Youth Center To Provide Local Jobs

A home in the Romney Community, which once housed the Mountain Top Church, has been acquired by Solomon's Youth Centers, Inc., to be used as a home for twenty-four boys between the ages of 14 and 18.

The home, or youth center, will reportedly have an annual budget of three million dollars, will purchase needed supplies locally as much as is possible, and will provide local employment for about thirty people.

Residents accepted at the youth center will be placed there by the courts, and will undergo an extensive program of evaluation, treatment, and training. Medical, dental, auditory, visual and psychiatric evaluation and treatment will be offered. There will also be counseling, monitoring of medications, behavior modification therapy, and staff training.

The boys will have rooms with not more than three boys per room, and

they will be offered religious training at the center and with the community as is available. Plans also call for a volunteer program of registered community representatives to have contact with the boys.

Some classroom schooling will be provided at the center under the approval of the local school district, and G.E.D. classes will also be made available. A full recreational program, and training in self-care, independent living, and

vocational awareness will be provided at the center also. And the boys will be assigned daily chores.

Privileges, treatment and discharge from the center will be based on the boys progress, or lack of it.

Communication with the boys' parents or guardians will be maintained when possible, and counseling will also be offered to them. The progress of each boy will be closely monitored and the treatment or training may be modified as needed.

Dr. Solomon Kimuyu, a resident of Abilene who may move to Cisco at the end of the school year, is the Executive Director of Solomon's Youth Centers, Inc., which also operates a center at Merkel.

Renovation, Other Matters Discussed At Eastland Commissioners Meeting

Eastland City Commissioners had a number of items on the agenda last Monday night, Jan. 23. One of the first discussions was an update on the Connellee Hotel renovation plan.

Sally Loveland of the National Development Council said that a 240-page grant application for \$1.2 million had been submitted to the State.

This is called a HOME Investment Partnership Application. The funds would be used for converting the old hotel into apartments for Seniors, with business space on the lower floor and a meeting

area on the top floor.

Sally Loveland appeared hopeful about Eastland's Grant Application, saying that it meets or exceeds most of the criteria used for scoring Grant Applications of this type.

Reportedly 30 other Applications are also being considered by the State. The decision depends on how much State money is available - and the survey will probably be completed in March, 1995. Eastland will know at that time if the renovation can proceed.

The Commissioners reviewed the situation with the downtown sidewalks - how tree roots are causing the sidewalks to buckle. No decision was made on this; further study will be made.

There was considerable discussion about tires being dumped at Ringling Lake. The item was tabled so that Commissioners can look into the possibility of putting a gate on the road leading to the Lake.

They also said there was no reason for people to dump old tires out on roads. Used tires can be brought to the City Yard Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. - 12 noon, 1 p.m. - 5 p.m. There will be no

charge. The City Yard is located on Halbryan and Plummer.

In other matters, 32 people were appointed to serve on a Mayor's Beautification Committee for the 1995 Homecoming. There will also be Code enforcement activities.

The Commissioners voted to allow Eastland Police Chief Cecil Funderburgh to set up the Eastland Citizen Police Academy Program. The first class is expected to have 16 people in it.

On another item, the Commissioners voted to see a H.E.R.C. pipe cleaning demonstration. This will be held on Feb. 15th, beginning at 9 a.m. It will be on a section of Conner St. between Bassett and Halbryan. Representatives of other towns will be invited.

In other business, regular payments were approved for improvements to the Wastewater Treatment Plant and City Collection System.

A new contract was approved for the assessment and collection of taxes. The Commissioners also heard the City Manager's fiscal report for December, 1994.

Texas Legislature

Austin, Texas - Speaker James E. "Pete" Laney announced committee assignments, January 26th. For some house members it was like the old card saying "read 'em and weep" when the





West Side of the Square

Let's look at the west side of the square, facing west. The south end of the west side according to my earliest memory of it was the two story Rust Building, owned by Judge Rust. The ground floor in the boom days housed a dry goods, or as some people liked to describe them as a department store. The later word seems to be a little more impressive. Although a lot of the earlier citizens here thought Mr. Boaz was Jewish, I don't think he was. It seems to me that he was a Christian by religion and he was Lebanese. While I was still a youngster he moved his firm to Jacksboro and the last time I was through that town I noticed his firm was still in business there.

