.

At this point in time, it is absolutely irresponsible for both the White House and Congress not to be linking arms, working together night and day to fix the economic problems.

Unfortunately, this city has become a town filled with sound bites, shell games, handlers, media stuntmen who posture, create images, talk, shoot off Roman candles but don't ever accomplish anything. We need deeds, not words, in this city.

Let's look at where we are. The debts piled up in 1992, just this one year, will exceed the total expenditure of the federal government for the first 155 years of our country's existence. The interest on the national debt just this year exceeds the cost of fighting and winning World War II.

The total national debt was only \$1 trillion in 1980, when President Reagan took office. It is now \$4 trillion. Maybe it was voodoo economics. Whatever it was, we are now in deep voodoo.

In 1992, we're going to go in for another \$400 billion. Let's think about some radical things and balance the budget this year.

Let's just shut down the Defense Department. You can't get \$400 billion. Let's just shut down the public schools nationwide. Sorry, that won't get me \$400 billion.

What if we just seized all the Social Security money coming in this year and used that to balance the budget? That would just about do it.

Let's just go over and take it away from business. Let's confiscate the Fortune 500 companies' profits. Doesn't give us nearly what we need. But we've solved the problem — we're all blue collar now, right?

OK, Ross, give us the bad news. How much are we going to have to raise personal income taxes to balance the budget this year? Watch my lips. You're going to have to double them.

Now, that's how big \$400 billion is. I'm not talking about the \$4 trillion.

The tax and budget summit in 1990 is a study in White House arrogance. We were told if we agreed to the \$166 billion in new taxes, the 1991 deficit would be \$63 billion. The following April, (they) said, "Oops! It's going to be \$318 billion." That's a \$255 billion mistake. That would get you fired in the most soft-headed company in corporate America.

Now, nobody told the voters that while they were

increasing our taxes by \$166 billion, they increased federal spending by \$304 billion. I'm not too smart, but I can figure out that we spent more than we took in. As far as I'm concerned, we were conned. And who conned us? The people who were working for us, our elected officials.

We were told at the tax and budget summit that the five-year deficit would be \$92 billion. Now we're told it'll be a trillion dollars. That's just a \$900 billion mistake. The chief financial officer of a public-owned corporation would be sent to prison if he kept books like our government.

We cannot continue to tolerate this. Every citizen works five months a year just paying taxes. Forty-two percent of his income goes to taxes.

Let's look for the good news. Well, surely all this spending created Utopia here in the United States.

Take a hard look at Utopia. We're the largest debtor nation on earth; we're the most violent, crime-ridden nation in the industrialized world.

We spend over \$400 billion a year on education, including colleges, yet we rank at the bottom of the industrialized world in terms of academic achievement.

We spend more than anybody else on health care, and yet we rank behind 15 nations in life expectancy and 22 other nations in infant mortality.

We have 5 percent of the world's population, 50 percent of the world's cocaine use... two-thirds of the world's lawyers, and the average fellow on the street can't afford one to go to court. Strange. Young lawyers out of law school make more than judges.

You've got the murder capital of the United States here. Fifth and sixth graders in the city, 31 percent of them have witnessed a shooting, 45 percent have witnessed a mugging, 67 percent have

witnessed a drug deal, and 75 percent have witnessed an arrest.

Is this an alabaster city, gleaming, undimmed by human tears?

Obviously, throwing money at problems has not created Utopia, and yet we continue to do it. Today, we have a government in gridlock. Nothing happens unless Congress and the White House work together constructively for the benefit of the people. That's the way our founders planned it.

I feel as owners of this country, if we're going anywhere, you've got to send them a message: You work for us, we don't work for you. Under the Constitution, you are our servants. Grow up! Work as a team! Serve the people, solve the problem, and move on to the next one. Build a better country and stop throwing away money we don't have.

I love the message coming from both parties. It's, "Can we buy your votes with your money this year?"

We need fundamental, long-term solutions to these problems, and at this point, we are running around in Washington with a hypodermic needle loaded with Novocaine, trying to give everybody quick, temporary pain relief just to get past the election.

This is the best analogy I can give you: An old racehorse has a good record. It's got bad knees, but we've got to get one more race out of him. We shoot him up. He runs the race, and that's his last race, because we wrecked his knees.

Now, folks in Congress and the White House, in my judgment, are not villains on this whole economic situation. They just don't know what to do.

You say, all right, Ross, which one of the presidential candidates can fix this. Solomon can't fix this — the wisest man that ever lived. Because we

have to fix it. You cannot just go vote in November. You're going to have to get in the ring, stay in the ring and act like you own this country.

We've got to stop deficit spending immediately. We've got to replace Gramm-Rudman with a real bill that cuts out all tricks, loopholes and improper accounting procedures.

You've got to take away Congress' right to raise taxes. So, that means a constitutional amendment. Now, if they need more money, just put it on a ballot and let the owners of the country sign off.

Step 1 is stop the bleeding; step 2 is make sure you don't just tax and spend, tax and spend.

If they want a raise, put it on the ballot. You own this country.

Give the president the line-item veto to get rid of pork barrel and waste.

Finally, Congress absolutely must not exempt itself from the law it imposes on us.

Require all members of Congress and the president to turn in excess funds from each campaign.

If I could have just one wish before I turn out the lights, this is it: Former federal officials, elected, appointed and career service officials, cannot serve as lobbyists for domestic interest for five years after they leave office. They cannot lobby for foreign countries, companies or individuals for 10 years, and there are criminal penalties if you do.

Why do we have elections on Tuesday? Let's have elections on Saturday and Sunday. Why can't we leave the polls open two days?

No exit polls. It's a criminal offense if anybody prints exit polls, and no data from East Coast polling booths until the last booth closes in Hawaii.

Now, we're getting things a little bit straightened out. This is kind of basic simple stuff. Make adequate television time available for all candidates so the incumbent doesn't have an advantage.

Get rid of all the freebies. You've got the free hair cuts, the big gymnasiums. Why don't these boys join a health club? It's hard times. We're talking all this fancy stuff, free prescription drugs, parking places and so on.

Get rid of the 1,200 airplanes worth \$2 billion that are used to fly our servants around like royalty. Keep an airplane for the president, if you want to, but downsize it to a Gulf stream. The Cold War is over.

Now, slash the White House staff, the Cabinet staffs, congressional staffs.

In summary, we own this country. Government should come from us.

In plain Texas talk, it's time to take out the trash and clean out the barn, or it's going to be too late.

We've got a choice.

We can wait until the clock stops ticking, and it'll take us two decades to fix it, or we can move now. It's our choice.