Then there was a long period when this site was the location of five and dime stores as many people refer to them as a variety store. Mr. J.W. Miller operated on the west side for years and years. He occupied this corner site and then later he occupied the south half of the department store. My's later occupied. Between these two sites various stores have occupied the building. Pipkin once had a grocery store in this building. Dr. Madden, who at one time had three drug stores on the square, two on the west side and one on the north side, had a store in this building. And it was in this building that I learned a noble lesson in proper conduct and relationship with my fellow man.

One day my mother and my brother and I were down town together when mother got a sweet tooth urge. She gave me a quarter and told me to go into the drug store there and get the three of us a Hershey bar, each. This I was only too glad to do, as a Hershey bar of their fine

milk chocolate was something I certainly did not get every day. I went into the store, walked to the candy counter and noticed the store manager talking to a man at the cash register which was on a desk about half way back to the rear of the store. This manager was the pharmacist-manager of the store and was named Earnest Harkrider. He had two or three brothers here later on, but at this time I did not know them and they have nothing to do with this story of life.

Mr. Harkrider seemed to be very busy talking to his customer and as a young kid I was a little restless and always in a hurry. After waiting for what seemed to me a short eternity to be waited on I tapped the counter with my quarter and spoke to Mr. Harkrider in a rather impatient voice, "Here Shorty, here's your money. Give me my change."

He leaned over that counter and looked down at me, "You're a mighty insignificant thing to be calling a grown man Shorty." That sort of took me and it did cause me to do a little thinking.

All people don't like the nicknames some of us try to attach to certain people. I never again called a man Shorty who might in any way have an objection to it. Nicknames can hurt. The only man I call Shorty now is Shorty Allcocks and I notice he is not at all offended by the name.

We almost let the small matter of a nickname get some of us in a little trouble and to hurt a good man's feelings some years ago. It seems that a young man who did not have all of the knowledge of farm animals or wild life made a simple inquiry about some "wolf-eggs." A group of boys suffering from their arrogant ignorance wanted to attached this name to him and always called him by that name when they saw him. Young boys can be a little heartless and unmerciful in some of their thinking. This hurt this man's feelings and I am proud today that I think I helped stop his being called by that nickname. I found out very quickly he did not like. Who would?

Harkrider. In 1938 or 1939 I was working in Odessa and Mr. Harkrider was a pharmacist for the L. and H. Drug Store in Odessa. He and I often had lunch at the little cafe whose name I think was Best Yet, that was right next door to the entrance of the Lyric Theater, so one day I told him of my experience. He did not remember it at all he said. But I did and still do.

The south half of the Dakan Building at one time was occupied by Jack Williamson Hardware Company. He in turn sold out to Jim Sherrill who operated here for some years, moved the south side of the square sold to Curtis Kimbrell.

The north half of this building was J.W. Miller's variety store for a long time. Mr. Miller had two children, a boy and a girl. The boy was a good baseball player and later worked for Texas Electric Service Company. He married the youngest of the Everette girls of Olden. But he died a few years ago and she did live many years longer than he did. They did not have any children.

Next to the west side was Campbell and Fagg Department Store with a 75 foot front. This was the largest store in Eastland for years and was the store that sold all of the old famous brand of clothes. Florsheim shoes, for example, Arrow and Manhattan shirts, Jockey underwear. If it was a popular brand name Campbell and Fagg usually handled it. However, by the time the depression hit Eastland the store had closed out. As I understand it Mr. Campbell lived in Abilene and he had a fair-sized department store in that town. Mr. Fagg lived here on South Seaman Street in the block just north of Sadosa. The store building had more space than any other in town and by this time the Connellee Theater was having a little trouble with acoustics in its building with the advent of sound pictures. Also the cost of heating and cooling that large a building was something for the entrepreneur to think about. So the theater people and the Campbell and Fagg people got together.

The theater people took over the northern 25 feet of the store and put in a movie, using the latest in sound equipment and air conditioning available at that time. Among the things that had to be done was to take out the old floor and dig a hole to slope the theater floor down several feet. This was done and the new theater was named the Lyric. For several years this was Paramount-Public's theater for first run pictures for Eastland.

Today if one stands at the front of this building and looks for evidences of this change in the building he can see that there used to be a marquee around a portion of the

front of this building.

The little building north had several different offices in it from time to time. As a kid I remember that the Eastland Telegram before it built its own building on East Plummer had an office of some sort next door to the barbershop. I was so small that that I did not know what this office was. I am sure where the Telegram, which then was a weekly paper, was printed. After their Plummer Street building as completed the Eastland Telegram became daily. That is it was a five-day afternoon paper and then on Sundays it was published in the mornings. I am not sure whether the connection had been made with the Ranger Times then or not.

At one time the Ranger Times was sort of the major paper of these two papers. And at this time there were two Eastland papers. The other being the Eastland Chronicle. I do not remember who published this paper.

But this piece was not supposed to be about the two newspapers in Eastland and the only way I got onto the subject was to mention that one of them had an office of some sort on the west side of the square in the early days following the Oil Boom. The other half of this building was a barber shop.

My earliest recollection of this barber shop was that it was a four or five man barber shop operated by a Mr. Joe Laurant. Mr. Laurant had two boys and a daughter. His daughter later became the personal secretary to Attorney Allen D. Dabney and worked for him for years and years. I think she worked for him until her death. I remember that Judge Earl Conner, Jr. and I were pallbearers at her funeral. The Catholic priest who conducted the services, the local pastor, had the same name as a man who had been in Nixon's cabinet: John Mitchell.

In those days there were many oilfield workers who

lived on the lease or out in the field who did not have bathing facilities at their homes so they would go to the barber shop for a bath. Laurant's Barber Shop had several small rooms in the back of the shop each housing a bathtub. For a fee a man could rent the use of one of these tubs, with plenty of hot water and soap and come out smelling like a rose. Saturday afternoon were the busiest for this operation.

The front of the barber shop had a shine parlor set up in it and Willie Speaker used to put out the best shoe shines in West Texas. Mr. Willie Speaker did know how to put a shine on a pair of shoes.

On Sunday mornings he opened for the Sunday School trade and always did a land office business for a while. It was always a treat to get him to shine one's shoes and he made your feet feel good too.

The corner north of the barbershop was the Corner Drug Store. This was the old mainstand of many of our younger people at that time. The store had one of the finest soda fountains in this part of the country and a couple of the finest sodaskeets in the business worked there. They were Archie Hayes and Elmer McCann.

Archie had a brother Monte who operated a grocery store in part of what is now the Fellowship Hall of the First Christian Church. Later he and Archie went to California to the oil producers of California.

Several years ago Archie came to one of the Homecomings that we have in Eastland every five years and on his arrival in Eastland, the first thing he asked me was who was the Eastland boy who had intercepted an Arkansas pass and ran it back for a touchdown. He had seen the game in California and that was the game that Jimmie Moyland ran like, the radio announcer said, a halfback. That he did.



Ranger Commissioners Roundup

Monday, January 23 1995.

Mayor Ainsworth called the commissioners to order. Comm. Britt gave the invocation. The financial report by Comm. Tankersley showed the General Fund to be \$13,495.89; Water Sewer & Sanitation \$13,944.14; Hotel Motel \$455.69; Police Special \$123.29; Ambulance Fund \$4,088.71; Sewer Line Reserve \$797.51.

The first item on the agenda was the discussion of Buck Schlumbohm's job termination. Comm. Wells stated there had been some written complaints and a lot of people calling in complaints, as well as other reasons. At this point Mayor Ainsworth ask Mr. Achlumbohm if he had any questions. Mr. Schlumbohm (Buck) took the floor and ask who had made the complaints. Comm. Wells

explained that other officers as well as citizens had been complaining about his behavior on the job.

Buck went on to read a letter written by a lady from Weatherford who was in support of him. Mayor Ainsworth read the letter making some notes. The Mayor told Mr. Schlumbohm that was all Comm. Wells was going to bring out in open session.

Buck thanked the Commissioners and expressed his desire to help the city in any way he could in the future.

Second item of business was the installation of cross arms at the Wayland crossing by Brenda Wells. Mrs. Wells gave statistics on a number of accidents at this location.

The commissioners lent their names to a petition and agreed to send a letter to the Railroad and Hwy. Dept. to help get flashing lights and cross arms at the location. Anyone interested in signing the petition should contact Mrs. Wells.

Third on the agenda was a request by Doyle

Russell to have the utilities at the scout hut turned on. Adam Lopez stated their desire to start clean-up and renovation on the building. Comm. Tankersley assured the Scouts that work had already begun and the utility work would soon be complete.

Item number four: Mayor Ainsworth explained the importance of a class "C" license.

Under no circumstances will an employee falsify a sewer plant report as was done in the 1990 administration.

Approval of the December bills was number five on the agenda. After all the commissioners looked them over Shawn Wells made a motion to pay them. Comm. Tankersley seconded. All Ayes.

Personnel Matters followed, but were tabled until the next meeting.

The last item, number seven, was Old Business: Mayor Ainsworth said the City Council on 1-9-95 approved an "Option Contract" for the possible purchase of 130 acres from Mrs. Weaver Ishman. The City's understanding was that a Trailer House Manufacturer was interested in moving to Ranger. The City Council has yet to see a "Letter of Intent". After the contract was voted on it went straight to the Bank, signed at the bank, sent out to be returned to the Bank. The registered address for the Economic Development Council is 400 W. Main not the Bank at 106 E. Main.

Mayor Ainsworth went on to say he was tired of Tom Dunn and Ken Parrack trying to run the City Council and E.D.C. "I am really dissatisfied with the way the President of the E.D.C. is handling the project. If the City Council has to replace him we will."

Paul Riffle had been requested by the City Council to meet with the Trailer House

Manufacturer's representative and our City Engineer. We have had no response. It is very important that we meet with the representative of any company planning to relocate to Ranger to discuss incentives that the city will be offering.

The Trailer House Co. requested 20 acres for the plant. To Dunn told the E.D.C. that to purchase 130 acres of the Ishman property for \$91,000 was a good deal. The question is for who? The Bank President said he would make a note and combine the \$25,000 that is still owed on the Loves Truck Stop and \$91,000 for the 130 acres plus interest. That would total \$148,786.80 for ten years, with a monthly payment of \$1,239.89. No one mentioned this at the City Council Meeting!

To purchase this property, install a lift station for the sewer system, and to install all the piping necessary for the water and sewer development, would cost about \$450,000 plus interest. To do this the State requires the City to hire an engineer to prepare the plans and be approved by the T.N.R.C.C. Also this project requires doing an Environmental Assessment and Historical Survey. All this at an additional cost of several thousand dollars. These costs would not include the road construction or installation of drainage horns.

Ken Parrack had advised the E.D.C. that they "could" borrow \$200,000 from the State for improvements. These men said the city could build an Industrial Park on the Ishman property, and this would also be a good deal. Again, the question is, for who?

The Mayor said these improvements will cost Ranger 1.2 dollars. This figure is probably on the short side by \$3000,000. In his opinion, Ranger can't afford this Industrial Park. We can, however, afford the 20 acres Trailer House Manufacturing Co. This would allow our remaining Economic Development tax money to welcome more new companies to the City of Ranger.

At this point, Dr. Riffle took the floor and stated that some mistakes had been made and he had learned some things he didn't know before. From now on he wanted to work more closely with the City Council, he said.

The mayor ask members of the Council if they had anything to add, no one did, so he adjourned the meeting. By Mayor Ainsworth


